## Lay Cornerstone Of School Aug 19

BETHPAGE—The cornerstone of the new Bethpage Grammar School will be laid at ceremonies to be held on the new site on Broadway, Saturday, Aug. 19. The two-story \$1,400,000 building is expected to be completed in November and ready for occupancy by January, 1951.

"Until the new building is completed, pupils of the district will attend classes on a part-time basis," Frederick Kramer, president of the School Board, said this week. "Children of grammar school age have increased the pressure on the district's lone school on Powell St. at the rate of 100 a year. We now have an enrollment of 650 pupils and an additional 100 are expected this fall," he said.

# Incorporation Sponsors Meet To Map House-to-House Drive

HICKSVILLE — A village committee of neighborhood volunteers who will carry the message of incorporation for this community into local homes will be organized tomorrow (Thursday) night at a meeting in the Firehouse Auditorium, starting at 8:30. All interested persons are urged by William L. Geyer, leader of this division of the Incorporation committee, to attend.

Volunteers will be assigned to their own neighborhoods and blocks to circulate petitions which must be presented to the Town Board before a vote on the question can be scheduled, Lawrence A. Roman, general chairman, said last night.

The six sub-divisions of the Committee for Incorporation have been working quietly

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since a general meeting was held in June. All units have met and begun their share of the program.

The speakers committee has elected Mrs. Lucia McIntosh as permanent chairman and a letter will soon go to all organizations requesting speaking dates starting Sept. 1. The information division is preparing several preliminary reports for members and data for the speakers division.

The finance committee last week elected Harry Borley as chairman and will start immediately to collect funds for printing, postage and incidentals. The legal and research branches are also starting on their assignments with Robert Corcoran and Stanley Mruz as chairmen, respectively.

# Expect 1,000 in Kindergarten Class; See Peak of 8,500 Pupils by 1960

If proposed residential developments in Hicksville are carried out as planned, it is possible that the kindergarten enrollment in local schools may exceed 1,000 pupils in 1952, only two years hence, according to the Study of Hicksville School District building requirements made by Columbia University. "It is very certain that the total school enrollment will increase sharply over the next decade and conceivably could reach a peak figure of something like 8,500 pupils in 1960," the Report states.

The public school enrollment in Hicksville nearly trebled over the 30-year period 1919-1949. During the school year 1919-20, only 436 pupils were the average daily attendance in grades from Kindergarten thru 12th. In 1948-49, the average daily attendance figure had increased to 1,207 pupils, 176.8 per cent more than in 1919-20.

### What's Ahead

While an increase from 436 pupils in 1919-20 to 1,207 during the school year 1948-49 may appear to represent a substantial growth, this past increase covered a span of 30 years and will seem insignificant when compared with the changes that may be anticipated over the next decade. A slight hint of what is ahead may be obtained by comparing the public school enrollment on Sept. 30, 1949 with Feb. 24, 1950. Over that short period of approximately (continued on page 16)

## Hicksville Parochial Registration Much Higher Than National Average

This is the sixth installment by the HERALD of the Columbia Report on local school building requirements, a study prepared at a cost of \$5,000 voted by the district in May 1949. This chapter on school enrollments contains significant data about parochial school enrollment. In Sept., 1949, 27.1 per cent of the Hicksville children of school age were attending the local parochial school. This percentage is much higher than the national average, according to Columbia, since over the country as a whole approximately only 10 per cent of the school children attended nonpublic schools.

In Sept. 1949, St. Ignatius School was caring for 705 pupils, 451 from Hicksville and 254 from other school districts. A study of the local school census reports covering the 10-year period 1939-49 reveals that 32.4 per cent of the local children 5 to 11 years of age attended the parochial school. This age group corresponds roughly with the grades K thru 6. These census reports indicate also that practically all the local parochial children re-enter the public school at the high school level. In fact the data showed that only 1.3 per cent of the local youth, 15-17 years of age, attended parochial secondary schools.

Ernest Mazzara of 436 Nassau Blvd., West Hempstead, had planned to install two tanks of 4,500 gallons each on Midland Ave., north of Bethpage Rd., Hicksville, for oil blending. Strong opposition to the request was registered at the hearing by residents of Midland and adjacent Twinlawn Aves.

