New Residents Carry 4 School Questions

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education plans to proceed almost immediately with a call for bids upon the construction of additions to East St. elementary school which will increase its capacity almost 100 per cent. A handful of voters, the majority of them from the Levitt houses in the south part of Hicksville, gave their approval to the bond issues to cover the cost of the additions last Wednesday night.

Total votes cast: 327
 Prop. No. 1—Extensions for East St. School at cost of \$400,000. 255 yes, 44 no.
 Prop. No. 2—For purchase of site for Dutch Lane School at cost of \$33,000. 218 yes, 84 no.
 Prop. No. 3—For purchase of site for Old Country Rd. school at cost of \$35,000. 223 yes, 79 no.
 Prop. No. 4—For purchase of site for South Hicksville School (on Folk Lane) at cost of \$30,000. 261 yes, 60 no.

With 1,947 persons registered and qualified, 327 turned out during the approximately 4-hour period set aside for voting. Of the total more than 60 per cent voting were from South Hicksville.

4 to 1 Approval

Four propositions representing total bond issues of over a half million dollars were approved almost 4 to 1. More "no" votes were cast on the Dutch Lane and Old Country Rd. school sites (continued on page 14)

Brandt Promises New Inlets for Area

OYSTER BAY—John R. Brandt, town highway superintendent, today promised the installation of two inlets to carry the water off Frank Homes development streets "just as soon as we can spare the men for the job." The town board approved the Hicksville project, Tuesday.

It was the first time in Brandt's experience that a sump or recharge basin had overflowed, he told the Herald, referring to the basin at the end of Lee Ave.

which apparently handles all the surface drainage for Frank, Halstone and Ronald home areas. Installation of new inlet pipes would speed flow of water from those streets into the basin, he explained.

"We have undertaken more drainage work this year than ever before in the history of the Township," Brandt declared, "and we have more to do." He added that the next town budget will have to include more money for such

work. Meanwhile, residents of the area of Lee Ave., Fairview Court and vicinity found themselves flooded for the second time in a week, Sunday.

Incumbents Seek Re-Election to Water Board at District Vote Next Wednesday

HICKSVILLE — Resident taxpayers of the water district will vote next Wednesday night, Aug. 30, at the Courthouse at Heitz Pl. and Bay Ave., between 7 and 9 p. m. for two commissioners of the district. Harry Borley and Lawrence W. Bevan, incumbents whose terms expire, are candidates for re-election.

Persons who are residents for 30 days before the election and are owners of property appearing on the last County assessment roll are qualified to vote.

Borley, incumbent chairman of the Board, is completing his third 3-year term. He has long been active in community affairs, has been a member of the volunteer fire department for 23 years. He

is former captain of Co. No. 5, past department chief, past president of the Nassau County Firemen's Association and past president of the Nassau County Fire Chief's Council. He is a member of the Civic Association.

Bevan was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of his father, Lawrence W. Bevan Sr. A commissioner will be elected to fill out the term which expires one year hence.

"It has been a privilege to serve Hicksville as a commissioner of the water district and I would appreciate the opportunity to continue in this capacity, always acting in accordance with the best interest of the taxpayer," Bevan said last night.

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Board Explains Proposed School Project; Harbes Cites Objections

PLAINVIEW — Voters of this school district will vote upon the plan of the School Board this Friday night, Aug. 25, at Mammetto Hills Schoolhouse for construction of a \$160,000 temporary-type of building on the present school site.

About 50 persons turned out last Friday night for a discussion meeting on the project.

Joseph Arena, board president, disclosed that Dr. Wilson of the State Education Department had on the previous Tuesday given his approval to the plans of the School Board to build a 7-room structure which will stand about 35 feet from the present building.

Cost Includes Fixtures

He described the building as flat-roof structure 162 x 56, which will consist of 5 classrooms and a playground of two units. The estimated price covers the complete project, including furniture, heating, blackboards, etc. The floor will be concrete covered with Kentele and raised above the ground.

It will be built largely of cinder-block with an all-window frontage and red brick trim.

Answering questions from the audience, Board members said the State Department would not approve construction of anything else less than a 14-room building at a cost of \$500,000 on the site recently purchased with voter approval near the Plainview Country Homes and Briar Park developments. Erection of the temporary building, apparently okay for the present site, would not be permitted by the State Education Department on the site in the west section of the district.

The temporary building is expected to be in use for the next five to ten years. It was brought out that home construction has slowed down as a result of the Korean situation making a 14-room school unnecessary in the "immediate future."

