HICKSVILLE—A local firm this week announced the development of a portable battery-operated instrument called the Palpatron, designed to free the hands of the anesthetist during surgery by relieving him of the frequent manual pulse checks necessary during an operation. The electronic instrument is being produced by Gillmor's Inc. of 110 Duffy Ave.

According to Gillmor's the Palpatron in constant operation makes possible immediate visual detection of cardiac arrest. "We developed the Palpatron at the suggestion of the Boston City Hospital," according to William S. Gillmor.

3 More False Fire Calls In Single Day

HICKSVILLE—The mounting record of false alarms of fire here rose to 35 for the year when volunteer firemen were called out three times, Saturday, by false alarms. Two of the calls were four minutes apart. There were five calls for vamps for grass fires on Friday. Firemen have answered 253 fire calls so far this year.

Old Country Rd and Morgan St., Saturday afternoon, the firemen were called to West and Malone St. by a false box call at 8:36 P.M. The sirens had already ceased sounded that call, when a second false alarm came in from the box at Cottage Blvd and Jordan Ave at 8:40 P.M. The first false alarm of the day was received at 1:53 P.M.

MEET DR. LAMB:

New Asst School Superintendent Here With 26 Years Experience

HICKSVILLE—Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, newly appointed Assistant Superintendent of Schools here, comes to this community with 26 years experience in school administration. Prior to his assumption of duties here he was for four years Supervising Principal in the Greenport school system; before that he served in a similar capacity at Schoharie and at Bolton Landing in upstate New York. His biography is included in "Who's Who in American Education".

Dr. Lamb is well-known as an author, particularly in the educational field. His best-known work is a textbook in American History which is used throughout the nation. Another textbook "New York State and Its Communities" is used widely in New York State. Besides he has written a handbook for teachers on community planning, several books on local history, and various magazine articles on a wide range of subjects.

Dr. Lamb is, and has been for many years, a member of the State Regents College - High School Guidance Committee which has been engaged in promoting better coordination between high schools and colleges in the interests of the pupils concerned. Much better school guidance is possible as a result. He has served on state Regents committees framing Regents examination papers.

He has been particularly active in the National Council for the Social Studies. Lawn Sprinkling Wastes Water

JERICHO — Lawn sprinkling tank, chief engineer and director of the Division of Sanitation of the County Health Dept. was guest speaker.

He told the membership that during hot dry spells water consumption rises to 800 gallons per day per person, compared with average normal daily use of 50 gallons per day.

In Hicksville lawn sprinkling is restricted to the south of Old Country Rd. on odd-numbered days of the week and north of Old Country Road on even-numbered days. All farm irrigation is prohibited between 4 and 9 p.m. daily.

Bethpage and Plainview water districts have not imposed restrictions on use for sprinkling this year.

Ask the CPA

Q. What policies and standards does the government follow in determining to what extent traveling and entertainment expenses are deductible?

A. In a recent statement the Commissioner has stated in general terms how business deductions are to be examined. The examiner must determine whether personal, family, or living expenses are included or whether the deductions are excessive.

If the agent is satisfied that a legitimate basis exists for the expense item he must consider "the extent to which detailed verification is required, the papers or records essential to adequate substantiation, and the weight to be accorded oral statements and explanations." If documentary proof is not available, resort may be had to "reliable secondary sources of information and collateral evidence" for arriving at a close approximation. If a taxpayer satisfies the agent that he traveled for a certain number of days in the year, but cannot establish all the items of expense he may proceed as follows: Railroad and airplane fares can be established exactly. Automobile expenses can be ascertained approximately on the basis of mileage covered. Hotel bills will establish the cost of meals and lodging. If not available a daily rate may be applied to the number of days traveled.

The measure of reasonableness of the expenses lies in direct proportion to the taxpayers reported income, the reliability and accuracy of other records and the general validity of the statements made. No expense will be disallowed.

The Bean Bag Is Outlawed

THE LOWLY BEAN BAG, which we thought had gone out with the flapper and prohibition, is under the close scrutiny of the Oyster Bay Town Board.

Under a proposed regulation "relating to parks, playgrounds and other recreational areas" of the township, including those in Park and Parking Districts, the bean bag may not be tossed on Sundays. Those who insist upon tossing a ball "or other object" (and the bean bag is mentioned by name) upon a Sunday in a park or playground will be subject to a fine of up to fifty dollars or 30 days in the county jail.

The proposed regulations, the subject of a hearing in Oyster Bay on Tuesday morning, Aug. 3, starting at 10 o'clock in the morning, are the result of complaints from people who live near playgrounds in the township, we are told.

