RR Tracks Going Up Car Parking Below

HICKSVILLE — Aiming for the hearing before the Public Service Commission on Feb. 14, tentative plans are being drawn for the proposed elimination of six and possibly seven Long Island Rail Road grade crossings here. Michael J. Sullivan, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce crossing elimination committee, reported to the directors this week on what he had been advised unofficially by the LIRR engineers regarding the project.

Plans announced earlier for a proposed community meeting to discuss the proposed elimination have been dropped. Convinced that the majority of the community favors some type of elimination which would elevate the tracks and provide parking areas behind the structure, those who have conflicting views are invited to register comments with Sullivan thru the Chamber.

As plans are shaping at present, the station will probably remain in its present location. Railroad sidings into industries will probably stay as they are with a feeder track running at ground level along the elevated structure to service industrial plants.

Sullivan reported there appears to be "every indication" that the tracks will be raised on some type of pillars, similar to the Rockville Centre program, to allow parking under the structure near the station.

Since planning at this stage is very preliminary, no working plans or designs are available at present.

The Chamber directors meeting Friday at Henningsen's for lunch, lauded Patrick J. Buffalino, chairman of the Christmas program, for the "excellent job done" by the retailers and business people to make holiday shopping in Hicksville attractive.

Buffalino displayed a new colorful poster which will be exhibited by stores which are issuing Christmas award tickets with each \$1 purchase. A brand new Pontiac and other awards will be made on Dec. 29.

GARBAGE COLLECTION:

Chlumsky Arranges Emergency Pickup

HICKSVILLE — All rubbish and garbage in the district was collected under emergency arrangements made by Councilman Frank Chlumsky with other collectors last week as "labor trouble" made it impossible for James Allen, the regular contractor, to cover the district. Chlumsky said that emergency pickup would continue until a satisfactory solution to the difficulties can be worked out. He added that he appreciated the understanding and cooperation of residents during this period.

The Oyster Bay Town Board is scheduled to hold a public hearing today (Tuesday) at the Town Hall on the enactment of a new township ordinance which makes it illegal to allow debris to accumulate on streets and property near homes and stores. Tenants and owners are held responsible under the proposed law. Councilman Chlumsky is scheduled to preside in the absence of Supervisor Lewis N. Waters.

Expressways Cut Thru Here

BABYLON — Routes proposed for the new Long Island Expressway from New York City to Lake Ronkonkoma, and a north-south expressway from Wantagh to Oyster Bay were disclosed Saturday. However, maps released by the State Public Works and Long Island State Park Commission are not specific as to local streets and properties and only indicate that both routes pass thru the mid-island section, intersecting in the vicinity of Woodbury Rd. and Northern State Parkway, near the home of Judge Joseph P. Lebkuecher, in Woodbury.

The north-south expressway appears slated to run between Bethpage State Park on the east and the community of Bethpage on the west, going thru Plainview, Locust Grove, Syosset and on up to Oyster Bay. Detailed local maps will be published in the HERALD when released by the authorities.

Continue Hard Look At School Purchases

HICKSVILLE — Further study of obligations contracted for the school district, including extensive ground improvement work, will probably be aired when the Board of Education holds a special meeting tonight (Tuesday) at East St. School. A hint of what is ahead was given at a recent meeting when several bills were extracted from a mountainous monthly stack and payments deferred.

The board is also scheduled to hear a report from School Attorney Bertram Crane on the now famous "Nicholas St. School bell" on which he has been negotiating with former Board President Henry C. Bruegel who now has the "ding dong" in his possession, and other legal questions submitted to Crane recently for decision.

Also anticipated is a move to propose the creation of a recreation program, offering the proposal as a question together with a series of new building propositions at a referendum early next year. The employment of a full time, paid recreation director is expected to be one of the most controversial issues submitted to local voters since the initial school bus proposition was posed several years ago.

Trustees Emil J. Szendy and Arthur L. Eirich, a committee of the Board, may have a report and recommendations regarding the matter of the "three missing baseball backstops" which came in for considerable attention at the Board meeting a week ago.

Politics, Smear, Other Charges Heard In Bethpage Fire Election

Today (Tuesday) is election day in four mid-Island communities with charges and counter charges of "politics" and "area representation" marking the Bethpage Fire District voting for a commissioner and fire district treasurer.