If the building program is not approved Friday night, it was warned at the meeting, local students will have to be sent out of the district with one class going to Woodbury and another to Syosset. The building will care for

Commissioner to Hear Harbes Appeal Aug. 30

ALBANY—The State Commissioner of Education will hold a hearing here on Wednesday afternoon, Aug. 29, at 2 PM upon the appeal of John G. Harbes disputing the election of Plainview School Trustees. It was revealed today by Thomas F. Hyland, attorney for Harbes. Last week Howard T. Hegaa, attorney for the school district, asked the state to hold the hearing "as promptly as possible" adding "the new Board of Education has proceeded diligently with the plans for the new elementary school which is desperately needed in this school district and if there is to be any question on the validity of proposed bonds, it is important to the district as a whole that an early hearing be held."

The bid is on the basis of \$33.50 per bus per day, the School Board revealed. No information on the number of buses required, location of stops, etc. is anticipated until the term begins.

HICKSVILLE — The Sister Kenny Foundation fund campaign is underway in Hicksville-Jericho today with a large committee of prominent citizens serving under the chairmanship of Charles H. Stoll. A meeting of volunteers was held Monday night at Stoll's law offices.

PLAINVIEW — John G. Harbes, former member of the School Board, today predicted the defeat of the proposal to build a \$160,000 temporary-type school on the grounds near the present building.

"Parents of small children who will be going to school will not be in favor of this cold-as-death concrete floor-type school for their little ones," he asserted. "The taxpayers who have no children are not in favor of a temporary type school either because they know that in the long run it will be an extra added expense for the district. They also know the interest rate for a bond issue will be higher than upon a permanent school."

"They also know that a temporary school lowers the value of the district and the value of every home in it."

Harbes summarized arguments against the proposal which will be voted upon this Friday night, Aug. 25, at the schoolhouse: "higher interest rate, additional transportation costs, extra inconvenience to children and parents, destruction of the only park and recreation field in the community which will have to be reestablished at 'tremendous cost' to the taxpayers at a later date"

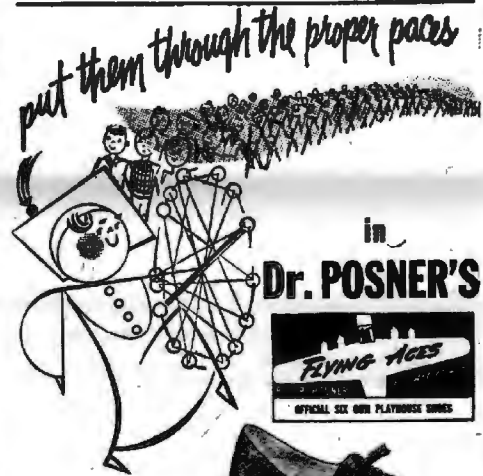
HICKSVILLE—The Post Office will change its address from Herzog Pl. to North Broadway, near James St., over the Labor Day weekend, it was learned today.

Shall We Incorporate?

Police, Road Costs

The HERALD, in cooperation with the Information Division of the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville, will publish this department regularly in an effort to bring its readers a full discussion of this question. The HERALD invites comments and questions on this subject in writing.—Editor.

Ques.—Will we have extra taxes to pay to set up a local police department in an incorporated village?

Many incorporated villages in Nassau, including Farmingdale, Westbury, Mineola, etc., use the services of the Nassau County Police Dept. just as we have it today. There would be no increase in tax. We would pay the same tax (\$3.80 per \$1000 valuation) as is paid by Hicksville property owners at present.

Ques.—Won't it certainly cost more to operate a local highway department when we have to take over the maintenance of roads and streets now under the town highway department?

Last year the property owners in Hicksville School District (the area it is proposed to incorporate) paid for town highway purposes \$66,279 or 17 per cent of the amount paid by the entire township.

It is believed that a local public works department for the incorporated village of Hicksville could be operated for this amount or less, including the amortization of bonds on road equipment to be purchased, employment of men, etc.

The research committee has found that Floral Park Village, with 28 miles of streets, does the job for \$38,000 a year, Mineola has 37 miles of streets and it costs \$64,000, Farmingdale has 12 miles of village streets and spends \$41,000, including street lighting and parking field expenses.

The Committee has not been able to get a figure from the Town highway dept. on the mileage of town roads in Hicksville.

Pupils Enter New School in January

BETHPAGE—A heavy shower cut short the formal program for the laying of the cornerstone for the new elementary school, here, Saturday afternoon. Almost 200 persons gathered in front of the building to witness the ceremonies. It is expected the structure will be ready for occupancy in January.

Victor L. Miller, supervising principal, was master of ceremonies at the exercises. Frederick Kraemer, board president, officiated at the laying of the stone declaring "I want to express my thanks to each member of the Board of Education for his work in connection with this task and to the people of Bethpage School District who have supported the Board wholeheartedly. Without the encouragement and support of our people this fine structure would not be possible."

Big Gym, Auditorium

Described as one of the most modern school structures in the country, it consists of 20 general classrooms, modern well-equipped library, auditorium with 800-seating capacity, gym larger than Hicksville High School, cafeteria, special rooms for music, home-making, shop and science. It will house about 650 pupils.

