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OFFICIAL IN 30 TO 60 DAYS:

Bank of Hicksville, Meadow Brook, Join

HICKSVILLE—Merger of the 51-year-old Bank of Hicksville into the Meadow Brook National Bank organization is expected to become official in 30 to 60 days. Following tentative approval by the Comptroller of the Currency, the merger agreement will be presented to the Board's of Directors of the two banking institutions. Announcement of the proposal was made late Tuesday morning.

The announcement was made jointly, Tuesday, by Henry G. Eisenmann, president of the Bank of Hicksville which was established in April 1903, and Augustus B. Weller, president of Meadow Brook. The merger will give Meadow Brook its 13th office.

The 35 officers and employees of the Bank of Hicksville will continue in their present positions as "members of the Meadow Brook family", the announcement stated. The Bank of Hicksville had assets of approximately 17 million dollars to contribute to the expanded organization. The merger will bring the total assets of Meadow Brook to over 150 million dollars.

The Meadow Brook National Bank is currently issuing additional stock as a result of its growth to date. This increase in capital stock outstanding and the completion of a merger with the Bank of Hicksville would bring Meadow Brook's capital position to approximately nine million dollars.

In a statement issued jointly, Eisenmann and Weller said, "The residential and business growth of Long Island continues in an easterly direction. We are confident that through the merger of our two institutions, we will be able to offer 'big bank' facilities with 'small bank' friendliness. We are sure that this merger will be in the best interests of the community as well as the stockholders and staffs of both institutions."

L I National Increases Interest Rate On Jan 1

HICKSVILLE—Interest on savings accounts at the Long Island National Bank will be increased to 2½ per cent, effective Jan. 1, it was announced Wednesday by William E. Koutensky, president of the bank. He said the announcement conforms with a resolution passed by the Board of Directors at their regular weekly meeting, Oct. 20.

The Long Island National Bank hopes to have its new Plainview branch office open for business on or about Dec. 1, it was learned this week.

The new bank quarters in the Great Midway Shopping Centre at

South Oyster Bay and Woodbury Roads will include a drive-in tellers' window, 10 teller stations, night depository. The second floor of the structure will be occupied by the bookkeeping department.

President Koutensky joined the bank in 1920 as Assistant Cashier and recently celebrated his 34th anniversary with the bank. His resources in 1920 were \$37,253. Today they are \$24,089,664.70, according to report as of the close of business on Oct. 7.

It was pointed out today that the growth has been carried out in the single premises on Broadway at Herzog Pl., without merger or consolidation with other banks.

Early Morning Fire Destroys Old Barn

HICKSVILLE—Fifty volunteer firemen responded at 3 o'clock this morning (Thursday) when flames gutted two frame barns on the Philip Barberie property on Cantiague Road at the State Parkway bridge, here. The ramps were on the scene until after four o'clock and saved adjacent buildings and a house from destruction. Jericho firemen also answered the call, approaching the blaze from the State Parkway.

The volunteers, also under Chief Arnold Jeanson, went to the home of Tom Mix at 184 6th St., at 5:10 Wednesday evening for an oil burner and chimney fire. Damage was listed as slight.

Two more false alarm for the community firemen were sounded one on Oct. 13 at 2:40 P.M. from the alarm box at Hemp and Straw Lanes and another on Tuesday, Oct. 19, afternoon at Arrow and Arcadia Lanes.

Other calls during the week include an oil burner which caused concern at the Clifford Bruce home, 67 Tip Top Lane, Sunday evening at 7:25; silent call for a grass fire on Kramer St. on Monday afternoon, and fire in a new Jonathan Home at St. John's Place at 8:59, also on Monday afternoon.

Fegelman, candidate for State Senator; William H. McCaffrey, Jr., candidate for Assembly; Larry McKeown, county chairman, and William Ciesler, leader of the 4th Assembly District.

