## Democrats Delay On Leader

HICKSVILLE—Election of a new chairman of the Township Democratic Committee has been postponed pending the official tabulation of gubernatorial votes to determine the voting weight for each committeeman. Committeemen met at Henning's Restaurant, here, Monday night with strong support evidenced in behalf of Thomas Evans of Bobwhite Lane, here, as a contender to succeed Thomas Abbott who has moved to Florida. Under the by-laws the Democratic organization, a spokesman explained, the votes credited to each committeeman are scaled according to the number of votes recorded in the election of a governor.

## Builders To Tour LILCO Here

HICKSVILLE—The Long Island Home Builders Institute will join officials from the LI Lighting Co. for an inspection tour of the first Central Operating Headquarters of its type in the United States, an installation of the LILCO on Old Country Rd. here. The completely centralized headquarters, including administrative forces, storage facilities, physical forces, laboratories and the many other functions necessary to deliver electricity for homes, civic needs, and industry is housed in six buildings with the most modern equipment.

A seventh building is under construction and scheduled for completion next summer. Built after more than a decade of planning, at a cost of more than \$8,000,000 the facility went into operation in the spring of last year on a 77 acre plot located in the heart of the Company's territory.

# Board To Engage Auditors For Check Of School Bills

HICKSVILLE—"Outside auditors" are being hired by the Board of Education here to make an audit of all bills paid by the school district since June 1952, it was learned at a special meeting of the Board, Monday night. The decision came on the heels of apparent confirmation that three baseball backstops, or levers and paid for by the school district, part of a \$10,000 order for backstops and other sports equipment, apparently cannot be found.

A lengthy report on the three missing backstops was presented to the Board, Monday night, as prepared by Herbert Purick, district auditor, and G. Dean Croucher, present business manager of the district. Board member Emil J. Szendy, who brought up the question of the missing backstops at a Board meeting last Friday night was the third member of the committee named to investigate.

The report disclosed that payment had been made in Nov. 1953 in the sum of \$9,925 on the purchase from Singleton & Yutuler, the firm which had the contract for the equipment, with \$75 allowed for the non-erection of three of eight backstops ordered. E. Parker Yutuler told the committee, the report stated, that two of the non-erected backstops were shipped to Lee Ave. School and the third to Fork Lane School.

Purick and Croucher reported in detail on efforts to locate the missing backstops at these schools without success.

Calling for the audit of back bills by "outside auditors," Szendy repeatedly stressed Monday night he was not making any accusations against anyone.

Board members were in accord that "something should be done." Vice President Joseph Cawley felt that the state education department should be advised at once. The other four members felt that the checkup should be made first to (Continued on Page 2)

# Youth Council Invites Support, Calls Meeting on Monday Night

HICKSVILLE—The Youth Coordinating Council will hold a general meeting next Monday evening, 33 West Marie St., at 8:15 P.M. At the meeting, committee chairmen will report on plans for future activities of the organization. All interested individuals and organizations are invited to attend. Details of negotiations with the Town Board concerning acquisition of a building for a youth centre, as promised by Councilman Frank Chlumsky on the mass meeting on Nov. 16, will also be discussed, according to HYCC President, Joseph Byrne.

At a meeting of the council's executive members and committee chairmen held on Nov. 28, the re-

sults of the community meeting held on Nov. 16 were reviewed. The spectacular resignation of Charles DeShaw as vice president was discussed and all present were in unanimous agreement with the statement released earlier by the HYCC, which read in part: "the Youth Coordinating Council regrets Mr. De Shaw's decision to resign because of 'poor attendance' at our meeting on Monday, Nov. 18."

"However, the quality of attendance as a reflection of Hicksville civic, business, fraternal and religious organizations was excellent." The statement also said that the Council did not believe there was any more apathy in Hicksville than anywhere else in the United States concerning the teen-age problem, and that the meeting had accomplished two main purposes: Councilman Chlumsky speaking officially for the Town Board had publicly stated that an architect and lawyer were investigating the HYCC's request to the Town Board for a youth center building; and that a police official had stated that as a direct result of the Council's activities, the youth problem in Hicksville had improved.

