The tenure of Harry Ernenwein in that position expired the end of June and was extended on a temporary basis for July pending selection of his successor. Board President Edna Sutton has sought to retain Ernenwein, pending another civil service examination in 1955, but was out voted by Trustees Joseph Cawley, Richard School and Emil Szendy.

HICKSVILLE—Registration of senior high school students begins the first two weeks in August from 9 AM to 12 noon at the high school general office, according to Dr. E. H. LeBaron, superintendent of schools. The announcement is for the benefit of new students of the school or for those who were not here in May.

Library Art Classes To Close

HICKSVILLE—The painting classes for children have for six years been a part of the Summer program of the Public Library here. Mrs. Emmy Liebhardt-Kraso of South Plainfield, N. J., is again the instructor, according to Librarian Kenneth Barnes.

Mrs. Kraso is a native of Austria and studied at the Academy of Art in Vienna as well as Budapest and Rome. She has conducted classes for a number of years in Austria, France, Italy, Germany and taught in India from 1939-1946. While in India, Mrs. Kraso became acquainted with Gandhi and was with him every day for a month while she painted his portrait. At present she teaches in the Parsons School of Design in Brooklyn.

This year's classes have been as enthusiastically received by the children as the previous classes. The final class will be held Friday, July 30, at which time there will be a showing of the work done by the children this year. All parents are invited. Mrs. Kraso plans to send some of the work to India in exchange for some representative work done by the children of India.

Lightning Puts Out Lights

HICKSVILLE—A brief thunder and lightning rain storm lashed this area, Tuesday night, but brought little relief from the drought heat. However, when lightning struck wires at Old Country Rd. and Broadway at about 6 o'clock television programs in about 1,200 homes in the north east section were interrupted. Three wires were knocked out by the bolt and some homes were without electric service until almost nine o'clock in the evening.

The combination of an accident at Floral Park and the lightning storm delayed commuter trains into Hicksville for nearly a half-hour, starting at about 6 o'clock.

\$130,000 OUT OF SURPLUS

Bus Service, Nicholai Repairs Up For Vote

HICKSVILLE—A special meeting of the school district to vote on five assorted proposals spending a total of \$130,000, out of surplus district funds, was set today by the Board of Education for Saturday, Aug. 21, with voting hours from 2 to 10 PM. Nearly 2,500 voters are registered and qualified to vote with an additional registration set for the previous Saturday, Aug. 14, from 2 to 10 PM at the four voting places in the district.

The special referendum was forecast exclusively in the Herald on July 1. At that time it was expected the question of a recreation director would also be proposed. The School Board has since shelved plans for a district-financed recreation program.

Text of the propositions is published in this issue as a legal notice (see page 11). Summarized the questions are (1) Appropriate \$10,000 more for transportation to give bus service to Junior High pupils living a mile or more from school, (2) Appropriate \$16,000 more for like transportation for senior high pupils, (3) Appropriate \$82,000 for fire safeguards and alterations in the Old Nicholai St. School, and (4) Appropriate \$22,000 for mechanical ventilation and a folding partition in the present high school gym.

All expenditures would be from surplus funds of the district. The financial statement of the district as published today shows a balance on deposit as of June 30 of \$463,772.77.

The fifth question asks permission to accept sealed bids for the purchase and disposal of 300 obsolete desks and chairs at Nicholai School.

Proposition 1 is considered an excellent chance of approval since the extension of the range of bus service from two

SPECIAL REPORT ON RECREATION:

Hire Director On Top Of List

(Fourth in a Series)

Almost half of the three part survey of recreation in Hicksville School District prepared at the direction of the Board of Education by Dr. John Hutchinson of Columbia covered recommendations "for a minimum program".

The following recommendations are directly from the report.—Editor.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In making recommendations those which should be initiated immediately appear first. They are listed in order of priority. Each recommendation is substantiated and explained. Further, the approximate cost, if any, of the recommendation is noted. The expense of initiating this minimum program is then totaled. The remainder of the recommendations are suggestions which point the way toward the future and should be considered in light of the success experienced in developing the minimum program.

In all of the minimum recommendations which immediately follow it is suggested strongly that the program for girls both of the pre-teen age and teenage groups be emphasized. Very few of the voluntary agencies now provide fully for the recreation needs of girls; and, consequently, it becomes necessary for the school to fill this gap.

Recommendation I: School District #17 should assume responsibility for conducting a year-round community recreation program.

The leisure problem for all ages is evident and special concern for teen-age recreation not only is serious at present but also promises to become much more serious if a recreation program is not organized. For a community as large as School District #17 voluntary efforts do not adequately meet the needs of all children and youth. The responsibility for recreation therefor becomes the responsibility of the School Board since School District #17 is the only legally established authority in the unincorporated village of Hicksville.

