Columbia Report Suggests 5 Steps; Predicts 5,600 Students by 1958

HICKSVILLE—This community may be called upon to spend almost \$7,000,000 during the next ten years for the purchase of land and construction of new school buildings needed to accommodate the growing student population of the district. That is the summary conclusion of the Columbia Report which was presented to a handful of interested residents, Thursday night, at a public meeting.

The 63-page data-packed Report which includes 18 charts, seven tables and eight maps was officially turned over to the Board of Education by Dr. Felix J. McCormick, associate director of the study. The Report is divided into six chapters, the titles of which give a clue to its scope:

I—The community of Hicksville; II—School enrollments; III—The School plant; IV—Educational objectives and school plants facilities; V—Conclusions and recommendations; and VI—Financing the school building program.

Start Made Already

Based upon Interim Reports made to the Board of Education by Dr. McCormick and Dr. Henry H. Linn, director of the survey, initial progress has been made. The Board has engaged an architect to prepare plans for an extension on East St. School and is offering to public vote, tonight, the question of purchasing 10 acres off Lee Ave. for a new elementary school building.

The voters will be asked within the coming few months to decide upon (a) bond issue to cover enlargement of East St. School, (b) purchase of three tracts of land from Levitt and Sons for school sites in the southwest corner of the district where 3800 homes are (continued on page 12)

Decide on Bus, Land Purchase Tonight; Board Seeks Opinion on Distances

HICKSVILLE—About 800 persons are expected to vote tonight (Wednesday) at the high school auditorium on two propositions. There are 1,365 persons registered and qualified to vote. The meeting starts at 8 o'clock and concludes at midnight.

Besides voting upon (1) proposed purchase of Lee Ave. property for an elementary school site at a cost of \$35,000 and (2) appropriation of \$20,000 from anticipated surplus for transportation of elementary school students starting in September, the voters

will be asked to express their opinions in an informal poll.

A questionnaire will be handed each voter asking for opinions on suggested distances for transportation (ie, half mile, three-quarters of mile, or one mile from schools) and upon class groups (ie, Kindergarten to 6th grade and kindergarten to 3rd grade).

The Citizen's Bus Committee plans to put on a strong campaign today to get out the vote. A sound truck will be at the depot to meet commuter trains tonight and remind them of the balloting. (Editorial comment on page 4).

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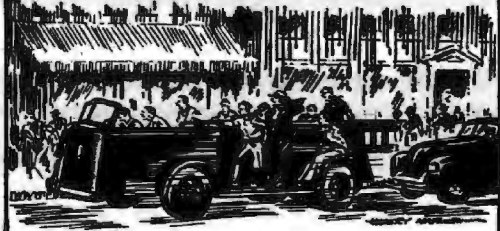
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Sound Off News and Views of VFW Post 3211

IN OUR OPINION:

Vote 'Yes' on Both Questions

THERE ARE TWO questions on the ballot tonight (Wednesday) at the special meeting of Hicksville School District. There are 1,565 persons registered and qualified to vote on these questions. A "yes" vote upon each question is strongly recommended, and it is hoped that a large percentage of the voters will express their will.



The first proposal concerns purchase of property near the corner of Lee Ave. and South Broadway for a new elementary school. You need only to glance thru the recommendations of the Columbia experts (see page 1) to discover that we are confronted with a tremendous school housing problem that is going to fall upon us like a load of bricks within a matter of months. Purchase of this site is logical and necessary. It is only the first tiny step toward attempting to head off the problems and headaches ahead.

The site appear adequate and the price, we are told by realty men, is fair.

The second proposal is the much-discussed and disputed school transportation question. Everyone agrees that some transportation is needed. The disagreement comes in deciding the degree of such service to be provided. May we stress that the vote tonight concerns only approval of the question of providing service? The decision as to who shall be carried and for what distance remains—as it always has—in the hands of the school board.

The Board is going to solicit your opinion tonight on this question, informally. After you vote you will be handed a sheet and asked to mark it indicating your opinion on what distance from the three grade schools transportation should begin. Some say a half-mile, others three-quarters of a mile, and others a mile or more. The sampling of opinion, with the cooperation of the voters, should prove a valuable guide to the Board.

Hicksville District must provide transportation next fall. Look at the map on our front page. The Levitt houses are being built in the southwest corner of the district. The nearest grade school is Nicholai, something like two miles or more at the farthest

A Timely Warning

A WARNING to owners of Long Island acreage to "beware" was sounded this week by a Herald reader. He charges, based upon his own sorrowful experience, that some unscrupulous out of town real estate speculators who are being aided in their efforts to make a killing by certain local people who might normally be expected to protect their client's best interests.

Our reader, who is today a wiser but perhaps poorer man, insists that the local people involved are of professional or semi-professional standing. He hopes and trusts that a word of warning at this time may save others from the same costly experience. He claims that his experience has been duplicated by other former mid-Island acreage owners with whom he has compared notes.

point, from this building. All the children expected in this section alone, come September, will not fit in Nicholai, and therefore some will have to go to East St. School, which is scheduled for an early addition. Thus the distance is increased.

