SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION: Eisenhauer Not Seeking Re-election on May 3

HICKSVILLE—Lawrence Eisenhauer, completing six years on the Board of Education, will not be a candidate for re-election on May 3rd, the Herald learned this week. His second three-year term expires the end of June.

Asked if he would seek re-election at the district voting in May, Eisenhauer said that he is definitely not a candidate. The increased pressure of his private business affairs coupled with the increased burden of school affairs, had forced him to decide against running.

He said he had told friends last summer that he would not seek re-election at the end of his current term.

With one vacancy on the board at present due to the resignation of Dr. Charles J. Masak in February, the way is now clear for the election of two new trustees for the Board. In fact, following the election on May 3, the board will have completely changed the membership within a two-year span with the exception of Henry C. Bregmal, board president.

Mrs. Edna Kuhns Sutton was elected as a new member two years ago and Lawrence C. McCaffrey was elected, replacing John Herzog, last May.

Two men have individually announced their intention to seek election on May 3. They are Harry Erneinwein of 265 Jerusalem Ave. and Robert W. Corcoran of 74 Owlhollow Ave.

Candidates for election to the two vacancies have until mid-April to file their designating petitions with District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer. Petitions must carry the names of at least 25 qualified voters.

All voters wishing to vote on May 3 and to express their vote on the school district and library budgets on May 2 must register (continued on page 14)

2 Offer to Sell Land For Federal Post Office

HICKSVILLE — Two parcels of property with price tags of \$25,000 and \$15,000 are proposed by their owners for purchase by the Federal government as a future post office site, here. Bids were opened Monday morning at the local office by Postmaster William G. Mollitor and are now on their way to Washington for consideration.

Griffin and Rossmore has offered its tract on the south side of E. Barclay St., next to the D and E Shirt Co. for \$25,000. The property has a frontage of 195.96 feet on Barclay St. and a depth to the RR tracks of 130 feet on the east and 211.25 feet on the west side.

William Duffy has offered a tract on the north side of Duffy Ave., about opposite Underhill Ave., for \$15,000. The parcel is about a half mile west of Newbridge Rd. with a frontage of 150 feet and a depth to the RR of 347.19 feet.

The two proposals were the only response to a call for sites. Congress has authorized funds for the purchase of land here as the future site for a Post Office building. Present also for the opening of the bids was William Staehle, superintendent of mails, and a representative of the Herald.

Accompanying Mollitor's report on the bids received is a strong recommendation for construction of a federal building with 10,000 square feet floor space, or about 4 times the present office on Herzog Place. Mollitor's report shows that at the beginning of 1948 there were 2500 homes receiving city home delivery in this community. (continued on page 14)

ABOUT INCORPORATION: Village Govt Closer to People, Can Cost Less, Mayor Tells Civics

HICKSVILLE — An incorporated village government is closer to the people — more responsive to their needs and requirements, Mayor Joseph Nohowec of Mineola told a full-house audience at the Civic Association meeting, Thursday night. More than 150 people attended the session in the firehouse.

meets two evenings monthly, welcomes all who wish to speak to the board to appear. In contrast, town and county boards meet on weekday mornings and no one may address the county Board of Supervisors unless they are on the agenda for the day, he said.

"I feel, personally, that a village government is closer to the people," he asserted, comparing it with a school board. He traced the history of village government in Mineola since its creation in 1908, discussed its taxes as compared with a typical property owner in Hicksville, and answered numerous questions.

Forum In April
Nohowec has been mayor of Mineola for 17 years, trustee for two years and served 2 two-year terms as chief and assistant chief. He was accompanied by the Mineola corporation counsel and village clerk.

Mineola today owns property and installations, not including fire apparatus and other automotive equipment, valued at \$2,350,000, he said. Residents pay \$10.40 per \$1000 village taxes against \$14.20 paid for the same services by the Hicksville property owners.

Stephen Smatiak, program chairman, announced that a debate on incorporation will feature the Apr. 27 meeting, presented by members of the Public Speaking Class of the Adult Education program.

Nohowec, answering a direct question from Civic President Lawrence A. Roman, said that if he were a Hicksville resident today he would favor incorporation. He cited the fact that town government must make laws for an entire township and sometimes locally needed regulations would be unnecessary for the entire town.

Bethpage Doubles Dimes March Goal

MINEOLA — Bethpage more than doubled its quota in the 1950 Nassau March of Dimes campaign but Hicksville fell short of its goal, according to final reports for the mid-Island area released this week by Mrs. George A. Stevenson, chairman for the county.

Bethpage, with Mrs. Pete Curcio in charge raised \$3,516 with a goal of \$1,500. Hicksville, led by Mrs. Arthur Aracil, contributed \$1,225 with a quota of \$2,000. Island Trees, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Thomas Zinzi raised \$240 more than its assignment of \$1,000.

Plainview hit its quota right on the nose, raising \$500 under the chairmanship of Mrs. Alfred Stauber. Farmingdale, with Mrs. Joseph DeMarco and Mrs. Edward Quinn in charge, raised only \$2,023 with a goal of \$3,000. Bethpage collections included Syosset and Woodbury, it was noted.

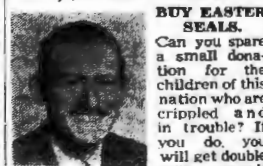
Munch Appoints Board of Tellers

Census to Start Here Saturday

BETHPAGE—Census enumerators will start making the 1950 Federal count of the population this Saturday, Apr. 1, and only eight questions will be asked of all individuals when the census taker calls at local homes, according to Frederick D. Webber, district supervisor. He has his office at the US Naval storehouse here.

