Adjourn Garbage Area Extension Hearing Upon Plea of So. Hicksville Spokesman

OYSTER BAY—The public hearing upon the proposed extension of Hicksville Garbage District south to the Township line to embrace all the Levitt-built houses in Hicksville has been adjourned until Tuesday morning, Oct. 31. The request for adjournment was made at the hearing held here yesterday by Charles Miller of Summer Lane, speaking as a representative of the North Levittown Homeowners Committee. Miller told the Town Board that residents of the area approached by his committee have expressed satisfaction with the present private collection, to date, and that they fear that under municipal operation "it will not be as good and cost more money."

New Procedure:

Discussion on Lee Ave School Set Prior to Vote

HICKSVILLE — A new and improved system for discussing and voting on school district proposals will be tried when the appropriation of funds for the new Lee Ave. elementary school building is presented to the voters, next month. A discussion meeting on the question is tentatively set for Tuesday night, Oct. 31, at 8 p. m. Voting on the question is tentatively set for Wednesday, Nov. 1, between 4 and 10 p. m.

The new procedure was adopted by the School Board at a special meeting last Thursday. It is calculated to eliminate a complaint from the voters that they are subjected to a meeting and discussion of a question upon the same evening that they vote, a School Board spokesman said. Under the old system, voting could not start until the discussion of the question ended.

Under the new plan, voters will be able to cast their ballots at any time during the late afternoon and evening, thus eliminating the problem when small children must be

cared for while mother and child wait on line for a couple of hours before casting a vote in the late evening.

Pending the official setting of the date of the vote, the Board of Registration and Canvass will tentatively sit at Nicholai St. School Building on Oct. 21, from 4 to 10 p. m. to register voters. Those who registered for the annual meeting last May or for subsequent special meetings and referendums will not be required to register again.

At the same session last week, the Board engaged Mrs. James Redfern for home teaching where required within the district. The trustees also arranged to outfit an new classroom in Junior High School.

New teachers added to the faculty during the week included: Mrs. Elizabeth Pearce and Mrs. Ellen Butler in Nicholai; Clayton Francke and May Leach Braun in East St. School.

New Polling Places for Most Voters With Districts Split

MINEOLA — Seventy-five per cent of the voter in Hicksville will have new polling places on general Election Day, Nov. 7, the Board of Elections disclosed this week. As forecast in the Herald last week, four new districts have been established for Hicksville, effective Oct. 1, giving the community twice as many as before.

Four out of five new districts created in Oyster Bay Township are in Hicksville. The fifth is the new 38th, created from the 15th in Massapequa.

Describe Boundaries of New Districts

3rd DISTRICT — Bounded by Long Island Rail Road on north, Jerusalem Ave. on east, Old Country Rd. on south and township line on west. Polling place—Motor Vehicle Bureau, Jerusalem Ave. (Rest of old district now 39th).

16th DISTRICT — Bounded by Hicksville-Jericho school district line on north, North Broadway on east, Long Island Rail Road on south and township line on west. Polling place—Gillison Knitwear, 65 E. John St. (Rest of old district now 40th).

19th DISTRICT — Odd shape of almost two portions. Part A is bounded by Old Country Rd. on north, Jerusalem Ave. on east, township line on south and Newbridge Rd. on west. Part B is bounded by Long Island Rail Road on north and east, Old Country Rd. on south and Jerusalem Ave. on west. Thus district includes the Levitt-built houses north of township line between Jerusalem Ave. and Newbridge Rd. Polling place—High School Gymnasium, Jerusalem Ave. (Rest of old district now 41st).

20th DISTRICT — Triangular shape, bounded on north and west by Woodbury Rd. (includes part on north side of Woodbury between RR and Bethpage Rd.), South Oyster Bay Rd. on east and Plainview Rd. on south. Polling place—Courthouse, Heitz Pl. and Bay Ave. (Rest of old district now 42nd).

39th DISTRICT — Bounded by Old Country Rd. on north, Newbridge Rd. on east, township line on south, and township line and Parkway on west. Includes Levitt-built houses west of Newbridge Rd., around Hempstead Ave. Polling place—High School gym on Jerusalem Ave. (Was part of old 3rd).

