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Bishop to Bestow Honor

HICKSVILLE—Bestowal of the dignity of Domestic Prelate of Right Reverent Monsignor by Bishop Thomas E. Molloy upon Father George M. Bittermann, pastor of St. Ignatius R. C. Church, here, will take place at "a mutually convenient date", it was learned this week. Rt. Rev. Bittermann, VF, who is dean of central Nassau with limited jurisdiction over 23 parishes, was notified of his ecclesiastical honor by the Holy Father on June 1.

Continue Water Use Rules

HICKSVILLE—Residents of the water district were reminded today that regulations on the proper days for lawn sprinkling and irrigation are continuing in effect, immediately. Consumers south of Old Country Rd are restricted to odd-numbered days of the month, and those north of Old Country Rd to even-numbered days of the month.

Farm irrigation consumers are prohibited between the hours of 4 P.M. and 9 P.M. every day.

"The Board of Water Commissioners requests the cooperation of all consumers in complying with these regulations to avoid the possibility of a catastrophe by fire and also to avoid the possible damage to wells and pumping equipment which could run into untold unnecessary additional costs to taxpayers", a spokesman said.

Change in Business Manager?

HICKSVILLE—The School District may shortly have a new business manager, it was learned this morning. Harry Ernenwein, present business manager who resigned his position as a member of the Board of Education to accept the position upon the death of Franklin Duerk, has failed to get a passing grade in a recent State Civil Service test for the job. It was revealed at a Board of Education meeting, Wednesday night. Six other residents of Nassau County, whose names were not known at this time, also took the test and hold positions on the list for the position. The job currently pays \$6400 with a scheduled increase to \$7200 under the budget for the new fiscal year, starting July 1.

Clothing Collection Takes Place Saturday

HICKSVILLE—Lieut. Leonard F. Urschel, Chairman of the American Relief for Korea said today, "This is our last plea before the actual house-to-house clothing collection, scheduled for this Saturday, June 12, starting at 10 A.M. Friends, give all the clothing you can spare to help alleviate the suffering of the Korean people. Men's, women's, and children's clothing of all types are needed; trousers and overalls, dresses and skirts, coats, caps and gloves, bath-robies, socks and stockings, shirts and sweatshirts, blankets and bedding, mittens and mufflers, layette material, shoes in good repair. Knitted wear is especially needed; winters are severe and bitter in Korea. Remember, in Pusan people are living right along the windswept streets without any shelter, and the only clothing they usually have is on their backs."

"So please give generously. Your neighbor in this campaign will call at your door. Be ready won't you? Please have your contribution, tied in neat bundles or in boxes. All our cars and trucks will carry identification. Please look for this, before giving your clothing to anyone: If you expect to be away during the drive, your bundles may be brought to 2nd St. and Frevert Pl. during the morning of June 12."

PSC Sets Hearing June 24

NEW YORK—A hearing "to determine whether preparation of plans should be ordered" for Hicksville RR grade crossing elimination was announced today for 10 o'clock Thursday morning, June 24, by the State Public Service Commission at 233 Broadway, here. Presiding at the hearing will be Examiner Sanders Schwartz. Crossings listed are Jerusalem Ave., Broadway, Marie St., Nicholai St. and Old Country Rd., all in Hicksville.

Note Park Care Progress

HICKSVILLE—The expanding park district staff here is getting some more equipment. Already utilizing the service of a man charged with maintaining various park district grounds and a power cutting machine, the district is adding a trailer unit to transport the power mower, it was disclosed today by Councilman Frank Chlumsky.

A remodeled barn on the property of Parking Field no. 3 in the rear of the Professional Bldg. is used to house the park district equipment and machinery.

The Town Board is considering enactment of rules and regulations on the use of the various park areas, including restricting

hardball playing in the smaller fields, it was learned.

Meanwhile the Civic Information Exchange which has been devoting considerable attention to the problems of development of areas set aside by builders here, at the direction of town authorities, for park purposes, disclosed that while work on fencing the park area at Glenbrook Homes has started, only the posts have been erected so far.

Also, in the Millwood Gate section a park area has been cleared of rubbish and debris but has not been fenced as yet. And in Hillside Terrace, adjacent property owners are complaining because the playing field backstop is too close to the houses.

Charge 'Strike Violence' As Amperex Talks Resume

HICKSVILLE—Charges of vandalism by a small portion of the 2100 striking employees were voiced yesterday by the management of Amperex Electronic Corp. at Duffy Ave., here, as a date for a Federal conciliation meeting in New York City was announced. The meeting was set for two o'clock

this afternoon (Thursday) at the office of Cincilliator George Mc Gann.

