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Invest Monsignor Sunday Afternoon

HICKSVILLE—The Rt. Rev. George M. Bittermann, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Catholic Church, will be invested in the role of a Monsignor at ceremonies this Sunday afternoon, Aug. 15, in the church starting at 4:30. There will be a procession of visiting priests from the rectory to the church led by the Honor Guard of the Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus.

The blessing of the robes and the investiture will be conducted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Lawrence H. Bracken, pastor of St. Brigid's Church in Brooklyn. He will also deliver the address of the occasion. After an acknowledgment by the new Monsignor, the ceremony will close with benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Bittermann was proclaimed a Domestic Prelate by the Pope at Rome on May 7.

A testimonial by parishioners and friends in the form of a reception and dance will be held on Tuesday evening, Aug. 17, in the school auditorium at 8:30 P.M. The St. Ignatius choir will present a program of glee club numbers under the direction of Mrs. Evelyn Dooly, choir-mistress with William McBrien of St. John's College Glee Club as piano accompanist.

A presentation in the name of the parishioners will be made by Vincent McGunnigle, trustee, and after acknowledgement by Msgr. Bittermann, there will be refreshments and dancing in the St. Ignatius School basement. Many former parishioners and friends are expected to attend.

Rt. Rev. William G. Burke will be master of ceremonies at the testimonial on Tuesday evening.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Bittermann, dean of Central Nassau County has been pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church for 23 years. Born in Brooklyn, he studied at St. Vincent's Seminary, Latrobe, Pa., and St. John's Seminary. He was ordained May 21, 1910 and served as assistant at the following parishes: St. Fedelis, College Point and All Saints and St. Benedict's, Brooklyn. He was acting pastor of St. Alphonsus in Brooklyn and was pastor of Queen of the Most Holy Rosary in Bridgehampton before being appointed to St. Ignatius in Hicksville in May 1931.



Vote Aug. 21 To Decide Distance

This map was submitted, with distances indicated, in argument of Robert Conlin of 29 Lehigh Lane (at right), showing location of his home 1.8 miles from school. When his children were refused a bus ride,

he kept them home from school most of last term. His appeal to the State Dept. of Education from the board's edict, with children 1.5 miles getting service, is now pending in Albany. Vote Aug. 21 will decide if mileage distance this fall will be reduced to one mile from high school.

Szendy Supports Junior High Bus As Board Circular Warns Of Costs

HICKSVILLE—The controversial question of reducing the distance limitation for junior high school bus transportation to one mile from the Jerusalem Ave. building will be decided by voters of the district on Saturday, Aug. 21 with polls open from 2 to 10 P.M. Final registration date for voters, who have not previously registered since April, will take place this Saturday, Aug. 14, from 2 to 10 P.M.

A sharp difference of opinion among Board of Education members on the manner of presenting the question to the voters developed this week.

A circular being delivered to everyone in the district by mail (13,000 copies) has been under attack by Emil Szendy, board member.

The circular urges a favorable vote on questions 3, 4 and 5, which involve improvements at Nicholas School, folding partitions for the H.S. Gym and disposal of 300 unwanted desks. On the bus questions, 1 and 2, the form letter says they "are presented to you for evaluation at this time. They are of sufficient importance for the Board to ask your opinion".

TWICE APPROVED

Szendy endorses Question 1 (Jr. High bus) and says that the circular stresses cost and omits much relevant information. "The taxpayers have in recent years", he asserts, "twice indicated that they wish extended transportation for Junior High School students. I am in agreement with them. I am opposed to any interpretation of Board policy which claims to limit transportation to those living two miles or more from the school, but grants it nevertheless to some living lesser distances (see map) because of pressure, or favoritism, or hazards long-since eliminated.

Says 'Blanks' Challenge Neutrality Of 45th Dist.

HICKSVILLE—The political neutrality of the 45th Election District, here, reported in Tuesday's Herald with exactly 228 Republicans and 228 Democrats enrolled, is challenged by Gertrude (Penny) Ridgon, Democratic committeewoman in that district and secretary of the 4th Assembly District, Zone 4, Town of Oyster Bay.