40th DISTRICT — Bounded by Hicksville-Jericho School district line on north, South Oyster Bay Rd. on east, Woodbury Rd. on south and North Broadway on west. Includes Zelida Park, Twinlawn Ave. Polling place—Nassau Motors Inc., 24 E. Barclay St. (Was part of old 16th).

41st DISTRICT — Bounded by Old Country Rd. on north, Long Island Rail Road on east, election district No. 2 of Bethpage on south (runs south on Broadway to corner of Bloomingdale Ave.), and Jerusalem Ave. on east. Includes most of Frank and Halstone homes, also Broadway Terrace, Murray Rd. Polling Place—High School gym, Jerusalem Ave. (Was part of old 19th).

42nd DISTRICT — Triangular shape bounded by Plainview Rd. on north, South Oyster Bay Rd. on east, Long Island Rail Road on south and west. Includes Gables section, Arnold Terrace homes. Polling place—East St. School building. (Was part of old 20th).

The Herald has maps of all these new districts on file at its office, 186 Broadway, Hicksville, for public inspection. It is planned to reproduce outline maps before election day.

**Mid-Island Housewife Wins \$500 Grid Prize**

NEW YORK — The New York Daily News announced Monday morning that Mrs. Stella Krich, who gave her name address as Farmingdale Rd., Hicksville, N. Y., had won its first 1950 Grid Guessing Contest and had collected \$500 for doing so.

Place and Bay Ave., with the new 42nd district (carried out of half of the 26th south of Plainview Rd.) will vote in East St. School building.

The old 18th district has been sliced down the middle along North Broadway. It formerly voted at MacPherson Motor Sales on Jerusalem Ave., corner of Barclay St. The new 16th is the section west of Broadway with its polling place at Gibson Knitwear Co., 665 W. John St. The rest of the district is now the 40th with polling place at Nassau Motors, Inc., 24 E. Barclay St.

The old 3rd has been reduced in size and part of the area has become the new 39th (polling place, high school). The new 3rd has as its polling place at the Motor Vehicle Bureau on Jerusalem Ave. The district has been cut down Old Country Rd.

The redivision of election districts is aimed to keep the total vote in an area to an average total of 1200.

No change has been made in the two Bethpage Districts (Nos. 2 and 28). The division line between the two areas is the Long Island Rail Road. North of the RR in Bethpage is the 28th, which votes at the Bethpage schoolhouse. The 2nd, south of the RR, votes at Bethpage Firehouse.

There has been no change in Plainview, 27th district, which votes at the Plainview Firehouse on Old Country Road.

Jericho district is No. 4, which votes at the firehouse.

Party committeemen are starting a canvas of all the new home sections in their respective districts for the purpose of registering new voters. Committees in the mid-Island section have non-personal registration, which means that another person may register, you and further that you need not register for each general election.

Registration dates and hours for the mid-Island committees are: Saturday, Oct. 7, from 7 a. m. to 10 p. m., and Saturday, October 14, from 1 to 10 p. m.

Nine districts have been created in Levittown entirely in the Township of Hempstead and the 2nd Assembly District. They are 123rd from 110th, 124th from 110th, 125th from 111th, 126th from 111th, 127th from 116th, 128th from 112th, 129th from 112th, 130th, from 112th and 131st from 112th.

The boundary between Jericho's 4th and Syosset's 17th has been relocated in a minor change.

There are a total of 69 districts in the County, 48 in Township of Oyster Bay.

We don't have such a special "Civic Week" in this section, but this is an appropriate time to focus interest on the civic association in your locality and to urge your active interest and support.

Tomorrow (Thursday) night the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc., Inc., resumes its regular monthly meetings at the firehouse on the 4th Thursday night of the month. This group serves the entire community of Hicksville School District.

Tonight (Wednesday) the Bethpage Civic group resumes meetings and next Monday is a regular meeting of the Island Trees Civic organization at the Melody Lounge, Millshire shopping center. They meet every two weeks. Last week, the Plainview Civic and Community Assoc. resumed meetings, sending out 300 invitations but getting only about a 10 per cent response, which is unfortunate.

