Harbes Answers Arena Comment

PLAINVIEW—John G. Garbes, former member of the school board, this week replied to the comment, "Go ask Mr. Harbes," made following the defeat of a proposed temporary school in the district.

His statement to the Herald, made yesterday, follows:

"Mr. Joseph Arena's statement which appeared in your issue of Aug. 30, 1950, clearly shows that Mr. Arena does not seem to realize that he, as a trustee, is charged under the law to provide education for the children of the district he represents and shows in his statement that he is shunning such responsibility.

"Every fair-thinking person in the district can fully understand that it did not make any difference which way the people voted on the proposition which was held on the 25th day of August because from that day to the day of opening school is only six working days. So what can be accomplished in respect to building (continued on page 15)

The Island Trees Civic Assoc. is bringing the action represented by John Galardi, attorney. The petitioners want to be included in the Bethpage Fire District.

There are 269 homes which want to be excluded from the Levittown District, which does not become effective until Jan. 1. At the present time this area is under the protection of the Wantagh District.

Cites Complaints
The lengthy petition filed by Galardi for the civic group recites numerous complaints and grievances. It charges the Hempstead Town Board acted "capriciously" in creating the district when it failed to consider the petitions of those who did not want to be in the new district, making its decision in a matter of minutes at the public hearing on Apr. 11.

The petition states that there are about 410 Miller homes in the section with about 100 already within the Bethpage Fire District. It points out that Bethpage has a fully equipped department, able to serve the area; whereas, (continued on page 13)

LEVITTOWN—The people in Hicksville who are promoting incorporation of the community have "rocks in their heads, tax-wise" by planning to include in the village Levitt built houses in school district 17, a special rally was told here this week by James M. Pedowitz, president of the Levittown Property Owners Assoc.

"Purely on sentimental grounds Hicksville wants to incorporate," Pedowitz asserted. "A group in Hicksville with a mistaken sense of community pride has decided that the only way to stop being swallowed up was to incorporate. I don't know what they have to gain, except a lot of headaches." Community Pride Attacked

There is no reason, he told the audience at the Abbey Lane School, for the homes north of the Township line being "in Hicksville." The rally was held by the LPOA for the residents of houses built by Levitt & Sons in Hicksville, north of the Hempstead-Oyster Bay Township line.

While Pedowitz assailed the mistaken sense of community pride by Hicksville people trying to maintain their boundary, he told the audience they should be proud to live in Levittown and be a part of it.

He blasted the "incessant prop- (Continued on Page 3)

Civics Adopt Name 'North Levittown'

HICKSVILLE — The North Levittown Homeowners' Committee, a group of residents in Levitt houses north of the Township line who were known as a temporary committee for organization of a civic group among homeowners' in South Hicksville scarcely 24 hours before, presented a petition to School Superintendent E. H. LeBarron on Friday for a change in the school bus routes.

The changes suggested a route from Newbridge to Jerusalem Ave. on Bus D, via Spindle Rd. and Table Lane. The petition tossed down the gauntlet, as far as the Committee is concerned, as to what the area is called. "This (new route) will provide service for children living in the area bounded approximately by Spindle Rd., Newbridge Rd., Lantern Lane and Jerusalem Ave., Levittown, not served by the existing routes," it stated.

Strangely, the petition, signed by Roy Deets, as secretary of the Committee, ignores the new residents in Levitt-built houses also north of the boundary line, but east of Jerusalem Ave. and west of Newbridge Rd.

A spokesman for the School Board told the Herald that the board will try to make adjustments in stops on bus routes to fit the new developments and growth in the district which took place during the summer recess.

HICKSVILLE — The 22nd Annual Labor Day Firemen's Tournament, Monday, was one of the most successful in recent years with more than 13,000 spectators on hand for the morning parade and 10,000 present to witness the contests on New South Rd. The weatherman proved himself a real friend of volunteer firemen when advance predictions of rain failed to materialize.

Westerners Are Victors

The Westerners of West Hempstead took top honors for the day with 15.5 points followed by the Oyster Bay Rough Riders in second place with 13 points. Yellow Hornets of Hempstead with 12 points. East Meadow with 11.5 points and Great Neck Alerts with 10 points.

Parade prizes included first award for most men in line to Freeport (140) and second went to Oceanside with (133). Port Washington was judged the best appearing with over 50 men and Alberton the best appearing under 50 men. 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2 Banks Jointly Buy Lee Ave Site Bonds

HICKSVILLE—A bond issue of \$35,000 of the school district for the purchase of the Lee Ave. elementary school site has been acquired jointly by the Long Island National Bank and the Bank of Hicksville with a low bid of 1.20 per cent interest.

There were five bids received on the issue with the interest range from 1.20 to 1.60.

Preliminary sketches for the proposed building have been submitted to the School Board by Knappa and Johnson, architects, who hope to have preliminary plans ready for State Education Dept. approval shortly.

When Albany approves, a bond issue question on the Lee Ave. school will be submitted to the voters of the district. The 10-acre site on Lee Ave. is near the intersection of South Bway.

