# Thousands Parade Here On Labor Day

**HICKSVILLE**—The Labor Day volunteer firemen's parade and tournament here next Monday promises to be one of the biggest in the history of the community with more than 60 fire departments and their ladies auxiliaries entered. A parade of over 3,000 firemen, about 40 bands and hundreds of fire trucks will start at 9 o'clock in the morning. Competitions for over 60 trophies will begin at 1 in the afternoon on Levittown Parkway and continue until about 6.

A big block party, free to everyone, will be held this Saturday night, Sept. 4, in the public parking field opposite the firehouse on E. Marie St. There will be dancing to a band of musicians, refreshments and entertainment. John Jeanson as chairman will be grand marshal for the Labor Day Parade here which starts promptly at 9 o'clock Monday, morning, rain or shine.

The parade will start from Broadway and Marie St. Hicksville Fire Dept., as the hosts, will head the parade with its Ladies Auxiliary, the Fire Commissioners and apparatus. They will form in front of the firehouse and the siren will blast twice to signal the start.

Parade divisions will form on W. Marie, W. Nicholas and W. Cherry Sts. and as the marchers proceed south on Broadway, the divisions will fall in.

## SCHOOL BOARD MEETING: Federal Funds Assured; Explain New Bus Policy

**HICKSVILLE**—All allocated Federal construction aid funds, amounting to \$472,820, can be assigned to the Old Country Rd. School addition, Trustee Emil J. Szendy reported to the Board of Education last night (Wednesday) upon his return from Washington and conferences with various Federal agency department heads. The Board, in special session, immediately moved to award the construction contracts upon the Dutch Lane, Fork Lane and Burns Ave. Schools—which had held pending the official word from the government—and ordered the preparation of specifications for bidding on the Old Country Rd. addition as a federal project.

Szendy headed a delegation from the district which included Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent; Michael Sullivan, attorney on the additions; Frederick Tinney, financial advisor, and the school architect, which made a flying trip

to Washington on Wednesday. Among the officials they conferred with were Curtis Boehre of the School Construction Division of the Dept. of Health, Welfare and Education; and Congress- (Continued on Page 15)

## PRECISE MEASUREMENT:

# Strictly Distance School Bus Rules Disregard All Hazards

**HICKSVILLE**—The new policy of the School Board of determining who shall ride and who shall walk to classes with the opening of the fall term next Wednesday, Sept. 8, to "the crack in the sidewalk" the precise distance from the school entrance used by the student is expected to raise some controversy next week.

Acting upon the ruling of the State Dept. of Education, children who live a half mile or more from school and attend the kindergarten through third grades, will ride. All others will walk, regardless of "hazardous" special circumstances, except of course physical handicaps.

And children in the 4th through 8th grades who live a mile or more away from their school will also ride.

Parents of all children of the district entitled to board a bus next Wednesday will get notice by Mail from Max Wilton Chemev, administrative assistant to the Superintendent of

Schools in charge of bus transportation. The letters will include the child's bus pass and an explanation of the bus policy.

As a result, no schedule of bus stops will be available for publication prior to the opening of the new term, a spokesman said. Everyone entitled to ride will receive a pass and data by mail and 2,557 letters will reach parents by next Tuesday, the day before the term begins. All others will walk.

Under the new precise measurement policy, it is anticipated that certain children who previously enjoyed bus service because of special hazardous conditions enroute will be obliged to walk.

A program for school bus service, being provided this term by Semke instead of Benkert Bus of Bethpage, had been fully developed and then had to be totally revised in the past two weeks to fit the new policy.

**Chamber Urges Child Safety As Classes Resume Next Week**

# Emergency Crews Work Around Clock To Untangle Carol's Blow

Hurricane Carol lashed the mid-Island area on Tuesday morning but damage resulting from the high winds and rain storm were considerably less than the hurricane visitations of previous years. Many homes were without power for periods varying from a few hours to more than 24 hours as falling trees and limbs tore down wires. Traffic on South Broadway, Hicksville, was detoured around the corner of Broadway and Lee Ave where a stately tree pulled down wires, the traffic signal and covered a car. The driver was not hurt.

Twenty firemen were on standby duty but received only one minor call on BasFet Lane. The firehouse operated intermittently on emergency power. Several

vamps cooperated with the Lighting Co. and provided their floodlight truck for three hours, Tuesday night.

The heavy rainfall flooded many streets, and intersections. Power failures caused numerous stores and offices to close for the day.

William B. Billmeyer, district manager of the New York Telephone Co for the Mid-Island area said that about 300 Hicksville lines were out of service. However, it was anticipated that all would be working by 5 P.M. on Sept. 1.

Hours before Hurricane Carol pelting rain and lashing winds blasted 13,000 Long Island telephones out of service, the entire New York Telephone Co. maintenance and repair forces were alerted and on the job Billmeyer said.