"The point of political neutrality of Mr. O'Leary's and my District 45, headlined in your Aug. 10, issue is questionable", Mrs. Ridgon wrote. "Usually, blank registrations in Nassau are Democratic voters who are too terrified of the powerful entrenched machine to

state their preference."

The Board of Elections reports there are 33 "blank" enrolled voters in the 45th District.

The tabulation of registrations in other election districts in Hicksville, as published Tuesday, failed (Continued on Page 6)

Primary Battles Ahead For GOP

When primary elections are held on Sept. 14, Republican voters may be deciding the first local nomination contests in almost 20 years.

Harold L. Glasser, mayor of Saddle Rock, is seeking the GOP nomination for State Senator for the area which embraces the Townships of North Hempstead and Oyster Bay. The incumbent is William S. Hulta of Port Washington.

Another prospect for mid-Island voters enrolled as Republicans is a contest for GOP nomination for U. S. Representative of the First N. Y. Congressional District. Stuyvesant Wainright is seeking selection and his bid is opposed by William P. Shea, Ronkonkoma lawyer. Shea is running on a pro-McCarthy platform while Wainright came out for Army Secretary Stevens in the recent Army-McCarthy dispute.

8 Playgrounds In Final Week Report Attendance 2,000 Daily

HICKSVILLE — The Summer Playground, under the direction of the school district, goes into its final and concluding week. This year's program is by far the most successful in its six year history, as a 2,000 daily average attendance seems a certainty, according to Director Chester Jaworski.

Last week a group of youngsters travelled to the Polo Grounds to see the Giants lose, but in spite of the defeat of the Giants, the children had a most enjoyable time. James Walters, Herbert Cavanagh, Gloria Francke, John Maher, and Frank Burke were in charge of the youngsters who made the trip.

Township CD Drill Oct. 19

OYSTER BAY—Township Civil Defense Chief Buddy Mazzara announces that Hicksville will be the scene of a major CD test scheduled for Oct. 19.

According to Mazzara the format for the problem will be similar to the one used last year in which a small scale atomic bomb (20,000 ton destructive capacity) will be dropped on the Little Neck Parkway, between Hillside and Jamaica Ave.'s in Queens Village, just over the county line.

The problem for the Oyster Bay CD will involve the setting up of Hicksville as an evacuation center. Hicksville was chosen, because it was considered as the closest "safe" center to the devastated area.

Township CD has scheduled a "dry-run" for Sept. 18 in which chiefs of welfare, communications and welfare, along with the various unit chiefs and assistants will participate.

Four check points will be set up at date to receive members coming from the four areas of the Town.

In the October tests these points will be used to receive aid from other centers and direct the aid. They are:

1. At Robert Hall on North Broadway to receive traffic coming from Oyster Bay and the North Shore.

2. On South Oyster Bay and Woodbury Roads to receive traffic coming from Woodbury and Syosset.

3. On South Oyster Bay at Old Country Road to handle traffic from Plainview and Farmingdale.

4. The Carvel Ice Cream stand on South Broadway to handle traffic from Massapequa and the South Shore.

One of the major features of the test will be a welfare center set up at the Hicksville High School at which members of the local CD unit under the direction of Col. William C. Godfrey will man an operating welfare center for the feeding, registration and clothing of victims from the "disaster area."

CURRENT COMMENT:

Let's Agree On Up Or Down

NEXT WEDNESDAY, Aug. 18, is an important date for Hicksville and the entire Township of Oyster Bay. At 10 o'clock in the morning at 233 Broadway, New York City (which is the Woolworth Building), a hearing will open before a Public Service Commission examiner on the question of eliminating Hicksville's aggravating railroad crossings at grade.

The hearing is being held under the New York State Grade Crossing Elimination Act as supplemented by the Grade Crossing Elimination Act of 1939. It is the first real forward step on this long-dreamed of Hicksville improvement.