Employees of Amperex, members of the International Assoc. of Machinists, have been on strike since May 28th when union-management negotiations on a new contract were "deadlocked."

The statement released to the Herald yesterday by Martin G. Wolfert, assistant to the President of Amperex, follows:

NAILS IN ROADWAY

"Management feels that the large majority of Amperex employees who are on strike are law-abiding and responsible personnel and we feel that they are not in sympathy with the vandalism that took place Friday, June 4, such as throwing nails in the path of moving cars or cutting and scratching of cars that occurred Monday, June 7.

"We feel that acts of this kind are not helpful in bringing management and union together. The attitude of management is that we cannot be pressured into anything by irresponsible vandalism."

"We have every reason to believe that the large majority of our employees now on strike, do not condone these acts that are being carried out by the very few."

Employees of Amperex out on strike have charged that "management provoked the strike". A management spokesman said a basic issue appeared to be a demand for a 10 cents per hour wage increase plus additional sick leave.

All production at the plant has ceased since the strike began 12 days ago.

Payroll of the striking employees is estimated at \$18,000 weekly. The firm manufactures specialized power tubes for giger counters, x-ray machines and radio transmitters. Amperex opened here about two years ago.

GEROE V. SPOHRER obtained approval this week from the Town Board to remodel and rebuild some of his buildings at the Hicksville Farmer's Market on Robbins Lane. At a recent public hearing, the application was opposed by JACOB GELLMAN who is developing a Farmers Market on South Broadway, Bethpage, opposite Grumman's. Gellman charged that since farmer market regulations have been changed by the town board regarding 20 acres or more, the former autopark market would be a non-conforming use and thus, he claimed, not eligible for revision. . . . 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

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT OF SETTLEMENT IN CONNECTION WITH MAP OF PROPERTY TO BE ACQUIRED FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF MEADOWBROOK STATE PARKWAY EXTENSION SECTION TWO AT GARDEN CITY, IN THE TOWN OF HEMPSTEAD; PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY, THE NASSAU COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE AND AMENDMENTS TO SAID LAWS.

WHEREAS, the County of Nassau did acquire title to certain premises located at Garden City in the Town of Hempstead, Nassau County, New York, formerly the Long Island Motor Parkway, and

WHEREAS, subsequent to such acquisition the Jones Beach State Parkway Authority condemned said premises for the improvement known as Meadowbrook State Parkway Extension, Section Two and caused to be filed in the office of the County Clerk of Nassau County a map entitled: "State of New York, Jones Beach State Parkway Authority, Map of Property to be Acquired for Meadowbrook State Parkway Extension, Section Two, August 17, 1953" on which map the premises owned by the County was designated as Parcel 20, Map No. A-11R-2015, and

WHEREAS the Jones Beach State Parkway Authority has requested that the County of Nassau execute and deliver to it an agreement in settlement for all claims for damages created by the acquisition by said Authority for good and valuable considerations, as set forth in an agreement in writing dated June 14th, 1954, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the County Executive be and he hereby is authorized to execute for and on behalf of the County of Nassau said agreement dated June 14th, 1954, between the County of Nassau and Jones Beach State Parkway Authority and to execute any and all other instruments necessary to effectually carry out the terms of said agreement.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

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
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CURRENT COMMENT:

Tournament Time Again

PROBABLY NOWHERE in the state, if not the country, are volunteer firemen's drills conducted with such enthusiastic vigor as they are in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. The season for such activity is now getting underway and there will be competitions in various firemen's operations on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays until the biggest of them all—the statewide competitions included—is held at Hicksville on Labor Day.

For a period of years there had been increasing efforts to break standing records for the high speed events. This trend, we are pleased to note, is now being reversed and there is greater interest in the slower but more practical type of events. The urge for speed led to the development of supercharged racers and all kinds of trick devices (such as miniature wheels on the foot of ladders to ease dragging ladders down the course) had been coming into vogue.

But with speed came the increase in the number of physical injuries to the men who on other days of the week make their living at such prosaic tasks as cutting meat, painting, plumbing, carpentry, delivering mail or pushing a pen.

This year, we are told, there will be more active participation in such foot running events as efficiency, bucket, and the slower vehicle punper contests.

Although a smaller inter-battalion contest was held last Sunday at Levittown, the formal tournament season gets started at Lynbrook on Saturday, June 19 with the program sponsored by the Nassau County Firemen's Assoc.

