# Report Raps Hicksville Fire Dept.

HICKSVILLE—A set of affidavits and sworn statements concerning a small fire in a Levitt-built house in this community was put in circulation this week by the "North Levittown Homeowners' Committee" as the results of a 5-day investigation. Local fire officials, after a study of the "evidence," branded the report as a "barefaced attempt to besmirch the integrity of the Hicksville Fire Dept." A full-dress presentation of the report will be made at a meeting of the "Homeowners' Committee" this Friday night in the high school auditorium.

### Claim Hicksville Calls

The Herald this week was given copies of affidavits made by six

persons including Model who swears he told the phone operator at the time of the emergency that he wanted to be connected with Hicksville Fire Department, and Joseph H. Reid of 58 Eastern Rd., a neighbor who also said he asked the operator for Hicksville Dept.

William Bilkmeier, manager of the New York Telephone Co., told the Herald on Monday — as he did last week — that the company has no record of an emergency call being made on that evening (Oct. 16) to Hicksville Fire Dept.

## Homeowners Get Reports Friday

HICKSVILLE—Reports of education and public utilities committees, including a discussion of the Fork Lane fire incident of last week will feature a meeting this Friday night, Oct. 27, in the high school auditorium on Jerusalem Ave. The meeting is being called by the temporary North Levittown Home Owners' Committee. Residents of all Levitt-built houses in Hicksville are being urged to attend.

Robert Rind, chairman of the education committee, is expected to report on various school district matters, including the forthcoming vote on Nov. 14 regarding a bond issue for the Lee Ave. school. Since the proposal to seek an increase in the Hicksville School Board from 5 to 9 members was tabled at the Sept. meeting, this may also come up Friday night.

Charles C. Miller, chairman of the public utilities committee, is expected to take the spotlight with a report upon investigations concerning the fire at the home of Norman Modell of 2 Fork Lane last week. (A partial report on this investigation is given elsewhere in this issue.—Editor). The committee is also expected to offer a plan to help prevent a duplication of confused fire protection service in the future.

## Reverse Traffic On Nicholas St

OYSTER BAY — Direction of traffic on W. Nicholas St., Hicksville, will soon be reversed. The Town Board yesterday adopted an amendment to the Hicksville Parking Ordinance ordering that one-way movement be from west to east and that parking be prohibited for the entire block on the south side.

The Hicksville Business Men's Association Inc. had requested a delay upon the proposal and that a hearing on the question be held in Hicksville in the evening when local merchants and others interested could attend. The change of direction was urged by the county police dept., the town declares, and recommended by the Nicholas St. P.T.A.

The Hicksville Civic Executive Committee this week went on record as opposed to the change of direction since it would feed traffic into Broadway, an already congested street, rather than off Broadway.

# Water Board Replies To Sattig

PLAINVIEW — The hydrant rental charge in this district to be collected here on the Town tax bill for 1951 was discussed today by the Board of Water Commissioners in an open letter to the Herald. At the same time, the three-man board jointly answered statements credited to B. A. Sattig, criticizing the proposed charge.

It is a gentleman like manner and perhaps he will receive a few more votes than he has, at all the unsuccessful attempts he made in the past. Now let's consider the "unlawful" questions or statements made by Mr. Sattig. The law states that fire hydrants installed by a water district shall not be permitted to be used by fire districts until a contract has been made for the purchase of water and the rental of such hydrants.

Nor shall a water district furnish water to fire houses of fire companies situated in the water district at no cost.

"The above is very clear and anyone should be able to understand the meaning thereof. The State Department of Audit and Control who make a complete examination of the accounts and fiscal affairs of special districts such as Plainview Water District has in (Continued on page 18)

"We have read the charges made Oct. 19 in which Mr. Sattig uses the terms 'highway robbery' and 'unlawful.' Now these are raw and open terms and we know that you are not a well man, but you should know the meaning of a statement or quotation before you issue it. You should also know that there is such a thing as a Public Officers' Law which gives certain protection to public-elected officials and provides the remedy pursuant to law when such officials are unjustly attacked.

