## To Interview Three Prospects For Business Manager Job

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education will interview three unnamed Nassau residents for the position of business manager of the school district on July 7. The provisional appointment of Harry Ernenwein expired on June 30 and by action of the board at a meeting the same night, he was engaged for the month of July to carry on the duties of business manager. Based upon a Civil Service examination held Feb. 6, the school district was advised on June 1 that six names appeared on the eligible list. Of this number, three have indicated they are willing to take the position, Dr. E. H. LeBarron reported to the Board.

# Buses, Rec Director Coming Up For Vote

HICKSVILLE—Voters of the school district can look forward to a special referendum upon an assortment of questions probably by mid-August, it was learned this week as the final Board of Education meeting of the 1953-54 fiscal year was held. Among the propositions expected to come up for voter approval are (1) recreation, employment of a director; (2) appropriation of funds for improvements at Nicholai School and the high school; (3) increased transportation, reducing the distance for junior and senior high pupils.

Henry C. Brengel presided for the last time, Wednesday night. His term as a member of the Board of Education expired the same evening. The reorganization meeting of the Board is set for Tuesday night, July 6, when Joseph Cawley will succeed Brengel on the Board.

Expressions of appreciation of the work of Brengel during more than 20 years of membership on the Board were voiced by various groups and individuals at the meeting, Wednesday night. Lucia McIntosh, speaking on the proposed recreation program, stated her compliments to Brengel for "his excellent job for Hicksville".

Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent of schools, prefaced his report to the board by complimenting Brengel.

A preliminary report by the Citizens Advisory Committee on Education was read by Mrs. Edna Sutton which stated, in part, "our comments would not be complete without a word of thanks and sincere appreciation on the part of the committee and the community to Mr. Henry C. Brengel, president of the Board, who is retiring after more than 20 years of unselfish service to the cause of public education in Hicksville."

## Higher Court Upholds Town In Denying Parc Gas Station

BROOKLYN—The year-old decision of the Oyster Bay Zoning Board of Appeals in refusing to permit a gasoline service station on Jerusalem Ave. in the Parc Terrace area, near Tobias St., has been upheld in the Appellate Division, here, this week. The five judges of the Appellate Division, second department, reversed the Supreme Court order of last November which had disagreed with the board of Appeals.

## North West Civics Object To Reports of 'Pressure'

OYSTER BAY—Over 90 members of North West Civic Assoc. of Hicksville and interested parties journeyed to the Town Hall, here Tuesday evening to meet with Supervisor Lewis Waters and Councilman Frank Chlumsky on the proposed garden apartments for Princess St. off North Broadway, Hicksville.

The Civic Association went on record earlier in the month to object to this proposed application and had requested an opportunity to present its case to Town Board. Chlumsky contacted the Supervisor and confirmed the Tuesday date for the discussion.

In his opening remarks Supervisor Waters informed the group present "that this is no hearing. A hearing was held on June 15. We

will listen to those in the immediate area concerned with this problem".

Bernard Gill, President of the North West Civic Assoc., informed Mr. Waters that they had a spokesman for the group, Warren Doolittle, attorney retained by the Civic Assoc. It was suggested in order to expedite the discussion that Doolittle present his case. Mr. Doolittle cited "these garden apartments do not benefit the home owner, only a few individuals." Further there will be new parking and traffic hazards involved and the "pride of ownership" and "civic pride" of the home owners in comparison to others who would just be "tenants".

A petition was presented by counsel and would be filed with the Town Clerk. Mr. Waters told the group. Supervisor Waters agreed to give Doolittle time to file a brief on behalf of the Civic Assoc. No decision will be reached for a week or two, according to Councilman Chlumsky.

President Gill in an official release to the HERALD after the discussion Tuesday evening stated "that no press releases were authorized or sanctioned by the North West Civic Assoc. other than those appearing in the Mid Island Herald" (Continued on Page 2)

The decision is the latest step in a dispute between Commercial Properties Inc and the residents of the Parc Community area. Willis B. Carman of Farmingdale was special counsel for the Town of Oyster Bay in the Appellate Division.

900 SIGNED PETITIONS  
The controversy began last year in May when Commercial Properties applied for the gasoline station permit on Jerusalem Ave. A public hearing was held on June 11 of last year when petitions in opposition signed by more than 900 residents were presented.

