OPEN TO NON RESIDENTS, TOO: Enrollment Next Week For 33 Adult Courses

HICKSVILLE — Thirty-three courses are being offered in the fall term of the Adult Education Program of Hicksville School District, according to Director Elery H. Bean, with registration set for next Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, Sept. 26 and 27, from 7 to 9 p. m. in the high school gymnasium. Classes are held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, open to all adults, with preference to district residents.

"If 12 or more persons desire a

class in any subject not already in the program, we will add this class if an instructor is available," Bean said today.

"Sculpture under the guidance of Polygnos Vagis will be presented again this term in the program. Modeling for beginners will be stressed and any objects made at home can be brought to class for criticism by Mr. Vagis.

"GROUP piano should prove to be a novel class. Mrs. Mildred Boyd in charge of the class is a (continued on page 15)

Town Sets Hearing On Garbage District Extension Embracing South Hicksville

OYSTER BAY—The Town Board will hold a public hearing here on Tuesday morning, Sept. 26, at 10 o'clock upon the proposed extension of Hicksville Garbage District to embrace all the Levitt-built houses and other dwellings from the Hempstead-Oyster Bay Township boundary north to the present garbage district.

The hearing is being held upon a motion of the Town Board adopted at a meeting held Sept. 7.

Purpose of the hearing is to

"consider the extension and to hear all persons interested in the subject" . . . concerning the same and for such other action on the part of the Town Board as may be required by law or proper in the premises.

The Town Board on the same date will receive bids for the improvement of Herzog Rd., Hicksville, and for construction of a refuse disposal plant project for the Township at Locust Grove.

Albany Approves East Street Plans, Studies Emergency Aid Request

ALBANY—Approval on the final detailed plans for the addition of wings of East St. elementary school and for preliminary plans on the proposed Lee Ave. elementary school in Hicksville was given by State Dept. of Education, here, last week.

Members of the Hicksville School Board led by President Henry C. Brengel also made a plea for emergency State financial aid for the district. The Board consulted with Dr. A. W. Schmidt of the State Education Dept. on the state aid request.

The trustees were advised the plea is being given today.

Frank Gilson of the State Dept. Buildings and Grounds Division reviewed the plans for the East St. addition and new Lee Ave. build-

ing. Accompanying the board was Dr. E. H. LeBarron, school superintendent, and the architect for the buildings.

Last week hearings were taken on the East St. grounds for the footings of the proposed wings which will almost double the present capacity of the school.

HICKSVILLE — Four more teachers have been added to the public school faculty and several additional bus stops have been created, a spokesman for the Board of Education said this week.

CD Precaution: Fire Board Boosts Strength Of Companies, Lifts Age Limit

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Fire Commissioners this week took action to comply with the recommendations of Civilian Defense authorities of the county and state and directed that the five fire companies of the department increase their memberships.

A new limit for membership has been set at 40 men, compared with the previous limit of 35. At the same time, companies will be permitted to enroll as members not more than five men who are 35 to 45 years of age. The previous limitation of age was 35 years for all applicants.

Purpose of the new policy, aimed at being the total department membership up to 200 men, is to provide a fully-manned organization as men are called into the armed services or become unavailable due to increased defense work.

"We are increasing the department size to eliminate the necessity for an auxiliary fire unit such as was created in World War II," a spokesman for the fire board told the Herald. Auxiliary firemen are not protected by insurance, under present regulations, in event of injury.

The commissioners also announced that the annual inspection and parade of the department will take place on Oct. 14 at 7:30 p. m. Vincent W. Braun, Sr., is chairman of arrangements for the fire board. The ceremony will start with a public inspection in front of the firehouse.

The fire board made it known that plans for installation of additional alarm boxes, recently approved by voters, include about three boxes to be installed in Zelda Park section. Representatives of this area were present at the fire commissioner meeting last week with a petition asking for installation of signal boxes in their section.

Double Election Districts on Oct. 1 To Handle Increase in Population

HICKSVILLE—Election districts in this community will be doubled for election day in November, it was learned this week. The new boundaries of the districts are expected to be fixed officially on Oct. 1, in advance of voter registration Oct. 7 and 14.