Meanwhile, drawings for the East St. school additions are almost ready for final approval by the State Dept. before a call for bids on the \$400,000 project is issued.

aganda that you are in Hicksville when you are not." Pedowitz confessed, "you can become a part of Hicksville if you want to. You can join the group that is trying to incorporate Hicksville. Then you can put up big signs on the highways, instead of little signs, saying it is Hicksville."

"Levittown is a community in fact if not in law. Perhaps some day we may become a legal entity."

"People in Hicksville," he continued, "are hurting themselves in several ways by alienating affections. There is no reason for antagonisms to start at all and it should cease right here and now."

May Go Into North Hempstead
Levittown is known as a far larger community than Hicksville ever will be, the speaker said. It is unique and has received nationwide publicity. It is now in two townships, he continued, and may go into a third (North Hempstead) if it crosses Old Country Rd. just west of the Wantagh Parkway. The area is now known as New Cassel.

"You thought you bought a house in Levittown," he told the audience. His basic argument was that where Levitt builds is Levin, own. There were about 200 persons present at the start of the meeting but about half the total had drifted out by the time the question period started at 10 o'clock. Pedowitz spoke for more than an hour and a half, outlining the government of the county and townships and special districts.

The Herald editorials on the subject were mentioned several times during the evening.

Maurice Schoenwald, chairman of the temporary committee of 10 named to consider formation of a special civic group for the area of Levitt houses in Oyster Bay Township (South Hicksville) spoke briefly at the conclusion of the meeting.

 - 6—NAME AND ADDRESS—Print plainly on back of entry.
 - 7—CLOSING DATE — Must be received by the Herald by Nov. 30, 1950.
 - 8—OWNERSHIP—All entries become the property of the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville.
 - 9—JUDGING—A poll taken by the Herald will determine the winner.
 - 10—PRIZE—Winner receives \$10 cash award immediately, plus \$50 in cash when Hicksville becomes incorporated.
- SUGGESTIONS—A simple shape such as a circle, oval or shield is recommended. Try to include a suggestion of Hicksville's historical past; for instance, its purchase by Robert Williams from the Indians. The seal should be simple and appropriate. The idea and design of the seal are more important than perfection in drawing. Uhlein Gets On Ballot But Bevan Wins One-Year Term On Water Board, 177-41

HICKSVILLE—Incumbents were re-elected commissioners of the Water District, last Wednesday night, when 256 persons cast their ballots at the Courthouse. Louis H. Uhlein of Murray Rd. was successful in getting his name upon the ballot with a fast-minute petition but failed to muster enough votes to win.

Harry Borley, unopposed, was re-elected for a three-year term. He received 188 votes. There were 19 void and 39 blank ballots for this position.

Laurence W. Bevan Jr. was elected for a one-year term, getting 177 ballots. Uhlein received 41 votes in a contest for this office. There were 19 ballots void and 26 blank.

It was the first contest for water commissioner in the past several years, although the post has been strongly contested over the years with as many as 600

votes cast in an evening. Bevan asked the Herald to publish this statement:

"I want to thank the people of Hicksville for the support given me in the recent election for water commissioner. I will discharge all duties of the office to uphold the confidence that has been placed in me."

Uhlein said the day after the election: "I would like to thank all my neighbors and friends who took enough interest to come out and vote for me last night at the Courthouse for the election of water commissioner of Hicksville. I also want to thank everyone else who attended and was civic-minded enough to come out and vote."

Borley expressed his public thanks for the support he received at the polls on Wednesday.

Bevan and Borley took office immediately for the new terms.

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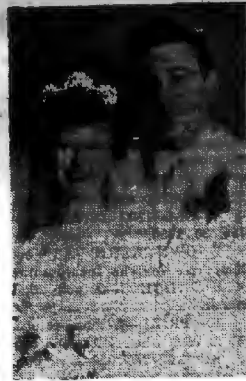

The members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars are determined that the sacrifices of hundreds of thousands of their comrades in World War II shall not be voided by our failure to resist the Godless tyranny of Communism. Above all, we are resolved to bequeath to our children the blessed heritage of freedom and opportunity which we have enjoyed because of the unselfish sacrifices of every generation of Americans.

HOW PERMANENT IS A NAME?

Concern Apologizes for Mail Error

HICKSVILLE—A southern state medical products concern this week confessed it had "slipped up" in addressing Hicksville doctors by mail at "Levittown, N. Y." The letter received by Lawrence A. Roman, chairman of the Incorporation Committee, in answer to his protest, explained how it happened.

Physicians in Hicksville on Aug. 19 received sample packages of a soda drug from the C. B. Fleet Co. of Lynchburg, Va., addressed to them in "Levittown." The parcels were delivered promptly, even to street addresses in Hicksville business section, within blocks of the Post Office. Roman obtained a couple of the addressed labels and wrote C. B. Fleet Co. and the Postmaster General in Washington.

