Circulation of multigraphed copies of a letter signed "Bernard F. McCaffrey" pledging loyalty to Republican county boss, J. Russel Sprague, on Sunday and yesterday was denounced by friends of William H. McCaffrey, Jr., Democratic candidate for State Assemblyman from this area, as "a deliberate effort to deceive the voters" at the 11th hour. The letters were branded as "pre-election fraud and deceit" by Democratic workers who predicted "this thing is going to boomerang in their faces".

While the Bernard McCaffrey letter makes no reference to candidacy for office, a spot check by the Herald yesterday morning disclosed that three out of five persons who were shown the letter assumed it was written by the Democratic candidate for Assembly from the Fourth District (Town of Oyster Bay and City of Glen Cove).

The Bill McCaffrey residence at 19 Hope Drive, Plainview, which is his campaign headquarters, was deluged with phone calls starting Sunday afternoon as copies of the letter began to show in Plainview and Hicksville election districts. Many loyal workers for the Bill McCaffrey cause were distressed, believing he had apparently switched to the Republican camp and left the election race.

On the candidate's own street, the Bernard McCaffrey letter was distributed together with literature urging the election of John J. Burns of Sea Cliff, Republican incumbent.

William August of 2 Violet Lane in the Suburban Gardens section of Plainview, signed a sworn statement that "when the Republican representative delivered the letter he said to me 'see what your candidate wrote to Mr. Sprague'. Immediately I thought Mr. McCaffrey had decided to become a Republican and had resigned his candidacy for State Assembly."

Bernard McCaffrey whose home is at 161 Manor St., Plainview, is an attorney. William McCaffrey the Democratic candidate, is also a lawyer. Lawrence McKeown, Democratic leader, said, "The de-

Ask Return Of Old Bell

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education has instructed Attorney Bertram M. Crane to "write graciously" to Henry C. Brengel, former president of the School Board, and request that he return to the district an old bell from the Nicholas St. School. Brengel in an open letter published in the Herald recently admitted he has the old bell.

The Board voted 3 to 2 to act on the now famous "ding-dong" following a detailed report from Crane regarding the disposal of debris and other items in connection with the remodeling of the Nicholas School last July.

Crane presented from the records, copies of bills submitted by Edward R. Schluter Jr., contractor on the job.

Emil J. Szendy made the motion to get the bell back, claiming that it "is school property". The motion was seconded by Arthur L. Elrich, Szendy, Elrich and Joseph Cawley voted in favor of the question and the other two members voted no.

Cawley commented that "the bells in the White House were sold" and thus historic relics are

You Can Still Vote Until Seven Tonight

A PLAINVIEW RESIDENT by the name of Bernard F. McCaffrey wrote a letter to J. Russel Sprague, the supreme boss of the Republican machine in Nassau County. Somebody at Republican headquarters decided the letter was so good that they had thousands of copies prepared and these are being distributed by the GOP paid district workers.

another Plainview resident by the name of McCaffrey who is running for office on the Democratic ticket. He is William H. McCaffrey Jr. who has been working hard to win the right to represent us in the New York State Assembly.

Both men are attorneys; both have the same last name, both live in Plainview.

Of course it is interesting to note that Bernard McCaffrey decided six days before this bitterly contested election to break with a political affiliation which he acquired at birth, to quote his own words. It is also of interest to note that this particular change of heart should come under such coincidental circumstances.

There are easily hundreds if not thousands of people who may today favor the Republican candidates after a lifetime of association with the Democrats, and vice versa. Among these hundreds there are probably many who are much better known and more prominent than "Bernard F. McCaffrey."

But the Republican big brass says it's just "coincidence" that his last name, community of residence and occupation are the same as a candidate who has made definite strides forward in the current campaign which concludes with the balloting today, Tuesday).

The circulation of Bernard McCaffrey's letter within a matter of hours of the election appears to be an out and out deliberate attempt to deceive the voters. It is probably the most shocking and disgusting attempt to gain superiority at the ballot box that we have ever had the misfortune to observe.

HICKSVILLE—This is the Cedar Cliff Civic Assoc.'s Annual report on the fulfillment of the Assoc. purposes, which is the development of the social life and the welfare of the community.

In attaining the social end of the association, we can look back on many successful activities. In the course of the year, we planned and held one profit making and one non-profit dance, both of which we can well be proud. Santa Claus was brought to Cedar-Cliff on Christmas morn with forgotten presents, and was welcomed with cries of joy by the children. Separate soft ball teams were organized for the men and boys to represent the organization in non-league competition.

A dutch treat picnic was held at the Bethpage State Park for the pleasure of the members. As a morale builder for hospitalized members, flowers and cards were sent. Also cards were sent for special occasions when they were reported to the secretary. At the end of the Fiscal Year we had a business and social meeting, at which the new officers were installed and refreshments served.

"It represents a symbol of importance to a great many people. Its return by Mr. Bregel would provide a quick and simple solution to the entire matter." Elrich said there was "misinterpretation to try and give the impression that an effort is being made to embarrass Mr. Bregel. If the taxpayers want an answer, it is up to us to give an answer. The Bell has sentimental and material value."
