### Sues Civic Assn. for \$50,000

HICKSVILLE—Charging "false and defamatory matter" has been published injuring O. L. Pompa, Miller Rd contractor, the Twinlawns Civic Assoc. is being sued for \$50,000. Papers were served on Joseph Kenyon, president of the Civic Assoc., Thursday evening just about an hour prior to a public hearing before the Oyster Bay Zoning Board of Appeals where Pompa's application for a variance was to be heard.

Daniel Dunlap, past president of the Civic Assoc., presented a petition signed by 206 residents of the area objecting to the variance plea by Pompa.

The papers allege that "defamatory, slanderous and libelous remarks" have caused Pompa "loss of business. Also being sued for the same amount is Mrs. Mathews of 115 Miller Rd.

The Civic Assoc executive board at a special meeting this week decided to engage counsel to answer the allegations.

### Plainsmen Win First Leg

PLAINVIEW—The Plainsmen of Plainview Fire Dept won the first leg on the special Fourth of July efficiency contest between Plainview and Co. 5 of Hicksville Fire Dept., here, Sunday afternoon. The home team made the run in 11.3 seconds on Washington Ave while the Hicksville vamps recorded 12.2.

Assistant Fire Chief Larry Buttler of Hicksville and Ex-Chief Edmund Osker of Plainview were judges. Jerry Kiesel is captain of the victors.

### Congregation Honors Two Men

HICKSVILLE—Presentations of gifts were made to two men at the annual installation of officers of Congregation Shaarei Zedek, recently. Sam Kellner, honorary president and Samuel Schwartz, honorary vice president, were both recognized at the presentations for their service to the congregation. Harry Goebel was installed as president.

### Worker Hurt at Pine Ave School

BETHPAGE—A worker on the new Pine Ave School, here, suffered a brain concussion and laceration of the forehead when he fell from a scaffold on the project on Monday afternoon. John Hafner, 20, of Flushing was treated at the scene by Dr. W. Goldschmidt and then removed to Meadowbrook Hospital.

### Lauds Effort on Polio Trial

HICKSVILLE—The Field Trial Polio Vaccine which started on April 26 were completed the week of June 21. At the 52 Trial Clinics, conducted in the Elementary Public and Parochial Schools, 61 percent or 1,990 of the local children eligible for the vaccine completed their third inoculation.

"The village may well be proud of the splendid team of workers, comprised of 36 physicians, 87 registered nurses, and 217 volunteer workers," according to Dr. E. H. LeBaron, Superintendent of Schools.

"The time demanding project was organized by the nurse teachers in the schools, aided by the invaluable help of principals and classroom teachers," LeBaron added.

Lollipops donated by the PTA and local business men, were no doubt considered by the children to be the best part of the entire Field Trial. These children will be recognized by their proudly worn pins, "Polio Pioneer". The pins were given to the children by the National Polio Foundation."

### Earn Trophies at Hempstead

HEMPSTEAD—Hicksville and Plainview went home from the Independence Day tournament, here, Monday with three trophies won in competition with 40 other fire departments. The Hicks took fourth in Motor Hose Class C and fifth in Motor Hose Class B. The Plainsmen won fourth place trophy in efficiency.

Taking fifth in so-called "slow hose," the Hicks made a time of 9.7. Several years ago the Hicks set a state record for this event with a time of 9.9.

The Oceanside Sailors won first in points while St. James was second. In three major tournaments this year, a different department has won each time.

# Meeting Thursday On Teen Question

HICKSVILLE—A schedule of evening activities for local teens, provided there is responsible parental cooperation, may be developed at a community meeting set for this Thursday night, July 8, at the high school. Representatives of all community organizations are being publicly invited and urged to attend the session which will start at 8:15 PM.

The meeting is being held as the result of expressions from both teens and parents for the development of activities, on two or three evenings weekly, when teen-agers can meet under adult supervision. Particularly invited are representatives of the Charles Wagner Legion Post, William M. Gouse Jr. VFW Post, Robert O. Ulmer Memorial Post, Amvets; Hicksville Jewish War Veterans.

Also, Hicksville Teen Club, Police Boys Club, supervisors of the local summer playground program, police dept., Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions.

Also, the clergy, Chamber of Commerce, civic associations and all interested adults.

Isidor Siegel of 47 Glenbrook Rd. will serve as temporary chairman and moderator of the meeting until the audience decides what action, if any, should be taken.

A preliminary meeting was held by a group of concerned parents with Capt. Vincent Chimenti, Commander of the Second Police Precinct and others interested in the situation, Friday night.

It was tentatively determined that no program could be operated successfully without the cooperation and assistance of parents of teens.

This week two teenage boys, of a trio which had been remanded to jail on a charge of disorderly conduct pending sentencing, were given suspended sentences by Judge Maccaro Tuesday in District Court. The third and oldest boy was sentenced to 20 days in jail, with allowance for time already served.

Initial plans were made by a committee under the chairmanship of Joseph Googhan, head of the real estate and insurance department of Century Theatres, at the old clubhouse, last night.


The Council aims to begin its new clubhouse on newly acquired property on Heitz place, late this year or early next year.