Last year the county assoc. tourney was held in cooperation with the Hicksville Labor Day program. Therefore, the Hicksville Fire Dept., as the previous year's host department will lead the parade at Lynbrook on June 19.

The parade is always a big part of tournament day. Competing teams are always required, by regulations, to enter the parade if they wish to run in the contests. Anyone who can't resist the sight of a gleaming fire truck can get his fill by watching a tournament day parade.

Among the people who can recall highlights of almost every important tournament in the past decade or more are several from this area. Perhaps foremost among them is Henry A. Gebhardt, former chief of the Hicksville Fire Dept. (who was elected for four successive terms), who is always present as one of the county officials. Another county official is Harry Borley, ex-chief and a water commissioner in Hicksville.

A couple of years ago the word "tournament" became unfashionable and the competitions between the community fire departments are now officially described as "drills". But no matter what the name, the excitement of competition returns when tournament season opens on Long Island. Split second timing and teamwork, plus a few spills and an accidental wetting down for the audience at least once during an afternoon, are all part of the thrills.

Our town officials have known for some years now that the tremendous and ever-increasing number of serious local problems cannot be solved efficiently, or rapidly, under our special district form of town government. Our people, more of them every day, are coming to the same realization.

Our town officials, even if all of them were geniuses, could not handle the multitude of diverse problems in the numerous special districts of all the rapidly growing hamlets of our township. Their time is not in being unable to do the impossible.

Their shame is in trying to "kid" the people into waiting for the impossible to happen.

In Hicksville, Plainview, Bethpage, Syosset, Plainedge, Massapequa, and other populated areas in our township there are plenty of good civic minded citizens. Citizens who are interested enough in their local problems to start working today—tonight towards their solution.

In each of these areas there are men and women with the necessary intelligence and confidence to attempt to solve their own problems, and to put the solutions into effect.

There are enough of these community-minded

citizens in ever area so that each locality could be working simultaneously towards a solution. Instead of five semi-interested, harassed officials taking half hearted pokes in the general direction of progress, we would have dozens of citizens, whole village boards devoting their principal energy towards solutions acceptable to each local area.

But our American citizens in the unincorporated areas of Oyster Bay do not have the right to even decide which of their problems are the most important—let alone the necessary authority to take any action towards solving their own problems.

Only when an area such as Hicksville wants to incorporate, and to take over the responsibility of solving problems, do we see action by our town board. Even then the action is not towards solving any of the problems. All their energy is spent trying to keep Hicksville from doing for itself those very things that town government either won't or can't do for us.

Our town officials don't seem able to help us—but they are doing all they can. They are doing all they can—to keep us from trying to solve our own problems.

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

Section 1. Definitions. As used in this ordinance, unless otherwise expressly stated or unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:

1. The term "county property" shall mean all property owned by the County of Nassau including, but not limited to; the public general hospital known as Meadowbrook Hospital; the county tuberculosis hospital known as the Nassau County Sanatorium; the Nassau County Police Headquarters; the Nassau County Administration Building; the County Court Houses in Mineola; the Nassau County Park and the various parking fields and other installations owned by the County together with all of the drives, ways, parking areas and grounds

(b) "Vehicle" shall mean all vehicles propelled by any power other than muscular power.

3. "Park", "parking" or "parked" shall mean the stopping of a vehicle and leaving such vehicle unattended by a person capable of operating it.

4. "Stand", "standing" or "left standing" shall mean the stopping of a vehicle when such vehicle shall be occupied by a person capable of operating it.

5. "Stop", "stopped" or "stopping" shall mean the bringing or coming of a vehicle from motion to rest halting or causing the same to cease from motion.

Section 2. Speed Limit. No person shall operate any vehicle within any county property at a speed in excess of fifteen miles per hour; provided, however, that vehicles may be operated in excess of fifteen miles per hour but not in excess of twenty-five miles per hour upon the through road known as "Park Boulevard" which traverses the Nassau County Park beginning at the entrance of such park on Barnum Avenue (Post Avenue) opposite Stewart Avenue and terminating at the entrance of such park on Hempstead-Farmingdale Turnpike.

Section 3. Parking, standing and stopping.

(a) No person shall park, stand or stop a vehicle at any place within county property except those places where parking, standing or stopping shall be permitted by order of the county executive.

(b) The county executive may by order designate areas where parking, standing or stopping shall be restricted to vehicles operated by county officials or personnel or others having official business or rendering special services at the particular county installation.

Section 4. Movement of traffic. The county executive shall by order prescribe the direction in which vehicles shall proceed and the places where vehicles shall stop, turn or otherwise maneuver within county property.

Section 5. Signs and markings.

