Flat Retainer Fee For School Attorney

HICKSVILLE—No longer will the attorney for the school district be paid on a percentage of project costs or bond issues, it was learned this week. The present board has voted to engage its new attorney on a "flat annual retainer"; however, no amount was stipulated. The 1954-55 budget allows \$1,850 for "legal and auditing".

The Board is still without the services of an attorney since July 1 when it was announced that Michael Sullivan "is no longer available". He is continuing as attorney on projects which were approved while he was working for the district prior to June 30. These include the high school and additions to four elementary schools.

The Board of Education is open for applications for the position of attorney. It is understood there have been seven applicants made to date.

SPECIAL REPORT ON RECREATION:

Survey Touches Lightly On Current Activities

(Second in A Series)

Hicksville Board of Education in May of this year engaged Dr. John Hutchinson of Teachers College, Columbia University, to make a survey of local recreational facilities at a cost not to exceed \$1,000. The report was completed and filed with the Board in June.

The School Board has since announced that "in view of the community awakening" in the field of recreation, particularly for teens, it plans no action upon the Hutchinson recommendations at this time.

The present day recreation program is summarized in Part Two of the Hutchinson study. Some residents have felt that this part of the report is far too generalized to demonstrate any shortcomings in community recreation activities.

Seek Signal For Crossing Old Country

HICKSVILLE—Efforts of Duffy Park Civic Assoc., supported by a petition with the signatures of 459 residents north of Old Country Rd asking for the installation of a safety walk and traffic light at the entrance to the Old Country Rd School and playground were creeping forward this week.

Oyster Bay Town Board this week acknowledged receipt of a copy of a letter to the police, dated June 19 and read at the Board meeting on July 8. The town told Robert E. Kluck, safety committee chairman of the civics, that the board had already requested a police survey "and will advise you as soon as we receive their recommendations."

The Duffy Park Civics wrote Police Inspector Louis Schneider of the County Police that three prime reasons are obvious: "1.—This is the only playground available to the children of this area, but is unavailable when school is not in session due to the lack of proper safety control measures.

covered in Part B of the Hutchinson Survey as follows: Planned recreation now exists to some extent in the School District. Some steps have been taken by the schools, while other advances have been made by organized agencies and volunteer citizen groups. The lack of a year-round coordinated recreation program is apparent. Some of the most significant recreation programs are summarized in the following paragraphs.

CHURCHES. The various religious groups in School District #17 recognize the need for recreation. Although the conduct of their programs may have the added purpose of using recreation as a means to a religious end, nevertheless the contributions from a leisure education standpoint are significant. The activities sponsored by these religious organizations do make a contribution to the total community recreation program. Such experiences as sports and games, social activities and cultural activities form the foundation of these

programs. A limitation of these programs, and a most justifiable one, is that they affect mainly those children and youth who have affiliations with the particular faith. Realistically, the community which makes up School District #17 cannot expect the religious agencies to lay aside their original function and do the job of recreation.

The school district has provided facilities and areas for those religious groups which have made requests. This practice by the School District is commendable and it should be continued in the future.

VOLUNTARY AGENCIES. Various voluntary agencies in School District #17 presently make a valuable contribution to recreation. Every encouragement should be given to these groups so that recreation activities sponsored by these agencies will both continue and grow. School District #17, by making available various facilities and areas for these groups, (Continued on Page 6)

HICKSVILLE—Registration at eight school playgrounds is expected to exceed 5,000 this summer. It was estimated today as 4,199 were enrolled this week. The season continues until Aug. 20 and average daily attendance is over 2,300, according to Chester Jaworski, playground director.

Last year's high for a day was 1,632 with a daily average of 1,200. This year's high is 2,502.

In this sixth annual season records set last week were 1,741 on Wednesday, 2,356 on Thursday and 2,475 on Friday.

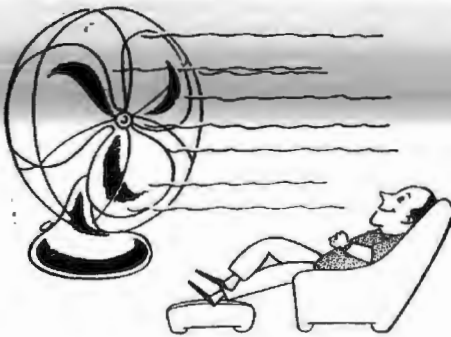

Youth Council Is Good Start

By FRED J. NOETH

THE HICKSVILLE Youth Co-ordinating Council is off to a good start and with mounting interest and help of the community appears destined to fill an important local need.

This is the fourth time in our memory that a "youth council" of one sort or another has been started in Hicksville. Two recent, previous efforts failed to get much further than the "talk about" stage. The earliest council, with which we were associated, operated about 10 years ago and during more than a year of meetings and activity accomplished some results.

The Rev. Miner Harwood, then pastor of the Methodist Church; the late Arthur Crossley, Frank Chlumsky, George McIntosh and E. H. LeBarron were among those who were among the most active in the Youth Council of a decade ago. Improvement in the type of films shown in the local theatre and a summer-time job listing service for teenagers were among the projects undertaken as we recall it today. Strangely enough, an attempt by membership of the council at that time to get a summer recreation program into operation under the schools failed to get support.

The more recent efforts at forming a council were (1) the group which had worked on the clean literature campaign a couple of years ago, and (2) the proposal advanced by Mrs. Edward Kist last year.