Incumbents Ex-Chief Edmund Thorne, seeking re-election as commissioner, and District Treasurer James Sturtevant have the backing of their fellow members on the Board of Commissioners and the Bethpage Volunteer Fire Department.

An "independent Citizens Committee" has been issuing circulars and bulletins in behalf of James T. Hynes for commissioner and Charles Lang for district treasurer. Joseph Littlerine is president of the Citizens Committee. With Frank Pilgrim, committee treasurer, a joint statement from the leaders of both major political parties in Bethpage was released to the HERALD for publication.

Chief Edward H. Schaaf last week stated the fire department's position, denouncing "the injection of partisan politics into the affairs of the fire district. Since it was organized in 1910, the fire department has been entirely free of political discussion and has never permitted itself to become a pawn in local political issues."

A statement attributed to Peter Carcio, local Democratic zone leader, and James "Tappy" Norman, GOP operative committeeman, both ex-members of the fire dept., and released by the Citizens Committee says:



Name Dimes March Leaders



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SCHOOL NOTES:

Citizens' Role In Local Education

(This column is contributed as a public service by the Plainview Citizens' Committee for Better Schools. Direct your questions to School notes 113 Morton Blvd., Plainview.)

We have written so far of the major groups officially governing our schools; our District Principal, our School Board, our District Superintendent, our State Education Dept. We have shown how all these groups have been set up by law to represent the will of the people. Each of these officials are voted into office by you, or chosen by those voted into office by you. But citizens do not stop there. So today we would like to answer those questions that have come to us concerning the roles citizens play directly in education through their community organizations.

Q. What community organizations for education exist in Plain-

view?
A. We have Citizens Lay Advisory Committees who are appointed by the School Board and are under their sponsorship. We have PTA's in each of our three schools. We have the Plainview Citizens Committee for Better Schools. We have the Civic Assoc. which has a school liaison representative on its executive committee.

Q. Why do we need so many school groups? Specifically, since you were the last group to form, why did you form the Citizens Committee for Better Schools?

A. Surprisingly enough, statistics have shown that communities having several organizations have larger memberships in each of the groups than communities with just one. Besides, each group performs a different function. Let us contrast them.

Q. What is the PTA's unique function?

A. The PTA organization is concerned primarily with conditions and activities in its own school. The Citizens Committee is concerned with and works with ALL the schools. PTA by laws prohibit certain activities that a Citizens Committee can carry out in the campaign to improve schools, since PTA's cannot attempt to modify school administration. The PTA interprets the school system to the community; the Citizens Committee interprets the community to the school system.

Q. What part do the Citizens Lay Advisory Committees play in school matters?

A. The Lay Committees are appointed by the Board of Education to advise the Board in carrying out its functions. Our Lay Committees perform a useful function and we are sure they will continue to do so in the near future. But since Lay Committees are appointed by the Board to study specific questions for a limited period and are then terminated, they are dependent on the Board for their formation and existence. They cannot make an overall, thorough, continuous study of all the schools and their problems.

The Citizens Committee is independent, self-sustaining and continuing. We feel that a group such as ours can provide much help to the Lay Committees and the Board of Education in carrying out our mutual program of IMPROVING OUR SCHOOLS.

Q. What part does the Civic Assoc. play in educational matters?

A. The Assoc. has a school board liaison representative as part of its executive group. However, the Assoc. has many other projects on hand and has been unable to give much time to consideration of school programs.

Q. What can the Citizens Committee for Better Schools do?

A. One of the best tests of the usefulness of a committee are the actual results obtained by such a committee. Since our committee is the only one in a new community, we will have to go to other communities to see what has been done by such committees.

In East Meadow, a driving snowstorm did its best to defeat a bond issue for new schools. But stalwart voters, at the incessant urging of the Citizens Committee turned out in record numbers to vote a thumping 86 per cent approval.

In Buncome County, N. C., urged by an independent Citizens Committee, citizens traveled long distances over mountain roads to say "Yes" to a \$5,500,000.00 building program.