The schools are already sponsoring many recreation activities after regular school hours, and the summer recreation program has become quite extensive. Further, the facilities and areas administered by the school board are the logical places in which to conduct a recreation program in School District #17.

Recommendation II: A recreation director (coordinator) should be employed by School District #17.

The development of a year-round recreation program requires a qualified leader who has full responsibility for its development and supervision. When (Continued from Page 4)

Doctor Jones Says

Can you remember when there were no ice cream sodas? No—that was 30 years before your time. But we had "soda fountains." Flavoring syrup they blew fizz-water in—sometimes a little sweet cream—cost a nickel. A few years later they began putting ice cream in, Yes—I remember taking a girl friend in to treat her. I discovered they'd gone up to 10 cents—all I had. But, with two straws and spoons, we managed all right.

Three or four years later we had a big scarlet fever epidemic; one of the "explosive" kind. It proved to be milk. Their first clue: bunch of teen-agers that patronized a popular soda fountain they got it (I was in school but I knew about it.) The druggist made his own ice cream. His raw milk and cream came from one dealer. His milk was already under suspicion.

Then, years later (1918), we had our big polio epidemic. It didn't take long to see that the soda fountains, with their common glasses, could be one way of spreading the infection. That started a nation-wide drive for single-service paper containers at soda fountains. It's been a long time, now, since I've seen the old-fashioned, common glasses in one of em.

Well, sir—what got me going on this theme: a friend sent me this little trade magazine: The Niagara Pioneer. (Buckley—that's right!) Anyway, it's put out by the Niagara Alkali Company. They make the stuff that makes the fizz. It's got a clever little article here: The Fountain of Youth. Here's one paragraph from it.

"Soda fountains like the teen-ager trade. It isn't fussy. It doesn't diet. It has money. It's willing to try anything, at least once. It never knows when it has had enough. And it shows no disposition to dash out hurriedly if not promptly served. It gets keen enjoyment, as well as ideas from what is being served to others." So, if Ponce de Leon could go back to Florida today, he'd find a fountain of youth, if not the one he is looking for.

recreation is organized so that it is the responsibility of everyone it becomes in actuality the responsibility of no one. Further, a qualified person develops a well-rounded program rather than a skewed program.

The qualifications of the recreation director should include the following:

1. At least a Master of Arts degree in Recreation or a similar degree with courses and experience in recreation theory, leadership and administration. Further, courses or experience in education, guidance, personnel work, group work, and psychology should be in evidence.

2. The recreation director's background should reveal not only that he is a very energetic and industrious person, but also that he possesses the following attributes:

ability to establish both good personal and public relations with others, ability to supervise, success with leading children and youth, interest in all phases or recreation.

3. The recreation director should consider this position as a life's work—one in which he is interested enough to carry the program through to its full development.

The recreation director's duties should include the following:

1. Coordinate the entire community and school recreation program.

2. Organize the total school recreation program and give administrative supervision.

3. Cooperate with all private and voluntary groups sponsoring recreation activities, and encourage and aid them to improve their programs.

4. Initiate new activities including clubs, music, dramatics, and cultural activities.

5. Develop a system for allocating areas and facilities to groups. (This requires the establishment of school board policy on this matter.)

6. Establish contacts with people controlling resources outside the District which may prove useful to the development of a program.

7. Assume no teaching responsibility, but work hours such as 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. on weekdays during the school year, and Saturday mornings. Also, follow a regular summer work schedule.

8. Conduct recreation on an eleven-month basis.

9. Submit suggested policies concerning recreation to the school board for consideration.

10. Screen applicants for all recreation positions and submit names.

with qualifications to the school board for approval.

11. Make recommendations to the school board for the acquisition of new or the improvement of existing recreation areas and facilities.

Financial cost for employing a recreation director: \$5,500-\$7,000.

Recommendation III. For at least a temporary period, the recreation director should be assigned as a recreation supervisor in the Department of Health and Physical Education.

At the present time the Department of Health and Physical Education, in reality, is conducting a summer recreation program in addition to an after school intramural program. Because of this fact, it is logical to build from the present base to expedite the initiation of a minimum program.

In the future when the program develops more fully, it may be advisable to separate recreation from physical education. The school board could establish recreation as a separate function under the direct supervision of the superintendent of schools. If the recreation director remains in the status suggested in the recommendation, any necessary future change in the position of director of health and physical education should be made with the realization that recreation is a very large and important phase of that position.

CURRENT COMMENT:

Urge For Home

Rule Is Stronger

THIS IS A HISTORICALLY significant week for Hicksville. Just one year ago this week, the finishing touches were put upon one of the biggest local civic activities in many, many years. The BIG PETITION, asking for the right to vote on the question of home rule, was finished and delivered to the Supervisor of the Township of Oyster Bay.

