Amperex Strike Ends

HICKSVILLE—After a six-weeks' strike, 200 employees of Amperex Electronic Corp. are expected to return to work at the Duffy Ave plant, here, on Monday, July 19. The announcement was made by a spokesman for the management who said a two-year contract has been signed. The Amperex spokesman said that employees lost about \$172.50 per man, in pay and Christmas bonus percentage, during the strike.

Buy More Land, Award Contract For Car Park

OYSTER BAY — Purchase of the property of Joseph P. Leibnach next to the Trinity Lutheran School and starting at the corner of Jerusalem Ave and Nicholai St for a new 60-car parking lot for Hicksville was authorized at the Town Board meeting, following public hearing, Tuesday. Albert Schachner, president of Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, appeared at the hearing to urge purchase of the tract.

The Town Board also received bids for the development of the triangular property on the east side of the L.I.R.R., between Marie and Nicholai Sts for Parking Field No. 4, Tuesday. John E. Peterson was low bidder of four at \$24,375 and work is expected to start shortly, according to Councilman Frank Chlumsky.

Two applications for special permits and zone changes in Hicksville ran into opposition on Tuesday morning, here. The first application for a zone change on Old Country Rd starting at Raymond St., Hicksville, as the site of a professional building was strongly opposed by residents of the area. The location is across the street from the L.I. Lighting Co. electric operating centre.

The request for a permit to operate a "public garage" on South Broadway, near Fourth St. in the rear of the V.F.W. Hall, was protested by residents of Grand Ave, which parallels South Broadway, one block away. John Eihmann and Clifford Freitag of Hicksville Firestone are the applicants.

The Town Board reserved decision on the two applications. A delegation of Hillside Terrace, Hicksville, residents also appeared at the meeting and presented the Board with about a dozen baseballs retrieved on their property in the vicinity of the play area in that development. They asked the board to do something about ball playing near their homes.

The Board held a short session, Tuesday, and planned to continue its business at an executive meeting today (Thursday).

SULLIVAN 'UNAVAILABLE': SCHOOL BOARD LOOKING FOR ANOTHER ATTORNEY

HICKSVILLE—The employment of an attorney for the school district appeared likely to become an immediate problem for the reorganized Board of Education this week as Michael J. Sullivan advised the board that he is "no longer available". As the Board met Tuesday night to reorganize, several changes and innovations in future Board activities were noted.

Edna Kuhne Sutton, re-elected last May for her third three-year term, was elected president of the Board; Joseph F. Cawley, starting his first three-year term became vice president and Richard Schoel was elected board-secretary.

EIRICH ABSENT

Mrs. Sutton fills the position formerly held by Henry C. Brengel, who was not a candidate for reelection. She had been vice president. Schoel replaces, as secretary, Arthur Eirich who was his running mate last year. Eirich is in Kentucky and could not be present for the meeting.

Emil Szendy, the fifth member of the board, attempted unsuccessfully to get Schoel elected first as president and then vice president.

Schoel nominated Mrs. Sutton for president, and Cawley for vice president. He in turn was nominated for secretary by Mrs. Sutton.

RECORD FOR CLERK

The meeting was opened by Andrew B. Heberer, district clerk, with a brief prayer. He was appointed for his 33rd consecutive year as clerk of the district, commenting that this was probably a record for any district in Nassau or Suffolk Counties.

The appointment was made, upon his written application, after questioning by Schoel regarding Heberer's health. It was indicated a typist may be assigned to him to aid in mechanical work of preparing the minutes.

Also reappointed were Sidney M. Volk as district treasurer at \$2,000 and Herbert Purick as auditor at \$350.

For the first time in more than a decade, the regular meeting night of the Board has been changed from the traditional last Wednesday of the month to the last Friday starting at 8:15 P.M.

Mrs. Sutton announced "with regret" that Sullivan is not available for appointment as attorney for the district. He will continue to serve, however, on contracts already made, Mrs. Sutton added. These include the high school construction and additions to the four small schools. His annual retainer was \$1,200.