The eight inquiries will be made concerning every person with the name, relationship to head of household, race, sex, age, marital status, state or country of birth, and citizenship status. The remainder of the questions will be asked only of a sample of persons, selected by chance according to the order in which their names fall on the census schedule.

Each enumerator has with him an identification card bearing the signature of the enumerator and identifying him as an employee of the census bureau, Webber warns. Housewives are urged to report to police any suspicious census takers who fail to show them official credentials. Imposters are

Sound Off News and Views of VFW Post 3211

We all know that our drive for new members hasn't been moving along very fast of late. Some of the new members are doing a bang-up job insofar as enrolling a member now and then, but honestly, fellows, we have to do more than that. I believe that we should give the members an incentive or a bonus to get out and work.

IN OUR OPINION:

Can't Grow Lawn on Patch of Sand

THE FEEBLE DISTRIBUTION of topsoil around some of the new homes in the mid-island section has become a matter of great interest for last fall and winter purchasers who are now struggling to plant lawns and gardens.

A couple of weeks ago in our department, "What's Your Problem," we gave an off-hand answer to a question about topsoil. By off-hand, we mean the answer simply cited the town ordinance regarding topsoil stripping operations, requiring a 6-inch minimum depth be left behind.

As a result of our answer, a new home owner in Hicksville called the Town Clerk's office and tried to follow the matter further. She was referred to the Building Department. The Building Department at Oyster Bay seemed astonished at the mere thought of a regulation about topsoil in connection with home construction and professed general ignorance of any regulations.

For our part, we dug up a copy of the Town of Oyster Bay Topsoil Ordinance, dated Dec. 18, 1945, and re-read it several times. We have also consulted with Councilman Frank Chlumsky and he says "we (the town) have no jurisdiction" if a developer wants to cart off most or all the topsoil on the tract where he is building houses.

There has been a great deal said in recent weeks about Levitt and Sons and their advance into the Township and School District No. 17. We have seen nothing in print locally criticizing Mr. Levitt as a builder — he certainly gives fair value to the home purchaser. We would like to add, in connection with topsoil, that Mr. Levitt's bulldozers back the topsoil before he starts construction and then, when the houses are finished, redistributes all the soil about the buildings.

But not so some of the builders in Hicksville today. They have heaped the soil in huge mountains and sold the bulk of it to dealers in such merchandise. One contractor, at least, has offered to sell some of his pile to a new home owner at \$40 a load. Other prices range upward from \$15.



Now the Town Ordinance, which we have quoted before in connection with sandpits, pens with a commendable statement of policy. It stated simply and clearly that it is the Town Board's policy to prevent all manner of excavations which "cause soil erosion, which depletes the land of its natural vegetative cover and supply of organic material, renders such land unproductive and unsuitable for agricultural purposes and undesirable for building homes."

Section 2 of ordinance reads: "No excavation for purposes other than the construction of a wall, driveway, sidewalk, building or part thereof, or as permitted by Section 9 of this Article, shall be commenced except in conformity with the provisions of this Article."

The Ordinance establishes strict rules for general topsoil stripping.

Section 9 reads: "Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall require a person to obtain a permit for or prevent a person from removing topsoil from one part of his lands to another part of the same premises when such removal is necessary as an accessory use or is made for the purpose of farming or improving said property."

We can expect to hear a great deal more on this earthy subject in the weeks to come. Certainly if the topsoil ordinance is not strong enough to require that adequate topsoil be left around new homes, then the building code of the town should be immediately amended to cover such requirements.

You can't grow a decent lawn on 1 1/2 inches of soil. You can't grow flowers or vegetables successfully on barren sand. Take a look at the grounds of new houses around Lee Ave.

Pays To Be Born In Nassau

DR. EARLE G. BROWN, Nassau County Health Commissioner, has said on occasions that if a baby could choose its place of birth, it would pick Nassau — because of the extremely favorable infant mortality rate (number of deaths of infants under 1 year of age per 1,000 live births) which prevails here.

The State Department recently released a map showing counties of the State and the average annual infant mortality rate for each for the 5-year period 1944-48. Nassau County was the lowest rate recorded at 24.0, and 10 per cent lower than the rate for the next county (Tompkins) having the next best record.

- Q. What are the minimum floor space requirements for homes in this community?
- A. Oyster Bay Township Laws require a minimum habitable ground floor space of 900 square feet for houses in Class A residential zone, 850 for Class B, 800 for Class C, 750 for Class C-1, 700 for Class D, and 650 for Class E.
- Q. What is the significance of the Founders Day Costume Dance planned by the Hicksville Civic Assoc?
- A. The present-day site of Hicksville was bought

from the Indians by Robert Williams on May 20, 1648. On May 20th of 1948 the community celebrated the 300th anniversary of this purchase and a gala community costume dance was held that year in connection with other week-long festivities. The Civic Assoc repeated the event in 1949 and will continue it annually to celebrate Founder's Day. The event has been written into the Constitution of the organization. Admission will be open to all wearing a costume. It will be held in the high school gym.

- A. The area today known as Bethpage was Central Park before the residents changed the name a dozen years ago. This was done by petitions to the Post Office Dept. and Long Island Rail Road.
- Q. What ever happened to the proposed Helicopter Airmail Service plan?
- A. Hearings were held in New York recently. It will next go to the Civil Aeronautics Board for oral argument.