Citizens in Carlehad, N. M., working with the School Board on a recent bond issue campaign, turned out in twice the usual strength to register an 18-1 "Yes" vote.

In Manhattan, Citizens Committees studied municipal problems and came up with satisfactory solutions to community conflict.

In Baldwin, Citizens Committee worked in improving school hours, and a substantially by its study of the school salary schedule.

We could cite countless other examples of school problems being solved in rural, small town and metropolitan areas. Studies by local committees are daily demonstrating that schools are everybody's business. A national organization, which serves as a clearing house for information and resources, has been set up to help Citizens Committees throughout the country.

This organization, the National Citizens Commission for the Public Schools, 2 W. 45 St., New York, N. Y., was founded by Roy Lagen, editor of TIME Magazine. They buy material on file, available to any interested citizen, telling story (Continued on Page 5)

THE SCHOOLS ARE YOURS: Financing School Systems

"How are schools financed?" asked John.

"Essentially in two different ways. One is state aid and the other is by taxes on real estate in the local district."

"How is the state aid a district receives determined?"

"All state aid is based on the average daily attendance of all pupils in the district schools. By state aid we mean money allotted to the district by the State of New York."

"What is meant by average daily attendance?"

"If a pupil is present every day during a school year that attendance would count as one average daily attendance or A.D.A. as it is usually abbreviated. Actually the A.D.A. for any period can be determined by dividing the total days of pupil attendance by the number of days that school was in session."

"From your explanation it seems to me that attendance is highly important."

"Definitely, John. Since nearly all aid from New York State depends on the A.D.A. the greater the total days of attendance per pupil the larger the amount of state aid received by the district."

"Is there anything else I should know about state aid?"

"Yes, it is paid the year following the computation. For example, state aid is based on a three year A.P.A. The average A.D.A. for 1950-1951, 1951-1952, 1952-1953 is used to compute the state aid paid during the year 1953-1954. In general more state aid is paid on the attendance of secondary students (\$274 per student) than for elementary pupils (\$220) per child. Kindergarten through 6th grade, kindergarten pupils on a half day session are allowed 1/2 the amount set for elementary children or \$119 per child."

"What about emergency state aid?"

"For rapidly growing districts in the state, especially in Nassau County, the state does grant emergency aid. This aid is also based on A.D.A. and other factors as rate of growth in school enrollments etc. In such case, the state aid is based upon a one year A.D.A. minus a one mill contribution on the full valuation of the district."

"These local school taxes interest me. What about them?"

"As a home owner, John, you should be interested in local taxes. School as well as other taxes."

"How is the school tax set?"

"The Board of Education prepares a budget listing the anticipated expenditures for the coming year. By law, all public hearings are held on this budget. All expenditures as well as state aid is estimated for the coming year. At the annual school meeting in May, the budget is presented to the Board of Education and it is either adopted as is or with whatever changes the voters decide. The total budget is authorized by the people and also a working balance, less amounts for interest and other receipts, such as tuition for non-resident children, rent for the use of building etc. is used to determine the tax rate."

"But that is early in May and I don't know my tax rate until Aug. just or early in September. Why is that?"

"That is true because, although the school district estimates the amount of the budget in May, the assessments for new building,

building etc. are not completed until July. Once the district assessments on real estate are tabulated the total assessed valuation of the district can be determined. Because it takes time to get information (assessments), from the Board of Education and for the various Boards of Education to meet and certify tax rates, the tax rate does not become official until the County Board of Supervisors issues the tax warrant. This is usually done at the first meeting of the Board of Supervisors in September."

"Then?"

"The amount to be raised by taxes is divided by the assessed valuation of the district to determine the rate. Usually the rate is stated in dollars per hundred dollars of assessed valuation."

"What do you mean by necessary expenditures?"

"Any expenses incurred in the normal operation of the district or connected with the construction of new buildings, transportation etc. Additional monies for salaries of employees, fuel, light and telephone and other general operating expenses may also be required. When a special meeting approves additional expenditures, not covered by the budget, the Board of Education can borrow money on interest bearing notes. These monies must be added to the budget for the following year if not covered by a bond issue, bus bonds or some other form of borrowing as outlined in the laws pertaining to Public Finance."