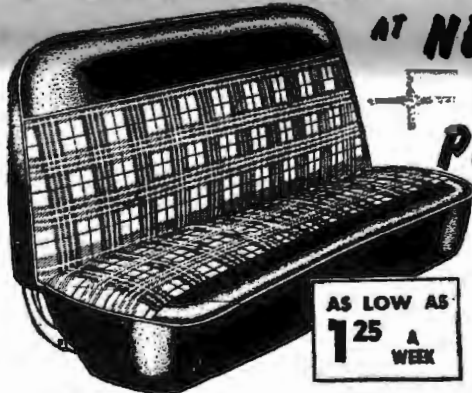


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### Registration Dates For Students Told

### Firemen Collecting Among Levitt Houses

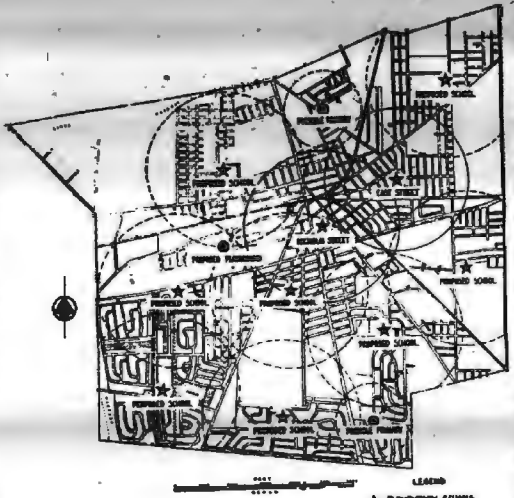

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After little better than two weeks, the total enrollment has reached the 318 mark for different children taking part in the playground. After the addition of

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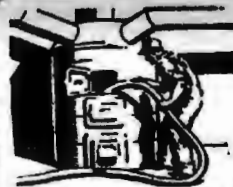

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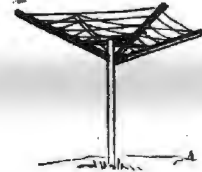
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# Levitt Could Logically Give Sites

HICKSVILLE TAXPAYERS got the news last week they are being asked to fork over \$148,000 to buy three new school sites, sites, totaling 47.4 acres, from Levitt and Sons. We are advised that this price represents the cost of this acreage to the Levitt organization plus the improvements, plus fees for preliminary surveys, maps, plans and incidental costs. It comes to about \$3,000 an acre.

The three sites are all in the south, south-west and west section of the Hicksville School District on property left vacant among the Levitt houses now being erected.



This is only the first cost. Yet to come are three elementary school buildings which the Columbia Report estimates will cost about \$600,000 each or a grand total, with the land; of \$1,948,000—and with architect's fees, etc., will easily top two million dollars. These costs will eventually be added to the tax bill of not only present Hicksville property owners but also the purchasers of these new Levitt houses.

All of which focuses attention upon the vigorous but not successful campaign of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. to get some assistance from William Levitt.

The Civic Assoc. asked Levitt to demonstrate a responsibility to his potential home purchasers by "providing the financing or guarantee the funds required to erect school buildings to house the anticipated pupil enrollment resulting from such large scale development."

In a letter which bluntly concluded "I

cannot continue any further correspondence on the subject," W. J. Levitt wrote the Civic Assoc., "the question of school facilities is a state function and far beyond the capacities of private individuals or firms."

However, at least four equally prominent builders do not agree with Levitt. This week the City of New York accepted from Gross-Morton building organization a gift of land encompassing a whole city block of almost three acres at Bell Blvd. and Underhill Ave. in the Cunningham Park section of Queens. George M. Gross explained that the land, located in the 18-building apartment house group now under construction at Windsor Park, was made available to the City so that existing school and recreational facilities in the area could be increased.

Previously we had heard of three other builders who recognized a responsibility:

1. Walter T. Shirley, president of Mastic Acres, offered a 20-acre school site to officials of School Dist. 82 in Suffolk County (*Journal-American*, Feb. 17, 1960). The site is valued at \$45,000 and is within the Mastic Acre development.