The people of Hicksville remember that on July 31st they completed what they considered was a significant step in the progress of the community. They were confident that their honest effort to get the right to vote on the question of incorporated local government would be respected for what it was—simple plea for the right to make an important decision via the ballot box.

But no, it was not to be.

The simple plea became a complicated political question, the aftermath of which will be noted in many forums and elections for years to come.

The BIG PETITION—consisting of more than 6,000 signatures of home owners, plus a list of ALL THE INHABITANTS (imagine, every man, woman and child), plus a map, plus a certified check for \$100.00, plus a form of proposition—was delivered by a group of citizens on July 31st, 1954, into the hands of Lewis N. Waters, then deputy supervisor.

Pictures were taken, pleasantries were exchanged and the citizens went home to await the date of the vte.

But it was not to be.

As we dragged thru the summer with the hearings and exchange of briefs between lawyers, we sweated out the eventual and anticipated right to make a decision at the ballot box.

On Oct. 5th, Supervisor Charles N. Ransom (by then it was already well known that he was not planning to run for re-election) said the proposition did not "comply with the law."

To the courts we went, as the law provides. More briefs, more arguments and then the "inspired" court verdict, upholding the supervisor.

Three years of volunteer work went down the drain. The great American tradition of the right to a free election and decisions at the ballot box, found not acceptable to the local political leadership.

Today, a year later, that local political leadership appears to be tottering. People are moving in faster than the machine can take up the slack and keep the wheels greased. People who were formerly "against home rule"—now come forward openly and volunteer their services to "try it again".

The case for home rule is stronger and better today than it was a year ago because of the so apparent and very obvious inefficiency of the antiquated and decrepit machinery of township government which the bosses strive so mightily to retain.

What was last year an annoying problem is today a raw, public disgrace.

Just look around. Take traffic for example. Not a single, additional traffic signal has been installed in all of Hicksville in the past 12 months, except one at the front door of the Lighting Co. One small (about 130-car) parking field opened and the plight of the parking commuter is far worse than it was a year ago.

On our streets we have a few more tons of blue stone, but what of those mighty headline-snatching drainage projects which a year ago were allegedly being held up because of the "incorporation question"?

What about parks and playgrounds? Instead of improvements, equipment and development of a program we have the proposed anti-bean bag ordinance. (Most local toy and sporting goods stores report they have not sold a bean bag since mother was a flapper).

This excerpt from the urgent plea of the proponents for the right to vote on home rule, will probably be echoed many times in the months and years to come: "The thousands of people who signed the consents and the thousands of people who failed to sign, whether for or against the proposition, may feel rightly or wrongly that a decision adverse to the proposition has deprived them of the right to vote on this vital local matter.

"The principle involved is whether the residents and taxpayers in the territory are intelligent enough to decide for themselves this crucial matter. * * * If the proposition is denied the matter will not be settled. The proponents will have to start all over again and if they do not have the time nor will to do this then the matter will fester like a sore in the minds of thousands and impair their confidence in democratic processes."

How can he reconcile this statement when any organization sponsoring Teen-age activities can give, as can any experienced leader in Youth Counselling, positive proof (If he really wants it, which I doubt) that for every bad Youth in a Community there are hundreds that are good. How about Adults. Mr. Walter? Are they all good?

He claims that the "Drums are being beaten too loud for Youth". Are they? Personally, I feel that they aren't being beaten loud enough. As for Youth never questioning their Adults as to why they caused the Mess today, with War and the threat of Bombs hovering overhead, surely Mr. Walter knows better than to assume that. The Youth of every age have always questioned the Messes left by their

elders; and upon becoming Adults against those who imprisoned them, themselves have tried to Kennedy the situation. Mr. Walter seems to forget that out of today's Youth will come Tomorrow's Clergymen; Doctors; Nurses; Scientists; Legislators; Lawyers; and such; as well as just ordinary citizens and parents. To "Bottle Up" as Mr. Walter would have, can only lead to disaster for all concerned.

He wants the "Wrong-doer punished and punished hard". Would he say the same if it were his child? Justice and Mercy must go together for the common good. Reformatories and Prisons are not the only answer, for wrong-doer seldom sees the error of his ways by being incarcerated in them. When they are still young is the time to help them. IT SEEMS TO ME, in conclusion, that the very utterances of the type made by Mr. Walter is the kind that throws the "Limelight" on obstreperous Youth and gives him the feeling of being a hero. On the other hand, those of us who truly desire to help troublesome Youth, keep him in the background, carefully guiding him to a truer understanding of his place in the Community. By doing so, he can observe the attitude and actions of proper Youth, and will begin to understand where he failed. Obnoxious Youth is like a Cancer. Unless treated as soon as the first symptom shows, it can kill with untold suffering inbetween.


