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Latest Albany Edict Puts Bus Distance Back On Road

HICKSVILLE—Distance from a child's home to school is the "most direct highway route" it was ruled this week by the State Education Dept. legal counsel, apparently reinforcing Albany opinions previously stated in connection with efforts by parents to have the local School Board give special consideration to safety as well as distance. Dr. Charles Brind repeated his previous verdict in a letter to Dr. E. H. LeJarron, superintendent of schools, received here on Monday.

As a result, the School Board voted 2 to 1 at its special meeting, Tuesday night, to request that Joseph Matienzo of Haverford Rd. return a pass which had been temporarily issued his kindergarten daughter. The Matienzo home is less than a half mile from Woodland Ave. School by auto route. Measured by a Woodbury Rd. crossing protected with stop signs the route is over a half mile.

A special committee had recommended measurement by "safe-route" as policy for the district.

HICKSVILLE — The Post Office on North Broadway, opposite Thorman Ave., will be open for the sale of stamps and acceptance of parcel post from 8 A.M. to 7 P.M., effective this Saturday, Dec. 11, according to Postmaster William G. Mollitor. This schedule will remain in effect to and including Dec. 23, he stated. There will be NO Sunday service.

Roman Urges Community Session On RR Crossing Ups and Downs

HICKSVILLE—Lawrence A. Roman, active civic worker and former president of the Hicksville Civic Assoc., today called for a community meeting to discuss publicly the relative merits of raising or depressing the rail road tracks when crossings are eliminated. Referring to the report on Tuesday's Herald, he said there appears to be an "arbitrary decision" in the assumption that the community favors "elevating the tracks".

His statement follows:
"I read with great interest the unofficial comments regarding the apparent decision to 'elevate' the railroad tracks in our community. For what seems to be an unexplained reason the Chamber of Commerce appears to assume that

the majority of the community favors 'elevate' rather than 'depress' the tracks and has therefore cancelled a community discussion of this most vital subject. This to me appears to be an arbitrary decision. When was a consensus of opinion taken on this subject? How many people were contacted and their thinking summarized into a conclusion?"

"I have been told many a story about people, as long as 30 years ago, standing near the tracks at Broadway and debating whether grade crossing elimination should be 'up' or 'down'. Charles Voigt remembers his father, over 40 years ago, debating this subject with a local banker. When such a discussion takes place for 40 years, there must be quite a bit to the subject.

Eddie Quimby Joins Bethpage Amvets Post

Not many men can boast of so many wonderful moments, nor heartaches within their span of life as Eddie (Ace) Quimby of Cottage Blvd., Hicksville when they look back on what their achievements were, and yet Eddie is the type to keep quiet when asked about his life and the war.

Back when Pearl Harbor was still the Pearl of the Pacific and Japan was still the land of the little men, Eddie was cutting his name on ice. Skating was his chief avocation and during his reign hauled in more than 80 medals and numerous assorted titles. As a speed skater Eddie won the Middle Atlantic two-mile indoor and outdoor championship in 1935, the Middle Atlantic five-mile indoor championship in 1936, and in 1936 he teamed with Allan Potts, a member of the US Olympic team, to win a number of races over the longer distances.

WHIZ AT HANDBALL

But, Eddie was not only a champ on ice, but a whiz at handball with the New York Sporting Club of Queens. As an amateur boxer, Quimby-fighting in the 160 pound class knew how to handle his dukes as well, where in a tourney staged by the Long Island City Moose, he led the way by scoring two one-round knockouts over Frank Miskell of the West Side and Harry Hoffman of Woodhaven.

In 1937 Eddie's career began with the New York City Fire Dept. where he had many narrow escapes, but little did he realize that

his biggest experiences were yet to come. When Pearl Harbor was bombed, Eddie enlisted with the US Marines, fighting through eight hard days as an infantryman during the invasion of Saipan, he was wounded in the back and leg by a mortar shell. After being hospitalized, Ed was reclassified and given

THE ABOVE PICTURES illustrate more graphically than thousands of words of warning the kind of driving which is taking place on the residential streets of Hicksville. The fact that two vehicles designed to transport the public were involved makes the lesson all the more shocking.