Friday night, the North Levittown Home Owners Committee (frankly, we believe that name is inaccurate) is holding a meeting in Division Ave. School, Levittown (below the town line in Hempstead Township). This temporary committee is serving the section of houses in South Hicksville, above the township line.

The residents of Twinlawns Ave., Hicksville, have a fine civic organization and are already busy with plans for a neighborhood Christmas program. The people in Zelda Park are planning to form

a civic group in the northeast part of Hicksville.

Civic associations fill a vital need in any community and their abundance and growth in the Mid-Island area is proof of the fact that local residents are interested in doing something about the problems that confront them. Problems may range from the need for a local fire alarm box or road repairs to incorporation of a community.

Some uninformed public officials take a dim view of such going-on because civic groups have a way of getting at the root of a problem, through collective action. Individuals could accomplish the same results but few of us have the time or energy to carry out programs which warrant neighborhood or community-wide effort.

Make it a point to join your civic association and be active. Go to the meetings, help select competent officers, share the work. Jerusalem Ave., since it has been improved, is a major highway into the community. We have not less than five major highways converging at the centre of Hicksville—which is good; but we also have long delays and bottlenecks at the grade crossings—which is tragic.

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

AN ORDINANCE regulating the erection and control of parking meters in Hicksville.

Section 1. Definitions.—For the purpose of this Ordinance:

(a) the word "street" shall mean any public street, Avenue, road, boulevard, highway, square, lane or other public place located in Hicksville in the Town of Oyster Bay and established for the use of vehicles.

(b) the word "vehicle" shall mean any device by which any person or property may be transported upon a highway, except those operated upon rails or tracks.

(c) the word "person" shall mean and include a natural person, firm, association, co-partnership or corporation.

(d) the word "operator" shall mean and include every individual who shall operate a vehicle as the owner thereof or as the agent, employee or permittee of the owner.

(e) the word "park" "parking" or "parked" shall mean the stopping of a motor vehicle or motorcycle upon any public highway and leaving such motor vehicle or motorcycles unattended by a person capable of operating it for a period longer than necessary to load or unload passenger or freight.

Section 2. Parking meter zones are hereby designated and established as being those streets and parts of streets upon which limited parking is now permitted under authority, and by virtue of all limited parking ordinance now effective, and the parking limits and restrictions herein provided are hereby incorporated in this ordinance for its uses and purposes, in the regulations, terms, and enforcement hereof, and such other parking meter zones as may be hereafter created by the Town Board, but spaces designated as "bus stops" and "loading zones" shall be excluded from the above described parking meter zones. The Town Board as Commissioners of the Hicksville Park and Parking District shall provide for the installation, regulations, control, operation and use of the parking meters provided for in this ordinance and shall cause said meters to be maintained in good workable condition. Meters shall be placed upon the curb next to individual parking place and meters shall be so constructed as to display a signal showing legal parking upon deposit therein of the proper coin or coins of the United States as indicated by instructions and said meter, and for a period of time conforming to the parking limits of the Town of Oyster Bay said signal to remain in evidence until expiration of said parking period so designated, at which time a change of signal or some other mechanical operation shall indicate expiration of said parking period.

Section 2A. Parking shall be controlled and limited by parking meters on the following streets, avenues and highways:

ONE HOUR PARKING

- On both sides of Broadway (Route 107) from Old Country Road to the south curb of John Street.
- On both sides of Jerusalem Avenue from Nicholai Street to the south curb of John Street.
- On both sides of East Barclay Street starting at the east curb of Broadway east for a distance of 200 feet.

TWO HOURS PARKING

- On both sides of Marie Street from the LIRR TRACKS west of Jerusalem Avenue.
- On both sides of Herzog Place from Broadway to Jerusalem Avenue.