BUDGET HEARING TUESDAY:

Special District Tax Rates Due To Rise

OYSTER BAY—Every special district tax rate for Hicksville will increase in 1955, except for garbage collection in the original district, according to the proposed Township Budget which will be the subject of a public hearing at the Town Hall, here, next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.

Among the increases is a boost in the cost for residents of Hicksville in the Joint Pool-Hall District where the new rate will be \$1.73 per \$1000 of assessed valuation compared with \$1.69 for the current year.

In Bethpage, the overall cost will be about the same. The water tax will be down 50 cents per \$1,000 and the fire rate has dropped from \$2.95 per \$1,000 to \$1.15. The garbage tax is up, together with the park and parking district rate.

New for Plainview is the \$1.55 per \$1,000 rate for street lighting. The new town budget also pro-

vides for increases in salaries for several township officials.

STATEMENT TO COMMUNITY:

Brengel Says He Bought Old School Bell As Scrap Metal

To the People of Hicksville: Yes, "BRENGEL GOT THE DING DONG", but not "GOT" in the sense as used in the article of the Mid-Island Herald on Friday, Oct. 14.

When the tower of the Nicholas St. School was demolished and the bell and other scrap metal was carted away, I expressed to the contractor the desire to have the bell, for no other reason than the fact that I had attended Nicholas Street School and was summoned by the bell, many years ago.

I had no idea Mr. Eirich or anyone else wanted the bell, or had a desire for it. The matter was discussed at the Board of Education meeting and it was agreed that all scrap metal would be taken away by the contractor, sold as salvage, and an allowance made to the district for the salvage money. Maybe

Mr. Eirich would also like to have the boilers, etc., that were taken from the school—but he will have to look further for them as they were sold to a junkman (the same as the bell) would have been if I had not bought it. If the bell had been sold to the junkman, neither Mr. Eirich nor anyone else would have been able to locate it at this time. I paid the contractor more than the junkman's price.

If the School Board itself is now looking for the bell, would it not have been better to look into the matter before the demolisher carted it away? However, if it is the School Board that wants the bell, I shall be glad to donate it to them and they may have it by sending someone to cart it away from my property.

 suits of last Saturday's speaking tour here was encouraging because of the large crowds that listened attentively to the candidates. He said he was "very optimistic" about prospects of a large plurality for himself and other Democratic candidates on Election Day. McCaf-

frey paid tribute to the outstanding efforts of campaign manager Thomas Evans in arranging for the many details necessary for a successful campaign.

SWING TO DEMOCRATS
 McKeown reported that "there is a very definite and strong swing to the Democrats all through the county." He said "people are sick of raceway scandals, Long Island Railroad deals, and do-nothing-ism about unemployment and other serious economic problems." McKeown was accompanied by his attractive daughter, Nancy. Although she is not yet eligible to vote, she is an active Democratic worker.

At the request of Thomas Evans, campaign manager, committee chairmen reported on their activities. Thomas Powell said the Democrats traditionally experienced more difficulty raising campaign funds than the Republicans, but that they had the same expen-

ses. He made an impassioned plea for those present to tell their friends and neighbors of the urgent need for funds, and also asked for their contributions at an early date.

Arthur Isaaksen told of the speaking tour last week and said it would be repeated on the two Saturdays remaining before Election Day. He described how the sound truck arrived in a neighborhood and workers were sent to each house nearby to explain that the Democratic candidates were on hand to talk about the campaign issues and invited the residents to come out and listen. He said that 2,000 lolly pops were distributed to small children, and some not so small, at the various speaking locations.

Isaaksen also told the group that plans are complete for Hicksville's First Annual Home Town Night to be held this Saturday in the VFW Hall at 3:30 P.M. He said he was grateful to the merchants and other business men who contributed generously to make it possible for the committee to live up to its promise of a "prize a minute." He said there are almost 200 prizes to be awarded in addition to the grand prize of a 7-day all-expenses-paid trip to Bermuda via PAA.