Tragic headlines might have accompanied these pictures if the school bus had not just discharged its final passenger for the day—seconds before the crash.

Next Wednesday, Dec. 15, has been proclaimed as S-D Day for the nation by President Eisenhower. S-D stands for safe driving and the purpose of this special day is to keep all highway accidents, nationally, at an extreme minimum—to prove it can be done.

Every day should be S-D Day in Hicksville and all other mid-Island communities.

Our streets are swollen with motor vehicles. In some cases the streets themselves are inadequate to handle the volume. Street lighting is inadequate, safety devices are below minimum needs.

Therefore, extra caution is required by all who operate motor vehicles to keep the grisly toll of death and injury from getting any worse.

And on the subject of safety, the letter from Dr. Charles Brind of the State Education Dept. to the Hicksville School Board this week, besides its "decision" on how distance from a child's home to a school should be measured (as illogical and ridiculous as it seems), also carries this pronouncement:

"There is a duty on that branch of the municipal unit of government charged with the maintaining of proper safeguards and enforcement of laws to take such steps as may be necessary to insure the safety of the children using and crossing the public highway."

The "unit of government" is unfortunately very vague when it comes to the unincorporated hamlet of Hicksville. Is it the township? The county? The police are involved and appear willing to do their share, but all too often their best efforts are stymied by this same question—we don't have a local government.

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Suggests DeShaw Check 'Facts'

To the Editor:

There is a favorite trick of beginning debaters and politicians some call it "setting up a straw man so you can knock him down." This involves setting up ridiculous arguments and attributing them to the opposition. Disproving them becomes easy as pie. One can then relax, feeling quite happy and sure of having won the debate. Altogether ignored is the point that the original arguments were based on invented facts rather than the true ones.

Mr. Charles DeShaw has been practicing this trick for some weeks now. It is a shame that the no doubt considerable amount of energy expended by Mr. DeShaw cannot be channeled constructively. There is room in every democratic community for the informed questioner. Basic issues should be clarified so public opinion can seek the answer from the facts as they really are.

Here are some facts Mr. DeShaw can check at the Library, or the Superintendent's office. School taxes are levied to pay the cost of educating our children. Of the things for which these taxes must pay, the largest category for the past three years has been instructional services, taking up half the entire budget. It is a FACT that school administrative and instructional costs must increase as our school population increases. These children will need additional teachers, nurses, books, supplies, desks, in addition to rooms in which to work. The Columbia Survey shows that even our present school population is not as big as the average is expected to be after the "bulge" has passed through. This would indicate to me that we have yet to reach our minimum teaching staff.

It is a FACT that the superintendent's job includes a great deal of administrative detail in addition to the basic responsibility for the educational standards of our schools. As a parent, these standards are very important to me. They are the most important reason for having a superintendent. I can't see letting the details of efficient management interfere with this primary reason for the existence of the job. That's the tail wagging the dog. It makes dollar sense to me to have the detail jobs delegated wherever possible so the executive in charge can see that educational policy is being properly carried out.

This brings me to Mr. DeShaw's rather involved logic of December 2. As clearly as I can make out the meaning of his argument, he is saying: a) Assistants were hired to relieve the superintendent so he could concentrate on running the school system efficiently. b) The superintendent is still loaded down with work. Therefore, c) The assistants are not relieving him of work, proving that they are unnecessary.

The obvious fallacy lies in premise b). The School population this year is four times what it was in 1950. It is expected to go from this year's 8,135 to a total of 13,400 in 1962 and then decline to a year round average of 8,900. The instructional staff of 1954, with 68, has grown to a total of 343 in 1954. The transportation problem, the problems of coordinating teaching methods, the problems of school construction and utilization, are still very important and time consuming ones.

Despite these facts and the experts' estimates (drawn from the facts by the Board's financial advisor as well as by the Columbia Survey), Mr. DeShaw goes on to make some serious accusations.