The Board of Appeals turned down the application and Commercial Properties took the case to the Supreme Court at Mineola, where the town was reversed on Nov. 24, 1953.

The Appellate Division said in its decision published on Tuesday, June 29, in the New York Law Journal, "there was substantial evidence before the Board to support its determination. The court may not substitute its judgment for that of the Board."

Judge Carman successfully prosecuted the appeal. Louis Cohen was attorney for Commercial Properties, petitioner-respondents.

Residents of the Parc Terrace area had told the Board of Appeals last time that they had been promised when they bought their homes that the property fronting on Jerusalem Ave would become a "park" or a "professional-build" (Continued on Page 2)

## Dear Jean:

The high-court decision in Brookhaven regarding the gas station gasoline station application (see page 1) was a source of considerable satisfaction to the friends of WILLIS B. CARMAN who was special counsel for the township in prosecuting the appeal. Judge Carmen was the attorney for the Hicksville Home Rule Committee in its efforts to get the right to a vote on incorporation last year. The papers on appeal numbered 184 pages, included photostats of all the opposition petitions in the case which numbered nearly 1,000 local homeowners, and included, among other things, that reprint of clippings from the HERALD which was distributed in front of the model home last year and resulted in attempted legal action against Dr. BERKOWITZ and Mrs. PETER FERRARA. Our editorial of last Feb. 18 had pointed out that the Township had put up the "strongest possible case" in higher appeal—which they apparently did in getting Judge Carmen.

(Continued from Page 1) ing" and insisted that they had been assured the site would not be used for a gas station.

During the hearing, the attorney for Commercial Properties claimed that the home purchasers had agreed to a recorded declaration that they would not object to such use of the property.

It was brought out at the first hearing by Attorney Maurice Schoenwald, and emphasized during the arguments before the Appellate Division by Judge Carmen, that 7th Construction Corp. had sold the land for the homes to Park Terrace Estates Inc. in Jan. 1962. Eight months later Park Terrace gave the 7th Construction Corp. a declaration, dated Aug. 19, 1962, agreeing to consent to the application for a gas station.

On July 12, 1963, Commercial Properties Inc., an assignee of 7th Construction Corp., applied for the permit to operate a gas station.

**TOO MANY NOW**

During the initial hearing it was brought out that there are 64 gasoline service stations in Hicksville.

The Appellate Division decision was made awarding disbursements to the township.

Still pending is the action by the building concern against two members of the Park Community Civic Assoc. who were accused of "picketing a model home" in protest against the gas station at the time the matter was before the board of appeals.

The Park Community Civic Assoc. got plenty of it.

Assoc. wishes to publicly express appreciation to all of Hicksville residents who assisted them in their endeavor to keep another gas station out of the community.

Since Jan. 1 of this year, applications for gasoline station permits now come before the Town Board, rather than the Board of Appeals. Legal authorities regard this move as one which makes it difficult for applicants, who may be turned down, from taking such adverse decisions into court.



# Call Community Meeting July 8 on Teen Question

By FRED J. NOETH

**THE ARREST** last week of three Hicksville boys, ages 16, 17 and 19, has set off a chain reaction which may result in the establishment of community recreational activities which up to the moment may have lacked unity and overall purpose. There are several fine programs now serving a measure of the need.

During the past week we have talked to the fathers of some of the boys who have had a brush with the authorities. We have talked with the police, and we have been called upon by a delegation of the boys.

The fact that the three boys were arrested on the charge of disorderly conduct and the eventual disposition of their case is a matter for the courts and legal experts. They were apprehended, apparently, as the climax of a series of incidents which have been multiplying and increasing in intensity in recent weeks.

For instance, 15 boys had been rounded up early last week in the yard of the Nicholai St. School. They were taken to the precinct station house and their fathers were summoned. All were warned in the presence of their parents to "stay out of trouble." The boys claim they were engaged in a harmless game. Adults charge that there had been previous damage to the building reported and that the youngsters were at the school grounds long after darkness fell.

The following night the three boys, now in jail awaiting sentence of the court on July 6, were apprehended on Broadway at East Nicholai St. They had been ordered, it is reported, "to move on." They are accused of sassing the police officer.

There is more to the story, including the appearance in court, the trial, the exchange of comments between the judge and the father of one of the boys, attempts to get the boys out on bail, etc.

While not wishing to discuss the merits of the case and the manner in which it is being handled by the court, it does appear that the trio was given stiff medicine in being remanded to the county jail for 10 days until sentencing on July 6.