Section 3. When any vehicle shall be parked next to a parking meter the owner or operator of said vehicle shall park within the area designated by the curb or street marking lines as indicated for parallel or diagonal parking, such parking meter spaces shall be so marked that vehicles will be required to park parallel with the curb or edge of the pavement on any State Highway, and so that no vehicle will be required to park in violation of Section 86.7 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law, and upon entering said parking space shall immediately deposit in said meter a five cent coin of the United States for one (1) hour of legal parking limit, and for a one cent coin of the United States for twelve minutes of legal parking. In the area where two hours parking is provided by ordinance, meters shall provide for two hour parking and the same ratio of deposit of money shall be used, i.e., an additional 5 cents for the second hour of parking and the one cent for each twelve minutes of parking. It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to park within said designated area, or fail or

neglect to so deposit the proper coin or coins. Said parking space may be then used by such vehicle during the legal parking limit provided by the ordinances of the Town, and said vehicle shall be considered as unlawfully parked if it remains in said space beyond the legal parking limit and or when said parking meter displays a signal showing such illegal parking, except that nothing herein shall prevent the owner or operator of a vehicle from parking his vehicle in a space without depositing a coin as aforesaid, where it appears that the maximum legal parking limit has not run since the deposit of the previous coin. It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or permit any vehicle registered in his name to be unlawfully parked as set out in this section.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any slug, device or a metallic substitute for a coin of the United States.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to deface, injure, tamper with, open, willfully break or destroy any parking meter.

Section 6. Any vehicle parked or placed in any parking space in any parking meter zone shall be parked or placed within the lines marked on the street for such parking purposes, as herein provided.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of each traffic patrolman, or such other officer as shall be so instructed by the Nassau County Police Department, in his beat or district, to take the number of any meter at which any vehicle is overparked, as provided in this ordinance, and the make, vehicle tag number of said vehicle, and make complete, the name of the District, Street, House Number, Hall Place, Hicksville, together with the length of time during which said vehicle is parked in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, as well as any other facts, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violations.

Section 8. Any person, firm, association, co-partnership or corporation who shall violate or permit or allow anyone to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine or penalty of not exceeding Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00).

Section 9. This ordinance is hereby declared to be for the preservation of peace, health, safety, and property and a police regulation therefore. It is declared to be in addition to and supplementary to existing ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay in the Hamlet of Hicksville, and an additional provision for the regulation of traffic and parking in those zones provided for herein, and not in conflict with nor a repeat of existing ordinances, excepting only any and all parts of existing ordinances relating to traffic which are contrary to the provisions of this ordinance in its present form, are hereby repealed and declared void.

Section 10. If any section, provision or part thereof in this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such adjudication shall not effect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any section, provision or part thereof not so adjudged, invalid or unconstitutional. This amendment to take effect immediately.

3rd Period Pass Beats Comets

PATCHOGUE — A plodding, cumbersome, errant Hicksville High eleven opened its 1950 grid season here, Friday night, and succumbed to a 20-yard third period touch-down pass which produced an unexpected 6-0 victory for Patchogue.

The winning strike was pitched by quarterback Charlie Russo to end Art Rate who carried the clinging Ernie Evanschuck with him over the goal line for the score.

The Raiders set up their touch-down by covering a Hicksville fumble on the losers' 45 yard line. Russo passed ten yards to Rate for a first down on the 35. Two more passes fell incomplete and then John Magandini caught the Hicksville defense napping as he delayed slightly before charging up the middle for 15 yards to the twenty.

It was the longest ground gain of the night for the winners who were held to a net advance of 25 yards in 19 rushes by the heavier Hicksville line.

The next play went the distance and although the placement attempt was wide that didn't dampen the joy of the partisan crowd of 1,800 which had been led to believe that Hicksville was coming to town with a new to unbeatable squad.

First Half Chances

At that Hicksville had more than one chance to win the game. The running of Dick Scott and Phil Millevolte was outstanding but faulty blocking prevented any long scoring jaunts.

The Comets first got the ball on their own 46 and in six plays reached the Patchogue two yard line. Six minutes had not yet passed on the clock. Scott and Elias Stetz alternated on the drive but the play that put the Comets six feet from paydirt was a sweep of the right end by Evanschuck followed by a short lateral to Scott.

There a running play was smearred for a three year loss and the hosts took heart when Hicksville was set back five yards for being offside. Stetz made the big bid to put the ball over as he smacked the center of the line three straight times but finished a yard short of the goal.

Later in the period the Evanschuck-to-Scott combination succeeded for a 23 yard passing gain to the Patchogue 23. A 15-yard holding penalty ruined a scoring chance then even though Scott ran for nine yards out of a fake punt formation just after the turn of the quarter.
