HICKSVILLE—Disaster, including possible injury and death to pedestrians and motorists, was narrowly averted here Saturday morning when a construction trailer being towed thru the heart of the business section broke loose and smashed into the entrance of the Susan Joy Shop at Broadway and Marie St. Firemen were called to the scene at 11:33 AM to wash away about 30 gallons of gasoline which spilled around the street and sidewalk. A scoopmobile being towed thru the village on a trailer jumped the curb and smashed into the plate glass. The machine is owned by the Mastro Construction Co. of Jamaica.

Added Fire Safety For Nicholai

HICKSVILLE—The installation of additional fire warning and safety devices in the old Nicholai St. School building, here, were approved by the Board of Education at a special meeting, Thursday night. The board authorized a change in the present construction plans to permit the addition of a sprinkler system in each classroom at a cost of \$880 which will be linked with the elaborate system already arranged for the basements, storerooms and corridors. The system will also be connected to fire headquarters, at a cost of about \$860, to give immediate notice of a temperature rise which will set off the sprinklers. A proposal to install exit doors in the seven first floor classrooms directly to the outside of the building at an estimated cost of \$10,866 was rejected. The state authorities and district architect both found this proposal "unwarranted".

TO MEET MINIMUM NEEDS:

Vote On 2 Schools Looms For December

HICKSVILLE—Tentative arrangements are being made for a possible referendum of voters in the school district early in December upon proposed additional bond issues to cover the cost of constructing two more elementary schools, extensive alterations and additions to the present high school building and possible purchase of property for a third small school.

Following a meeting with Knappa and Johnson, school district architects, who are proceeding with plans for a 12-room school on the so-called Wettersau property off Newbridge Rd. and the plans to enlarge the high school for junior high use doubling its present capacity, the Board of Education at a special meeting, Thursday night, heard a hummery report from Felix McCormack of Columbia Teachers College who has developed continuing studies of district requirements since 1949.

Dr. McCormack told the board that the construction of schools at the Wettersau property, another on the north side near Zeida Park and a possible third small school in the south east corner of the district—together with the junior high project and currently committed projects—should take care of the long range needs of the school district.

He warned that the district is still confronted with a 10 to 15 year period of peak enrollment and double sessions after which there will be a sharp tampering off in student enrollment.

"If you try to build to meet the peak requirements, even with 35 students in a room, you will over-build and waste the taxpayers' money", he warned.

Knappa and Johnson, architects, were authorized to develop preliminary plans for a possible four class-room addition to Lee Ave. School which may be utilized instead of locating another school in the south east corner of the district (vicinity of New South Rd. and Field Ave.) if a site cannot be found.

Award of contracts for the Old Country Rd. School, addition as a federal aid project is anticipated shortly. Bids were opened Thursday night and it was disclosed that the Board may hold a special meeting this week to get the architect's recommendations and bid summary.

DISTRICT CLERK POSITION:

Claim Bloc Of Three Trustees 'Controls District' And Board

HICKSVILLE—Charged that "unilateral control" of the School District and School Board by a bloc of three board members has been "further enhanced" thru the election of Richard G. School, member of the board, as District Clerk, were leveled today by the two dissenting members.

Emil Szendy and Arthur L. Eirich in a statement issued last night said that "contrary to published reports" Mr. School did not volunteer for the job. His election was ordained, determined and voted by the bloc and no other member was asked whether he would serve.

"The action was taken", Szendy and Eirich charge, "while six applicants for the job waited outside. Some of these applicants proved more than usually qualified. Nevertheless, the possibility of appointment of one of these was discounted and disregarded and Mr. School's election pursued through." They claim the bloc of three members of the board "with unilateral control" consists of Trustees Richard G. School, Joseph Cawley and Edna Kuhne Sutton.

The statement continues: "No votes were cast by Trustees Eirich and Szendy, with the recorded

lengthy preamble setting forth the problems faced because of the sudden death of Mr. Heberer, previous District Clerk, envisioned as the only solution the appointment of Mr. School. There were other practicable solutions.

"4. When, for lack of other second, the proposed appointee seconds the motion for his own appointment, the unilateral action thus imposed is achieved by means distasteful if not impractical."

Erich further stated that "no recommendations were ever entertained by President Sutton in connection with the clerk's appointment from among board members. Mr. School's name was selected and moved by Mr. Cowley and a vote was immediately called for."