How It Can Happen

O. B. Newton Jr. answered Roman this week explaining just how simple it is to change the name of a community, although he didn't say just that. Newton wrote: "Our medical representative who has been detailing on Long Island for 25 years called on the doctors in Hicksville in March of this year and wrote us, 'Levittown is a new town. The old post office was Hicksville, but here is now a new post office.' Our representative is going to feel awful about this. Chances are he took the word of one or more doctors that the post office name HAD been changed, and did not wish to take up the valuable time of other doctors to verify his information."

The Fleet Co. also checked with the local postmaster. "He tells us that Levittown is only a branch post office of Hicksville," Newton added.

"Forgive us, please, and tell all the good people affected how sorry we are to have slipped on this one."

The concern is also writing every physician and dentist in Hicksville and Levittown asking them to return a self-addressed postcard stating his post office address.

Taxpayers will also vote on a proposition to purchase a \$2,600 tournament truck. The total budget calls for an expenditure of \$16,525.

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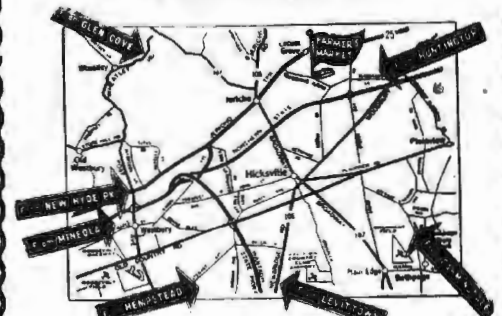

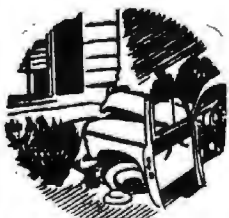

THE HOME HANDYMAN'S CORNER

By TOM CASHEL

REMODELING A FIREPLACE

Many a useful fireplace—particularly those in older homes—is disfigured by an ornate mantel and poor arrangement, or by a brick or tile facing out of all proportion to its size. Such a fireplace can usually be remodeled into a cozy and attractive center of interest for the room.

First, determine how much of the brick, tile, or stone facing you want to leave. This, of course, will depend upon the size and shape of the room. Since the brick or tile also serves as insulation, the facing should extend an adequate distance beyond the opening.

When you have removed the excess decoration, there are several methods of finishing the fireplace. A paneling of broad vertical boards may be set above the fireplace and allowed to extend downward along the sides, with an equal amount of space at the top and each side of the opening.

If the brick facing extends outward from the wall, the wood paneling may be finished flush with it. If not, a simple wood molding may be set around the edge of the paneling to finish it off.

Plywood or fireproof wall-board be applied in the same manner as the wood paneling. One advantage of these materials is that a single large sheet can usually be cut to fit, thus avoiding seams and joints.

If wood paneling is used, it is usually left in a natural finish, merely being shellacked or varnished after it has been properly sanded. Plywood may be treated in the same manner if the grain is sufficiently interesting. If not, it should be painted to match the general decorative scheme of the room.

Perma-Stone is a beautiful decoration and can be cemented directly to the brick. It comes in a variety of colors and the price is reasonable too.

In some rooms a mantel over the fireplace may be desirable. It should be made of the same material and finished in the same way as the new facing. The mantel may be set at whatever height you desire, but the modern trend is toward lower and more convenient mantels.

American Legionnaire

NEWS FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.—Rep. Dwight L. Rogers (D., Fla.), father of World War II terminal leave pay law, introduced H.R. 2292 to authorize VA to make mortgage, rent and civilian insurance payments for members of armed services . . . including WW II veterans recalled to active duty . . . whose ability to pay has been materially impaired by reason of military service.

Rogers' bill would amend soldiers' and sailors' Civil Relief Act of 1940 to permit VA to pay rental charges not in excess of \$100 a month . . . mortgage installment payments on obligations not in excess of \$20,000 . . . and premiums on all types of civilian insurance up to \$10,000 policy level.

All payments made by VA would become an indebtedness on the part of servicemen beneficiary . . . with repayment without interest spread over period equal to four times period during which VA made payments; for example, over four year period if VA made payments over one year period.

WW II veterans returning to active military duty . . . who have converted GI insurance to permanent form . . . may well find heavier premiums of permanent insurance severe financial strain during tour of duty.

Possible solutions for those who cannot, or do not wish to carry expense of converted policy during active service include:

(1) If policy has been converted more than one year . . . it could be cancelled out for accrued cash value . . . with serviceman, then applying for \$10,000 term insurance . . . to which he is entitled as member of armed forces . . . and which would give him full protection at considerably less cost.

(2) If policy has been converted less than one year . . . it could be cancelled on an extended insurance basis . . . which would keep policy in force for specified period . . . depending on length of time premiums had been paid on converted basis . . . without payment of any further premiums.

Danger in latter choice is that extended free insurance period might not have expired prior to insured's return to civilian status . . . in which case, he would be unable to take out another NSLI policy.

For that reason . . . if converted period is short of one year: by only few months . . . insured would probably be better off to meet premiums through to one-year date . . . then surrender policy for its cash value and take out term insurance.

Term insurance can then always be converted to permanent form after return to civilian life and more stable economic condition.

2 cups sliced lunch meat
2 sliced, hard-cooked eggs
1 can condensed cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup Pet Milk