PLAINVIEW — The Teen-age Community League consisting of five basketball teams started play on Nov. 17. The League was formed as part of a four-day program. There will be two halves to the League play, with the winner of the first half, playing the winner of the second half for the Community Championship. The attendance has been favorable, with 60 or more boys placed on the five teams.

Everyone is welcome to attend the games, and it would be a pleasure to the boys to have as many parents as possible come to cheer their youngster on. The teen-age cheer leaders will add a bit of color to the future games.

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
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Proven Ability and Re-Election

Canarsie means "the fenced place;" Rockaway, "the sandy place;" Merrick, "at the barren land;" Massapequa, "great water land;" Matinecock, "at the hilly land;" Nissequogque, "the clay or mud country;" Setauket, "land at the mouth of the river;" Corchaug, "the greatest place;" Secatogue, "black or dark-colored land;" Unkechague, "land beyond the hill;" Shinnecock, "flat country;" Montauk, "fort country;" Manhasset, "island land;" Amagansett, "at the well;" Commack, "good land;" Copiague, "sheltered place;" Coram, "low country;" Outchogus, "great place;" Mastic, "tidal river;" Mattituck, "great creek;" Patchogue, "where they divide in two;" Peconic, "small plantation;" Seawanhaka, "island of shells;" and Yaphank, "bank of the river."

Q. What caused the Long Island Indians to die out.

A. There are still some descendants of the various tribes on the Island, but most of the tribes died out because they caught smallpox from the white man, and many became weakened by addiction to drink and other bad habits acquired from the whites.

Killing Goose With Golden Eggs

To the Editor:

IT SEEMS TO ME, that our School Board is well on the way to "killing the goose that laid the golden egg". Intentional or not, the fact remains. The only consolation, if it's any help, is that they aren't alone in this, for the newspapers report daily the actions of many other School Boards of like mind.

Many School Boards pressured the State Equalization Board to reevaluate Equalization Rates to enable them to increase their Debt limit. This they felt would enable them to build more schools without first appealing to the State for approval to exceed the limit set by law. Thus when the new Equalization Rates were announced they were hailed with glee by many School Boards. Unfortunately, there is an alarming factor included in the new rate that the Boards haven't considered, and that is the Tax Rate. Since the amount of State Aid will be decreased under this new formula, the Tax Rate will necessarily take a big jump. The prospect of a \$10. Tax Rate seems very

likely within the space of a few short years, unless School Boards begin now to eliminate waste and cut non-essential spending. Many School Boards, our own included have been all too prone to leave the School System run itself; and just concern themselves with the building of new schools; expansions; and alterations.

School Districts are 'Big Business' and in order to survive must be conducted as such. Big Business is constantly on guard to keep expenses down. They know that unless a close watch is kept on overhead expenses, they will eventually snowball into such huge proportions that the Business can no longer survive. Many School Boards will also suddenly find themselves in like predicament when the expense saturation point has been reached in their Districts, and that it is impossible to Tax any further. Then they'll "Run around like chickens with their heads cut off" trying to find ways of cutting expenses, but it will be too late then.

For some unexplained reason, many School Boards want their

new schools to be citadels of beauty, comparable both in and out to the richest universities in this Country. This naturally increases the costs of the buildings. The Boards use the weak excuse that the Plans call for this and that the Architect knows what he is doing. How true this is! The Architect certainly does know what he is doing, and draws the Plans thus because HE RECEIVES 10-20 per cent OF THE CONSTRUCTION COST FOR HIS FEE. It is only natural that the Plans he draws will be for costly construction.

IT SEEMS TO ME, in conclusion, therefore, that our School Board should 'get on the Ball' and not only re-examine Plans submitted by the Architect to cut out fancy dodads, but to stop treating a lot of useless, overlapping jobs. As a matter of fact, they should begin to dispense with some already created; and begin a careful painstaking study to eliminate non-essential spending.

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CEDAR CLIFF

Fund to Help Needy Members

The first bit on the agenda is a report on our Civic Association's meeting on Thursday last at which a hard core quorum dug into some new business after hearing reports from the various committees.

