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

Bomb Scare Empties HS, Soaked Kids Sent Home

HICKSVILLE—The high school building was evacuated, Tuesday, shortly after 12 noon, when a mysterious phone call warned that a bomb was scheduled to explode. Students of senior high were just concluding sessions and junior high pupils were just arriving when the call was received at about 12:20.

Police ordered the building emptied and the youngsters stood outdoors in the heavy rain until one o'clock when the 700 of them were permitted to enter the auditorium. At two o'clock, Principal Leon Galloway dismissed the soaking wet youngsters for the day and they were sent home by bus. Police found no trace of explosives.

Shopping for Christmas Tree

What kind of Christmas tree do you want this year? With so many different kinds on the market to choose from — the most discriminating person can't seem to suit their taste says Prof. Fred Winch of the conservation department at Cornell.

More than 11 million Christmas trees are sold in New York State each year. In eastern New York and in the large cities, people seem to prefer red and white spruce and balsam fir. Persons in central and western New York seem to prefer Scotch pine, Austrian pine, Douglas fir, and balsam fir, the specialist noted.

Most of the trees sold in the eastern portion of the State are natural field grown trees from the Adirondacks, New England, and Canada. Trees sold in central and western New York are usually plantation grown.

Whether you prefer a blue-green, pale green, or deep green color; a latty or miniature tree, look for one with well-planned branches that have not been damaged in transport, suggests Professor Winch.

Makes sure the tree is large enough so you can cut off a section of the butt when you put the tree in water. You can tell a freshly cut from an old tree by tapping the butt on the ground to see if needles fall. Also, a fresh tree will have a limber stem in above freezing temperatures. A dry tree, with the exception of Scotch pine, will appear yellowish green. Yellow-green is the natural color of Scotch pine.

Many persons, says Winch, prefer the Douglas fir even though it is twice as expensive as Scotch pine and three times more expensive than white spruce. Douglas fir and Scotch pine can be cut early and kept in the home a month.

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



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
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Youngsters Mob Legion Santa


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

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
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Woodland Ave Has Full Week

Mr. DeShaw has correctly shown that the elementary schoolrooms now in existence or already approved previously, are sufficient to take care of the expected peak enrollment of 8,600 elementary pupils. In fact it could be done even without the classrooms at Nicholai St. School, which will have to be abandoned soon because of the age of the building. But this would mean that all classes would be "Emergency" size of 35 children. There is thus no question of empty schoolrooms. 25 children per class is quite a sizeable group, and if you have ever had ten little ones at your own house for a birthday party, you can realize what a tremendous additional burden they can be to a teacher. Can we afford to build these schools? Can we afford not to build them? 
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