There appears to be some misunderstanding about the HY-CC and its objectives. As tentatively stated, the purpose of the HY-CC is broad. It does not intend to "take over" or replace any current program or organization. It merely seeks to be helpful to existing programs and to encourage new ones.

We strongly urge adults who are sincerely interested in the youth of Hicksville to come to the meetings (which are always open) and find out at first hand exactly what is being discussed and planned—rather than depend upon third-handed reports.

This is a non-sectarian, non-political program which will only work if people will help it grow and succeed. There is a meeting next Thursday night, July 29, at the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church Hall. The hall has been kindly provided for the use of the Council. Spread the word and come down yourself.

Previous efforts to form a "youth council", despite their success or lack of it, have contributed to this present effort because the accompanying discussion and talk has slowly but surely developed the realization that by cooperation and coordination a workable plan can evolve.

shows a recognition of the important gap filled by these agencies. Some of the leisure activities conducted by a few of the more active agencies are referred to the following paragraphs.

GIRL SCOUTS. Scouting for girls, including groups within the age limits of seven to seventeen, appears to be one of the most active voluntary agencies in School District #17. At present, approximately 580 girls are registered, with the ten to fourteen year age groups largest and the seven to ten year age groups also quite large. However, the senior group, fourteen to seventeen years of age, is relatively small—it includes only about fifteen girls. At least 100 girls are on the waiting list and it is estimated that by January 1, 1955, there will be approximately 650 to 700 girls registered and in troops.

In the main the Girl Scouts use the facilities of the school. Four troops meet in churches. The facilities they are permitted to use are adequate but a means for earlier clearance of the school facilities in the fall should be effected.

Some of the unique yet traditional Girl Scout activities which are conducted in School District #17 deserve mention. Among these are camping—day camping, overnight camping, and two-week camping. Trips to the United Nations, the Coca Cola Co. and various other places of interest are common. Further, excursions to Bethpage Park are scheduled.

BOY SCOUTS. The Boy Scout movement in School District #17 has also had a fine start. This agency has not registered as many as the Girl Scouts, but the enrollment is over 200 boys. The Cub Scouts is a larger group than the Boy Scouts.

The Boy Scouts also use the facilities of the schools in District #17. In the future the schools will be called on for additional aid because the Boy Scouts plan to organize more troops during the school year 1954-1955. The extension of this movement in School District #17 will grow and develop as fast as dependable volunteer leadership can be acquired.

POLICE BOYS CLUB. The Police Boys club in School District #17 is quite active. Approximately 350 boys participate in the programs sponsored by this agency. About 200 boys between the ages of ten and fourteen, 100 boys between the ages of 13 and 15, and fifty boys between the ages of 16 and 18 engage in the program. The activities sponsored by the Police Boys Club are baseball and basketball. Leagues are formed and tournaments are conducted.

LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL. Little League Baseball which has been organized in School District #17 has developed to the point where eight teams have been formed for regular competition in games. Boys between ten and thirteen years of age participate. At present approximately 300 boys are registered.

TEEN CANTEENS. Teen Can-

teens have an excellent start in School District #17. These have been considerably successful with volunteer leadership assuming all the responsibility for the administration and conduct of the program. For the most part school facilities have been used as meeting places. Some difficulty has been experienced in obtaining volunteer leaders who continue regularly throughout the year.

The Teen Canteens have conducted a program one night each week from 7:30 to 10 p.m. Dances which are held once or twice a month in the summer attract as many as 300 teen-agers. Because of transportation difficulties and other factors, dances during the winter do not attract such large numbers.

The weekly programs tend to become more of a neighborhood affair and do not regularly serve as many teen-agers as the dances and other special events. The weekly program consists of activities such as: small games, music, table tennis, informal dancing, and other socializing activities. Field trips to skating areas and to outdoor shows, like "A Night in Venice" at Jones Beach have proved very successful.

SCHOOL DISTRICT #17. The schools themselves are playing an active part in the recreation program. Of major importance are the summer program, the intramural programs, the dances planned after-school hours, and adult education.

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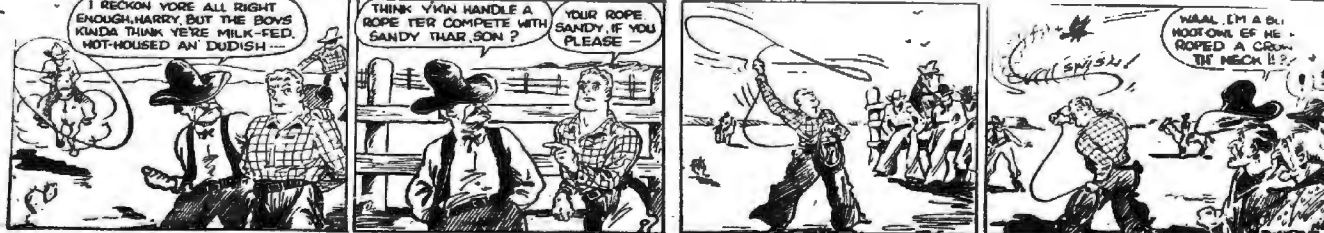

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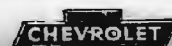

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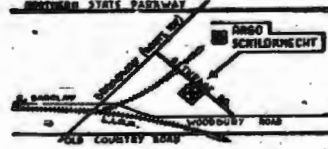
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3 In 7 Minutes