Szendi pointed out, after the meeting, that Sullivan has received \$74,200 in fees while attorney for the district and during the coming year will receive an additional \$30,700 for the high school and extension.

3 School Boards Elect New Presidents Here

Three mid-Island School Boards elected new presidents, Tuesday night, when the annual reorganization meetings were held. Hicksville district, for the first time in its history, has a woman as president. Mrs. Edna Kuhne Sutton was elected, filling the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Henry C. Brengel. Bethpage district elected Charles Campagne to fill the position formerly held for many years by Frederick Kramer. In Plainview, John Dowling was elected as president of the Board. New Utility Office To Cost Millions

HICKSVILLE — Ground was formally broken here, when the Long Island Lighting Co.'s new administration building, here, which will cost nearly three million dollars and take 13 months to complete.

L.I.L. Co. President Errol W. Doeber turned over the first spade-full of earth on the tract along old Country Rd. He commented that the event was "further assertion of the importance of Hicksville in the continuing growth of Long Island" as well as another milestone in the growth of the utility company.

County Executive A. Holly Patterson and Henry G. Eisemann, Hicksville banker and realtor who is a director of the company, helped turn the brightly polished shovel.

Also present were Town Supervisor Lewis N. Waters, Councilmen Frank Chlumsky and James Norman, Town Clerk, Henry Curran, Town Tax Receiver David Welsh and Building Inspector William Tiford.

Others attending included Arthur LeRoy Francisco, architect, and Emond C. O'Driscoll, builder, as well as L.I.L. Co. executives.

The new Administration building will face Old Country Rd., the latest unit in the Central Operating Headquarter-

ers being developed at a 77 acre tract east of the LIRR. The "T" shaped building will be 262 feet across the front and extend 200 feet in depth. It will be two stories high in the front and three stories above grade in the rear.

Doeber explained that there are now 1400 people reporting for work at the Operating Headquarters and the new building will bring an additional 800 to the premises.

He thanked the county for its cooperation on traffic problems in the area and the township for originally changing the zoning on the site.

BOND ANTICIPATION NOTE ORDINANCE, DATED JULY 12, 1954, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$142,000 BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU IN ANTICIPATION OF THE SALE OF SERIAL BONDS AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE HEATING PLANT IN THE OLD COURT HOUSE, PURSUANT TO THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW AND THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Nassau shall issue its Bond Anticipation Notes of the aggregate principal amount of \$142,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York, in anticipation of the sale of \$142,000 Serial Bonds authorized by the Bond Ordinance entitled "Bond Ordinance dated July 12, 1954, authorizing \$142,000 Serial Bonds of the County of Nassau to finance the reconstruction of the heating plant in the Old Court House, pursuant to the Local Finance Law and the County Government Law of Nassau County," adopted by the Board of Supervisors on July 12, 1954.

Section 2. The specific object or purpose to be financed by the issuance of said Bond Anticipation Notes is the reconstruction of the heating plant in the Old Court House, which is a Class "A" (fire-proof) building as defined in Subdivision 11.00 of said Local Finance Law.

Section 3. As required by said Local Finance Law, it is hereby stated that (a) there are no outstanding Bond Anticipation Notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said Serial Bonds and (b) the notes authorized by this ordinance

The County Executive and the County Treasurer are hereby directed to sign any Bond Anticipation Notes issued pursuant to this ordinance and the County Clerk is hereby directed to affix to such notes the corporate seal of the County of Nassau and to attest such seal.

Section 5. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to publish this ordinance in full together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law. The validity of said Bond Anticipation Notes may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which would be compelled with at the date of the publication of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or if said obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

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Carnival Night For GOP

MINEOLA—J. Russel Sprague, Republican County Leader of Nassau County, and William D. Meisser, Chairman of the County Committee, announced in a joint statement last night, that the official County convention and meeting of the County Committee, to be held in Casa Seville, Franklin Square, on Monday evening July 12, to designate candidates for legislative and other organizational offices.

