Owner Of Monument Works Here 59 Years

HICKSVILLE—The funeral for Fred Sutter of 21 Newbridge Rd. who conducted one of the longest established businesses in the community will be held tomorrow (Wednesday) morning, Aug 25 at 9:15 o'clock with the Rev M. G. Gosselink of the Parkway Community Church officiating. Mr. Sutter died on Sunday at the age of 88. He had been in the monument business here for 59 years. His monument works on Jerusalem Ave at the RR station is a well-known landmark.

Masonic services will be held this evening (Tuesday) at Henry J. Stock Funeral Home on Newbridge Rd where he is residing. He was a life-long member of the Masonic Order and a member of Glen Cove Lodge F and AM No. 520. He was a member of the Royal Arcanum of Baldwin. He had served as a member of the Board of Education and as a director of the Long Island National Bank of Hicksville.

Mr Sutter is survived by a son, Fred J; two brothers, William and Frank; a sister, Matilda Sutter; and a sister-in-law, Anna Susky, and two grandchildren, Suzanne and Keith Sutter.

The monument business was originally established by his father as the D and F Sutter Monument works. His son was associated with him in the business.

Blob In Sky Turns Many Heads

A big silver glob in the sky over the Mid-Island area, late Sunday afternoon, was a "pain in the neck" to thousands. Official comment was that the blobbing object which appeared to change shape and was variously described as a space ship, flying saucer, etc, was actually a weather observation balloon which somehow managed to hold altitude and position for more than two hours. It was observed about 5:30 PM and remained in view until darkness. Necks were disoriented as many craned and swined skyward. One amateur astronomer offered the opinion it was a new star of meteor headed earthward. A neighbor of Benjamin Vryn's on Rising Lane, Hicksville, who is with the Mitchell Air Base weather station asserted the object was a weather balloon released to determine wind and other conditions.

33 Firemen March Up Buffalo Main St.

BUFFALO—Thirty-three members of the Hicksville Fire Dept led by Chief Arnold Jeanson and accompanied by six members of the Ladies Auxiliary paraded up the main street here, Friday during the New York State Firemen's Convention. The Hicksville contingent was one of the largest to participate in the state parade from Long Island and received a big hand from the thousands of spectators.

The Hicks racing team took part in the contests held for volunteer firemen from all sections of the state, Thursday. George McCue is captain of the racing team.

SENIOR HIGH KEEPS WALKING:

Approve Jr High Mile Bus, \$82,000 Nicholai Project

HICKSVILLE—One third of the registered and qualified voters of the district gave their approval, Saturday, to reduction of the limit for junior high school bus service to a mile or more, while they defeated a like proposal for senior high school by a margin of 66 votes. All other propositions were approved. A total of 1,187 votes were cast.

The Board of Education was expected to immediately put into operation plans for the new bus service for 7th and 8th graders, including parochial students at St. Ignatius.

Total votes on the five propositions submitted, Saturday, were as follows: No. 1—Junior high bus—582 yes, 435 no; No. 2—Senior high bus—476 yes, 542 no; No. 3—Nicholai School improvement—755 yes, 252 no; No. 4—folding partition for high school gym—704 yes, 305 no; and No. 5—permission to dispose of 300 unneeded desks and chairs—893 yes, 119 no.

All five propositions were carried in voting districts which vote at Burns Ave. and Old Country Rd. Schools. The Senior High Bus service question was defeated 99 to 193 at the high school and 183 to 191 at East St. School. The high school voting district also voted no, 183 to 153, on the junior high bus question.

The referendum took place a matter of hours after the State Education Dept. announced that the children of Robert Caplin of 29 Lehigh Lane in Hillside Terrace area were entitled to bus transportation.

The vote on Saturday was regarded as related to the Conlin case since his children are enrolled at Junior High School.

At a special board meeting last week, a policy on the measurement of the one-mile bus service distance had been adopted pending the vote. Max Wilton Cheney, administrative assistant to the superintendent of schools on bus service, has completed his survey of the district. It is anticipated that the one-mile service for junior high will be in operation when the term starts after Labor Day.

All 1954-55 appropriations approved by the voters, Saturday, are being taken out of surplus of the school district and are not expected to affect the tax rate.

There were over 3,000 persons registered and qualified to vote in the referendum, Saturday.

THE CONLIN CASE:

President Sees Change In Thinking By State

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education will have to consult with the State Commissioner of Education for "further guidance" on its transportation policy for students during the coming school year, in the opinion of Edna Kuhne Sutton, president of the Board. Commenting upon the decision of Acting Education Commissioner James E. Allen Jr, she said:

"The Board, of course, will comply with the Commissioner's ruling. The Board notes the Commissioner's comment concerning distance. In the spring of 1953, the State Dept made a transportation survey of our district, and indicated that a transportation policy involves two factors—distance and hazard. From the text of the ruling (published in full in this issue) the Acting Commissioner in this appeal, it would appear, however, that only one factor—distance—is deemed involved. Since this departure from the 1953 thinking will have an important bearing on the development of our 1954-55 transportation policy, I believe that the Board should consult with the Commissioner for further guidance."