Fourteen years ago we made this editorial comment:

"Little hope for railroad grade crossing elimination work in Hicksville during 1940 (that's right, 1940) is seen as the Public Service Commission reports crossings which will receive its full attention this year. Five Hicksville crossings were recommended for consideration by the County Board of Supervisors several months ago (in 1939), but the elimination program is travelling so slowly that Floral Park work started eight years ago is still in the discussion state."

The Floral Park program is still in the discussion stage and, as far as the record goes, is much further advanced than the Hicksville eliminations. However, in Floral Park a big hazard developed over the plans and thus deadlocked the matter.

Most Floral Park people wanted the tracks lowered below ground level, while State plans called for raising the tracks. Floral Park has a branch off the main line in the heart of the village—much like Hicksville—and there were fears that elevating the tracks on a solid wall embankment of soil and concrete would create a "China wall".

The question of raising or lowering the tracks at Hicksville arises almost in the same breath as comment upon elimination. There are, as can be expected, two schools of thought.

Lowering the tracks is greatly to be desired—particularly if the tracks will be covered like a subway. However, the cost of such elimination is several times greater than raising the trackway. To lower the tracks would require the excavation of great amounts of sand, raise questions on drainage and the operation of switches and sidings.

Raising the tracks would be satisfactory if the elevation were on reinforced concrete pillars in the same manner as the elimination was carried out at Valley Stream and Rockville Centre. Elevating the tracks would provide parking facilities for thousands of commuter and shopper automobiles in the very spot where such facilities are desperately needed. Raising the tracks would also permit the opening of several streets which now dead-end at the tracks: Jackson Place, Cherry St., Cari St., Park Ave., etc.

While the hearing set for next Wednesday, as we understand it, is a preliminary first step before the drafting of plans, calling for bids, etc., it would be well for all parties interested to get together on the question of raising or lowering the track level so that Hicksville does not fall into the same stalemate position as Floral Park did.

Meanwhile, all possible evidence and weight must be marshalled for the hearing next Wednesday to prove that the highway-railroad crossings at grade in Hicksville have to be eliminated without further delay. Once this is accomplished, all concerned must continue to press for the appropriation of the millions of dollars of State money which will be required to carry out the job.

Play Ball

Every boy in this country has the inalienable heritage to play baseball and it is a foolhardy political body that tries to take it away from him. Baseball, along with all its variations invented by ingenious youngsters of several generations, has been the national sport for many years. Grass has gone green, basements uncleared, windows unwashed, and all kinds of chores undone so that boys can play ball. And now the Oyster Bay Town Board has the temerity to tell our Hicksville boys that they may not play ball in township playgrounds on Sunday. This is the Town Board elected, not by the people of Hicksville, but by the township of Oyster Bay to administer the affairs, such as a kid's ball game (hah!), of the many communities of the township.

Freedom To Play

In this country, along with other freedom loving nations, the people have the right to do as they please, tempered only by interference with the rights and privileges of others. This freedom extends down to our youngest ball players and undoubtedly we all recognize that although they have the right and the privilege of playing ball, they, as young as they may be, must recognize that they should not be an annoyance to their neighbors. They must exercise care so that they do not damage property or annoy people by wanton invasion of private yards or by excessive noise. Most of us recognize that this is part of a youngster's training.

Shortcomings

The present discussion about ball playing (and bean bags, ouch!) is an almost perfect example of the great fallacy of township government. Here's what happens. The Town Board very properly requires builders to set aside land for recreational areas, but then they forget all about it. It takes an explosion by the homeowners to get the land areas cleared. But it turns out, because of a really outstanding lack of foresight combined with an understandable lack of interest by the Board, the fields are too close to the houses for the kids to play ball with any degree of freedom. Great planning, get out of kilter with the needs of the people.

"Best For The Board"

Supervisor Waters is quoted as assuring those attending the public meeting on this problem that "We will do whatever we feel is best for the Town Board." Notice that he didn't say best for the people, or the kids, or the community, but only best for the Board. "Best" for the Board can mean only the easiest way out, the path of least resistance. Is that what we want from our government body? No, of course not. But it's all we will get until Hicksville really gets up on its hind legs and fights for incorporation as a village and local government.