Evans revealed that the impressive signs inside and outside the headquarters were largely the handiwork of William Oltzky. Mrs. Rigdon explained the office procedures for the duration of the campaign and called for volunteers for headquarters duty. It is planned to have someone in charge from early morning until late at night until Election Day. Evans closed the meeting by saying that the enthusiasm and interest he has seen to date shows "the very strong probability that the Democrats will have an even larger plurality in Hicksville than last year."

MISSED NOTICE ON POLES:

Protest Another Gas Station

HICKSVILLE—Homeowners' along Levittown Parkway and Old Country Road have been aroused by another attempt to locate a gasoline station in that vicinity. This time the selected site is the north side of Old Country Road where it meets Levittown Parkway.

A chance observation by residents uncovered the fact that the Town Board of Oyster Bay had posted notices of a public hearing on the poles adjoining the property. At this point there are no sidewalks, and few persons, if any, would have the opportunity to see or read posted notices.

A local newspaper, (not the Herald, of course-Ed.) also carried the legal notice but it was confusing in the way that it had been written. The only known reference point included was Old Country Road,

and the remainder of the 'check points were surveyor's measurements and vague property lines described by the names of former owners. "Many of the residents living near the property in question are of the opinion that efforts by the Town to publicize the public hearing were not genuine or in conformity with the spirit of the law," a NLHOA spokesman said. Earlier this week, representatives of the North Levitt Home Owners Association met with individual families that live in the immediate vicinity of the proposed gas station. Opposition to the construction of the station was almost unanimous. The NLHOA will therefore, assist the people in that neighborhood in making their objections known before the Town Board.

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Bus Operator Asks Cooperation On Street Use And Patronage

PLAINVIEW—Frank Parsley, president of the Star Bus Co., operator of the new Plainview-Hicksville bus route, was the guest speaker at the Thursday meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, here.

At this time, Parsley outlined plans for the new inter-village bus service and stressed the importance of having the cooperation of the residents.

Parsley stated that many have requested this service and after making arrangements with the Public Service Commission for a temporary franchise, found that some residents of certain streets are opposed to having the bus use

these streets. "The great question is, 'how can we satisfy Plainview residents if we can't run the busses on the streets?'"

He also stated that there have been a number of incidents amounting to vandalism with rocks being thrown at the bus in question.

A spokesman for the Chamber which has been instrumental in arranging for the new bus route in order to better the transportation facilities here said that the Star line has placed a brand new bus in operation and will make seven trips daily until a permanent schedule and route can be maintained and approved by the Public Service Commission.

PSC HEARING

Michael M. D'Auria, Chamber's chief legal counsel and chairman of the Transportation committee, will attend a meeting of the Public Service Commission this week, in

order to help gain approval for the new route. He asks that all residents cooperate by using the new service as often as possible.

At present, under the temporary set-up, the bus will leave Manetto Hill Road and Old Country Road, (Yerk's Corner) at 6:52, 7:52, 9:57 and 11:57 A.M. and at 1:57, 5:30 and 6:35 P.M. daily for the Hicksville Railroad station, making all stops where necessary along Old Country Road.

It will also travel the same route on the return trip from Hicksville.

WHAT OTHER EDITORS SAY:

Beware Of Exact Labels

During these days of heated arguments over politics and community questions, the disinterested citizen is flooded with appeals and statements which ignore the possibility of a middle ground. Every word is aimed at establishing a narrow concept of each of the points at issue.

This practice of creating exact labels for every person, party or community group makes it difficult to get at the whole truth. In spite of the misleading character of his approach, it is widely used and applied by individuals and groups alike. It is one of the primary tools of the demagogue and rabble-rouser.

To judge people and organizations by such statements is akin to discarding all the colors of the spectrum. This would leave only black and white and would ignore the many shades and hues ranging from the combination of all colors (white) to the absence of all colors (black). In the case of the human being, this approach fails to recognize the fact that every person's thinking is the composite of many things which have influenced him over a period of years.

