# Vote On 2 Schools Looms For December

HICKSVILLE—Tentative arrangements are being made for a possible referendum of voters in the school district early in December upon proposed additional bond issues to cover the cost of constructing two more elementary schools, extensive alterations and additions to the present high school building and possible purchase of property for a third small school.

Following a meeting with Knappe and Johnson, school district architects, who are proceeding with plans for a 12-room school on the so-called Wetterau property off Newbridge Rd. and the plans to enlarge the high school for junior high use doubling its present capacity, the Board of Education at a special meeting, Thursday night, heard a summary report from Felix McCormack of Columbia Teachers College who has developed continuing studies of district requirements since 1949.

Dr. McCormack told the board that the construction of schools at the Wetterau property, another on the northside near Zelda Park and a possible third small school in the south east corner of the district—together with the junior high project and currently committed projects—should take care of the long range needs of the school district.

He warned that the district is still confronted with a 10 to 15 year period of peak enrollment and double sessions after which there will be a sharp tapering off in student enrollment.

"If you try to build to meet the peak requirements, even with 35 students in a room, you will over-build and waste the taxpayers' money," he warned.

Knappe and Johnson, architects, were authorized to develop preliminary plans for a possible four class-room addition to Lee Ave. School which may be utilized instead of locating another school in the south east corner of the district (vicinity of New South Rd. and Field Ave.) if a site cannot be found.

Award of contracts for the Old Country Rd. School addition as a federal aid project is anticipated shortly. Bids were opened Thursday night and it was disclosed that the Board may hold a special meeting this week to get the architect's recommendations and bid summary.

## Added Fire Safety For Nicholai

HICKSVILLE—The installation of additional fire warning and safety devices in the old Nicholai St. School building, here, were approved by the Board of Education at a special meeting, Thursday night. The board authorized a change in the present construction plans to permit the addition of a sprinkler system in each classroom at a cost of \$880 which will be linked with the elaborate system already arranged for the basements, storerooms and corridors. The system will also be connected to fire headquarters, at a cost of about \$950, to give immediate notice of a temperature rise which will set off the sprinklers. A proposal to install exit doors in the seven first floor classrooms directly to the outside of the building at an estimated cost of \$10,865 was rejected. The state authorities and district architect both found this proposal "unwarranted".

HICKSVILLE—Members of the fire department will show films on fire prevention in district schools this week in observance of Fire Prevention Week, according to Chief Arnold Jeanson. # Claim Bloc Of Three Trustees 'Controls District' And Board

HICKSVILLE—Charges that "unilateral control" of the School District and School Board by a bloc of three board members has been "further enhanced" thru the election of Richard G. Schoel, member of the board, as District Clerk, were levelled today by the two dissenting members.

Emil Seandy and Arthur L. Erich in a statement issued last night said that "contrary to published reports" Mr. Schoel did not volunteer for the job. His election was ordained, determined and voted by the bloc and no other member was asked whether he would serve.

"The action was taken", Seandy and Erich charge, "while six applicants for the job waited outside. Some of these applicants proved more than usually qualified. Nevertheless, the possibility of appointment of one of these was discounted and disregarded and Mr. Schoel's election pursued through." They claim the bloc of three members of the board "with unilateral control" consists of Trustees Richard G. Schoel, Joseph Cawley and Edna Kuhns Sutton.

The statement continues: "No votes were cast by Trustees Erich and Seandy, with the recorded

reasons for dissent substantially as follows:

"1. Immediate appointment of a District Clerk to provide the only urgent need, a third signatory for District checks, was not necessary; a board member could be

authorized to affix the third signature.

"2. A district clerk could be appointed from the applicants about to be interviewed.

"3. Mr. Cawley's motion, with (Continued on Page 2)

## Town Awaits Official Word On Thruway Path

OYSTER BAY—All zoning change requests in the Syosset-Jericho-Woodbury and Locust Grove areas may be held in abeyance until the exact routes of the new North-South Expressway and the East-West Thruway are revealed by State Park Commissioner Robert Moses, "and the overall, comprehensive zoning plan proposed for that area will also be postponed for the same reasons," it was revealed this week by the Town Board, here. It is believed that the Board will go along with the recommendations made by Zoning Consultant John H. Mudderman, who was retained by the Town to make a preliminary survey for the area.

The Town Board, besieged by requests for zone changes brought about by the rapid growth of the areas announced two months ago that all zoning change requests in that area would be held up until Mudderman's report was received.

lengthy preamble setting forth the problems faced because of the sudden death of Mr. Heberer, previous District Clerk, envisioned as the only solution the appointment of Mr. Schoel. There were other practicable solutions.

"4. When, for lack of other second, the proposed appointee seconds the motion for his own appointment, the unilateral action thus imposed is achieved by means distasteful if not improper."

Erich further stated that "no recommendations were ever entertained by President Sutton in connection with the clerk's appointment from among board members. Mr. Schoel's name was selected and moved by Mr. Cawley and a vote was immediately called for."