(I use quotes for my own re-statement of his arguments)

1. "We have too many administrative assistants.
2. "They earn too much.
3. "They don't—or won't in the future—do anything to earn their pay.
4. "The school board intends to do nothing but create unnecessary jobs."

These accusations are very grave, particularly the last two. They raise the issue of community confidence in the policies set by their elected representatives.

BEFORE any person takes his stand, he would do well to find out what those policies are.

BEFORE anyone denounces as unnecessary or overpaid the jobs of the 3 administrative assistants on the District payroll, he would do well to find out what they do, what they are expected to do, and what, if anything, they know has to be postponed because of lack of manpower.

The PTA's and school faculties have done much to explain to parents the what and the how of their children's education. The facts of how much are of interest, too, to the general public. They are available at the annual budget meeting in May each year. The facts of

why are harder to explain, but the community is entitled to know them. Together, all can give a community the understanding so necessary to the efficient teaching of their children.

The facts are not yet all before the public. The Board and the Superintendent have been busy actually planning the education of our children. The charting of their plans and policies in a form designed for community understanding is not available. It is my earnest hope, after four years of waiting, to see the job done soon. I have faith that when the community has the facts, when its questions are answered, the Board will be helped in its constant struggle to balance economy against the quality of education our children will receive.

Ask the CPA

Q. When is child care cost deductible.

A. Under the new Internal Revenue Code a special deduction for the cost of child care has been provided for a working woman or working widower. This allowance is in addition to the \$600 dependency credit.

If the working woman is married she must file a joint return with her husband unless he is mentally or physically unfit to care for himself. If she is legally separated under a decree of divorce or separate maintenance she may claim the child-care deduction even though the child is supported by the father who claims the dependency deduction. The definition of "widower" is extended, for the purposes of this section of the law, to include a man legally separated from his wife.

The child must be under 12 years of age or physically or mentally incapable of self-support. The overall deduction is limited to \$600 regardless of the number of dependents. Furthermore, in the case of a child reaching his twelfth birthday during the year only those expenses incurred prior to the birthday are allowable.

The expenses must be paid in the current year and payments to a dependent relative for the child cannot be included as child care expense.

A married woman must file a joint return in order to qualify. The deduction is then decreased if the

amount by which it exceeds \$4,500. For example, if the combined adjusted gross income were \$4,900 the deduction may not exceed \$200. Thus, if your combined income is \$5,100—you get no deduction.

Furthermore, the deduction is permitted only where the taxpayer is either working or actively in search of employment. Therefore, if your child is in nursery school which costs \$25 a month and you work for three months, only \$75 is deductible. If you work two weeks in each month only that proportion is deductible. If you work only for half a day while the child is in school for the entire day—only one-half of the cost is deductible. If you have a maid or housekeeper who in addition to caring for the children also cleans and cooks, her salary must be pro-rated.

This child-care provision fills a long-needed gap in the law to help people who need it because of special circumstances. You are cautioned that it has nothing to do with the expenses of a baby sitter when husband and wife go out for a night's entertainment.

The Question Box

The following are representative of the questions asked at the Public Library. If you need help in obtaining answers to your questions, or desire to do research in certain fields, call Mr. Eisner at the Library, 111 S-1617. However, the privilege of borrowing books is extended only to residents of School District 17; non-residents must pay a \$5 annual fee to borrow books, although the library will extend its reference services to non-residents without charge.

Q. What was the population of Long Island when the first settlers arrived?

A. No reliable figure existed as to the Indian population on the Island when the first settlers arrived; however, it has been estimated as "several thousand." In addition, it has been estimated that there were probably no more than 1,225,000 Indians north of Mexico when the first explorers came to the North American continent. In 1698, when the first census of Long Island was taken, there were 3,366 whites and 199 Negroes in Queens County (which included what is now Nassau), and 2,121 whites and 558 Negroes in Suffolk County. In 1790, the first U.S. census showed 4,494 persons in Kings County, 16,014 in Queens County, and 16,440 in Suffolk County, or a grand total of 38,948 on the Island.