More than 5,000 Nassau Republicans are expected to attend the official meeting and the ensuing "Nassau Republican Carnival," it was added by Sprague and Meisser.

The "Republican Carnival" entertainment program will follow formal adjournment of the official convention at 10:30 p.m., the joint statement of the two GOP officials said the meeting will be called to order promptly at 8:30 p.m., and will last exactly two hours in order to make way for the entertainment program and dancing to Guy Lombardo's music.

"This Republican campaign, and I say this with every emphasis, will be the most intensive in the contemporary political history of Nassau County," Sprague stated.

"Republican interest in the impending campaign has been demonstrated ever since the first of the year when heavily-attended club meetings and other functions have been held at frequent intervals all over the county, and new clubs have been constantly organized."

"In addition, we have made a strong appeal to the youth of the

country to ally itself with Republicanism, and increased strength has been had by old and new chapters of the Nassau County GOP recruits.

"As to the activities of Republican women's groups," Sprague concluded, "the County Federation of Republican Women has been consistently active, and will continue to further step-up its activities immediately after Labor Day. This is equally true of Women's Republican Clubs on the district levels and in the villages and cities. Nassau Republicanism will say it with voters—in November."

Schools Can't Handle Everything

To the Editor:

IT SEEMS TO ME, that too many people in the District expect the School Board to cure all the ills in the Community, and are continuously pressuring the Board concerning their pet projects. They seem to forget that handling the educational matters of the community is a full time job; and that the Board must not be expected to delve into matters that are the responsibility of the Township or the County.

A community wide Recreational Program is not the business of the School Board, other than assisting in the coordination of such and the making available of school facilities and buildings. The instituting of such a program; the building of

facilities; and the hiring of instructors in the business of the Town Board, not the School Board. Their responsibility exists only so far as to present to the Town Board the needs for such; and to request immediate action.

Though the School Board has already instituted a survey of the District's Recreational needs and authorized payment for such, this Survey report should be turned over to the Town Board for their information and action. Especially in view of a report given to the Board on June 30th, wherein was stated that the Town Board was already prepared to construct recreational facilities here in Hicksville. It would appear then that both the Town Board and the School Board had duplicate surveys, and that the money spent by the School Board for their Survey was "wasted". Actually, this may not be so, since it is possible that a compilation of both reports may give a clearer picture to the Recreational Program and facilities needed. In the future, however, it would be wise for the School Board to consult the proper authorities before undertaking any action on Civic problems to prevent the possibility of duplication again.

IT SEEMS TO ME, in conclusion, therefore, that since the Town

Board is going to handle this matter, there is no need for us to vote on the hiring of a Recreational Director, or the expenditure of funds for a recreational program.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO SOCIAL SECURITY ACT

The 1954 Social Security Bill contains various amendments to conform the taxes on self-employment with taxes on employees and employers under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act. It also proposes to extend old-age survivors' benefits and increase wages subject to F. I. C. A. taxes from \$3,000 to \$4,200.

Under the House Bill rates on self-employment income would be 5 1/4% beginning after 1963 and before 1975, and 6% for taxable years beginning after 1974. For years ending after 1954 the self-employment income subject to tax would be raised from \$3,000 to \$4,200.

All self-employed professional persons other than physicians would be subject after 1954. Likewise after 1954 a farmer on the cash receipts and disbursements basis could consider 60% of his "gross income" from farming up to \$1,800 as self-employment income.

The rates on employers and employees would be raised to 5 1/4% for calendar years 1950-1974 and 4% thereafter. After 1954 the maximum amount subject to tax would be raised from \$3,000 to \$4,200.

The following people would be brought under the program:

1. Farm employees earning at least \$200 from one employer in a calendar year.

2. Domestic workers whose cash pay is at least \$50 from a single employer in a calendar year.

3. Casual workers earning \$50 as above.

4. Employed ministers, etc if the tax-exempt employer waives exemption and the clergyman consents.

5. American citizens working abroad for a foreign subsidiary of an American Corporation provided such corporation enters into an agreement with the Secretary of the Treasury for coverage.

