## Board Approves Salary Increases for Principals

HICKSVILLE—A salary schedule for principals of district schools here has been adopted by the Board of Education, effective Oct. 1. The budget appropriation for the current year covers the amount of money required, according to Edna Kuhn, Sutton, principal.

Elementary principals are now paid \$6,000 to \$8,500, advancing in eight steps. The previous scale was \$5,500 to \$7,900. For Junior high the new scale is \$6,500 to \$9,000, compared with \$6,000 to \$8,400, while the senior high, also on eight steps, is \$7,000 to \$10,000 compared to the previous range of \$6,500 to \$8,900. The new scale had been recommended by the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Education last Spring.

# Change 7 Election District Boundaries, Add 6 More

MINEOLA—Boundary changes in seven Hicksville election districts which are in effect for registration, and the November election have been announced by the Board of Elections, here. Districts where no change has been made are: 3rd, 16th, 44th, 40th, 20th, 42nd, 45th, and 46th.

Generally, the changes in the remaining districts are as follows:

39th Dist.—Sliced in half along Blueberry Lane. Area bounded by Old Country Rd., on north, Newbridge Rd., on east and Blueberry Lane, on south, is now Dist. 78. Area bounded by Blueberry Lane on north, Hempstead Ave., on south and Levittown Parkway, on west is now 39th. Both districts now vote at Old Country School.

57th Dist.—Divided into 57th and 81st Districts along Ketcham Rd. (Woodland Ave.). Both areas now vote at Woodland Ave. School. Area bounded by Woodbury Rd., on south, Ketcham Ave., on east, LIRR and School District line on north is now 57th. Area east of Ketcham Ave., with Woodbury Rd., on south and South Oyster Bay Rd., on east is new 81st.

68th Dist.—Cut into 68th and 80th districts with dividing line along part of Hayford Rd. and Berahine St. through Hillsdale Terrace. Both districts vote at East St. School.

19th Dist.—Has been considerably changed, still votes at the high school. Is now bounded by Old Country Rd., on north, Jerusalem Ave., on east, 10th St. and Glenbrook Rd., on the south and Newbridge Rd., on west. Part of former 19th is now in 48th and 82nd districts.

48th Dist.—Votes at Fork Lane School, area bounded by Glenbrook Rd. and 10th St. on north, Jerusalem Ave., on east, 10th St. and Ellwood Ave., on south and Newbridge Rd., on west. Section (Continued on Page 15)

## Non-Personal System Confuses New Voters

Although this question has been covered yearly, we still meet people who are confused or suspicious by what we call non-personal registration. For the benefit of these people and for the hundreds of new home owners or tenants, who have come to live in Hicksville, during the past year, we would like to explain it again.

Hicksville is an unincorporated village and therefore according to

law, non-personal registration is valid and bona-fide.

The Hicksville Republican Club, as a community service, provides a yearly house to house canvas. This means that an authorized Republican Committeeman and/or his assistant enrolls each and every occupant of your home who is of voting age and eligible.

## Town Gives Approval For Apartment House

OYSTER BAY—Approval has been granted for the construction on garden apartments in the vicinity of Princess Ave. and North Broadway, Hicksville, by the Town Board, it was learned Wednesday morning. Councilman Frank Chlumsky said the approval was granted after long and careful study of the request, coupled with an on the spot visit to the scene by members of the Town Board on Tuesday and receipt of a report from the Township's zoning experts, John A. Muderrman Associates.

The application was opposed by the North West Civic Assoc. of Hicksville, which had retained an attorney to fight the request, and the Jericho Civic Assoc.

It will consist of a 180-unit project on a 10-acre site in the vicinity of Robert Hall. William A. Manilla will be broker and agent for the developer.

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

## Library Offers Film Services

HICKSVILLE — A new service to all community leaders, organizational program planners, and other film users is being offered by the Public Library here beginning Monday, Oct. 11.

This series is being co-sponsored by the library and the Executive Council of the Parent-Teacher Assoc. Arrangements have been made with the Film Council of America, a non-profit organization, to establish a free monthly film preview program to be shown the second Monday of each month at the High School auditorium.

"These films, which are documentary and educational, generally run for 15-20 minutes each and four or five will be shown at each preview so the program will be about 1½ hours long," according to Librarian Kenneth Barnes.

The library will have the information available at the time of the showing concerning the source of rental. The films will not be for rental at the time of showing, the purpose being to let the interested teachers, clergymen, or program chairmen see the films and perhaps use them later for their own programs if they so desire. Catalogues in which films will be scheduled throughout the year include political education, international relations, economic education, health and safety, child development, history and many others.

The first topic to be featured is international relations and the films are scheduled at 8 o'clock, Monday, Oct. 11. The titles are: "Progress Report on Pakistan", "Turkey: Key to the Middle East", "Two Worlds of France", "Waters of Life."


of Process Detection." He presented a method for determining the number of experimental trials required for this comparison.

# Join Your Civic Assoc

**THIS SEEMS like an appropriate time to say a word about our fine local civic associations and their membership. This is the time of year when civic groups resume their activities for the fall and winter after periods of general inactivity due to vacation time.**

It probably will never happen, but an adult in every household should belong to a good, active civic association and as far as we are concerned every civic group accomplishes good for the area it serves.