Under new business was the establishment of a special fund for the purpose of helping needy members of the community. In keeping with the purpose of the Cedar Cliff Civic Assoc. the recipients of aid need not be members of the Civic group. The fund, as yet is painfully inadequate but fund raising methods being considered should make it possible to do some good for neighbors who are hit hard by illness, unemployment or both.

Motions were carried to write to the town fathers to bluntly remind said gentlemen that close to 600 voters represented by the Ass'n. are not entirely satisfied with certain conditions existing in the community. Grievances aired were on the subjects of poor road drainage, poorly installed street signs, need for more street signs and more street lights. Intersections of our north and south streets at Plainview and Woodbury Roads respectively were the points criticized for lack of lighting.

There was a call for an Ambulance Committee representative to join the central committee composed of a volunteer from each organization in the Hicksville area. Al ready a very busy man, Johnny Reichel volunteered to temporarily sit in the committee for our Ass'n. Incidentally I was mistaken in writing that the much needed ambulance was a reality. How wrong can I be?

Members were gratified to hear that more mail boxes were recently spotted about the area to satisfy a long need.

Something is wrong with the ruling that bars children from school because they are not five by December 1st. I know that, due to crowded conditions, a line has to be drawn somewhere but I feel strongly that the ruling should be more flexible. Some five year olds have no desire to start school while others cannot wait to start and should be admitted before the desire is gone even though not quite five by December 1st.

Here is another angle, some children at four and one-half are more advanced than others of five and one-half in vocabulary, enunciation, creativeness and crafts of Kindergarten level. Why must these particularly bright four and one-half year olds have to wait an-

other school year and then be forced to attend a full year of short session Kindergarten classes? The answer is a special group of tests to be given children who are to be five before the second semester starts and if the child passes these tests be admitted for the second semester of Kindergarten to start first grade studies in September of the following year. What is so vital about Kindergarten that makes a full year's attendance necessary? If there is a certain number of Kindergarten hours required by State Law for children starting school at any age up to seven, why, cannot four and one-half year old children who are five by January 15th. Who can pass the proposed attitude test be allowed to put in these hours in the second semester?

I was told during registration by the principal of the E. Street School that she had turned down a child's application because the child was one day over the arbitrary birth date deadline!

At the risk of being called a crank, What are we paying taxes for? If my offspring starts school sooner he finishes school sooner. Does that skin anyone's nose?



have been made to inject politics as an issue into the Bethpage Fire District election.

"We further state that candidates Hynes and Lang clearly have support from members of both major political parties as well as non-partisans, all acting as members of the community as a whole. "The public welfare demands that partisan politics be kept out of the area of fire protection and we duly subscribe to this principle. We further state that at no time have we instructed any of our party workers to take part in this campaign."

The Citizens Committee went further and charged "the incumbents are resorting to a last-ditch effort of smear and innuendo to hoodwink the voters of Bethpage."

The Hynes-Lang platform seeks "equal representation for all areas of Bethpage, a fresh viewpoint responsive to the needs of Bethpage today, intelligent view towards the future, fire protection needs, and positive opposition to rubber-stamp administrators dominated by one-man-rule ideology."

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Phone Co Petitions High Court

The New York Telephone Co. petitioned the State Supreme Court Friday, to set aside the Public Service Commission's recent denial of the company's request for a rate increase.

The company's petition points out that the state law requires that rates for telephone service be sufficient to provide a reasonable average return upon the "value" of the telephone property used to furnish service. By declining to receive evidence as to the present value of the company's property in its rate application, the petition adds, the Commission failed to comply with the clear requirement of the law.

Keith S. McHugh, company president, said that the present action was taken only after most careful

consideration.

"The issue is of the greatest possible importance to telephone users and can be stated simply," he declared. "Will the company be allowed earnings sufficient to meet the impact of post-war inflation? Or, will much of the effect of inflation be ignored in fixing its rates?"

The company's rate increase request was filed with the Commission on Nov. 30, 1954. It asked for an increase of about 10 per cent in revenues, a day for business main telephones. Hearings before the Commission began January 4, 1954, and were completed July 4.

The company pointed out during the hearings that its telephone charges had gone up less than those in any other state in the country. They have amounted to only 16 per cent, it said, compared to an increase of 92 per cent in the cost of living generally.

The request was denied by the Commission Aug. 5, 1954.



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
