**Bring Your Bundles In This Saturday**

**HICKSVILLE**—L. F. Urschel, Chairman of American Relief for Korea campaign here, today apologized to the many kind and generous people whose clothing contributions were left uncollected last Saturday, June 12.

Despite the many pleas for drivers, only a handful showed up. This small group, worked almost all day but could not cover all the homes in town. An added problem was the scarcity of trucks (which had been promised) to transport the garments out of town. Henry C. Brenzel, owner of the Empire Warehouse, generously offered his warehouse as a temporary depot.

Mrs. Urschel, in the absence of her husband (who is attending a Lutheran Convention upstate) said today, "The New York City office of ARK advises me that they have obtained the use of an Army truck to transport donations. This truck will be stationed at 2nd St. off Jerusalem Ave., near the High School, this Saturday, June 19. It would be deeply appreciated, if those who can, will bring their bundles to the truck any time between 9 A.M. and 12 Noon."

**Count 94 Flags Flying Here**

**MINEOLA**—The community of Hicksville displayed the second largest number of American flags of any community in Nassau County on Monday, flag day, and almost tied with the first place Suffolk County village of Patchogue. A report on the count of flags displayed has been released by the American Principles Committee of the Long Island Assoc.

Leading in Nassau was Great Neck with 162 flags. Second for Nassau was Hicksville with 94 compared with a display of 24 flags in 1952. Patchogue, first in Suffolk, flew 98 flags.

Other comparative figures for mid-Island communities were (1952 figures given first): Bethpage 7 and 26, Jericho 8 and 3, Levittown 8 and 19, Oyster Bay 29 and 46, Plainview 2 and 8. Syosset flew 64 in 1952 and only 9 this year.

**140 Object To Apartments Here**

**OYSTER BAY**—A petition bearing over 140 signatures was presented in opposition to the erection of garden apartments in the north end of Hicksville at a town board public hearing, here, Tuesday morning. Objectors were largely residents of the adjacent Princess Ave. area. The structure is planned for 150 units on a 10-acre tract on the west side of North Broadway near Princess Ave.

The Town Board reserved decision on the application. Efforts by Jerry Zettler, vice president of the North West Civic Assoc., to obtain an adjournment of the hearing to permit further consideration was ignored. (See North West Notes on page 2 for other details.)

**Tougher Water Rules Unless Public Assists**

**HICKSVILLE**—Residents and consumers of the water district are not complying with the regulations of the board of commissioners regarding lawn and garden sprinkling, it was learned today. As a result the district is experiencing difficulty in maintaining sufficient water storage to insure adequate fire protection. Residents are reminded that all residential consumers SOUTH of Old Country Rd. are restricted to odd-numbered days of the month, and those NORTH of Old Country Rd. to even-numbered days. All farm irrigators are prohibited from doing so between 4 and 9 PM each day.

"In the event that consumers continue to disregard these restrictions, it will be necessary for us to greatly curtail the use of water for such purposes and in cases of persistent violators resort to fines or other means to enforce same", according to Frederick R. Davidson, superintendent of the water district.

**Dedicate Lutheran School on Sunday**

**HICKSVILLE**—Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, will dedicate its new \$220,000 Parish House and Lutheran School this Sunday, June 20, at 8:30 P.M. The Church is located at 40 West Nicholas St., just east of Jerusalem Ave.

The impressive services will be in three parts: the placing of the cornerstone, the cutting of the ribbon at the main door and the service of thanksgiving in the new auditorium.

The Rev. Professor Albert E. Meyer, President of Concordia College Institute, Bronxville, New York, and James W. Carpenter, Chairman of the Committee on American Principles and President of the Long Island Assoc., will be the principal speakers. Each will speak on the theme of the Dedication, "Teaching them to observe all things..." a dictate of Christ to His disciples as related in the Gospel of St. Matthew. The Rev. Edward H. Stammel, pastor of the Congregation, will give the dedication prayer.

Trinity Lutheran School, as it will be officially known, is the first Christian Day School to be established in the last decade in the fast-growing communities of Hicksville, Plainview and Levittown. As of Sept. 1954, it will accommodate 240 students from Kindergarten through eighth grade. During the last year, 165 pupils have been attending classes in temporary quarters.

The two-story modern styled building was designed by architect Robert Green of Tarrytown, who also designed the Walt Whitman elementary school of Woodbury and the Church edifice of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Lutheran, in Plainview. The latter was dedicated on April 11 of this year and was formerly a mission

of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church.