He said his reasons for voting "no" were stated as follows for inclusion in the minutes of the meeting:

"In my opinion, the need for a district clerk is most urgent. I am not, however, in favor of appointing Mr. Schoel as District Clerk unless he consents to resign from the Board of Education to accept such appointment. It is my understanding that the immediate need is for one person to affix his or her signature to checks in payment for debts that have become due and payable. This person would act as a third signer in the absence of a District clerk are requested to make out that such a person may be selected from among members of the Board.

"In furtherance with the above I am of the opinion that we are in a position to select, from among applications on hand, a person to fill the position of District Clerk."

Last week it was announced that candidates for the position of district clerk are requested to make their application to Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, assistant superintendent of schools, East St. School, on or before Oct. 8, 1954.

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## McCaffrey Scores GOP 'Do Nothing' Policy

PLAINVIEW—The "do nothing policy" of the Republican administration locally and nationally regarding the layoff of 7,000 Republic Aviation plant workers was blasted by Bill McCaffrey, Democratic candidate for state Assembly last night (Monday). He addressed the Democratic Club at a meeting in the firehouse, here.

"The Republican big boss, Sprague, and his nine little stooges in the State Legislature and Congress," McCaffrey said, "have sat by and twiddled their thumbs while some 30,000 of the people in Nassau they are supposed to represent are left without any income or prospect of jobs—left staring into the face of big mortgage payments they cannot meet."

"Defense Secretary Wilson's dramatic visit to Republic accomplished exactly nothing except some phoney publicity," McCaffrey continued. "Not one single worker was rehired. Mr. Wilson says it's a matter of planes. I say it's human beings. If Nassau had decent representatives in Albany and Washington instead of Sprague's little stooges, the people would get some action."

McCaffrey's statement on Republic came as part of an announcement of his full campaign platform for the Nov. election. Some of his campaign points include:

1. Long Island Railroad: McCaffrey calls the present LIRR Bill "another Republican give-away." He advocates control of the railroad be taken out of Pennsylvania RR hands and put under a Rapid Transit System or a group similar to the New York Port of Authority. "The Pennsy," he said, "is Long Island's worst enemy."

2. Pari-Mutual Tracks: "In the past years only the GOP bosses have profited from Roosevelt Raceway," McCaffrey said. "Now it's time for the people to cash in a little. I advocate a Nassau County Pari-Mutual Tax on Roosevelt Raceway, the proceeds to go to education and hospitals in Nassau. Sprague and the other Republican stockholders in Raceway have blocked such a tax in the past eight years, but now it is going to be a change."

3. Utilities: McCaffrey blamed what he called "outlandishly high gas and electric bills" on the LI Lighting Co. and the Republican-controlled Public Service Commission. "Five Dewey-appointed Republican hacks," McCaffrey charged, "are setting your gas and electric rates now and they have absolutely no concern for the average homeowner. When elected I intend to sponsor legislation to alter the make-up of the PSC so that really qualified men of both political parties are re-

presented.

4. Planning: McCaffrey charged that planning in Oyster Bay Township is synonymous with "19th century planning." DR. FELIX McCORMACK brought to the Hicksville School Board meeting last Thursday night statistics which are of great local significance. Much of what he had to say has been told and re-told in the periodic installments of the so-called "Columbia Report".

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Further, it has been determined that only 626 new dwelling are planned for construction in the entire district next year, which is another decline and indication, according to Dr. McCormack, that there is an "end in sight". By comparison in 1950-51 there were 3,500 homes built in Hicksville.

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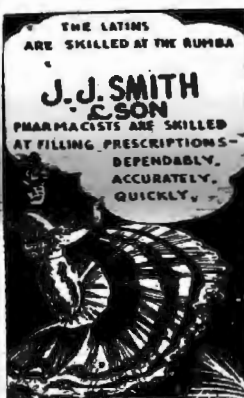

**McCaffrey Scores GOP 'Do Nothing' Policy**

PLAINVIEW—The "do nothing policy" of the Republican administration locally and nationally regarding the layoff of 7,000 Republic Aviation plant workers was blasted by Bill McCaffrey, Democratic candidate for state Assembly last night (Monday). He addressed the Democratic Club at a meeting in the firehouse, here.

# Saturday Is Last Day To Enroll

ALBANY—Non-personal registration districts will lose their votes in the Nov. 2 election unless they get their names back on the registration rolls under a new law, L. Judson Morhouse, Republican State Chairman, warned today.

Those affected are individuals in the non-personal registration districts who have not voted in a general election in

the past four years and who failed to reply to a postcard sent to them by their board of electors.

Morhouse said that under a 1953 amendment, effective last Jan. 1, names of those who did not vote in at least one of the past four general elections had to be stricken from registration books in non-personal registration districts (outside cities and villages of

5,000 or more inhabitants). He said boards of elections in these districts sent notices of the removal of these names to affected individuals, together with an attached return postcard application for restoration of the registration.

Those who received this notice and failed to return the attached card will not be eligible to vote in the Nov. 2 election unless they act immediately to restore their names

The clerk of the board of registration districts in the coming September. If affected voters may have registration restored in these districts by appearing personally at their local election districts Saturday (Oct. 9) or may have the election inspectors in their districts add their names on request.
