# 2 State Records Topple At Biggest Tournament

HICKSVILLE—All previous records for attendance were shattered at the 26th annual Labor Day parade and tournament which was won by East Meadow with 16.5 points. Two state records were broken during the fast and furious competition on Levittown Parkway with an audience estimated by police at over 12,000. There were 15,000 spectators along the two-mile parade route in the morning.

Massapequa came in second with 13.5 points and the highly favored state champions, the Oyster Bay Rough Riders, placed third with 12 points. The outcome of the day's events was determined in the final contest, efficiency.

Frank Sutter, chairman of the judges for the parade, reported there were 2,487 firemen in the parade, 206 fire trucks, 390 ladies in 21 auxiliary units, 38 bands and 52 fire departments.

Prizes for fire departments coming the furthest distance went to three long-distance outfits: Fiskeville of Rhode Island; Sea Breeze, from outside Rochester; and Matydale, from outside Syracuse. Fiskeville had first sent word it might not be able to take part due to the extensive damage in Rhode Island and the New England area as a result of Hurricane Carol last.

## Plainview Writer Earns Freedom Crusade Award

PLAINVIEW—In tribute to his help in the fight against world Communist aggression, Martin L. Gross of 24 Edin Avenue, this week received an award from the Crusade for Freedom.

Gross, a writer and contributor to the major national magazines, was presented the award by Henry Ford II, board chairman of the American Heritage Foundation, sponsors of the Crusade for Freedom and its subsidiary, Radio Free Europe.

Gross, long instrumental in exposing the Communist conspiracy, received the honor for authoring, among others, such articles as the story of Czech "Freedom Tank" builder Vaclav Uhlík and of Polish MIG jet pilot Lt. Franciszek Jarecki, both of whom attested to Radio Free Europe's impact behind the Iron Curtain.

His timely exposure of the Communist menace in Guatemala appeared in This Week magazine, the Sunday supplement of the Herald Tribune before the overthrow of the Red government. His latest exposure of world communism, to appear in the Oct. 9 and 16 issues of the Saturday Evening Post, deals with Kremlin policy in Asia.

The award itself includes a piece of authentic barbed wire encased in a lucite bloc along with a gold plaque attesting to Gross' service to the cause of freedom.

A contributor to such national magazines as This Week, Saturday Evening Post, American Weekly

True, Argosy, Cosmopolitan, Gross is active in local affairs. He is presently Public Relations Chairman for the Bill McCaffrey for Assemblyman campaign and editor of the Plainview News, Democratic Party bulletin. He is also Chairman of the Adult Education Citizens Committee of the School District.

He lives with his wife, Anita, and daughter, Amy, in Morton Village.

# Lower Water Use, Tax Rates

PLAINVIEW—Good news for the taxpayers and consumers of the water district was announced by the Board of Commissioners this week following the annual budget meeting. Both the tax rate and the water rate have been cut. The new water rate, a drop of 15 cents per 1,000 gallons, is effective Sept. 1.

The property tax rate has been cut 10 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. The new water consumption rate is 40 cents per 1,000 gallons, compared to a previous rate of 55 cents per 1,000. The 40-cent rate applies up to 100,000 gallons used in a quarter. Thereafter the rate is 20 cents per 1,000.

The quarterly minimum rate has also been reduced from \$4 to \$3, the board announced.

All residents of the district are invited by Superintendent John Traak and the commissioners to visit the new main pumping plant and office of the district at Manetto Hill Rd. and Old Country Rd. this Sunday, Sept. 12, between 2 and 5 P.M.

# LI Supports Legitimate Stage

Well, I think Long Island finally did it. The fastest growing area of the U. S. has just about everything the city has by now, and last week I discovered that Long Island is now at a place where it can support the legitimate stage at a non-professional level. By that, I mean, Producers Bruce Ferguson and Minor Dixon have managed to pack the house for a five night stand of the "Glass Menagerie". They deserve a great deal of credit for undertaking such an ambitious program. You will be hearing from them quite frequently, as their goal is a "50-week-a-year-theatre". Their next production due to come up very soon is "The Heiress" by Augustus and Ruth Goetz.