By 6 A.M. Tuesday, the Company had 4000 installers, repairmen, splicers and linemen operating on "Catastrophe Routine", a highly integrated system of scouting out damage on a street by street basis throughout the 274 square miles of Nassau and 920 square miles of Suffolk.

Three hours later all 41 phone central office buildings in Suffolk were operating on emergency power and 13 of 19 buildings in Nassau were similarly situated.

Early Wednesday morning reports showed phone men working in crippled areas in Suffolk where 180 poles are down and 846 trees are leaning on telephone lines. In Nassau 830 men had been assigned to work dawn-to-dark and it is reported that 119 trees are resting on telephone cables and 41 poles are down throughout the County.

Two hundred Brooklyn and Queens telephone men were assigned early Wednesday morning to augment the present emergency crews in the two Counties.



I've just finished reading some of the newspaper articles with members of a typical Brooklyn gang and I'm sick at heart. True there is a difference in the Teen-Agers in Hicksville and Brooklyn, but can anyone say how long it will be before our Teen-Agers are just as lawless and unmanageable as those in Brooklyn?

I have come to many conclusions concerning Teen gangs and the trouble they cause, and I think they all lead toward the correction of this deplorable situation. But first let me say that I have three children of my own so what I am about to say cannot be called the cold chatter of one who does not understand how to love youngsters. We've got to do more than just love our children; we've got to take a firm hand in heading them in the right direction.

Before I mention any of the preventives, I would like to say a word about the punishment that the youthful savages of the Koslow Gang are receiving... WEAK. There it is in just one word. Now, I am just as modern as the next person; I've gone along with all

the talk about psychiatry and helping offenders instead of "persecuting" them, but here is where I break away. Things, or rather, youngsters are getting out of control. Just look at all the cases of "thrill" crimes that broke out after the expose of the four "thrill-killers". I'll bet all those poor victim's sufferings that if the Koslow gang had gotten a good old-fashioned thrashing in public, or even in private with a report of it prominently printed in the papers, there wouldn't have been one case of repetition. Bring on your psychiatrists if you must, but after the thrashing. Let the offenders know what it feels like to be at the other end of brutality and give them a taste of what their victims felt. They won't be so quick to repeat their crimes; nor will others be to copy them.

Now I have nothing against Teen-Agers in general. I'm only 23 years old myself, and I can remember these years very closely; but you can't treat a Teen-Ager like a mature man, any more than you can treat a four-year-old like a teen-ager.

A teen-ager should not be left on his own for hours and hours until he gets the feeling that he is so bored that he wants to "punch the walls in" to quote a member of one of the Brooklyn gangs. We wouldn't leave a two-year-old out in the yard all day without supervising; the way the time is spent. Neither should it be done with a teen-ager. I am not comparing him to a two-year-old, but while he should of course have more freedom than a two-year-old, he still needs supervision. A certain amount of freedom is good for the teen-ager, but too much of a good thing is always bad.

A recreation hall is only a small part of the answer. How many such halls have been wrecked and abandoned. They also need a supervisor, but not one who, as a member of a Brooklyn gang suggested "would be with us almost daily just like one of our buddies. So any time we want to say something or we're feeling low or something, we can go over and sit down and talk to him". (I wonder what he thinks mothers and fathers are for?)

These boys want a safety valve so that they can think their antisocial thoughts and write in their self-pity and then pour it all out to the "supervisor" and thus emptied of their misery, proceed to build it all up again.

Why should these boys have such misery in the first place?? There's one big glaring reason... no religion. How can a boy respect the authority of the law of man when he has not the slightest respect for the Authority of the Law of God? This is very personal business, but then again so is the business of taking a man's life a very personal one. It is up to the father and mother to instill in their children a love of God, and second to that, love of their fellow man. The sad part about it is that too few fathers and mothers bother to think very much about this subject and those who do seem to feel that once a child enters his teens he is

on his own concerning religion. How ridiculous can things get! What does a teen-ager know about life and it's temptation and pitfalls that he can face it without the support of his religion? And how can he strengthen his faith in his religion if he is receiving no nourishment for it? This is expecting too much. And if one has no real faith in his religion, how can he care how he hurts his fellow man? All that is left in Self.

I do not claim to know how to awaken these poor souls to an awareness of God, but I'm going to pray that an answer can be found.

