

LeBARRON ON WAY OUT?

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School Superintendent Due to Change in June

HICKSVILLE—The impending retirement of Dr. E. H. LeBarron as superintendent of schools next June under alleged "pressure" and his replacement by Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, present assistant superintendent, together with a rehash of internal differences on the Board of Education came in for prolonged discussion at a special meeting of the Board, Friday night, at East St. School. For more than three hours, Board members and spectators participated in an exchange of questions and statements. The overflow audience moved the meeting from the Board meeting room into the school cafeteria.

The Board of Education will meet again tonight (Tuesday) at East St. School at 8:15 and hold its "regular" monthly meeting on Friday night. Gerard F. DeLorme, former president of the Hillside Terrace Civic Assoc., held the floor for most of the evening reading a prepared statement of questions and comments. Briefly summarized, his questions included:

1. Why did the Board elect a "neophyte member", Joseph A. Casley, as its vice president?
2. Has the Board entered into a contract effective, June of next year, to hire Dr. Lamb as superintendent in place of Dr. Le Barron, apparently in "violation" of Sect. 1711 of the Education Law which requires that a superintendent serve the district at least three years before he can receive a contract?
3. What is the big dispute over the district clerk, etc. among Board members which is attracting newspaper headlines?
4. What about the charge of \$3 to 2 "unilateral control of the board", with private meetings among the majority members?
5. And what gives with the transportation policy?

DeLorme told the Herald he expects individual answers from the members of the Board. Regarding the district superintendent, he said Friday night: "I have heard that the Board of Education has entered into a contract of hire with an individual to serve in the capacity of Superintendent of Schools for one year, effective June 1955. According to the Education Law (Sect. 1711) 'the board may enter into a contract with such superintendent after he has served (Continued on Page 6)

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ANOTHER STRAW IN WIND: Bethpage and Plainview Swing Towards McCaffrey

Election Day victory for Democratic candidates in the Plainview and Bethpage sections by slight margins was forecast today as the results of a partisan straw poll were disclosed. The poll in Plainview, it was claimed showed local resident William McCaffrey, Democratic candidate for Assemblyman, getting 65.5 per cent of the vote of persons polled against 26.6 per cent for incumbent John Burns, Republican, with 7.3 per cent undecided. In Bethpage the straws showed McCaffrey 52.7 per cent, Burns 41.3 per cent and 6 per cent undecided. In the gubernatorial race, Plainview indicates Harriman 51.6 per cent, Ives 45.3 per cent and 3.1 undecided. Bethpage favors Ives 53.5 per cent, gives Harriman 44.7 per cent with 1.8 undecided.

Mrs. Dandero, Reading Counselant for Hicksville School District, was the principal speaker at an Old Country Road Parent-Teacher Assoc. meeting held on Wednesday Oct. 20 at 8:15 p.m. Mrs. Dandero spoke on Reading Readiness, and the first grade pupils.

She said to over 200 Parents and Teachers, "Your six year old may seem to act and sound the same as other six year olds, but each is a different person in his own right. He is in a state of perpetual motion. Play to him is a natural and serious method of learning. His attention span is short. He flits from one interest to another. He has no understanding of fatigue. Parents can help by helping him to live a rich full and satisfying life at each stage of his growth and to achieve the best possible all-round development, physically, mentally, emotionally, and socially during the preschool years.

"Parents can help later by listening to him tell of his experiences

in school by reading to him from books suitable for his age level. By not comparing him with others. Leave reading instruction to the trained teacher. If he is not ready to read, it would be unfortunate to force him to do so."

Mrs. Mertoy Wilbur, representative of the Hicksville Girl Scouts, member of The Mid-Island Council, said in a short talk explaining about the organization, "Hicksville was one of the first towns to start Girl Scouting, having begun their organization in 1917. It has grown from 20 members then to 700 active Girl Scouts."

Mrs. Martin Polsenski, President of Old Country Road P.T.A. commended Mrs. Charles Frost, membership chairman for the outstanding work she and her diligent committee have done for the P.T.A. membership drive. Mrs. Frost reported the membership now stands at 452 members. She thanked Mr. Duncan and all the teachers and

the parents for their wonderful cooperation.

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



Bow to Demands To Cover Drain

MINEOLA—Installation of 1-140 linear feet of 54 inch drain pipe underground in Gerhard Road, Morton Village, Plainview, to eliminate the open drainage ditch previously planned in the area, was announced this week by Nassau County Executive A. Holly Patterson at a conference in his office.

"The change, recommended after our engineers have made another study on the insistent urging of Assemblyman John J. Burns, Oyster Bay Supervisor Lewis N. Walters and Howard T. Hogan," said County Executive Patterson, "will cost about \$70,000 more, but will give the street a center mall of grass with a concrete crossover or apron 100 feet in length opposite the entrance to the school located on the west side of Gerhard road."

