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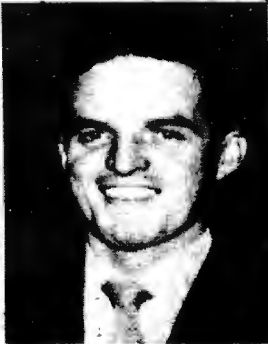

Shopping for Christmas Tree

What kind of Christmas tree do you want this year? With so many different trees on the market to choose from, even the most discriminating person has a hard time to suit their tastes says Prof. Fred Winch of the conservation department at Cornell.

More than 11 million Christmas trees are sold in New York State each year. In eastern New York and in the large cities, people seem to prefer red and white spruces and balsam fir. Persons in central and western New York seem to prefer Scotch pine, Austrian pine, Douglas fir, and balsam fir, the specialist noted.

Most of the trees sold in the eastern section of the State are natural field grown trees from the Adirondacks, New England, and Canada. Trees sold in central and western New York are usually plantation grown.

Whether you prefer a blue-green, pale green, or deep green color, a left or miniature tree, look for one with well-placed branches that have not been damaged in transport, suggests Professor Winch.

Make sure the tree is large enough so you can cut off a section of the butt when you put the tree in water. You can tell a freshly cut from an old tree by tapping the butt on the ground to see if needles fall. Also, a fresh tree will have a limber stem in above freezing temperatures. A dry tree, with the exception of Scotch pine, will appear yellowish green. Yellow-green is the natural color of Scotch pine.

Many persons say Winch, prefer the Douglas fir even though it is twice as expensive as Scotch pine and three times more expensive than white spruce. Douglas fir and Scotch pine can be cut early and kept in the home a month.

When you bring the Christmas tree home, keep it in a cool place, such as a garage or breezeway, out of the wind and sun, recommends Winch. Because conifers

contain a great deal of pitch or resin which seals the pores, cut off a small section of the butt before placing the tree in water. Water, according to the specialist, is the best preservative for Christmas trees. Before bringing the tree into the house, make a slanting cut in its butt. Then put the tree in a holder with water, and you're all set to decorate your Christmas tree for the holiday festivities.

Religious services were held on Wednesday, December 15, at 1 P. M. with Rev. Edward H. Stammel officiating. Interment was at Long Island National Cemetery.

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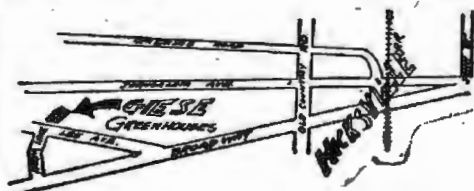
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Civics Distribute Handbooks

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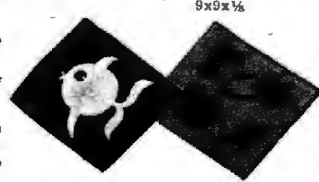
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Youngsters Mob Legion Santa

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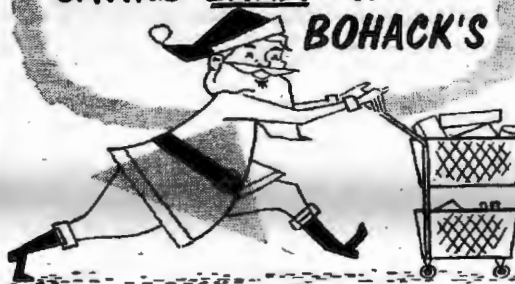
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DeLorme Reviews an SRO Show

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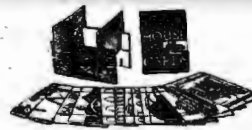

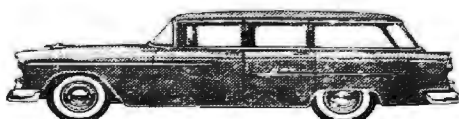
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Woodland Ave Has Full Week

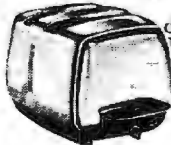

point personalities had to enter the picture. Both sides of the question were well presented, yet obviously both sides can not be right. How then is the average voter, who is much less familiar with the problem, to decide the propositions in the forthcoming referendum?

It would seem that the question resolves itself to the following: How good a school system do we want to build for our children? Mr. DeShaw has correctly shown that the elementary schoolrooms now in existence or already approved previously, are sufficient to take care of the expected peak enrollment of 8,600 elementary pupils. In fact it could be done even without the classrooms at Nicholas St. School, which will have to be abandoned soon because of the age of the building. But this would mean that all classes would be "Emergency" size of 35 children, and the entire system would operate on practically solid double sessions. It would mean that even for the long range elementary school enrollment of about 4,800 classes would have to be maintained at near emergency size, or would have to be operated at 40 per cent double session. Is that the kind of school system we plan?

On the other hand the additions now foreseen by the Columbia Survey would insure for the long range enrollment single session classes of no more than 25 children. This is what New York State authorities call normal capacity. Thus if we build all the classrooms now recommended by the Columbia Survey (i.e. 2 schools each of 1 Kindergarten and 12 classrooms plus an addition of 8 rooms to one of the existing schools) we will have 182 schoolrooms, or just barely enough, figuring that by then Nicholas Street School will be abandoned. During the Peak enrollment, which we are facing in four years, we will still have emergency size classes and almost universal double sessions, but at least

for the long range program we will have provided what is considered the very minimum facilities for the proper education of our children.

There is thus no question of empty schoolrooms. 25 children per class is quite a sizeable group, and if you have ever had ten little guests at your own house for a birthday party, you can realize what a tremendous additional burden they can be to a teacher. Can we afford to build these schools? Can we afford not to build them? I can think of quite a few things I would rather do without, than the necessary schools for our children. 39 Washington Ave. Hicksville, N. Y. Dec. 12, 1954.

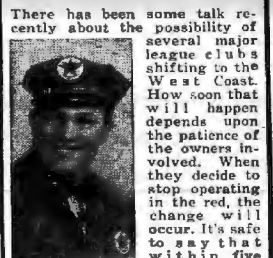

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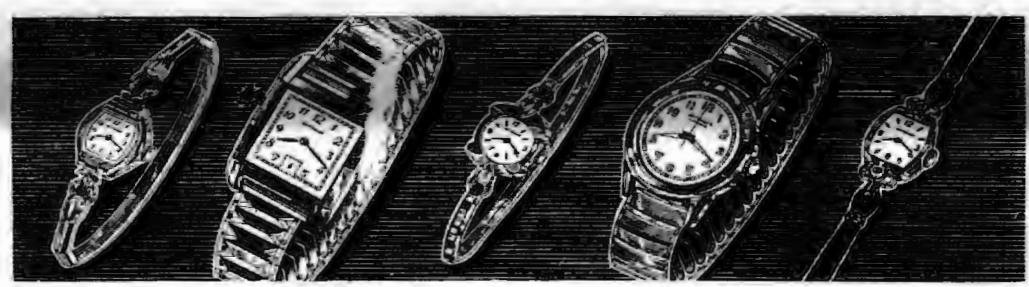
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
