## Town Grants Evening Session On Apartments

OYSTER BAY—The North West Civic Assoc. of Hicksville will meet with Supervisor Lewis N. Waters, Councilman Frank Chlumsky and two other board members next Tuesday evening, June 29 at 7 P.M. at the Town Hall here regarding the proposal to build garden apartments on Princess St. off North Broadway, Hicksville. President Barney Gill said, "After contacting Mr. Chlumsky for a confirmation of this date, we were advised that the meeting will be held in the evening, June 29, at Town Hall, Oyster Bay." He said Chlumsky commented "We are definitely not passing this application until such time as the North West Civic Assoc. has an opportunity to present its case."

A flyer will be distributed by the Assoc. this coming weekend advising all of the proposed action. Warren Doolittle, attorney for the Assoc., and Officers of the Assoc. will be present next Tuesday evening to present objections on this application.

## Plainview Gets Street Lights

OYSTER BAY—A new street lighting district embracing the entire Plainview School District was established by action of the Town Board, here, on Tuesday. A public hearing upon the proposal to create the district was held in Manhatta Hill School in Plainview a couple of weeks ago. ## Zelmour Homes Protest Dust

HICKSVILLE—Residents of Seymour Lane and vicinity in the Zelmour homes were aroused this week as their neighborhood was "blanketed with thick clouds of dust," they informed the Herald. An industrial development is under construction on the former Shrimpe farm off Bethpage Rd., next to the Water District office and property. A spokesman for Seymour Lane said that efforts to obtain information as to just what is being built there or to obtain relief from the overpowering dust were fruitless.

A private roadway is being built into the section, about 10 feet south of the property line of residences on Seymour Lane. The area had been rezoned for industrial development about three years ago, prior to the construction of the Zelmour Homes.



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

These drives are conducted on the last Sunday of every month.


### Rezone Tract For Industry

# Looking Back At Graduation

**TWENTY YEARS AGO** this month we became the editor of a community newspaper in Hicksville and have been on the job ever since. Maybe we're getting in a rut.

Graduation-time always reminds us of our earliest days at the editor's desk because a parttime vacation job became, for us, a permanent round of deadlines.

What was some of the big news 20 years ago in our community? Dr. Walter F. Stilliger, township health officer, had just been appointed surgeon of the fire department. Harry Glucker was chief. Dr. Walter M. Stilliger, a boy then in school, today holds the position his late father filled with distinction.

Justice of the Peace Andrew B. Heberer was very much a source of news and many newsworthy cases came before him in the old Hicksville courthouse. Leonard W. Hall, who is today national leader of the Republican party, was a member of the State Assembly, 20 years ago.

Elwood A. Curtis, president of the Chamber of Commerce, at that time, was then fighting the Long Island State Park Commission and Bob Moses with all his might over the imposition of a toll charge for the people of Oyster Bay going to town beachlands at Tobay on the Atlantic Ocean.

One of the first stories we covered as a community editor was a pleasant news conference-luncheon at the Curtis' summer place then at High Hill Beach. (It has since been moved with many of other beach homes down along the shore to West Gilgo).

William E. Koutensky, together with Attorney Morris Rochman and David Murphy, were working very hard as the leaders of the Hicksville Business Men's Assoc. and had just achieved the enactment of a peddler's ordinance.

In 1934 we were feeling the real pinch of the depression and local retail activity was slowed by unemployment and the lack of money. The peddler's ordinance became very important to local retailers because they felt the competition by a variety of "travelling stores" when rolling the streets. The ordinance is still on the books.

Mention of the BMA of 20 years ago, or even more recently, would not be appropriate without special comment upon the untiring efforts on behalf of local retail trade by Curt Unverhaar who was secretary for so many faithful years.

In our school system, E. A. Van Slyke was superintendent. Frank Chlumsky was president of the School Board. Henry C. Brengel had just been elected as a member.

John R. Brandt became a public official and was elected a councilman. David Dows was a big wheel in town politics, then serving as county sheriff.

Shortly after we began to peck away at a typewriter about local happenings, Judge Heberer passed away. Joseph P. Lebkuecher, then a young lawyer who had served as president of the local Republican club for a couple of years, was appointed Justice of the Peace. Very soon thereafter, District Court Judge replaced the J.P. and Judge Lebkuecher was selected to the position he holds today.

A little less than 20 years ago, the Chamber of Commerce could get a goodly number to attend a meeting when the topic was local rail road grade crossing elimination. Chlumsky was secretary at that time and one of his ideas was to submit the audience to a little quiz about their town, with a basket of vegetables as the prize for the most nearly correct answers.

We promise never to write a book, but one of these bright days when our beard is down to our ankles we will try to put some of those recollections of events and deeds in our community down on paper, such as the FHA housing show, the WPA street sign program, the fuss about the incinerator plant, the annual newspapermen's tour by Supervisor Tappan, the fighting over the crematory which later became a drive-in theatre, the Unemployed Club, the big hassle over the water district when it had two lawyers at the same moment and Hicksville's first centennial celebration.





Section 1. Ordinance No. 60, 1950 is hereby amended by adding to Article X thereof a new section to be Section 10.13 to read as follows:

Section 10.13 Tents.

1. No tent exceeding twenty feet in any dimension nor any tent used or intended for use for public assembly of any character shall be erected or so used unless it shall have been treated to avoid the spread or propagation of flame so as to meet the minimum standards for resistance to fire prescribed in Federal Specification CCC-D-746 or any amendment thereto for fire, water, and weather resistant cotton duck, when tested new or renewed, in accordance with generally accepted good practice and approved for the use of all departments and establishments of the United States Government. Subsequent to such treatment, no process may be used which increases its flammability.

2. No such tent shall be erected or used unless a certificate of approval shall first be issued by the county fire marshal upon presentation of satisfactory evidence of compliance with the foregoing provisions.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

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