However, our interest is focused upon stimulating community action on (1) whether there is a problem and (2) seeing that something is done to prevent future difficulties.

Is there a problem?

**THE FOUR BOYS** who called at our office asked us to publish something "that their fathers can read" and understand what the boys claim they are up against. They say there are about 150 boys between 15 and 20 years of age who have "nothing to do," "no place to go," evenings from 6 to 11. They are willing to help raise funds if it will help provide them with a place where they can gather evenings for quiet recreation.

This past week the Hicksville Swans Club met the Huntington Club to further its study of the Huntington YMCA. Such an activity in Hicksville would go a long way towards easing the local problem. However, the Huntington Y project took five years to complete and it must be recognized that present-day Hicksville youngsters will be adults with families before we can provide like facilities, if it takes as long here.

The number of teen-agers is increasing rapidly in Hicksville, a fact which can be easily verified by observing the swelling enrollment in junior and senior high schools.

A survey of recreation in Hicksville School District has just been completed and a limited number of copies are now in circulation.

While we believe the report leaves a great deal to be desired and we cannot, upon a preliminary reading at least, agree with its conclusions, the study does point out "the problems accompanying unassimilated youth and misdirected children have not, apparently, grown to undesirable proportions in the School District. However, with the school population growing rapidly and the number of teen-agers at least doubling within the next five years, juvenile delinquency promises to become a major concern."

At this moment, all elements in this situation are apparently sincerely interested in seeing that something is done. We find complete accord among parents, law enforcement authorities and the youngsters themselves in the ambition to get-together and work together on establishing a specific program commencing at once with such facilities as are available.

The opportunity for just such a pooling of ideas and energies will be provided at a meeting in Hicksville High School on Thursday evening, July 8th, at 8 o'clock.

All persons sincerely concerned with this situation are urged to volunteer their services and suggestions. All are welcomed to attend the meeting and to offer such preliminary suggestions as they may have, in written form if possible, by addressing them to the Mid-Island Herald which is cooperating in these primary stages, pending the meeting and formal adoption of a plan on July 8th.

This is a non-partisan effort which can result in great public benefit if it wins the sincere interest and cooperation of all who have something constructive to offer. It is not something we can "buy our way" out of by imposing new tax burdens or raising funds. It requires personal contributions of thought and energy. Properly developed, it can carry us through any future increases in our teen-ager population with a minimum of difficulty and heartache.

We feel certain that the community will respond.





## \$248,160 Federal Grant Here

BETHPAGE — A Federal grant of \$248,160 has been given to the Bethpage School District, it was reported at the regular meeting of the school Board on Tuesday, June 29. Joseph Ellinger will represent Frederick Kramer on Tuesday, July 6th, when the paper work is completed in New York City.

Victor Miller also reported, in answer to questions by taxpayers attending the meeting, that the district was forced to enroll students from Old Bethpage in its over crowded elementary school. They are living in the 1st supervisorial district under the direction of Dr. Chisholm and since Farmingdale schools, to whom they should report, are in a "superintendency" they are not governed by Chisholm. At the next nearest school, Bethpage is obliged to enroll them. Mr. Miller said there are about 16 now enrolled and the maximum should be about 25.

James Norman reports that 7 rooms in the Pine Ave. School are guaranteed for September by the bonding company.

Earl Cranston was designated as the Board's choice for the new elementary school principal and his appointment is awaiting the approval of Mr. Chisholm after July 1st.

The school custodians submitted a schedule of wages and hours which they say are comparable to surrounding areas and they asked the board to consider revising the present scale. Male custodians would start at \$2,200 the 1st year, increasing \$200 each year to a maximum in the 6th year of \$4,200. Overtime exceeding 15 minutes would be time and one half—like, wine holidays. They would like an 8 hour day—40 hour week. Two weeks paid vacation the 1st year and three weeks paid vacation over the 5th year.

The female custodians scale would start at \$2,400 the 1st year increasing to a maximum of \$3,000 in the 4th year.

The Board tabled discussion on this matter until the new board convenes on July 8th.

The summer program for the children goes into effect on July 6th—continuing until

Aug. 20.

Hours are temporarily set for 9 to 3 with the possibility of extending them until 4 P.M. if the need is pre-

sent.

School bus service will be provided for children living 1 mile (Continued on Page 14)
