LOOKING OVER RETURNS:

GOP Behind Ives Cut Democrats Edge 10%

HICKSVILLE — Progress made by Democrats at the polls here supporting Allen S. Carpenter last year were partially pushed back by the GOP in Tuesday's election. Carpenter, popular local resident, running for township councilman, had carried 11 out of 15 election districts. William H. McCaffrey Jr. of Plainview, this year carried six out of 22 districts and lost by less than 50 votes each in five others to incumbent John J. Burns.

Among the districts captured by McCaffrey on Tuesday were four just created prior to registration day — 80th, 81st, 82nd and 84th. He came within 18 votes of supremacy in the 83rd and missed by 24 votes in the 85th, also new districts.

McCaffrey also got the majority in the 39th, 57th and 68th. He missed by 42 votes in the 79th, 26 in the 46th, and 20 in the 19th.

Ernest Greenwood carried the 84th district and missed by one vote in the 83rd and two votes in the 80th.

Burns got 56.7 per cent of the votes cast here while McCaffrey scored 43.3. Last year Carpenter won 53.0 per cent of local votes. In the last election of an Assemblyman in 1952, Burns received 73.1 of the votes in the Township compared with 26.9 per cent for Thomas Powell of Hicksville. This year Burns collected 61.4 per cent of the Township votes, compared with 37.8 per cent of the votes in the township given to Senator Ives as Republican candidate for Governor.

Thomas E. Dewey in 1950 got 68.5 per cent of the Hicksville ballots while Ives received 58.3 per cent in this election for governor.

This community provided 18.8 per cent of the ballots cast in the entire township four years ago and 15.7 per cent of the total this election day.

Evidence of the drive to get out the vote can be noted in the fact that four years ago when about 10,000 were eligible to vote, a shade less than 50 per cent of that number went to the polls. This year with 21,000 on the enrollment books almost 70 per cent cast their ballots.

The committee has a goal of about \$13,000 to be raised for the ambulance which will be turned over to the fire district.