State Rules Board Must Treat All Pupils Alike

ALBANY — The Hicksville School District is required to provide equal transportation facilities for children residing at similar distances from the school they attend, Acting Education Commissioner James E. Allen Jr. ruled on Aug. 16 in sustaining the appeal of Robert A. Conlin of 29 Lehigh Lane, Hicksville.

Conlin had taken an appeal to the State Commissioner of Education when the Hicksville School Board refused to provide transportation for his children to Junior High School.

The answer to the appeal, prepared by Attorney Michael J. Sullivan, was made before the end of the 1953-54 fiscal year and was signed by Henry C. Bessinger as president, Edna Kuhne Sutton and Richard G. School as trustees. Board members Emil Szendy and Arthur L. Eirich had declined to sign the answer.

The full text of the commissioner's ruling follows:

"Appellants seek an order that transportation be provided by Union Free School District no. 17, Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, for their children to junior high

school, located within the school district at a distance of approximately 1.8 miles from the residences of the appellants."

(Note — Map showing location of Conlin's home at 1.8 miles from the junior high school, which was prepared by Trustee Szendy and was a part of the record of the appeal, was published in the Herald on Aug. 12).

"In this particular appeal," the decision continues, "certain preliminary comments are necessary. The Compulsory Education Law of New York State places the duty, in the first instance, upon the parents of a child within the compulsory school age to see to it that such child attends school. The parents have no right to keep such a child from proper attendance at school because the school district is not providing transportation. If the parents feel aggrieved because transportation is not furnished, the proper remedy is by appeal to the Commissioner of Education and not by refusing to send the child to school. Such action is directly contrary to the provisions of the law (Continued on Page 12)

FALL TERM STARTS SOON New Course For Adults Is 'Tops'

HICKSVILLE—Among the new courses being offered adult education enrollees this fall is one which is described as the TOPS — Take Off Pounds Safely — it was announced today by Director Elery

Bean. Registration will take place at the high school on Sept 13 and 15 from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M.

Among the nine new courses to be offered, Bean describes the following:

"A course which should interest the men is a course for Amateur Radio Operators on how to become a 'Ham'. Instructor, Lawrence Strout is an amateur operator and is professionally employed in electronics industry. He has been associated with Station WGBB and formerly was an instructor in one of the large metropolitan radio schools. The course can be useful to those in Civil Defense or may interest those who would like the satisfaction of talking to others in Africa, Europe or some distant

land. At the end of the course those who can pass a novice course will be given an FCC license. This course will be held Thursday evening from 7:30 to 9:30 P.M.

"Decorative Stencilling, which is the old art of gilt stencilling of antique rockers, trays and boxes will delight the men as well as the ladies. James Rubins has had much success teaching this art in Adult Education programs in North Shore Schools and we are pleased to have him in our program this fall. Free brush methods will be included if desired. This course will be held on Thursday evening from 7:30 to 9:30.

"We are offering a course TOPS (Take Off Pounds Safely) to be conducted by Mrs. Daphne Swier, who is well known throughout Nassau for her work in this field. Mrs. Swier has an extensive background in the field of nutrition, diet and group therapy, having studied under Dr. Joffe, author of the book, 'Reduce and Stay Reduced'. PLAINVIEW—The Board of Education here today announced that it expects to receive approximately \$120,000 in federal construction aid which is to be applied to the cost of the proposed new school.
John C. Dowling, board president pointed out that this money will reduce the amount of tax funds needed to erect the building and purchase the site to approximately \$360,000.
Included in this sum, Dowling said, is the building and more than eight acres of land. In addition, the Oyster Bay Town Board is making a gift to the district of an adjoining parcel consisting of more than an acre making the total land area of the school site approximately 10 1/2 acres.

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
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Jay Walkers Die Young

MORE THAN 49,000 motor vehicles of all kinds—private cars, trucks, buses and emergency vehicles cross the six Rail Road grade crossings in Hicksville during a typical 16-hour period.

That fact was brought out at the Public Service Commission hearing in New York City last Wednesday. It was determined by the process of having people stationed at each crossing, from 7 AM to 11 PM, and clocking the movement of all vehicles.

It is safe to assume that about one-third of this total moves up and down Broadway.

The figure is significant, not only in the presentation of the urgent need for crossing elimination to the state, but also for all persons concerned with local traffic. It points up the need for pedestrian and motorist safeguards which are common in many smaller communities but appear to be absent in our hamlet of over 35,000.

A reader tells us of a distressing experience with a jay-walker this week—a woman dragging two small children across Broadway against the traffic signal. The pedestrian, the reader reports, "had the audacity to shriek at me because I happened to be driving on the street at that time."

Jay-walking is a far too common practice on Broadway in Hicksville, particularly between Marie St. and the Railroad crossing at Herzog Pl.