Q. Have any other Senators, in addition to McCarthy, been censured?

A. In 1902, Senators John L. McLaurin and Benjamin R. Tillman of South Carolina were censured for fighting on the Senate floor. In 1929, Senator Hiram Bingham of Connecticut was condemned (not censured) by the Senate for permitting a lobbyist to attend a closed meeting of the Senate Finance Committee.

Visit to Old Historic Landmark

With this very chilly weather, everyone stays close to home. Well, yours truly and her daughter, Susan, spent the week in Connecticut and I will tell you about one of the highlights of the trip. We visited the Webb House, one of New England's historic landmarks which was built in 1752 in Wethersfield, Conn. It was at this house that General Washington who was with troops in N. Y. and Count de Rochambeau, French Commander, who had troops in New Port R. I. met to make final plans for the attack which resulted in surrender of the British at Yorktown. This ended the Revolutionary War. It was Washington's secretary who suggested that they meet at his brother's Thomas Webb, Home in Wethersfield since it was so ideally situated for each participant. Remember travel in those days were by horse back which was slow.

The Webb House is very interesting as the owners, Conn. Society of the Colonial Dames of America, have furnished it with articles of the 18th century as they feel it might have been furnished when Washington visited the house. The rooms are not crowded with articles, but well-placed for living and any extra items were placed in the attic where one can see the loft

where the slaves slept. The original Red Rock Wall paper which was imported from France (Mr. Webb was in the import and export business) for the chamber in which Washington slept is still on the wall.

They have repainted one of the back rooms a bright blue which was found when the walls were scraped and believed to be on the walls during this period.

There is a guide to show people around and she explains all points of interest in each room and will answer any questions you may have about items which they have knowledge of. Mrs. William Greer, our guide, was very interesting and told us about many things which we did not know or had not seen in other historic houses which I have seen through New England. There are many samples of Connecticut drafts from this period. Among the various collections in the house are silver, china, Gentleman's library, Weaving, colorful needlepoint and embroidery, furniture and many items from the colonial kitchen used in cooking in this era.

If you are up that way and like historic places, I am sure this is one you would enjoy visiting and the children would be very interested. It will give them a picture of history and many facts which are not printed in the everyday history books. The house is opened daily the year round.

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

Doctor Jones Says

Around 15 years ago, in this column, we were talking about hearing aids. Folks that were hard-of-hearing, we said, had no feeling against putting on glasses. But the hard-of-hearing people: suggest they try a hearing aid and they knew they'd feel conspicuous and self-conscious. We opined we needed a Prince of Wales to start wearing one. Then everybody'd want 'em."

Well, the Prince of Wales (our Duke of York) he evidently never needed one. But today we've got a prince of singers that's setting the style. It's the story of Johnny Ray, the immensely popular "crying singer." He's a prince, anyway, to the hundreds of otherwise deaf kids—and grown-ups as well—that're wearing hearing aids and liking it as a result of his influence. In May the story was in the New York World-Telegram. It was reprinted in a hearing aid trade periodical. That's where I got it.

Johnny was an Oregon farm boy. When he was in the sixth grade in school he was so deaf he couldn't follow what the teacher was saying. So much so that the teacher advised his parents to send him to school for the deaf. But his folks had heard about hearing aids and decided to try one. They did and he's been wearing one ever since.

Later on Johnny ~~Ray~~ he'd make "show business his business." His best friends—they knew he could sing and had unusual talent. But they said, with his handicap he never could hope to get anywhere as an entertainer. He wouldn't be discouraged. What had been a handicap had become an incentive. When, in 1951, 2 million of his Columbia records of "Cry" and "Little White Cloud" had sold, Johnny Ray had arrived.

Now there's a Johnny Ray Foundation that provides research funds and equipment to institutes for the deaf. When he flew to London, for a Palladium engagement, he took along \$1500 worth of equipment for a hearing project over there. He's a success not only as an entertainer but as a convincing proponent of better living through better hearing.