In addition to the classrooms, all of which have floor to ceiling windows, the building includes an auditorium-gymnasium, cafeteria and kitchens, health room, principal's office, (Continued on Page 16)

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# Appoint Recreation Committee To Work Out Township Plan

 OYSTER BAY—A full scale recreation program covering the entire Town of Oyster Bay and utilizing more than 80 playgrounds was activated this week by Supervisor Lewis N. Waters when he announced the formation of an advisory committee to "study the problem".  
 Cooperation of the New York State Youth Commission was also

assured, Waters said, after a number of conferences with Peter S. Hussey of Massapequa, Field Representative of the Youth Commission.  
 The plan entails the developing of more than 80 parcels of land which developers set aside in developments built during the past few years. Before issuing building permits, the Town succeeded in getting developers to set aside three per-

cent of their land for play areas, Waters said.  
 First step in the playground plan is the appointment of the advisory committee which includes Mrs. Ann Merin, Bethpage, president of PTA and organizer of a youth program for teen agers; Richard Guido, Bethpage swimming instructor and Little League organizer; Mrs. Jessie Christie, Farmingdale; Frank Manarel, principal, Syosset School; Mrs. William Orton, Hicksville; Chester Jaworski, athletic director for Hicksville Schools; Louis Millevolte, Hicksville, and Thomas Murray, also of Hicksville, active in Little League work, Charles Noble, Massapequa Park, Athletic Director, School District 28 and Little League leader Gustav Dopsaloff, Massapequa.  
 Following the advisory group's findings and recommendations, Waters said that a five-man Recreation Commission, headed by a full-time Commissioner, would be appointed to supervise operation of the Town's 80 future play areas. The State, Waters said, has agreed to pay half of the Commissioner's salary.  
 Preliminary work has already started on some of the parcels, Waters added.

## Reject Jerusalem Gas Station

OYSTER BAY—An application of David Forman for permission to erect a gasoline station on Jerusalem Ave. near Maglie Dr. North, Hicksville, was turned down by the Town Board here on Tuesday following a public hearing. The plea was protested by the Parc Community Civic Assoc. A spokesman for the town board said a similar application for the same site had been rejected by the board a year ago.

The Board reserved decision upon another gas station permit application for the corner of W. John St. and Holman Blvd., Hicksville, which was opposed by representatives of the North West Civic Assoc.

No decision was made by the Board this week regarding the proposed gas station at South Oyster Bay Rd. and Old Country Rd. which was the subject of a recent hearing and has been opposed by residents of Dave St. and vicinity.

Amend Article XXI, Subdivision 17.  
"plot held in single and separate ownership on January 27, 1953 with the width of lot not more than 40 feet, but not less than 20 feet, an attached garage may be erected with a total side yard not less than 15 feet and either side yard shall be less than 4 feet."

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# Passing Year Proves Point

THE WEEK BY WEEK reports on efforts to assemble the biggest petition in the history of the community—the petition required by state law to get the right to vote on home rule—was occupying the local headlines just a year ago. By the end of July, last year, a petition with more than 6,000 signatures of property owners had been compiled and turned over to the township supervisor.

It was not until August and September of last year that the volunteers who had trudged from door to door to obtain signatures discovered that their footsteps were being paced by various political personalities and who had successfully talked some home owners into withdrawing a few of those same hard-earned signatures.

In the interval since the petition was submitted, a hearing held, an adverse verdict handed down, and the matter was reviewed in court, a number of interesting facts have come to light.

For example, many shortcomings in local municipal affairs such as the lack of adequate shopper and commuter parking, drainage, road repairs and rebuilding were last year being scheduled for "immediate attention". Homeowners and business property owners were told that all things would be accomplished, that local home rule government was not necessary to get things done.

It is now a year later and most if not all of those conditions complained about are still the same or worse. Poor roads of a year ago are worse today. Small areas which flooded 12 months ago everytime it rained are large flooded areas today.

There will be another effort made to obtain the right for the people of Hicksville to vote and decide for themselves if they wish to establish local, responsive, home rule government. The discouragement of last fall, when the work of hundreds of volunteers on the home rule vote petition was clobbered in a few seconds by an arbitrary politically-inspired decision, is now being erased by the comments of those who a year ago were just lukewarm to the idea of local government but who are today among its most ardent advocates.

A prominent citizen who had been talked into withdrawing from the petition by "big men of the community, because my taxes would increase", today sadly confesses that "I took my name off, but taxes continue to increase nevertheless. And still we get nothing—except more gas stations."

The arguments of a year ago, being voiced by the anti-home rule element, look pretty sick today. Various conditions which were annoying a year ago are several degrees more aggravating today.

There has been progress of one kind noted: Come September or thereabouts, the Town Board hearing room will be moved up to the second floor of the Town Hall at Oyster Bay—to accommodate larger crowds. Thereafter, home owners will have a better opportunity to sit while they wait to protest and complain—in vain. As they sit they can ponder, in comfort, upon the thought that they had to give up a day's wages or neglect the housework or children, all the while attempting to protect their property values and rights. Or maybe they'll spend the hours, while they sit (instead of standing in a crowded corridor) recalling the fact that home rule villages hold meetings and hearings in the evening, right in the community involved. Home rule citizens can place their case before democratically elected local resident property owners whereas the disfranchised residents of a hamlet of 35,000 people can only hope and pray that the things they seek or protest may fit within some master plan of political strategy.

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
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
