## Repeat Board Request For Return of Old Bell

HICKSVILLE—The now famous old Nicholai St. School bell came in for renewed attention at the school board meeting, Monday night, with members agreed to have School Attorney Bertram Crane write another letter to Henry C. Brengel, former president and present possessor of the "old ding-dong".

The letter will advise Brengel that his "conditions", reported at a recent meeting by Crane after conversation with Brengel, have been rejected and the "prompt return" of the bell is asked. Further, that the board still believes it is the property of the school district.

Edward R. Schluter Jr., contractor who removed the belfry from Nicholai which housed the bell, was present at the meeting and told the Board that he considered the bell as "part of the debris". He did add, that "15 people" wanted the bell and "I wanted it too. I went to that school." But Brengel won out and got it from Schluter for \$10.

Emil Szendy revived interest in the bell and made the motion to ask again for its return, which was carried. He commented dryly that "it is school property and it must have intrinsic value if 15 people wanted and one was willing to pay money for it."

Brengel's conditions, as reported previously by Crane, were that the "board as a whole" must want it; the board must say what it plans to do with it if it is returned, and he will have it inscribed "donated by Henry C. Brengel".

Schluter added the comment "it's not workable and is not worth the tax backs Mr. Brengel paid for it." He added that he told those "15 people" who asked for it that they should get it down if they wanted it.

Harry Ernenwein, former business manager, was also at the meeting and said he didn't know the bell was in the belfry when he had it removed "together with debris" at the board's direction.

Richard Schoel wanted the letter to be "gracious" in tone. Szendy felt it should be "business-like". Schoel voted on Szendy's motion but took exception to the inclusion of the word "prompt" in reference to return of the ding-dong.

## Civics Protest Expressway Cutting Thru Green Knolls

PLAINVIEW—Opposition to the state proposed route of the North-South Expressway was recorded by vote at the Civic Assoc. meeting in Jamaica Ave. School, last night. A committee largely of home owners from Green Knolls—an area which will be almost "wiped out" by the route—has been named to work with the central committee opposing the Expressway route. Green Knolls, built by Frank Wells and associates, is on the south side of Old Country Rd. between Central Park Rd. and Grobmann's Lane, west of the Dun Roamin Kennel and the Firehouse. It was reported that about 20 split level houses in the development are in the path of the highway.

The Civic Assoc. also decided to write the Oyster Bay Town Board and request a public hearing on creation of a park and parking district for the community.

Despite inclement weather, more than 150 persons attended the session.

She received a \$25 savings bond and a plaque bearing her name was presented to the school by Fred J. Noeth, editor of the Mid-Island Herald and chairman of the Press Assoc. contest committee. Her entry was chosen from among those submitted by 13 Nassau high schools and judged by Prof. Hyman Enser, chairman of the journalism dept. of Hofstra College.

Miss Lomnicki is the 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Lomnicki. An honor graduate of St. Ignatius School in Hicksville in 1951, she is a member of the Leo Honor Society of the Diocese by reason of her scholarship, participation in school activities and scholarship competitions for college.

## Propose Movable Classes To Handle Student Peak

HICKSVILLE—Temporary, portable classroom units used with considerable success and economy in California, were recommended for consideration by the School Board here this week by Dr. Felix McCormick of the Institute of Field Studies, Columbia University, as a less expensive solution to the problem of handling the district's peak load of student enrollment. Otherwise, the district will be faced with the prospect of empty classrooms 10 to 15 years from now, he told the Board at a special meeting, Monday night.

Dr. McCormick, who has developed the construction program for the district since 1949, stated that his estimates of needs and long range enrollment are "liberal".

He has recommended that the district remodel the present high school for junior high use (about doubling its present capacity), add six rooms to Lee Ave. School, build a 12-room school on Wetterau (Glenbrook) site, and another 12-room school in the north side of the district in the vicinity of Willet Ave.

These proposals are to be the subject of a referendum in January or February.

He warned that "permanent type construction beyond these recommendations" could result in overbuilding.

A committee of the School Board will look into the portable, temporary units which have also been used in Newton, Mass., as well as San Diego and Sacramento, Calif.

It was brought out that the temporary structures, each larger than a regular classroom, could be located on the site of an elementary school (such as Dutch Lane or Old Country Rd. where there is adequate space), and then moved to the high school grounds when the "bulge" of enrollment reaches the higher grades.

Temporary units, Dr. McCormick said, could be built here for about \$10,000 each (or about a third the





# Teen Club Doing Effective Job

To The Editor:

In recent weeks the average reader must have come to the conclusion that there's lots of talk about recreation but little being done about it. I feel that it's time people were made aware of a group organized for this purpose and, to all appearances, giving the youth of our town the kind of recreation they want at NO cost to the taxpayer.