The Council's reply to Mr. DeShaw concluded that his statements are a challenge to every parent in our community. Only the parents can determine who will be correct in the final analysis. We hope that their response will help Mr. De Shaw reconsider his action."

The executive committee decided to ask the New York State Youth Commission to send a representative here to confer with the HYCC.

The HYCC is considering formation of a basketball league for teen-age boys. Interested men are asked to contact Mrs. John Leever at Hicksville 3-4065.

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# Tell PSC If You Want More Bus Service, Chamber Advises Public

**PLAINVIEW**—Following receipt of numerous complaints that the newly established bus route to Hicksville was not adequately serving the entire area, the local Chamber of Commerce authorized its transportation committee chairman, Michael M. D'Auria to investigate the matter and suggest a suitable remedy.

At the last general participation meeting of the local chamber group, D'Auria reported his findings. At this time, he stated that Frank Parashley, president of the Star Bus Co. which operates the new service, would be "only too glad" to extend his route should a franchise be granted.

A meeting was held with Julian Fleisher, Star Bus Co. dispatcher, and a better schedule was placed temporarily in operation.

The Chamber's committee also

contacted Mr. Hatch of the County Franchise Bureau at Mineola, who upon investigation, agreed that residents of the Molton Village section had to walk great distances in order to use the bus. The route was tentatively changed in order to correct this situation with the bus running from York's corner along Old Country Road to Central Park Road; thence to Main Parkway, back to Old Country Road, and on into Hicksville.

The original petition for the service contained 242 names of residents desiring bus service with the Star Co., the only one to offer to accept the franchise.

A survey was subsequently made by a representative of the Public Service Commission to ascertain local objection to the proposed route, if any. Although they had previously unanimously agreed that service was essential, 50 per cent of the residents on Main Parkway and almost 80 per cent of those on Central Park Road objected to a bus running through their areas.

The PSC and Franchise Bureau therefore restricted the route to

the shoulders of those involved.

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
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## CURRENT COMMENT: Our Teenage Ranks Growing

**IF YOU HAVE** been reading the installments of the Columbia Report on Hicksville Schools, currently appearing in Tuesday editions of the Herald, you are aware of the fact that we have a great many children below school age. Almost before we get a chance to take a second glance at the calendar, they will be thru the elementary grades and in high school.

The latest Columbia report states there will be 3,400 boys and girls in our High School by 1967—today there are about 600.

Allowing for boys and girls who may go to private and parochial schools, we can anticipate more than 4,000 teens in our immediate community, a gain of four hundred per cent in the next ten years. And don't forget the number increases EACH YEAR to reach the peak.

Therefore, serious thought and effort devoted to establishment of youth recreation facilities is to be encouraged. We visualize an effective youth program as one encouraging all forms of healthful activity for our teenage boys and girls. It is difficult for the parent of a pre-school child to concentrate upon a proposed youth centre, but sure as you are an inch high interest will develop as the child grows older.

People sometimes have the notion that youth centres and teen programs are for "problem children". Such is definitely not the case. Let's face it, children (and adults too) have more leisure time than was available a decade ago. Adults have demonstrated the need for leisure time activities—and you only have to look at the record-breaking attendance at adult education classes to see what we mean.

Few people would dare regard the teens of Garden City as somehow "underprivileged" or "special problems". And yet Garden City is currently interested in a youth centre.

On the same day as the Hicksville community meeting was held, the Garden City News reported that a survey revealed 1,229 local students feel Youth Centre in their village "is an absolute necessity", and that 1,151 are willing and eager to work on committees to operate facilities at a centre.

Dan Pratt, president of the high school student council, made the report in an appearance before the Garden City Citizens' Recreation Committee. "I think a Youth Center would promote good citizenship among us, and we would learn teamwork and how to get along with each other. It would provide a chance to make new friends and get to know people better", he said.

### The New Tax Law—Installment 7

(This article is based on material supplied by the American Institute of Accountants, national professional society of certified public accountants.)

**2. IMMEDIATE DEDUCTIONS FOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT:** Research and development costs may now be deducted in the years they are incurred. You no longer have to wait to get a patent or give up your experiment as a failure before deducting your costs.