He said his reasons for voting "no" were stated as follows for inclusion in the minutes of the meeting:

"In my opinion, the need for a district clerk is most urgent. I am not, however, in favor of appointing Mr. School as District Clerk unless he consents to resign from the Board of Education to accept such appointment. It is my understanding that the immediate need is for one person to affix his or her signature to

checks in payment for debts that have become due and payable. This person would act as a third signer in the absence of a District clerk are requested to make out that such a person may be selected from among members of the Board.

"In furtherance with the above I am of the opinion that we are in a position to select, from among applications on hand, a person to fill the position of District Clerk."

Last week it was announced that candidates for the position of district clergies are requested to make their application to Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, assistant superintendent of schools, East St. School, on or before Oct. 8, 1954.

CURRENT COMMENT: End In Sight At Long Last

By FRED J. NOETH

DR. FELIX McCORMACK brought to the Hicksville School Board meeting last Thursday night statistics which are of great local significance. Much of what he had to say has been told and re-told in the periodic installments of the so-called "Columbus Report".

The real big news which Dr. McCormack felt he had—based upon study of the enrollment in the school district over succeeding years—was that the peak has apparently been pinpointed, although we will not feel the full force of it for about two or three years. The census of the district shows there are 836 children under one year of age in Hicksville today. There are 1,169 children one year old, 1,336 two years old, 1,337 three years old, 1,328 four years old and 1,350 five years old.

Further, it has been determined that only 626 new dwellings are planned for construction in the entire district next year, which is another decline and indication, according to Dr. McCormack, that there is an "end in sight". By comparison in 1950-51 there were 3,500 homes built in Hicksville.

Today the Hicksville School District land area is 88 percent fully developed. There are 9,441 dwelling units housing 15,026 children under 18. Hicksville has about 33,000 people and according to Dr. McCormack we will reach a peak population of 49,000. There are 1.6 children per house today.

The problem is far from solved. Skillful scheduling and temporary housing will be necessary to carry the community thru the real peak load which will hit with full impact in two or three years, he said. The fact that the picture now has a beginning and end is of great importance to all community planners.

DR. FELIX McCORMACK brought to the Hicksville School Board meeting last Thursday night statistics which are of great local significance. Much of what he had to say has been told and re-told in the periodic installments of the so-called "Columbia Report".

The real big news which Dr. McCormack felt he had—based upon study of the enrollment in the school district over succeeding years—was that the peak has apparently been pinpointed, although we will not feel the full force of it for about two or three years. The census of the district shows there are 836 children under one year of age in Hicksville today. There are 1,169 children one year old, 1,236 two years old, 1,337 three years old, 1,328 four years old and 1,350 five years old.

Further, it has been determined that only 626 new dwellings are planned for construction in the entire district next year, which is another decline and indication, according to Dr. McCormack, that there is an "end in sight". By comparison in 1950-51 there were 3,500 homes built in Hicksville.

Today the Hicksville School District land area is 83 percent fully developed. There are 9,441 dwelling units housing 15,026 children under 18. Hicksville has about 33,000 people and according to Dr. McCormack we will reach a peak population of 40,000. There are 1.6 children per house today."

The problem is far from solved. Skillful scheduling and temporary housing will be necessary to carry the community thru the real peak load which will hit with full impact in two or three years, he said. The fact that the picture now has a beginning and end is of great importance to all community planners.

Saturday Is Last Day To Enroll

ALBANY—(Continued from page 1) In non-personal registration districts, voters will lose their votes in the Nov. 2 election unless they get their names back on the registration rolls under a new law, L. Judson Morhouse, Republican State Chairman, warned today.

Those affected are individuals in the non-personal-registration districts who have not voted in a general election in

the past four years and who failed to reply to a postcard sent to them by their board of electors.

Morhouse said that under a 1953 amendment, effective last Jan. 1, names of those who did not vote in at least one of the past four general elections had to be stricken from registration books in non-personal registration districts (outside cities and villages of

5,000 or more inhabitants).

He said boards of elections in these districts send notices of the removal of these names to affected individuals, together with an attached return postcard application for restoration of the registration.

Those who received this notice and failed to return the attached card will not be eligible to vote in the Nov. 2 election unless they act immediately to restore their names

The law changes the date of registration districts to the coming election, Oct. 10. Affected voters may have registration restored in these districts by appearing personally at their local election districts Saturday (Oct. 9) or may have the election inspector in their districts add their names on request.

Two study groups of the Levittown League of Women Voters will meet next week.