Politicians don't like civic associations, although they treat them with politeness and respect. The reason for dislike quite naturally stems from the fact that such associations are formed for mutual benefit and all of them, sooner or later, make demands of one kind or another upon the authorities.

In civic associations, as in many clubs and societies, we frequently find several hardworking individuals who give freely of their evenings and days off to labor for the benefit of their neighborhood.

For example, last Saturday morning the leaders of six Hicksville civic groups had a meeting with Supervisor Lewis Waters at Oyster Bay Town Hall. The reason for the conference was quickly apparent—letters and telephone calls had not done the job.

We won't go into the details of the subject matter discussed—we'll leave that for the respective organization leaders to report directly to their members. We mention this session, however, to illustrate that being the president or a committee chairman of a civic association takes a lot of time and running around.

Newest residents are among the most likely members for civic associations because they find in such organizations the opportunity to get better acquainted with their neighbors and they are drawn together by common problems—usually a headache involving the builder or the utility companies or the elected officials. Sometimes the problems concern a combination of all three.

New residents also find that thru civic association membership they can more readily learn what makes the local wheels go around, who is in charge of what, who takes care of which.

Our congratulations to all civic association officials who are retiring from office—your neighbors thank you for a job well done although perhaps not fully appreciated.

To all newly installed and elected civic association leaders we extend the facilities of the Herald and its staff to assist in any way possible to make your administration successful.

And may we urge all residents of the communities served by this newspaper to get active in their civic association. Join up, pitch in and you'll be amazed at how much more successful your efforts can be if you work together jointly toward common goals.

## The Question Box

The following are representative of the questions asked at the Public Library. If you need help in obtaining answers to your questions, or desire to do research in certain fields, call Mr. Eisner at the Library, HI 2-1417. However, the privilege of borrowing books is extended only to residents of School District 17; non-residents must pay a \$5 dollar annual fee to borrow books although the library will extend its reference services to non-residents without charge.

Q. When is United Nations Day? Is it a legal holiday?

A. United Nations Day will be observed on October 24, 1954. It is not a legal holiday, although the President of the United States issued a proclamation on June 24, 1954, asking that all citizens and organizations cooperate "in appropriate observance of the day throughout our country."

Q. Does the government issue a catalog of the publications produced by all of its branches?

A. Yes. There are several catalogs available—one, the *Monthly Documents Catalog*, lists all publications and cumulates at the end of the calendar year. Another, *Government Best Sellers*, is a selected list of those publications most frequently purchased by the public, and is issued yearly. A third, *Selected United States Government Publications*, is issued biweekly and lists 10 to 20 publications of the hundreds issued during that two week period that the government thinks will be of most interest to purchasers. The three catalogs are available at the library for consultation.

(Continued from Page 1) time—one year in N.Y. State, four months in the County and 30 days in the election district. You are not enrolled under the Republican emblem. You, yourself, do that on Election Day at the polling place.

When you are registered at your home, you do not therefore, have to go in person to the polls. Your name and address is recorded and this is transferred to the enrollment book. You do not need to be re-enrolled in subsequent years. Your enrollment carries on, unless of course you do not VOTE during a four year period. (This law was enacted last year).

However, we continue to come back year after year, to remind you to vote, to inform you if your polling place has been changed.

to see if you desire any absentee ballots for any member of your household and to answer any question you may have.

Sometimes during the next three weeks, you will find cards in your mail box, containing the number of the line, you are on, in the voting book. This will expedite matters on Election Day. ### The New Tax Law-Installment 1

This is the first time in our nation's history that its tax laws have been completely overhauled. On July 29 the bill was passed by both houses of Congress and on August 16, 1954 President Eisenhower affixed his signature to it. Thus the 1954 Internal Revenue Code became part of the law.

A great deal of credit for the clarity of the new code must go to the American Institute of Accountants, a national society of Certified Public Accountants. Countless hours of oral and written testimony were presented to the House, Senate, and final Conference meeting. The Treasury Department has complimented the Institute and the Accounting Profession for its objective assistance.

**QUALIFYING AS HEAD OF A HOUSEHOLD:** Under the new law a widow or widower who maintains a home for a dependent child receives the full benefits of income splitting for the first two years after the spouse's death. To qualify as head of a household the taxpayer must be single and maintain a household for one who may be claimed as a dependent. In addition this status may be claimed if the taxpayer provides more than half the maintenance for his mother or father.

**CLAIMING DEPENDENTS:** Under the new law if your child is under 19, or a full time student you may claim the \$600 dependency deduction as long as you provide more than half his support. This is true no matter what the dependent child earns, if he earns more than \$600 he must file his own tax return.

Added to the list of dependents are those who live with the taxpayer as members of his household irrespective of relationship. A dependent undergoing institutional care may also qualify for the exemption provided he was a member of the taxpayer's household prior to being placed in the institution.

A new concept of group contributors to a dependent has been added to the law. Where more than one-half the support of a dependent is contributed by several taxpayers they may annually designate one of their members to claim the dependency exemption provided:

1. Each would have been entitled to the exemption except for the support test.
2. The person selected contributed more than 10%.
3. All others who contributed more than 10% agree in a written statement not to claim the exemption that year.

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


