## Godfrey Calls Session Of CD Auxiliary Police

HICKSVILLE—Col William Godfrey community director of Civil Defense, announces a meeting tonight (Tuesday) in the basement of St. Ignatius School on E. Nichols St. for all members of the CD auxiliary police, including all who have ever been members or those who wish to join.

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

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## CURRENT COMMENT: Youth Week And Adults

**THE OBSERVANCE** of Youth Week in Hicksville, starting this Saturday, is viewed by the sponsors as a two-way proposition. The teens of Hicksville will be showing their skills and cooperative effort in a series of events ranging from parades to a hobby show. The other portion of the program will be the role assumed by the adults of Hicksville.

In the preliminary planning for Youth Week, the Youth Coordinating Council as overall sponsors and promoters, have encountered some disappointment in regard to cooperation. However, we feel certain that such experience has been more the result of misunderstanding on the part of those approached and possibly found wanting, rather than an unwillingness to cooperate. In the main, the program has received enthusiastic oral if not physical support and cooperation.

**Youth Week marks the first major undertaking since a community mass meeting was held some months ago in the high school auditorium. During the interval, a number of successful programs have been developed and encouraged. The Coordinating Council—being somewhat of a new idea—has been going through the throes of organizing, cataloging and surveying.**

We look forward to the permanent establishment of Hicksville Youth Week as an annual traditional community activity.

This is an excellent opportunity to get better acquainted with the young men and women who will some day take their positions as young adults and future parents and home builders.

If you have not taken an active interest in the Youth of Hicksville, the forthcoming program provides a wonderful opportunity. Drop in for some of the scheduled events. Meet the young people and most important of all—offer your cooperation and assistance.

The Youth Coordinating Council is not proposed as a new organization. Its sole purpose and function is to cooperate with and assist presently constituted organizations serving the youth and, if the need appears apparent, to promote and develop new activities, cooperating all the time with the churches, clubs, schools and societies.

The thanks and commendation of the community has been earned by those who have already come forward and offered to sponsor various phases of the Youth Week program. We hope to see the list increase several times over in the next few days.

But above all else, the youth program in Hicksville needs that one commodity which money cannot buy—the precious time and energy of adult volunteers.

Our community has many fine programs for boys and girls of all ages. But speak to any local adult leaders and you will find there's a common complaint—not enough adult help.

There are more candidates for Girl Scouting—for example—than the number of available troops. The shortage of troops is due to the lack of adult leaders. More boys could become Scouts, if there were more committee men.

The adults of Hicksville, and of every other mid-Island community for that matter, are on parade. Will they fail tomorrow's citizens? We don't think so.

## The Question Box

However, the privilege of borrowing books is extended only to residents of School District 17; non-residents must pay a \$5 dollar annual fee to borrow books, although the library will extend its reference services to non-residents without charge.

Q. I have an etching signed by Jacques Reich. Can you give me some information about him?

A. Jacques Reich was born August 12, 1852, and died July 8, 1923. He made most of the pen and ink portraits for Appleton's Cyclopedic of American Biography, and published a series of etched portraits of famous Americans. This series included Washington, Grant, Wilson and others.

Q. Where are the Mascarene Islands?

A. The Mascarene Islands are located in the Indian Ocean. They include the islands of Reunion, Mauritius, Rodriguez and Agalega, and the Chagos Archipelago and the Cargados Carajos Shoals. They have an inhabited area of 1,775 square miles, and a population of 785,000. Reunion is administered by the French; the other islands are British crown colony.

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



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