The record of legislation on a state and national level proves that a mere party label will not always indicate how individual legislators will vote on certain questions. There are many instances of differing opinions within political parties. To pin an exact label on every member of a political party is not fair to the members of that party.

The same is true of the members of organizations or of local units in national organizations. Generalized exact labels can work a great injustice on many people merely through the association of names with certain ideas. The use of this approach may ignore all the constructive actions of a group or individual.

The independent citizen has an obligation to himself and to his community to penetrate the many exact labels and get the complete picture. Whether this approach is used on radio, over television or by way of the printed word, the propagandist is trying to suppress some of the facts in order to strengthen his own case. The sincere citizen will evaluate every statement and thus will be able to act intelligently on every question.

If we all insist on all the facts, weighing the pros and cons of each issue, we will be able to act intelligently and vote intelligently. East Meadow needs this type of discernment if the rabble-rousers are to be discredited and the careful and considered judgment of an enlightened citizenry is to shape our future.—The Meadowbrook (East Meadow) Sun.

And THIS will become the Miracle of Hicksville: that the people of our Hamlet, knowing that a Community Center for their children was urgent and necessary arose as one, so that it could be so; and that People of Hicksville answered the voices of their children, who wanted so much to utilize this building—in their time.

Citizens of Hicksville, are we to sit idly by and watch ourselves callously destroy something in our very midst, when that something can be utilized so very aptly for the building of our future? Shall we deafen our ears to the pleas of our children in the ever ignominious pursuit of the almighty dollar? Shall we blind our eyes to the needs of our children and kid ourselves into believing that our children are not old enough, yet?—Or that it can't happen to us? (Though children who fall afoul of the law come from every walk of life.)—Or become mute, knowing that we should speak, but willing,

ANNUITIES: The three per cent rule has been eliminated. The new law determines the annual exclusion by dividing the annuitants cost by his life expectancy when the annuity payments begin. This annual exclusion remains the same even though the annuitant outlives his life expectancy. It is possible therefore to recover more taxfree than the cost of the annuity if the annuitant lives beyond his life expectancy. The life expectancy tables will be furnished by regulations and the insurance companies.

Taxpayers currently receiving annuities compute their life expectancies as at January 1, 1954. For those taxpayers currently receiving annuities the cost basis is reduced by any amount already excluded from income under the old three per cent rule.

Under the new law the proceeds of insurance endowment, or annuities paid by reason other than the death of the insured are accorded special treatment. The tax on such payments may not be in excess of the tax that would have been due had one-third of the proceeds been received in the current year and one-third in each of the two preceding years. A taxpayer may convert the lump-sum proceeds of an endowment policy to an annuity within sixty days of its

maturity and insure himself of a given amount of tax-free income. For the rest of his life because the proceeds will be taxed under the new annuity rule.

Generally speaking the proceeds of life insurance policies paid upon the death of the insured are tax-exempt. However, on contracts transferred for a valuable consideration the proceeds are taxable to the extent that the proceeds exceed the consideration and premiums paid by the transferee. The foregoing does not apply under the new law to contracts transferred to the insured, a partner of the insured, or a partnership or corporation in which the insured was a partner, shareholder, or officer.

\$5,000 DEATH BENEFIT: The exclusion is now limited to \$5,000 for each employee. The old law was much broader in limiting the \$5,000 to each employer. Thus the employee's beneficiaries could receive much more than \$5,000 tax free.

INSTALLMENT PAYMENT OF LIFE INSURANCE PROCEEDS: Interest on life insurance proceeds held by an insurer is includable in gross income. If an election is made 60 days after death to receive the proceeds as an annuity the annuity rule will be used. In the case of a widow such interest is exempt up to \$1,000 a year.