To John Dowling, president of the Plainview Board of Education, and Peter McIntosh, president of the Civic Association, Patterson explained that the mall would have to be slightly concaved should there be a heavy runoff.

"We have tried in every way possible to meet the drainage problem of Gerhard Road in line with good engineering and the wishes of the people of the neighborhood. The remaining drainage problem will be approached in an equally desirable manner."

New Tax Law—Installment 4:
EXPENSES OF OUTSIDE SALESMEN: Outside salesmen may deduct all transportation expenses in arriving at adjusted gross income and still use the standard deduction. Such employees who solicit business full time away from the employers place of business may deduct business expenses, including split commissions and similar items, in arriving at adjusted gross income.

ALIMONY AND SEPARATE MAINTENANCE PAYMENTS: Alimony and separate maintenance payments are deductible under the new law if made under a written separation agreement executed after enactment of the new law if the husband and wife are living apart and have not filed a joint return. For tax purposes it is no longer necessary that the payments be made pursuant to court decree. Receipt of such payments are includable in gross income of the wife.

THEFT AND EMBEZZLEMENT LOSSES: Under the new code theft and embezzlement losses are deductible only in the year of discovery.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS AND GIFTS: The maximum of charitable contributions al-

lowable for tax purposes is raised to 30 per cent of adjusted gross income provided that at least 10 per cent are made to churches, conventions of churches, educational institutions, or hospitals. Nonprofit cemetery or burial companies are permitted as charitable contributions. There is no limit on charitable contributions where when combined with income taxes in the current year and eight of the preceding ten years they exceed 90 come. In addition, for the purpose of determining the 20 per cent or 30 per cent limitation the carry-back of a net operating loss is no longer taken into consideration. Corporations are permitted a two-year carry-over for excess contributions. This provision does not apply to individual taxpayers.

AMORTIZATION OF BOND PREMIUMS: Premiums may be amortized to the nearest call date only if more than three years from original issue otherwise date of maturity must be used. If the bonds are called prior to maturity the deduction for the unamortized balance may be taken in that year.

as superintendent is the school district for at least three years. I am further informed that the individual in question had not served as superintendent at any time and has only been connected with this school district since July 1, 1954. If this be true, since the President is presumed to be familiar with the State Education Laws, why, after she took office as President did she permit this situation to prevail?"

CHARGES PRESSURE
Dr. LeBarron commented that he had "reason to believe pressure was being brought to bear to hasten my retirement" and "if the board desires my services for a longer time", he would be available.

Edna Kuhne Sutton, president, said Dr. LeBarron had indicated to the former board president (Henry C. Brengel) that he wanted to retire next June and that "it was not a case of pressure at all." She added "I am surprised at the present superintendent and will have to embarrass him now. He never indicated anything except that he is leaving June 30."

Emil Scaudy said he "opposed some pressure being brought to bear." He added that he was on record opposed to a contract being given to Dr. Lamb. Later in the evening the subject of the Dr. Lamb "contract" was revived. It then developed that no copy of the contract was readily available, although it was presumed to be in the District Clerk's records.

Dr. Lamb was not present at the meeting. Dr. LeBarron told the Board shortly before adjournment that Dr. Lamb had moved his place of residence that day and that Dr. Lamb and Mrs. Lamb were the dinner guests of the LeBarrons that evening.

At another point, the subject of LeBarron's future connection with the system came up again. Mrs. Sutton pointed out that he had made it clear that "as of June 30, 1955, he was thru." LeBarron commented that there was "nothing in the minutes about me except to serve as superintendent this year. I have no contract, just a verbal agreement with the Board."

ADVISORY COMMITTEE
It was established at the meeting that the Citizens Advisory Committee exists in "name only" since the end of June and that no

persons have been appointed to it "for this school year."

DeLoraine wanted to know if the P-T-A's could not do the same job as the Advisory Committee and Board member Arthur Ehrlich asked "do we or do we not have an advisory committee?"

Richard School, liaison member of the Board to the Advisory Committee this year, responded: "Of

course we have a committee—we just haven't appointed anyone to it." Casway added, that it was his concept "we have a paper committee."

Scaudy quipped "the committee appears and reappears depending on the desires of the people involved. Apparently the matter is now laid to rest. There is no advisory committee."

A. According to Cornell Extension Bulletin 441, Plants Poisonous to the Touch, a total of 15 species of plants will cause the same symptoms in humans as poison ivy and sumac. Among these are the wild parsnip, some types of lady slippers, spurge, certain buttercups, wild iris and nettles.