Jack Judd, who played the frustrated and discontent son in Tennessee Williams' "Glass Menagerie", was fully in character that night. I attended. It was easy to read the thoughts of his reticent, lame sister—awkward and shy and she was played by Emid McCormack. The gentleman caller—Rudolph Volpe—conveyed to the audience his understanding for the backward lass and he endeavored to teach her

how to look at life in a better light. When I stopped backstage after the performance, my husband asked Florence Kelly, who played the mother, how she EVER could learn the many hundred lines in this—one of the most loquacious parts of the stage. After seeing her prattle incessantly for two hours on stage, it was odd to see her so quiet backstage. "It wasn't so hard," was her taciturn reply. Only I couldn't be so quiet, and so I raved and raved about their presentation and while I'm still in the spirit, I'm recommending that you catch the Long Island Barter Theatre in their forthcoming plays.

No mention of a performance such as this can be complete without due credit to the man who knit the whole bunch together—memorized all the lines of every player—and consulted with them on their each and every movement. That man, the director—Jason Johnson—left the cast an inspiration from him right on the stage—his picture framed and installed in a prominent place on stage. It was supposedly a photo of the father who had run away from home to shirk responsibility but I was convinced that responsibility was one of Johnson's fine qualities.

Bouquets also to the folks—without whom the actors could not do a thing—the production staff. These folks did a job worthy of a Broadway performance. Tech. Dir. Minor Dixon; Stage Manager Janet Cripanuk; Set Design Broce Ferguson; Production Co-Ordinator Joan Holiday; Property Manager Arthur Neidlich; Special Effects Elaine Dixon; Amanda's costume Ruth Ringenbach. It was interesting to see the many objects that we bartered for tickets, as is

the custom with this group. On display were a Swiss Chalet Clock, Candelsticks, a coon skin cap, a blowtorch and many more unusual pieces.

Speaking of the theatre, the Plainview Theatre Guild has appointed a reading committee for the next play: Vera McIntosh, Gene Mallran, and Pearl Blumen-thal. . . . Recently, I wrote thumb nail sketches of members of the Theatre Guild. I hadn't a chance till now to write about Pearl Blumenthal. She attended Professional Children's School. On the road with Bert Lehr in Caribbean Cruise; the Whithead Players at Steinway Hall; Charles Lowe Varieties and Theatrical Enterprises. Her husband, Al, another talented member of the Guild will not give me any details, no matter how hard I press him. He is a very modest fellow but about him I do know that he was concert-maker for the orchestra at Duke University and first violin for Johnnie Long, and Les Brown and his band of Renown. Welcome back home to Mr. and Mrs. Parulli of Fulton Ave. They just spent a few weeks in Florida.

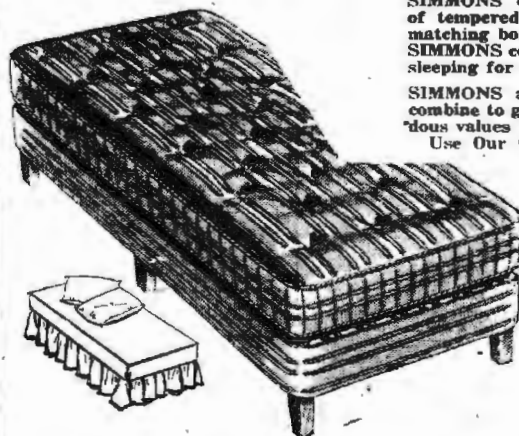

# DeShaw Not Only One Misled

By RML J. SZENDY

To the Editor:  
The assumption, on the part of one of your correspondents, that the amounts read at the time of bid opening for Hicksville school bus transportation, \$5550 for Junior High and \$7400 for Senior High, were, in each instance, the total cost of transportation is, of course, incorrect. These amounts were respectively for each of three buses for Junior High, and for each of four buses for combined Junior High and Senior High transportation.

However, he was not the only one misled. From discussion that evening it appeared that all Board members had the same impression, as did the staff member handling transportation. Copies of the bidding documents were requested by me but were unavailable; they were locked up and inaccessible. Only after back check was it apparent that bids had been requested "per bus".

The matter was further confused by another bidder quoting 28,000 for combined Junior and Senior

High transportation, obviously not on a "per bus" basis. Subsequent inaccurate and incomplete statements in the letter sent by the School Board to all residents of the District, approved in my absence due to illness, were also misleading. The letter spoke of a "contract cost" of \$16,650. No contract had been let at the time, and a bid for a lesser amount was actually on file. When the contract was actually authorized during the past week it was for \$12,000 for the three additional buses for Junior High.

Pertinent also, for the information of the public, is that the total cost of all transportation, including that newly voted for Junior High, and including the cost of staff supervisory services previously separately paid, promises to be less than the amount originally budgeted without Junior High and approved by the voters at the annual meeting in May. The additional amount from surplus voted at the recent referendum should not prove necessary, and only a small part of it would have been needed in any case.