To ask children from the kindergarten and up to the 3rd and even 6th grades to walk more than a mile each way to school, in view of the increasing local highway traffic in all directions, is to invite injury and tragedy.

The decision tonight is clear-cut, as far as the voters are concerned. The School Board will have to carry the ball from that point.

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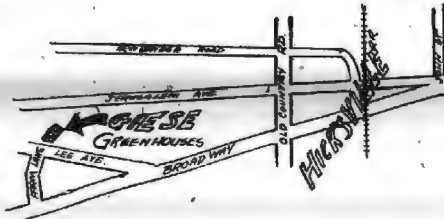

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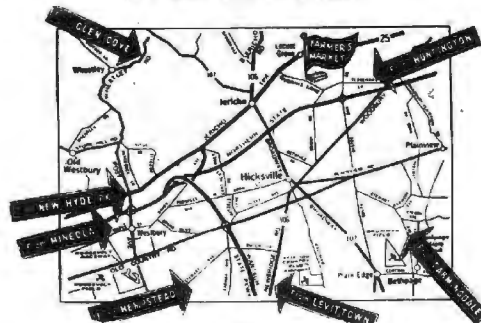

Columbia Report: 5 Steps, 10 Years

(continued from page 1) rapidly being built; and (c) approve a bond issue for the Lee Ave. school construction.

The Herald is preparing to publish in detail excerpts from the Columbia Report for the information of district voters. Copies of the Report will also be on file at the Hicksville Free Public Library, with members of the school board, school principals and other authorities.

The Report emphasizes that Hicksville is confronted with tremendous growth and expansion in the months immediately ahead. The present population is estimated at 11,700 persons which is expected to leap to 22,200 persons by next year. As many as 1,000 new dwellings (200 by Levitt, 700 by other builders) may be erected in the community before December of this year.

The community may develop ultimately into an area, with a population of 35,000 to 40,000 persons by 1960.

With population gaining 100 per cent in 12 months or less, the Report estimates student enrollment will also spurt. Therefore, the experts forecast, there will be as many as 5,600 pupils in local schools by 1958 and a peak of 8,500 by 1960.

Outline Five Steps
Five steps are recommended for action: The first includes enlargement of East St. School (at least 12 more classrooms), purchase of Lee Ave. site and construction of school there with 20 classrooms.

The second step calls for construction of two more 20-room elementary schools, one on Old Country Rd. (next to Norbrook) and the other on Dutch Lane (Hempstead Ave.), to be ready for use by Sept. 1952.

The third step provides for two more elementary schools, 20-room buildings, one down near the township line (behind Dante City), and the second on the Bergold property (already owned by district) on Newbridge Rd.

The fourth step (by 1955) suggests a new senior high school on the Bergold property (which will have to be enlarged).

The fifth step (by 1958) is a present high school for use or construction of a junior high in the north part of the district.

"The recommended and suggested projects described in this chapter of the Report constitute the major part of the proposed long-term school building program for Hicksville, as viewed by the survey staff on the basis of evidence and data now available," the Report states: "The need for the acquisition of a number of sites and the construction of elementary schools listed in Steps 1 and 2 seem quite clear at this time, but subsequent steps may have to be modified if community developments do not follow the (possible) pattern assumed in this report. It is suggested that a continual study of local residential construction, school census and local birth figures, be maintained so that estimates presented in this Report can be revised whenever new data becomes available."

Among the facts which add to the problems for the school district, the Report notes, are its present legal limitation upon bonding and the present pattern of assessments. The district is now assessed at about \$20,000,000 which would allow it to issue bonds up to \$2,000,000. Thus the progress of the program will depend upon the rate of increased local total assessment. To issue

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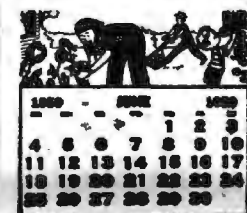

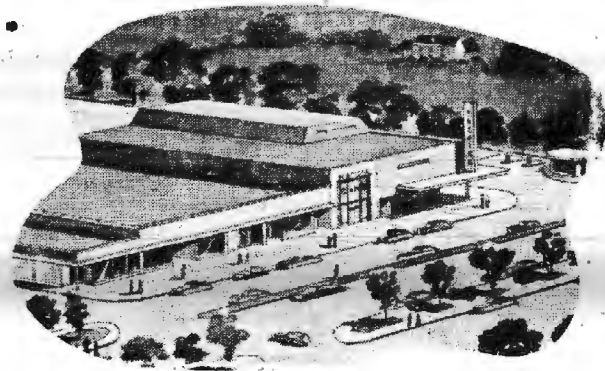

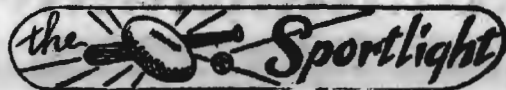