And what other aid is there to this problem? It's the problem of too much time, and the lesser one of the preoccupation of some teen-agers with acquiring and spending money. Money has become much too important to the teen-ager. However, it's a fact that in order to take a girl out nowadays, a boy has to have a heavy wallet. But if in these recreation halls the same things they pay plenty to do on dates were made available to them free, what need would they have for money outside of pocket money for refreshments?? They like to go to movies on dates, and bowl and roller skate; these pastimes have prohibitive prices for the teen-ager. And what about all that spare time the teen-ager has to while away? What on earth is the matter with putting a teen-ager to work in his off time? With his earnings he should be made to start a bank account and learn the real value of money and the good that money can do by being available in time of need or to further one's education.

It takes time to prepare oneself for the future. What are these boys doing towards readying themselves for a good job for instance, or keeping their young bodies in good shape? What has happened to athletics as a juvenile pastime? Hanging around the street corners hardly builds up the leg muscles, but swimming does. Look at what weight lifting does for the chest, arms and back muscles. And do you know what is even better than weight lifting? ... lifting a shovel loaded with soil and tossing it over one's shoulder.

Give these youngsters of ours some land and materials and let them build their own recreation hall, and then let them use it. They can even work to provide the money to buy the materials for the interior decoration; they'll really feel that it's their own place, and they'll take care of it too. There will be no destruction then. There are many ways they can earn the money, either with regular jobs or by getting us a show; most teen-agers have some kind of talent, and talent of every kind is required to run a show.

My last suggestion is to proclaim a "civvie hour" and enforce it; remember a teen-ager is not yet an adult and he should not be out at all hours of the night. He might not like curfew, but there are times when we must protect our children against themselves.

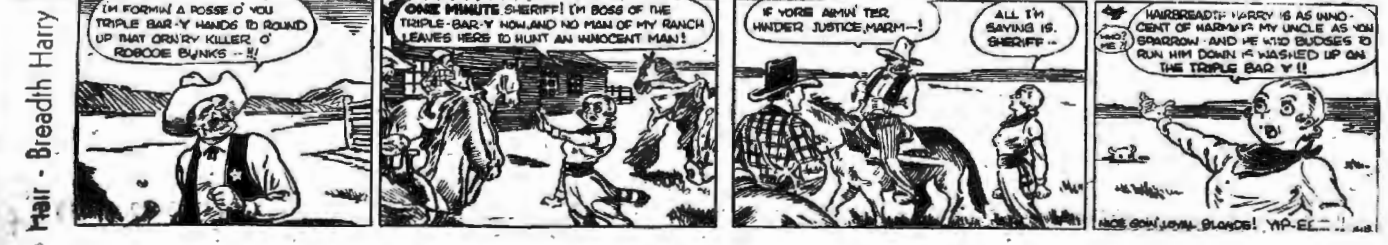

man Stayessant Walkeright. Spandy told the board there was a strong possibility that the district might also be eligible for Federal funds on operational expenses also.

After his report, he moved that the Board award the contracts on the three other schools to the low bidder. The motion was carried unanimously.

Trustee Joseph Cowley expressed the board's appreciation to the delegation for the success of their mission.

The Board also went into the matter of policy on parochial and private school transportation outside the district. It was voted that each child be considered as an individual case, that the distance to each parochial or private school be measured from the student's home to that school. Those who live eight miles or less from such schools will be given transportation.

Spandy protested that the motion was not necessary since the amount budgeted for such transportation in the coming year already determined the policy.

A detailed statement of the transportation policy was read and amended.

The statement follows in part: "At a meeting of the Board of Education, the Board voted to adopt a transportation policy based on the principals as set forth by the legal staff of the University of the State of New York.

"The Legal Division at Albany has ruled (1) that if our District sets up a mile limit transportation for children of a particular grade level, we should measure to each individual house, and that if one pupil is transported .95 mile, all other pupils of the same grade

level who live .95 from school must be transported; (2) the factors of safety have no legal bearing on the amount of transportation involved, and that if we transport pupils for hazard reasons .3 mile, we must transport all other pupils of the same grade level .3 mile.

"Up to now, the Board's transportation policy has been predicated upon instructions obtained from representatives of the State Dept. of Education who in the Spring of 1953, came to this district, worked with us, advised us and recommended a policy which we adopted. We have not found fault with that general policy, established then, nor do we now. A vital part of that policy was the recognition of physical hazards. The whole element of safety was a reason for consideration in providing bus transportation to any children, whose place of residence in terms of distance from the school attended would not otherwise entitle them to transportation. This meant that if one child faced a hazard, the Board could provide transportation for that child whether the distance were one block or one mile. By the same token, it permitted some latitude where the absurd drawing of a measurement mark would arbitrarily bar one child from transportation while giving his next door neighbor the benefit of such transportation when vacant bus seats could take care of all, at no extra cost.

"Whatever the defects of this practice and philosophy, it made human allowances for human considerations. True, it made error possible, but we would consider that the inevitable price of assuming responsibility.

"This new policy says, in substance, that if one child who faces a hazard, and who lives, let us