My husband and I direct the Hicksville Teen Club which provides clean, supervised social recreation for Hicksville teenagers twice a week and sometimes more. On Monday evenings we hold sessions at Burns Ave. School from 7:30 to 10 p.m. On Wednesday evenings we hold similar sessions at Lee Ave. School. We hold roller skating parties, trips to New York and are hoping to run a series of dances featuring a 17 piece orchestra at a very modest fee for teenagers.

We have at many times been confused with other organizations in town, both past and present and I should like to state that the Hicksville Teen Club is NOT affiliated with any group or organization nor are we sponsored by anyone. The Club is supervised by volunteer adults who have worked very hard to make it the kind we would want our own children to attend. None of us have been trained for this but we have tried to use our hearts and common sense in place of formal training. Among us are a Sunday School Supt., a P.T.A. vice-president, a civic association official, etc.

Together, with a teenage executive group, we have worked out

rules for the organization and spelled out in plain language that this is the way the club operates and those who cannot conform will not be permitted to remain. The children respect these rules and in the year that we have had Burns Av. open, no fights have begun, no disrespect has been shown the adults and no damage been done to the schools.

We feel proud of this statement since we accommodate between 130 and 150 teenagers per night at Burns Ave. who come from all over Hicksville and represent a cross section of our teenage population. To date we have issued 400 membership cards since Sept. 1954. Records are kept on every teenager attending as to dates, time of departure, etc. Once the teenager enters the school, he stays inside the whole evening except for a 15 minute supervised smoking period. Boys and girls have separate smoking periods and we try to keep those under 16 from going out to smoke. Once a teenager goes out the door (unless for a good reason) he is considered as having left for the night and the departure time noted on card, especially before 9:30 p.m. No loitering is permitted outside the school and cars must be locked and empty during club sessions. Girls are absolutely forbidden to wear dungarees or slacks and we hope to get the boys away from them some day.

"We do not offer a "planned" program although occasionally we surprise them with dance contests, different types of dances and have even threatened to have the boys make Brownies (which they were willing to do).

# The Question Box

However, the privilege of borrowing books is extended only to residents of School District 17; non-residents must pay a \$5 annual fee to borrow books, although the library will extend its reference services to non-residents without charge.

Q. Is there any method by which candles can be prevented from trickling while burning?

A. The following method may prevent trickling: dip the candle in a solution composed of 15 parts each of magnesium sulphate and dextrose in 100 parts of water. The solution will dry quickly on the candle and should not affect their burning properties.

Q. Where and when was the first postal route established in the U.S.?

A. The first postal route between cities in the U. S. was begun on January 22, 1673, between New York City and Boston, Massachusetts. Mail was carried once a month.

Q. Was Benjamin Franklin the first postmaster-general of the United States?

A. Benjamin Franklin was appointed head of the American postal system in 1775 by the Continental Congress. However, the first postmaster-general who was appointed after the adoption of the Constitution was Samuel Osgood, who served from 1789 to 1791, and was appointed by George Washington.

## Ask the CPA

Q. How can I shift cash-basis income?

A. This part of the year is one in which a wise taxpayer can do a great deal to reduce his income tax burden and at the same time be subject to no criticism. It is common sense and good business to consider your legally available alternatives and to take advantage of them. Now, if you are on a cash basis it is possible to persuade your tenants, clients, patients, or customers to make their payments in advance or put off payments until next year.

For example—Let's say that the taxpayer's income has been high in 1954 and he thinks that it will be lower in 1955. The taxpayer knows that if he sends bills or statements in December he will be paid in December. So he simply waits until January 2 to send them out. On a cash basis the taxpayer reports income as it is collected and those collections will apply to 1955.

Q. How can I control cash-basis expenses?

A. It will be easier to control expenses than income. The time of

payment for a cash-basis taxpayer determines the year in which he may deduct expenses paid. If the taxpayer owes money for services, repairs, supplies, taxes, interest, medical bills, merchandise, etc. he can either defer or accelerate the date of payment of these items. For example—Let's say that a taxpayer has bills for utilities, rent, merchandise, interest, taxes, medical bills, repairs on which payment is not due (or may be withheld) until January or February. If he feels that the 1954 income is going to be higher than 1955 he simply pays these expenses in advance. Consequently he increases his 1954 deductions.

However, should he feel that he would rather take the deductions in 1955 he can generally induce his creditors to wait until 1955 for payment.