The county executive shall cause such appropriate signs to be erected and pavement markings to be made or other devices installed as he shall deem necessary for the enforcement of this ordinance or any order authorized herein. Such signs, markings or devices shall be furnished, installed and maintained by the county agency or department charged with the general maintenance of the particular county property.

Section 6. Obeyance of signs and markings.

(a) Persons operating vehicles within county property shall at all times observe and obey the directions, orders and instructions concerning upon or conveyed by signs, pavement markings or other devices relative to the

parking, standing or stopping of vehicles or the direction in which vehicles shall be operated or the places or manner in which vehicles shall be stopped, turned or otherwise maneuvered.

(b) Persons operating vehicles within county property shall at all times comply with the orders of any peace officer engaged in the direction of traffic whether the same be given orally or by hand signal.

Section 7. Penalties. The violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days or by both such fine or imprisonment.



More About Attorney Fees

To The Editor:

IT SEEKS TO ME, that the writer of the letter published in your May 20 issue, "Doeth protest too much!", and should keep the record straight.

In his letter along with several erroneous statements, he states that he can attest to Mr. Sullivan's competence and ability. Fine! I hope Mr. Sullivan continues to be competent and capable. I would shudder at the thought of him receiving the renumeration he does if he were incompetent or incapable. In my letter I had made no reference to either, as the writer well knows, that is if he read my letter.

The question of competence and ability does not enter into the picture since there are many attorneys just as competent and capable, in this country who are working for the Public without considering the renumeration they may receive. As for the School Board concluding that the fee arrangement is beneficial to the community, this in my estimation has no bearing on the matter, since it is always easy to spend someone else's money. That the majority favor the arrangement doesn't mean that it is beneficial to the people. When a fee arrangement is based on a percentage of construction costs such as Mr. Sullivan is now receiving of 1 per cent on the first million; % per cent on the second million; & % per cent on all succeeding millions, this increases construction costs and taxes.

The writer submits that "it is improper for those whose opinions have been rejected to distract the community with tantrums and diatribes." If being concerned about raising taxes and speaking out about same is a "tantrum" and distracts the community, this is the first I have heard of it.

Until now, the reaction to my letter has been favorable. I sincerely doubt whether it has disturbed the community. More likely it has awakened the community.

He goes on to say that the "priority of the fee paid Mr. Sullivan was recognized recently by the State Department of Education which found the matter one properly within the province of the local school board". Having heard such decision read at a recent school board meeting, I cannot recall at any place therein where the Department stated that they recognized his fees as proper. The essence of the report was that he was neither the highest paid school attorney, nor among the lowest paid, and that the question was outside their province, being a matter for the local school board. The State Department merely "washed their hands" of the matter since it was a local "hot potato". They felt were they to rule pro or con on the subject it would set a precedent for other Districts, who would in likelihood file protests with it over the Attorney fees. Let's keep the record straight.

The writer states that the Attorney Fee question was a major issue in the recent school board elections. Was it? Strange, I don't recall any candidate campaigning on that platform. The only public mention of the Attorney Fee question was when Mr. Lawrence Roman announced to the audience present at the P. T. A. Council's "Candidate Night" at the High School one week prior to the Election that the State Department of Education had handed down its decision on the subject, the same of which referred the matter back to the School Board. This, and this only, was the only mention of the Attorney Fee matter during the campaign. Was this then a Campaign issue?

I know of an Attorney who would make an ideal public servant; one who is more interested in the public welfare than in personal gain. Unfortunately for us, he resides in Jamaica and practices there. His name is Herbert A. O'Brien, and his qualifications are 10 years on the Bench of the City of New York, as a Justice of the Children's Court and a Surrogate. His clients range from Corporations to persons without funds to pay attorney fees. He is never too busy to give ear to the problems of whoever contacts him and to offer advice and help. Regardless of the ability of the people to pay he never charges for visits to his office; phone calls he makes in their behalf; or letters he writes in their behalf. Only if the service he performs entails a great deal of work does he charge, and then the fee is moderate. This man feels he has a legal as well as moral responsibility to the community and his fellow man.

The writer of the letter omitted one important item from his letter, something that I feel should be defended, namely this: The fact that the School Board had to borrow money from the bank to pay Mr. Sullivan's bill because he was not content to wait until the Bond Issue had been sold. The reason no mention was made was because no explanation could be given. Especially when paying Mr. Sullivan meant that the people have to pay interest on the loan.

IT SEEKS TO ME, in conclusion, therefore that the writer should have made certain of his facts before making rash statements. Evading the facts is the act of a child, not an adult.