"Our old school was built about 1910 and an addition was added in 1924," Kramer recalled. "During the past 10 years our school district population has increased nearly 100 per cent (to over 5,000). We have been fortunate in having in our district several large industries, first and foremost of which is the Grumman Corp. These industries have provided work for our people and have brought to Bethpage hundreds of new families who have made their homes here. As a result of this growth, our school facilities had to be increased to keep pace with the current day developments.

"Even with this new school costing nearly one and a half million dollars, our school tax rate for the ensuing year will be \$1.63 which is considerably less than in some of our surrounding districts. Our faculty consists of 21 classroom teachers and six special teachers and a supervising principal."

Copy of Herald In Cornerstone Box Along With Record of Community Life

BETHPAGE—A copy of the Mid-Island HERALD has been sealed in the metal box within the cornerstone of the new million and a half dollar elementary school, here, along with other records of today's community. Frederick Kramer, president of the school board, placed the HERALD within the box just before it was cemented into position.

Other items in the cornerstone include: list of all the students who will attend this fall, list of faculty, autographed picture of Board of Education, list of officials of Bethpage including commissions and boards, copy of the bid, notice to bidders, sample of bond which if legal would be worth \$1,000, copy of the day's program, copy of original circular on the project, copy of annual report of School Board, 1950-51 budget, Farmingdale commencement exercises schedule, copy of current day's issue of N. Y. Times and N. Y. News, some material supplied by the Catholic Church, etc.

James "Happy" Norman, clerk of the works, took over with a trowel to firmly set the stone permanently in position. The trowel will be silver plated and preserved in the new building.

The Rev. James Taylor, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, opened the ceremonies with a prayer. The Rev. Michael Hartigan, pastor of St. Martin of Tours Catholic Church, gave the benediction in the midst of the down-pour which abbreviated the program.

Halsey Knapp, director of the Long Island Agricultural and Technical Institute at Farmingdale, was principal speaker. Education and schooling, he said, ranks high in the planning and thinking of free men. Men should have access to the truth to make them free. He congratulated the community.

Cites Cooperative Effort
John W. Chisholm, district superintendent, said, "this building represents the highest acme of cooperative effort." He paid tribute to Charles W. B. Schwarz and Henry Strauber and other former board members.

Principal Miller introduced

Kramer as "the man who has carried the ball on the Board over the past years" in bringing the project to completion.

The Grumman Battalion, U. S. N. R., band played several musical selections. The band was there on direct orders of Jake Swirbul, Grumman president.

After the exercises those present were invited to tour the first floor of the structure which had been cleared for inspection. All community organizations were represented including public officials, veterans, firemen, clubs and societies.

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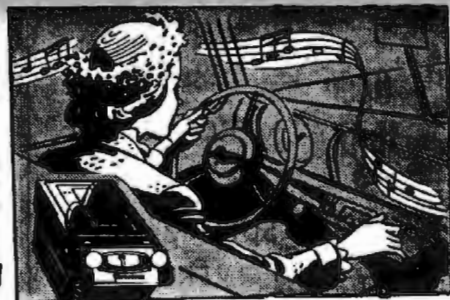

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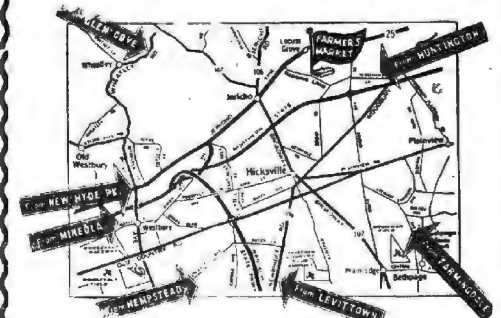

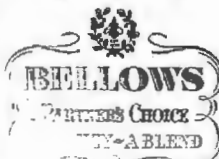

which total 37.6 acres than on the South Hicksville site purchase and East St. additions.

Less than 100 persons were present when Henry C. Brengel, school board president, called the meeting to order at 8:10 P. M. Wednesday. After District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer read the call of the meeting, Fred J. Noeth was duly nominated and elected chairman of the evening.

Board members found the very light turnout "disappointing" in view of the large amount of money involved and the general importance of the issues at stake.

Apple Graham Pudding

1/4 cup Graham cracker crumbs	1 package vanilla pudding powder
2 teaspoons cold butter or margarine	1 cup Fat Milk
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon	1 cup sweetened applesauce, cooked or canned

Mix crumbs with butter and cinnamon. Put pudding powder into saucepan. Stir in slowly mixture of milk and water. Heat to boiling, stirring all the time. Cook slowly and stir 30 seconds. Remove from heat; add applesauce. Put into 4 dessert dishes. Top with crumb mixture. Keep chilled until serving time.