6. American citizens employed by American employers on foreign ships or planes.

7. Certain federal employees not covered by a retirement system such as temporary Post Office employees, temporary Census-takers, federal employees paid by contract or fee, federal employees receiving \$12 a year or less, certain stipendiary agents, federal unemployment relief program employees, members of state, county, or community committees under the Production and Marketing Administration (unless composed of full-time federal employees), and patients or inmates of federal institutions (except penal) who receive wages for employment.

DOG OWNERS ATTENTION: As a dog owner, you have a very important responsibility, first to the dog and then to your neighbor. The dog you should keep well fed, watered, and exercise regularly. The neighbor should never have any cause to be annoyed because you keep a dog.





Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Nassau shall issue its Serial Bonds of the aggregate principal amount of \$71,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York, in order to finance the specific purpose hereinlater described.

Section 2. The specific purpose (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), to be financed by the issuance of said Serial Bonds is the reconstruction of a portion of the building of the New Court House, Class "A" (fireproof) building as defined in Subdivision 11.00 of said Local Finance Law, so as to provide additional space for the County's photostat department.

Section 3. The Board of Supervisors has determined and hereby states that the estimated maximum cost of such purpose is \$75,000 and that the Board of Supervisors plans to finance such cost by the use of (1) \$4,000 representing current funds heretofore provided for such purpose by a budgetary appropriation which has not lapsed, and (2) \$71,000 to be raised by the issuance of the Serial Bonds hereby authorized. Except as hereinbefore stated no moneys have been authorized to be applied to the payment of the cost of such purpose.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors hereby determines that the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is described in Subdivision 12 (a) (1) of Paragraph a of Section 11.00 of said Local Finance Law and that the period of probable usefulness of said purpose is twenty years.

Section 5. The power to prescribe the terms, form and conditions of said Serial Bonds, subject to the provisions of this ordinance and of any other ordinance or resolution hereafter adopted, and all powers and duties pertaining or incidental to the sale and issuance of said Serial Bonds, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer. Back interest, premium, representing interest payable on such Serial Bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer.

Section 6. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to publish this ordinance in full together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law. The validity of said Serial Bonds or of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said Serial Bonds may be contested only if such obligations are entered upon for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or if such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York.

Section 7. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to cause such bonds to be printed and to do such things as may be necessary to advertise the sale of the bonds and to employ Messrs. Reed, Hoyt, Taylor & Washburn, Attorneys of New York City, to furnish to the purchaser or purchasers of such bonds an opinion as to their legality.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Nassau shall issue its Serial Bonds of the aggregate principal amount of \$142,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York in order to finance the specific purpose hereinafter described.

Section 2. The specific purpose (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), to be financed by the issuance of said Serial Bonds is the reconstruction of the heating plant in the Old Court House, which is a Class "A" (fireproof) building as defined in Subdivision 11.00 of said Local Finance Law.

Section 3. The Board of Supervisors has determined and hereby states that the estimated maximum cost of such purpose is \$150,000 and that the Board of Supervisors plans to finance such cost by the use of (1) \$8,000 representing current funds heretofore provided for such purpose by a budgetary appropriation which has not lapsed, and (2) \$142,000 to be raised by the issuance of the Serial Bonds hereby authorized. Except as hereinbefore stated no monies have been authorized to be applied to the payment of the cost of such purpose.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors hereby determines that the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is described in Subdivision 13 of Paragraph a of Section 11.00 of said Local Finance Law and that the period of probable usefulness of said purpose is ten years.

Section 5. The power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of said Serial Bonds, subject to the provisions of this ordinance and of any other ordinance or resolution hereinafter adopted, and all powers and duties pertaining or incidental to the sale and issuance of said Serial Bonds, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer. The County Executive and the County Treasurer are hereby directed to sign any Serial Bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance and the County Clerk is hereby directed to affix to such bonds the corporate seal of the County of Nassau and to attest such seal. Each interest coupon representing interest payable on such Serial Bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer.