**3. MORE REALISTIC TAX ACCOUNTING:** Tax accounting under the new law has been brought more nearly in line with generally accepted accounting principles. Income reporting can be more realistic. You can deduct from current receipts estimates of such future expenses as refunds and rebates, allowances for discounts, claims for damages, etc. You can report advance rentals in the years in which they will be earned and in which you will have expenses such as maintenance or repairs to deduct.

The estimated expenses can be deducted if you can make a reasonably accurate estimate based on your own experience or that of others in similar circumstances. Of course only those anticipated expenses which apply to the revenue of the current period may be deducted.

Altogether there will be less dif-

ference between taxable income and net income as it is figured by accountants for ordinary business purposes.

**4. YOU MAY ELECT LOWER CORPORATE TAXES:** Partnerships and proprietorships now may, under certain circumstances, elect to report and be taxed as corporations. Some businesses will want to take advantage of the lower corporate rates at certain levels, remembering, however, that once elected the practice must be continued unless there is a 20% or more change in ownership. And re-

membering, too, though owners may escape an immediate high personal tax bracket by electing to report as corporations, assets kept in the business may later be subject to estate or income tax (as dividends or capital gains). Take care to look into all aspects before you change.

# Favors School Recreation Plan

To The Editor:

It is noted that Mr. Charles DeShaw of the Hicksville Coordinating Council resigned this week with a blast at the parents and organizations for their "lack of interest in the children and the future of the community". While Mr. DeShaw is to be commended for his sincerity and the great amount of time and energy he expended in behalf of our youth, he is wrong when he blames public apathy for the failure of the "Youth Center" movement.

The people of Hicksville are good parents, concerned about their children's welfare and proud of their community. We are busy people. In fact we are unique in our civic-consciousness.

The large memberships of our PTAs, church groups, scouting, Little Leagues, Police boys clubs, veterans organizations, and the many civic and fraternal associations are all making their contributions to the future of Hicksville.

Most parents are interested in the recreation of their children but many are reluctant to participate directly for other than the reasons Mr. DeShaw gives. The lack of "know-how" of volunteers in a movement of this kind is always evident; the legal and possible financial liability is frightening; and the burden of the work falling on the few who volunteer increases proportionately as other volunteers fall by the wayside.

There is also a basic difference of opinion on the advisability of erecting one huge center for the community. The financial problem of totally volunteer efforts is usually insurmountable. Just collecting funds to maintain an annual budget becomes a full time job. A paid director, salaried custodians, and maintenance of the building is the first obstacle. The lack of public transportation to and from the proposed teen center could create unforeseeable traffic and parking problems in the heart of the community.

The philosophy of putting thousands of young people in one building without trained personnel and guidance directors is unrealistic. Just having the structure would not guarantee that leisure time would be used in a worthwhile manner.

On the other hand we could initiate the program recommended by Dr. Huntington (of Columbia Institute of Field Studies) of opening the schools evenings under the guidance of a trained recreation director with the help of volunteers as chaperons, expanding the summer recreation program to include evening programs of music, dramatics and the arts, and an acknowledgement of the Board of Education of "acceptance of a moral responsibility to aid in our children's development in every way possible".

## Wants Northside School

To the Editor:

IT SEEMS TO ME, now that members of the School Board are going to Albany with plans for a new school on the Wetterau property (purchased earlier this year), it is necessary to bring to their attention that a new school is needed in the North section of the District.

There are already three schools in the South section, plus the present High School and the new High School (when it is completed). The north section now has only two school buildings, and this section in the area which has grown as fast as the south did in 1950, which makes it imperative that here is where the new school is needed. What makes the south section of our District so special to the detriment of the needy part?

A two story 29 room school should be built in the North section. I understand that there is an area of about five acres in the Northside that the Board will look into when they have let a contract for the Wetterau building. Why wait? It is obvious to a reasonable person that the place to build a school is where there is the greatest need. Secondly, the only type of school to build is a two story of at least 28 rooms. Even Drs. Le Barron, Lamb and Miller agreed on this at the Board Meeting on Nov. 6, when asked this question by a

member of the Board.

The practice of past Boards to build one story schools should not be a prerequisite to continue this type of construction. There are some members of the Board short-sighted enough who favor the ridiculous theory that enough schools must be built to enable the children to walk only two or three blocks to school.