2. The Cord Meyer Development Co. donated to the City of New York an 81,535 square foot plot at 71st Rd., west of Grand Central Pkwy, Queens, as the site for a Public School (*World-Telegram and Sun*, May 11, 1950). The gift eliminated the necessity for buying another plot assessed at \$190,000.

3. Fred C. Trump, builder of two big apartment developments in Brooklyn, has provided space in two recent projects for kindergarten and lower grade facilities. Approximately 6,000 square foot areas were leased to the City Board of Education at \$1 per year for three years (the maximum lease permitted under FHA).

When informed of the generous Trump \$1 a year leasing of school space, Levitt said "the analogy is illogical and poorly made. Mr. Trump merely built a few apartment houses and set aside certain basement facilities for nursery groups. There is not the remotest comparison in his problem and the problem of Levittown."

Levitt stands to make better than \$5,500,000 on this year's houses (*Time*, July 3, 1950), most of them constructed in Hicksville. In the process, Hicksville is being saddled with new headaches and a tax bill which adds up to almost \$7,000,000 in the next few years for school facilities alone.

Surely a gift of this land to Hicksville School District by the Master Builder would only be following an already well-established precedent.

## Now Is Time To Sell

WILLIAM H. KNIFFIN, Rockville Centre banker and director of Public Relations for the Nassau County Clearing House Assoc., Inc., writes "we are now in a real estate boom, especially in respect to land as distinguished from land and buildings — improved real estate." Mr. Kniffin's writings take the form of an official expression from the bankers of the county since the Clearing House (of which William E. Koutensky of Hicksville is chairman) represents the leading banks in Nassau.

"If you have land in the business section, or acreage in the residential area, the time to cash in seems to be at hand," is his advice. He adds an old adage "which tells us that 'real estate is the last to feel a boom and the first a depression.' My observation confirms that truism."

can bet your boots he's not losing money and maybe making as high as 100 per cent.

If the price asked is excessive, why not postpone this step and build on the sites we do possess? With the present bus service in operation it wouldn't make too much difference, would it? Then later public pressure and publicity might induce Mr. Levitt to lower his price.

Another thing: If these figures prove to be all right and the land alone cost this much, the Board

of Education MUST watch the cost of building carefully. Elaborate design, slate roofing, made-to-order fittings and hardware will all bring the cost up and add to the architect's commission.

I, for one, want to provide proper schools for our children, but certainly not at "excess profit" land costs and "show-place" building prices. Simplicity is just as beautifully and a lot cheaper.

# Protects Identity

The HERALD, in cooperation with the Information Division of the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville, will publish this department regularly in an effort to bring its readers a full discussion of this question. The HERALD invites comments and questions on this subject in writing.—Editor.

Ques.—How does incorporation tie-in with the question of keeping the name or identity of our community?

As an unincorporated section of Oyster Bay Township, Hicksville has no official local standing. Its boundaries are generally vague (although the line of Union Free School District No. 17 is generally regarded as our present boundaries).

As an incorporated village, it would be recognized as such by State and Federal Law. It would, for example, be listed in the federal census as a "place."

The only official claim Hicksville today has to its name is the fact that its Post Office and Rail Road Station are so named. About a decade ago Bethpage was known as Central Park. The residents there changed the name of their community by simply getting the US Post Office Dept. to change the name of the Post Office and the Long Island Rail Road to alter the name of the depot.

## Sound Off News and Views of FFW Post 3271

The other day I was talking to a veteran of World War II who had just completed a course of training under the GI Bill. I asked him if he had joined any of the veteran organizations, I don't recall his exact words, but what he said, in substance, was this: "No, I haven't, because I don't see any need to. I've finished the training the government offered me under the GI bill, and what I make out of it is up to me from now on."

Then I asked him if he had stopped to think how it happened that there was a GI Bill under which he could prepare himself for a good-paying job. I found that he had no idea of the history of the GI Bill. He didn't know that it was conceived by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the other veteran organizations, and that but for the efforts of these organizations, it is very probable there never would have been such a law.

And then it dawned on me that he must be typical of a vast body of veterans—men who have enjoyed the privileges which they earned so magnificently on foreign battlefields but which might have been denied them if other veterans had not raised a strong, organized voice.