### 31 False Fire Calls to Date



DRASTIC ACTION is promised to halt the increasing number of false alarms in the Hicksville Fire District. There have been 31 thus far this year, the latest on Friday afternoon, July 2, at 3:22 PM when the alarm box at the corner of Cottage Blvd. and Essex Lane, Hicksville (no. 233) was pulled. Firemen reported they found two small children at the box, still pulling the lever, when three fire trucks arrived. A false alarm was also received on June 30 from the vicinity of the Woodland Ave. School. ## Schedule Plainview Tourney on July 25

PLAINVIEW—The Ninth Fire Battalion will hold its annual Firemen's Tournament this year on Sunday, July 25, here, where the "Plainsmen" will play host to the six other fire departments comprising the Ninth Battalion.

Charles Leib, chairman of the Tournament Committee, states that 31 trophies will be awarded for the ten events to be held, a high point trophy for the department receiving the most points for the day, and trophies for the winners of

first, second and third places in each event.

A motorcade, instead of the usual parade, will start the day's activities and proceed from the northern section of the Plainview Fire District along Old Country Road to Central Park Drive, where the tournament grounds are located. Grandstands and an arch will be erected by the "Plainsmen," who have been busy getting the course ready for the tournament. A few minor details remain to be cleared up.

Entry blanks have been returned by all departments within the Battalion and it is expected that keen competition will be the highlight of this year's tournament, in view of the closeness of last year's events, when the "Hicks" of Hicksville outscored the Westbury "Turtles" by the slim margin of one point to win the High Point Trophy.

Hopes to have future games conducted at Woodland Ave. until the new high school building is erected were dashed when the cost of folding bleachers for the elementary school were ruled prohibitive. . . .

Suggestions in the Recreation Survey for School District No. 17, Town of Oyster Bay, HICKSVILLE, New York, which were received favorably in the sports and alumni circles were:

Swimming areas must be provided in School District No. 17.

Lighted concrete areas for outdoor skating, ice and roller, and basketball should be undertaken.

Additional hard surface tennis courts should be constructed.

Areas for all outdoor games should be designed. The leaving of an appreciable amount of these areas undeveloped would be a waste of resources.

While these suggestions are applauded we have gathered that in many cases they will not prove enough to sway votes in favor of all the overall proposals.

This is a matter of factual reporting that many persons feel too much emphasis will be placed on recreation for elementary school and smaller children and the teen-age group, which actually figures in the public concern, is out in the cold again.

People can make it known very sharply that they do not believe that the School Board should undertake a "baby-sitting program" for the younger children of the community at those times when it is normal for them to return to their own homes and neighborhoods to develop the social and correct elements of growing up in society. \*

## Sentinel

### TWO YEARS OLD

Just two years ago in July of 1952, the Sentinel made its first appearance. Its avowed purpose, at that time, and ever since, was to promote the integration of the South Hicksville area, newly built with houses, into the established Hicksville community. Many things have taken place during the past two years which have affected our community status. Some have been beneficial, and others have tended to continue our interminable position between Hicksville and the well known community to the south of us. In general, however, it is evident that our economic and political ties have properly prevailed over whatever ties a few of our neighbors may have had to the man who sold them their houses. Yes, this is so in spite of our elected township officials now trying to that builder to ignore a public referendum concerning the swimming pools and Levittown Hall, located in Hicksville. All in all, it has been a good two years.

### MUCH PROGRESS MADE

Much progress has been made during these two years in establishing that we are an integral part of the community. At times feelings of a few residents approached fever pitch. It seemed that some of us wanted to be part of Levittown no matter what the cost. Fortunately, as time went on much of this subsided and events took on a calmer tone. Some of those with strong feelings began to take part in activities having community wide scope. Their interests broadened and in some cases, because of their wider activity, they became concerned with the problems of other parts of Hicksville. This has been all to the good and it seems that we are now acknowledged to be an essential part of our community.

### WORTH THE EFFORTS

Some people will have the legitimate question of whether it makes any difference if we are a part of Hicksville or a part of Levittown. The answer is a very simple one. In any undertaking it is best to be one thing or another. You can't be in the position of being neither fish nor fowl. Another way of saying it is that no one can be a slave to two masters. Many years ago this area was determined to be part of Hicksville in Oyster Bay township. All of our community services, including the collection of our taxes, were provided by Hicksville and Oyster Bay. Levittown is in the township of Hempstead and it receives all of its community services from Hempstead. Could we be absorbed into Levittown without the costly complication of inter-township political arrangements? Could we benefit by an extension of the crazy-quilt pattern of overlapping special service districts which would be necessary? Can you imagine the cost in taxes to separate us from the service districts already established here? Or can you imagine the confusion of being Hicksville to some people and, being Levittown to others? We have to be one or the other and logic points out that we receive the greatest benefits in the Hicksville community. Of course, it's worth the effort.

### HICKSVILLE IS FORTUNATE

This is a good time to repeat what a great many of us have known for a long time. The community that has a good newspaper and a good editor is indeed fortunate. The editor who places the highest value on his newspaper as an institution for the continued progress of his community and the well being of his readers, regardless of politics, is all too rare. Hicksville has such an editor in the person of Fred J. Noeth and it is good to know that many of our neighbors are aware of it. As the newer neighbors get acquainted, they too will recognize that we have an editor who does not feel it necessary to agree willingly with whatever our elected officials do. In fact, when the welfare of the community calls for it, he objects vigorously to some of the goings on, even though he knows he will be very apt to suffer the personal and financial displeasure of the politicians in power. Yes, Hicksville is a good place to live and Fred Noeth has done more than his share in making it so.