Every year we hear much about the school buses, and when I hear that such and such a child doesn't have bus privileges, I feel badly; but when it comes time for voting these privileges into effect—that is the time to raise your voice and tell the powers that be—that you want that bus!

The voting will take place on Saturday, Aug. 21, between 2 P.M. and 10 P.M. There are 5 propositions to be voted upon, but only propositions 1 and 2 have to do with this discussion. Proposition one lowers the distance requirements from 2 miles away—to one mile away from the school or over—for bus service. If you want children in junior high who live less than two miles away to have bus service vote "yes." As I understand it that would cost \$16,650 this year, the money coming out of available surplus. The cost of this proposition this year would be \$12,950 this also out of surplus. If you believe that you are voting for safety and security and that the cost is worth it—vote yes, and you will have had your say. It does little good to say anything after the chips are down. So jot the date down in your memo book and be on-hand—even if you're going to vote "no".

(Passed by the Board of Supervisors on August 9, 1954, votes for 21; voted against, none. Became an ordinance August 9, 1954, with the approval of the County Executive.)

Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Nassau shall issue its Serial Bonds of the aggregate principal amount of \$2,114,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York, in order to finance the class of

objects or purposes hereinafter described.

Section 2. The class of objects or purposes (hereinafter referred to as "purposes"), to be financed by the issuance of such Serial Bonds includes and is limited to the following objects or purposes to be undertaken or completed during or after the year 1954: (1) the construction or reconstruction of, or the construction of additions to, surface drainage sewer systems established by the County for the purpose of drainage and to protect the property and the public health within the County from floods, freshets and high water, including dams, culverts, ditches, sluices, and other channels for the passage of water and the deepening, straightening, altering, piping or otherwise improving of streams, ditches, drains, or water courses in order to prevent them from overflowing and so as to provide that they shall carry off such additional water as may be brought to them by other public improvements in the County, and (2) the cost of the acquisition of such land or rights in land and the acquisition and installation of such machinery, equipment or apparatus as may be required for such purpose.

Section 3. The Board of Supervisors has determined and hereby states that the estimated maximum cost of such purpose is \$5,000,000 and that the Board of Supervisors plans to finance such cost by the use of (1) \$2,774,000 heretofore provided for such purpose either by bond ordinance or by budgetary appropriation; and (2) \$12,000 representing current funds heretofore provided for such purpose by a budgetary appropriation which has not lapsed, and (3) \$2,114,000 to be raised by the issuance of the Serial Bonds hereby authorized. Except as hereinbefore stated no moneys have been authorized to be applied to the payment of the cost of such pur-

pose. Not less than \$250,000 of such maximum cost has been provided by budgetary appropriations which have not lapsed.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors hereby determines that the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is described in Subdivision 4 of Paragraph a of Section 11.00 of said Local Finance Law and that the period of probable usefulness of said purpose is thirty years.

Section 5. The power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of said Serial Bonds, subject to the provisions of this ordinance and of any other ordinance or resolution hereafter adopted, and all powers and duties pertaining or incidental to the sale and issuance of said Serial Bonds, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer. The County Executive and the County Treasurer are hereby directed to sign any Serial Bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance and the County Clerk is hereby directed to affix to such bonds the corporate seal of the County of Nassau and to attest such seal. Each interest coupon representing interest payable on such Serial Bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer.

Section 6. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to publish this ordinance in full together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 31.00 of the Local Finance Law. The validity of said Serial Bonds or of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said Serial Bonds may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity, is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or if such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York.

Section 7. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to cause such bonds to be printed and to do such things as may be necessary to advertise the sale of the bonds and to employ Messrs. Reed, Hoyt, Taylor & Washburn, Attorneys of New York City, to furnish to the purchaser or purchasers of such bonds an opinion as to their legality.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.