Earning a privilege is one thing; actually getting it is quite another. Certainly those Americans who, in 1898, left their homes and jobs to avenge the sinking of the battleship Maine in Havana Harbor earned, at the very least, the privilege of hospitalization. But they didn't get it!!!

Why? Didn't the United States appreciate the valuable job that they performed? Didn't the country benefit from it? Of course it did; and of course the government appreciated its war heroes. But the veterans themselves had not yet learned to state their case in one voice, as a united body.

When they were discharged from the service, there was no organized group to assist them in their problems. This sad plight troubled many public-spirited leaders, including Gen. Irving Hale, a West Point graduate and a hero of the fighting in the Philippines. He headed a movement in Colorado to develop an association of overseas veterans. Simultaneously, other such veteran groups were being formulated independently in other sections of the country, in Ohio, Pennsylvania. In due time these various organizations were merged into one national body, the Veterans of Foreign Wars. As stated in the charter granted to this organization by the Congress of the United States, some of the fundamental objectives of the VFW were "to preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members; to assist worthy comrades; to perpetuate the memory of our dead and to assist their widows and orphans; to maintain true allegiance to the government of the United States and fidelity to its Constitution."

From the day of its inception, more than 50 years ago, the VFW has never deviated from its course. The organization, to be sure, has come along way from its humble beginning as the public-spirited idea of a handful of men to an all-inclusive group with a membership of one and one-half million and more than 10,000 Posts.

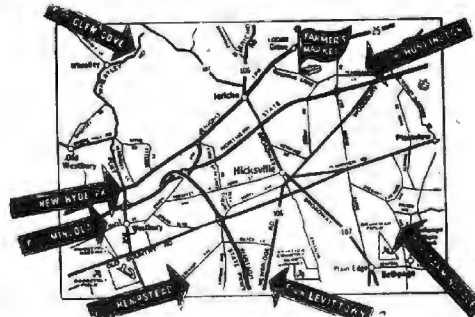

**Recital**  
WHEREAS, at a special school district meeting duly called and held in the School District on April 28, 1950 Proposition No. 1 was adopted authorizing the acquisition of a certain piece or parcel of land as a new school site, which Proposition No. 1 (omitting the metes and bounds description of the parcel of land) is as follows:

**Proposition No. 1**  
(Alternative to Proposition No. 2)

**RESOLVED:**

ately five months, the local public school enrollment jumped from 1,479 to 1,571 pupils, a gain of 92 students or 6.2 per cent.

This is equivalent to an annual increase of 14.8 per cent. Even this rate of increase will be dwarfed as soon as children from the Levitt development in Hicksville enter the local schools.

It is interesting to note that the local Sept. enrollments decreased from 1,277 in 1939 to 1,024 in 1944. Following 1944 the local enrollments increased slowly in 1945, 1946 and 1947, and then, owing largely to the spurt in local residential construction, increased rapidly to 1,479 in Sept. 1949. This same pattern, first a slow decline in enrollment, then a slow increase followed by a rapid spurt, occurred in each of the local school buildings.

**Experience in Levittown**  
The Survey Staff of the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers College, Columbia University, analyzed returns from a questionnaire administered to 956 families which moved into Levittown (South of town line in Township of Hempstead) in Sept., Oct. and Nov. of last year. The responses indicated that children from these 956 homes (1,472 children) would enroll as follows:

These data indicate that at least 6 per cent of the children will attend parochial schools and that the maximum number would not exceed 14 per cent of the total. In the absence of any information to the contrary, it seems reasonable to assume that the families moving into the new

(Levitt and other) homes in Hicksville will be similar to the families which moved into Levittown itself. If this assumption is correct the percentage of local children parochial school will decline substantially over the next few years although the actual number attending the parochial school may increase.

Over the past ten years the number of non-resident pupils enrolled in the Hicksville Public School has more than doubled. In Sept. 1939, 99 pupils (7.8 per cent of the total of 1277) were non-residents. In Sept. 1949, ten years later, the number of non-resident pupils had increased to 269 or 18.2 per cent of the total enrollment of 1,479 pupils.