There are today four districts in Hicksville, Nos. 3, 16, 19 and 20. Each of these will be subdivided, creating eight districts, according to Ernest Francks, Republican leader of the community. Recommendations for new committeemen in the districts to be established have been completed.

The split in districts is necessary due to great increase in population. But even with this, there may be a need for further division of some districts the following year, largely due to the construction of new homes by Levitt & Sons.

Election district boundaries will observe the township boundary lines. It has been unofficially reported that the Levittown Republican Club considers the Levitt homes sections in Oyster Bay Township as "Hicksville" districts.

800 In Parochial School This Term

HICKSVILLE — Registration at St. Ignatius Parochial School was about 800 the first day of classes last week, according to Mother Adelaide, principal. Last year, registration totaled 700.

The kindergarten is now being conducted in two sessions, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon with 40 children and from 1 to 3 p. m., also with 40 children.

Jericho Rejects Plan To Enlarge Firehouse

JERICHO — A proposal to spend \$8,000 for an addition to the firehouse for a new kitchen and to provide storage space for auxiliary equipment was defeated at the annual budget meeting held here on Sept. 12. There were 12 yes votes, 19 no and 2 void ballots.

A total of 33 votes were cast to approve the 1950-51 budget of \$5,689.42 with 23 yes, 8 no and 2 void. A proposition to spend \$1,000 to defray expense of the department attending tournament and educational purposes was approved 18 yes, 13 no and 2 void.

2,403 Students

There has been an almost 100 per cent increase in student enrollment in Hicksville Public Schools this term and more new pupils are arriving daily. School authorities disclosed this week. There were 1,351 enrolled on the opening day in 1949 compared with 1,917 for the opening day this year. As of last Friday, total enrollment was 2,403 as follows: East St. School 650, Nicholas St. School 750, Junior High 275 and Senior High School 728.

Start New Parking Field 'In About Week'

OYSTER BAY—Ralph Yonatta of Roslyn has won the contract with a low bid of \$13,000 to build the new public parking field off W. Marie St., Hicksville, and will start work "in about a week." The job will take about three weeks. The property was bought from Mrs. Taliaferro for \$15,000 by the parking district thru the town board. This week the Town received long-awaited State approval of an ordinance to permit installation of parking meters on Broadway, a state highway. A total of 350 car spaces will be metered, according to a final survey.

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BEETLE GRUBS IN LAWN? Demonstrate Control This Saturday

LEVITTOWN — The Nassau County Farm Bureau, with the cooperation of Levitt & Sons, has arranged a demonstration on the control of Japanese beetle grubs in lawns to be held at the home of George H. Black, 26 Shelter Lane, here, this Saturday, September 23, at 3 p. m., according to Howard H. Campbell, the Bureau's Agricultural Agent. This demonstration has been arranged as a result of the many requests for information about Japanese beetle control received from residents in the area.

In order to present all aspects of a Japanese beetle control program, three state authorities will participate in demonstration activities. Dr. J. A. Adams, Research Entomologist, New York State Agricultural Experiment Station, at Geneva, will show how to examine lawn areas to determine if a control program is necessary. Dr. Adams, who recently made a Japanese beetle survey in Nassau County, will report.

Dr. George Mathysse, Extension Entomologist, of Cornell University will demonstrate how to

apply an insecticide to grub-proof a lawn. For materials, he will use Chlordane, which is effective in two or three weeks and DDT which requires a longer time to control beetle grubs. He will also display equipment used for applying insecticides to lawns.

The use of milky disease spore powder, a natural biological control which gives permanent protection when completely established in a turf area, will be demonstrated by Robert L. Clement of Hempstead, Horticultural Inspector for the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets.

It is the purpose of this demonstration to show how to identify lawn injury and how to protect lawns and turf areas against the beetle grubs until the area is protected by the milky disease spore powder, the natural enemy of the beetle.

All interested persons are cordially invited. The site of the demonstration, near the exhibit home in Levittown offers amply parking facilities.

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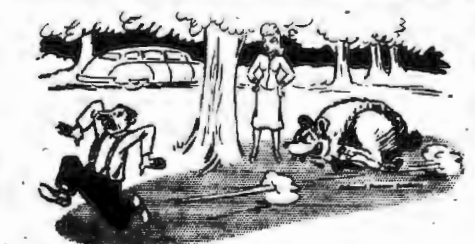
