(Second in A Series) Hicksville Board of Education in May of this year engaged Dr. John Hutchinson of Teachers College, Columbia University, to make a survey of local recreational facilities at a cost not to exceed \$1,000. The report was completed and filed with the Board in June. The School Board has aince annowneed that "in view of the community awakening" in the field of recreation, particularly for teens, it plans no action upon the Hutchinson recommendations at this time. The various religious groups in School District #17 recognize the need for recreation. Although the conduct of their programs may have the added purpose of using recreation as a means to a religious end, nevertheless the contributions from a leisure edu-cation standpoint are significant. The activities apon-nored by these religious organizations do make a con-tribution to the total community recreation program. Such asperiences as sports and games, social activities and cultural activities form the foundation of these

programs. A limitation of these programs, and a most justifiable one, is that they affect mainly those children and youth who have affiliations with the particular faith. Realistically, the community which makes up School District #17 cannot expect the religious agencies to lay aside their original function and do the job of recreation.
