The letters were branded as "pre-election fraud and deceit" by Democratic workers who predicted "this thing is going to boomerang in their faces".

You Can Still Vote Until Seven Tonight

A PLAINVIEW RESIDENT by the name of Bernard F. Mc-Caffrey wrote a letter to J. Russel Sprague, the supreme boss of the Republican machine in Nassau County. Somebody at Republican headquarters decided the letter was so good that they had thousands of copies prepared and these are being distributed by the GOP paid district workers.