However, in fairness to the pedestrian, it must be pointed out that there has been a shameful lack of interest by whatever authorities are concerned with safety—few of our street crossings even in the business section, are marked out for the footsteps of pedestrians. No signals indicating when pedestrians can safely move and autos must halt have been provided.

It is difficult to urge people to cross "at the corner" when the point of recommended crossing is not defined or laid out.

We are in full agreement with our letter-writing driver friend who says he would like to give the jay-walking lady a message: "If she wants to keep her two children healthy and wise, not to teach them to cross the center of a busy street against the traffic signal. Also that in this good country of ours, they arrest people for 'jay walking' in some cities."

Would Use Surplus For Specialists

To the Editor:
In view of the pending vote on the school bus proposals and the somewhat confused public attitude on the matter, I wonder if the following ideas from a parent, resident taxpayer and school teacher may help to clarify the situation.

As I see the arguments of those favoring extending Junior High School bus service from two mile and upwards coverage to coverage for all JHS pupils living beyond a mile, their basis seems to rest on three factors: One: pupils who live beyond the mile distance from the school incur undue hardship and danger during their trips to and from school. Two: Some youngsters are being permitted to be exceptions to the existing bus regu-

lation and live within a two mile radius. Three: The public schools have an obligation to taxpayers to provide their children with bus transportation to school so long as State law requires children to attend school.

The arguments in opposition to the above beliefs are as follows: Regarding the hardship and danger which distance from school entails for our youngsters, it may be pointed out that Junior High School boys and girls walk or ride bicycles to school during the warmest hours of each day—Fall, Winter and Spring—between 11:30 and 1 p.m. With the exception of a few icy days each school year, bicycle and foot travel are not overly dangerous if common sense precautions are exercised. As for our congested

streets and the dangers they present, it is the obligation of the community to provide adequate police protection and to educate kids and drivers in traffic safety. The taxpayers should not have to foot the bill to overcome deficiencies in our pedestrian and driver behavior by running buses to carry youngsters. Instead of suffering, boys and girls of 12 to 14 years gain by the exercise and self-reliance engendered by daily walking to school.

Regarding point two (favoritism alleged to exist under present bus regulations), any such discrimination or preferential treatment should be scrupulously avoided to avoid contention. Regarding society's obligation to see that youngsters are given conveyance to school, this obligation does not exist. Society compels its voters to register before voting, to obtain new license plates each year but society does not provide transportation to the polls or provide the registration fees for annual auto plates. An obligation to respect the law does not entitle us to have the community help us to obey that law.

Bus transportation homeward is now provided for all J.H.S. pupils during the winter months, since the school does not finish until 5 p.m. and darkness. This is sufficient transportation for children of this age who are normally quite hearty. Bus arrangements may be made for those children incapacitated or too weak to walk to school each day.

If we taxpayers are anxious to help our schools, let us remember that the Junior and Senior High School could use any tax surplus or additional appropriation to better advantage in engaging full-time remedial reading, speech and guidance specialists, in expanding their shop, athletic or audio-visual programs or bringing their building plants up-to-date.

Tax rates will go up steadily enough as our new high school and renovated Junior High are being constructed so prudence and best use of our limited funds require that we vote NO on propositions which would spend funds to provide bus service for the senior high and expanded bus service for the Junior High.

State Rules Board Must Treat All Pupils Alike

(Continued from Page 1)

Compulsory Education Law and it was the duty of the school authorities to promptly institute proceedings in violation of such law. It should also be pointed out that a board of education has no authority to furnish transportation unless the voters approve such transportation and make an appropriation therefor or unless ordered by the Commissioner of Education.

AREA PLAN

"It appears that the Board of Education, for transportation purposes, has divided the district into various areas and has determined to furnish transportation to junior high school pupils residing in certain of these areas but has determined not to provide transportation to pupils residing in the area of appellant's residence. It further appears that pupils residing in one of the areas being furnished transportation reside at distances less than 1.5 miles from the junior high

school. "A school district is not obligated to provide transportation for any of its pupils to the school they legally attend where the distance involved is less than two miles in the case of elementary pupils and where the distance is less than three miles in the case of high school pupils. Of course, the voters of a school district have the power to provide transportation for lesser distances where they deem it desirable or necessary.

EQUAL TRANSPORTATION

"However, having assumed the responsibility of transporting public school pupils for lesser distances, the school district is required to provide equal transportation facilities for those children of the district residing at similar distances from the school they legally attend. Therefore, appellants' children are entitled to be provided with the same transportation facilities as are now being provided to other children residing at the same distance from such school.

"Accordingly, the APPEAL IS SUSTAINED.

"It is ordered that the Board of Education of Union Free School Dist. No. 17, Town of Oyster Bay, county of Nassau, proceed forthwith to provide transportation for the appellants' children to the school they legally attend and pay the reasonable cost thereof out of any funds of the district funds available for such purposes the Board of Education is hereby authorized and directed to raise by tax on the taxable property of the district a sum sufficient to pay for the same."