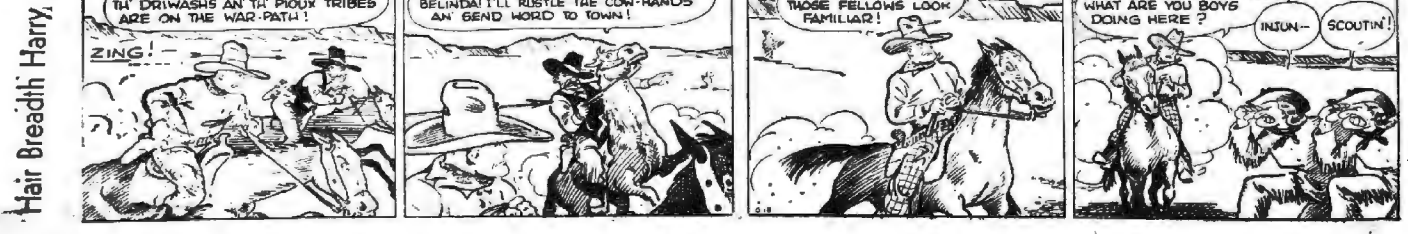

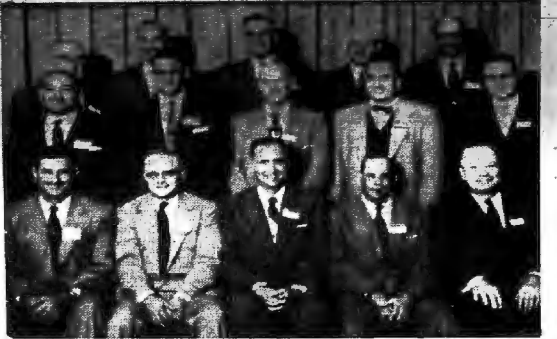

 That being the case, is it not a matter for community wide participation? As we are only a hamlet we do not have an official census count, but estimates run to 40,000 people comprising our community. This population warrants a community meeting on this important decision.
 "There are many items to consider in connection with this vital move which I dare say is taking place because of the Home Rule Committee's constant reference to the grade crossing hazard and lack of remedial action by our town fathers. This is not a matter on which a community discussion can be summarily dismissed purely because the Long Island Rail Road Company may have preference for 'elevation'. This is a subject that needs careful deliberation to a conclusion. Property values and appearance of our community are both at stake. Let's have a community meeting," Roman concluded.

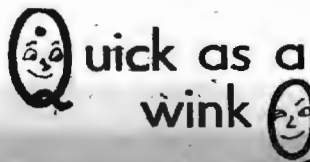

Mr. Derwent has had 50 years experience in theatre as a Shakespearean actor, and will be opening soon in "The Merchant of Venice."

His topic was "The Theatre—Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow." The highlights of his discussion covered his various experiences, and observations he has made during his career. Mr. Derwent feels that it will remain about the same as it is at the present time.

In London there are one and a half times as many theatres as in New York City. In Rome, Moscow, Paris, etc. there are outdoor concerts sponsored by the government daily. The legitimate theatre is a price where everyone may participate. In this country it is a luxury to see a Broadway show. Here it is difficult for a novice to get a foothold in the theatre as it is hard for him to get experience.

In my personal opinion I feel this is not so on Long Island as there are many theatre groups. To mention a few, Barter Theatre, Threshold, Salt Box Players, Actors Playhouse, Showense Theatre, Great Neck Community Theatre, Manhasset Community Club, Curtin Call Players of Hicksville, to mention a few. As for getting younger people interested, we have the Teen Players of Hicksville, which is open for membership. We have been most successful in this as the youngsters have been most enthusiastic.

One of the many plays that have been put on locally was Blind Alley by Threshold Theatre. It was directed by Jason Johnson. Cast: Frances Donney, Jason Johnson, Cliff Owen, Florence Kelly, Matt Shaw Jr., Madilyn Lee, David Mann, Jean Sheraton, Matt Owen Sr., Rudy Volpe.