I repeat this is ridiculous! Not only from the standpoint of taxes, but also from the standpoint that when the peak period is past (estimated at 1968 or 1969) more and more classrooms are going to become empty. There is also the possibility that we may have some completely empty school buildings soon.

IT SEEMS TO ME, therefore that our School Board need only to look at the four schools built in 1952, and then at the expansions to these schools being constructed now to realize their mistake in building one-story school buildings; and for once use some common sense.

We, the people should vote down any referendum for the building of a school on the Wetterau property; and for any new school that does not specify that it will be of two story construction.

## The Question Box

The following are representative of the questions asked at the Public Library. If you need help in obtaining answers to your questions, or desire to do research in certain fields, call Mr. Bisner at the Library, 411-3147. However, the privilege of borrowing books is extended only to residents of the School District. On Dec. 17, non-residents pay a \$5 annual fee to borrow books, although the library will extend its reference services to non-residents without charge.

Q. Who had the first telephone in Hicksville?

A. The first telephone installed in Hicksville was a public phone, which was located in Taliaferro's Drug Store. This was in 1895, when only one line connecting Hicksville to Brooklyn. In 1896 a switchboard was also installed at Taliaferro's, which became the "central". There were twenty-five subscribers to the service.

Q. Who had the first electric light in Hicksville?

A. The first electric light was installed in Julius Augustin's general store in 1890. The power plant for this installation was located in Zemmer's blacksmith shop on East Main Street. In 1904 a lighting system was installed which served most of the town.

Q. How long has Hicksville had a post-office?

A. The first postmaster was appointed in 1855 and had his office in the railroad depot. Before that time residents of Hicksville went to Jericho to pick up their mail. It was not until Aug. 1, 1926 that carrier service was inaugurated. Up to that time mail was picked up at the post office.

responsibility for maintaining Board minutes and other Board records. This is one of the most important administrative responsibilities of the Board and therefore, of the new District Clerk.

"He will have charge of Board correspondence and this should enable us to serve the public better by quicker and more direct response to public inquiries.

"The Board carefully considered applications of several local residents for the position. We decided upon Mr. Affrunti because we felt that he had the background and qualifications which seemed most likely to produce the service that we need." Mrs. Sutton stated.

Trustee Emil J. Szendy, who voted with Arthur L. Eirich against the appointment of Affrunti, and has suggested that the appointed decline the position "in

the interest of peace and harmony" because he was chosen by a 3 to 2 vote, today noted that "it was actually argued by Trustees School that superior qualifications were a handicap, not an asset. Possible saving of \$1,000 a year was also disregarded."





**The Musical Arts**

There is no finer tool than dancing to give children poise, grace, beautiful bodies etc. It does marvels for normal children and is an invaluable therapy for the correction of many physical and personality defects, but its value is in direct proportion to the competence of the instructor.

There are many fine teachers but there are also many hacks, who have little concept of what they are doing. Not only don't they do much good but, through incompetence or the desire to please the parent by hastening the child's progress, can cause permanent

physical or personality damage.

Unfortunately in the United States there are no set standards by which to judge a teacher. In England, The Royal Academy of the Dance, creates a yardstick. To be a member of the Royal Academy a teacher must be a high school graduate, study intensively for a minimum of six years, and pass difficult examinations in anatomy, Psychology and handling of children, history of Ballet, Theory of the Dance etc.

Not all the good teachers are members but at least a standard does exist to which all teachers can be compared.

In selecting a teacher for your child use these standards, at least, as a guide. Remember the purpose of dancing for children is not to teach a few steps but to help them develop into better adults. Above all do not ask for quick results. Before a child can dance well it takes years of body conditioning but then body conditioning rather than dancing is what we are really after, isn't it?

**QUESTION:**

What is the correct age for a child to start Music?

**ANSWER:**

Seven is the minimum provided the child is emotionally prepared to grasp musical instruction. Some children show interest a great deal earlier but if it is a true interest it will keep. If started too young a child may find music too difficult and lose interest. Once lost it can seldom be regained since the child is convinced it is too hard for him. As a matter of fact a child started at seven and another of equal ability started at say the age five, will be at the exact same level by the time they are nine. A child absorbs little between the ages of five and seven.