While regulations on the use of such areas may be quite necessary, this proposed action against the bean bag hardly seems the type of action residents of new developments who have these "so-called playgrounds" have been seeking with little success since last January.

We can't help but wonder how these rules will affect ball playing, for example, on Abraham Levitt Little League ball field in Hicksville Park nad Parking District. As we read the proposed rules, Sunday ball playing will hereafter be prohibited there as well as in the play area at Hillside Terrace and other "playgrounds".

What ever brought the wrath of the town fathers down upon the bean bag is the biggest mystery of all. Maybe we'll find out at the hearing.

Delay Action On New Principal

By DOROTHY GUELPA

At a special meeting of the school board called to consider the appointment of a principal for the new Central Blvd. school a letter was read from Dr. John Chisholm, supt. of schools, wherein he stated that he "didn't recall" and didn't have "any record of ever having O. K'd Mr. Cranston to the Board of Education".

This was in answer to a letter to him written by Fred Kramer, former President of the Board, asking that the situation be clarified.

At the beginning of the year three names were submitted to the board by Supervising Principal Victor Miller for their consideration for the new principal. These names were reported to be approved by Dr. Chisholm and that he would approve any one of the three that the board chose. Acting under this idea, the name of Mr. Cranston was submitted only to have Dr. Chisholm withhold his approval "until the new board was seated".

The answer to Mr. Kramer's letter also stated that Dr. Chisholm could not see the necessity of appointing a principal at this time. The Central Blvd. school is tentatively planned for completion in

Sept. 1965. The board voted 3 to 1 to dispose of the principal for the present with Mr. Ellinger voting against the motion.

At the same meeting a discussion was held as to the advisability of buying the triangular piece of property which fronts on Locust Ave. and is adjacent to the school entrance off Pine Ave. This would give a "better approach" to the Pine Ave. school which now has its rear side facing Pine Ave., and would also give the district a five room ranch house to be used for the administrative staff. This would free an extra classroom at the Broadway School where they are badly needed.

The cost of this project would amount to under \$20,000 which is now available in the general fund and would not cost the taxpayers added taxes. The matter was referred to the school lawyer for action. Before anything is done toward the purchase of the property a vote must be taken to get the permission of the taxpayers to expend this amount of money despite the fact that Mr. Miller says it is now available as surplus.

Dr. Nathan Lefferts was appointed to be the Supervising Democrat for the School District.

Dr. Chisholm had an appointment with members of the board to look over buildings in the district which may be used satisfactorily for additional classrooms should the necessity arise or should there be a possibility of having fewer children on part time. He was to inspect the sites on Friday, July 25, and then make his recommendations to the board.

RECREATION. During the summer School District #17 conducts an extensive recreation program which is organized by Chester Jaworski, the Director of Health and Physical Education. The summer program in 1953 attracted an average of 1250 children daily. The largest attendance any one day was 1632 participants.

Plans for the summer of 1954 indicate clearly that this program will be expanded and the number of participants will increase. More areas, additional leaders, and a greater emphasis on the girls program are being planned. Further, interplayground activities are anticipated.

The summer program includes a wide sports and games program. Team sports, individual sports and low organized group games are stressed. Further, an extensive crafts program is conducted. The lack of other activities such as music, dramatics, and arts appear to be the result of both financial and leadership limitations.

INTRAMURALS: Because of double sessions in the schools the development of an extensive intramural sports program has proved impossible. At the schools go through the transition to single sessions, the intramural program can be developed considerably.

In spite of the difficulties now existing an intramural program does exist in elementary schools such as the East St., Lee Ave., Fork Lane and Burns Ave. Schools. The activities conducted include basketball, soccer, football, softball, baseball, and square dancing. The lack of physical education teachers in some of the elementary schools limits the program. However, when the proposed extensions to twenty-room elementary schools are affected, physical education teachers may be employed therein. If the plans for additional physical education teachers materialize, the elements-

intramural program should be increased considerably.

In the junior-senior high school the double session exists, but some intramural activities are conducted. Space, time, facilities, and leadership are problems. Many of these limitations will disappear when the new high school is constructed.

The junior high school boys and girls have a program which takes place twice weekly for each group. The boys program includes basketball, wrestling, baseball, and tumbling. The activities offered in the girls program are volleyball, archery, basketball, softball, tumbling, track and dancing. The physical education teachers have achieved very good results in spite of the handicaps caused by crowded conditions.

The high school boys have a limited intramural program which consists mainly of basketball. The high school girls have approximately the same program as the junior high school girls with the addition of field hockey.

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
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