One Lone Democrat On Bench

GARDEN CITY—Voters have a "fine opportunity" Nov. 2, regardless of party affiliation, to remove the judiciary in Nassau County from partisan politics, it was asserted by James D. C. Murray, nationally known attorney who is general chairman of the Citizens' Committee for the election of Wil-

liam J. Sullivan as Justice of Supreme Court. Speaking at a meeting of the Women's Committee for Sullivan which held a reception at the Garden City Hotel, here, Sunday, Murray pointed out that "in Nassau County there are 18 sitting judges in all of its courts, and 17 of them are Republicans, and but one Democrat—a ratio of 17 to 1."

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"The one Democrat is Supreme Court Justice Percy Stoddard who has served a 14 year term on the Supreme Court Bench, and the Republicans followed the custom of endorsing a Judge who has served a full term. "The Democrats", Murray continued, "when they had an overwhelming plurality in the former second Judicial District, saw fit to nominate a Republican, Cortland Johnson, on the Democratic ticket, when otherwise he could not have

been elected. This gesture on the part of the Democrats provided Nassau County with one of its finest Supreme Court Justices.

"William J. Sullivan of Rockville Centre is regarded by both bench and bar and citizens whom he has represented as a lawyer—as a learned lawyer and fine citizen. He has been nominated for Justice of the Supreme Court for Queens, Nassau and Suffolk.

"When he ran for County Judge last election many Republicans obviously recognized the fact that there should be at least one Democrat judge in Nassau County. This is evidenced by the large vote he received in rock-ribbed Republican Rockville Centre where the vote is normally three or four to one Republican, and in which election Mr. Sullivan, as the Democratic judicial candidate, lost by only about 200 votes. This undoubtedly was because Republicans in Rockville Centre who knew him best regarded him highly, both as a lawyer and citizen.

"This election" Murray concluded, "gives the voters the opportunity to diminish that 17 to 1 ratio of GOP in the courts, by electing a Democrat to the Supreme Court—and there could be no finer choice than William J. Sullivan." Eighty ladies from the three counties were present for the reception. Mrs. Richard J. Cullen is chairman of the women's committee.

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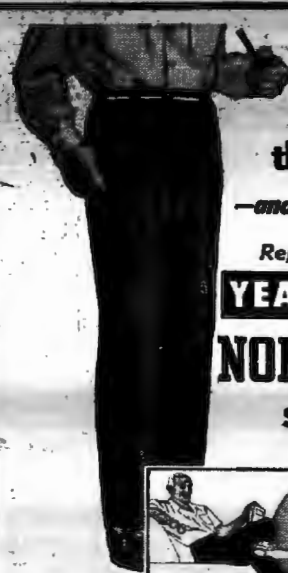

McCaffrey Takes Gas Waste, PSC Ruling Before Court

ALBANY—William McCaffrey, Democratic candidate for State Assembly in Oyster Bay Township and leader of a six-month long civic assoc. "petition parade" against "high gas and electric" rates will present his case before the Supreme Court of the State, here, this Friday, Oct. 22.

McCaffrey, resident of Plainview, will ask the court to order the Public Service Commission of New York State to hold "open, impartial hearings" on the "exorbitant gas rates charged by LI Lighting Co. in Oyster Bay Township—rates that run 40 per cent higher than those of neighboring utility firms." McCaffrey will also point out that because of LILCO'S "monstrous waste and inefficiency", their gas "lost or unaccounted for" now reaches 12.9 per cent. This waste, McCaffrey will charge, comes out of the consumer's pocketbook.

McCaffrey is charging the PSC with "capricious, unreasonable action in violation of the law of New York State."

Specifically the charge against PSC, which McCaffrey terms "five political hacks hand-picked by Gov. Dewey for services rendered to the Republican Party," is violation of Sec. 71 of the Public Service Law.

"The Law" McCaffrey told the Herald, "says that if a petition contains 25 names or more the PSC must consider a hearing. We had 1,000 names and got nowhere."