## Rental Issue Delays Town Budget Okay

OYSTER BAY—Action upon the Town Budget of \$1,279,074.55 for 1951, an increase of \$280,722, was stalled yesterday (Tuesday) by protests over the proposed hydrant rental charge in Plainview Fire Protection District. A delegation from Plainview was at the budget hearing to protest the rate and offer a petition signed by 128 persons. Those who spoke on the question included John G. Harbes, B. A. Sattig and Joseph Arena. A meeting has been scheduled for next Monday night at Plainview School, when Councilman Frank Gilmovsky will meet with parties interested in an effort to work out a compromise.

Plainview Civic Assoc. objects to the charge as "too high." The charge, as proposed in the town budget, would raise the fire protection tax rate in Plainview from 16 to 28 cents per \$100, of which 18 cents is for hydrant rental charged by the water district.

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**Schenck Asks PSC For Old Country Rd**

**NEW YORK CITY**—The Public Service Commission heard a plea from the Schenck Transportation Co. for permission to operate a new Hickville to Westbury route, last week, and reserved decision. The petition presented by Lester E. Weidner, Schenck vice-president, states the route would

start at Maple and Post Aves. in Westbury, go south on School St. to Old Country Rd., then east to Newbridge Rd., Hickville, north on Newbridge to Horne Pl., east to Dwyersway, south on Dwyersway to Old Country Rd., west to Newbridge Rd. and then back again to Westbury.

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Weather said the plan is for the route to be divided into two 10-cent fare zones with the through fare set at 20 cents.  
 "The route," he declared, "is designed to serve a rapidly expanding residential community and will probably last money for two or three months before it can get on a paying basis."

page report were made by Roy L. Deets of 88 Friendly Rd., secretary of the Homeowner's Committee; Charles C. Miller, 24 Summer Lane, chairman of the public utilities committee of the Homeowners Association; Michael J. Kostynick of 1724 Prospect Ave., East Meadow, a captain of East Meadow Fire Dept., and Mrs. Modell.  
The statements of Deets and Miller cover much of the same ground. They include interviews with Modell, officials of East Meadow, Wantagh and Bethpage Fire Dept., and Henry Gebhardt, daytime custodian of Hicksville Firehouse. While no evidence is offered to prove that Hicksville received notice of the fire, until it had been extinguished, the Miller and Deets statements are highly critical of Hicksville Fire Dept. headquarters.

**Modell Statement**  
Modell states in part that the fire broke out at about 10:40 p. m. and five minutes later he asked the local operator for a connection with Hicksville Fire Dept. "and pointed out that there was a serious emergency. I was connected with the fire dept.," he claims. "I reported the fire and its location. I was asked for details of location. I explained 'off Lantern Rd. and the West Village Green.' I was told 'forget the details, we will find it.'"

"At about 10:50 p. m. Mr. Reid (a neighbor) answered our call for help. He helped us fight the fire. Several minutes later, about 11, no fire department having responded, I asked Mr. Reid to telephone the Hicksville Fire Dept. He did so. About 11:05 p. m. the Wantagh Fire Dept. arrived and a few minutes later the East Meadow Fire Dept. came. The Hicksville Fire Dept. never came."  
Reid swears that he asked the operator for the Hicksville Fire

Dept. "The phone was answered by someone who identified themselves as the Hicksville Fire Dept. I asked if they had sent an engine to 2 Fork Lane. The person with whom I was speaking said they had gotten a report of a fire but that the report was confused. I told him that the fire was at 2 Fork Lane which was within Hicksville. I then said it was the corner of Fork and Lantern. He asked me to spell the names of the two roads, which I did. He then said they would be right over."

"The Wantagh Fire Dept. and East Meadow Fire Dept. arrived approximately five minutes after our telephone conversation. The two fire depts. proceeded to put out the fire which they succeeded in doing. The Hicksville Fire Dept. had not arrived."

**East Meadow Report**  
Kostynick, East Meadow fire captain, swears that he went with the fire truck "in answer to an alarm of a fire at 2 Fork Lane, Levittown, within the Hicksville Fire District." He states that Chief Joseph Kosharsky asked him to call Hicksville and ask them to make out their fire report "as required of them." He tried to get Hicksville Fire Dept. by phone (Modell's) and after some delay got the number of the public phone booth in Hicksville Firehouse but could get no response.

"After this I went to the firehouse in Hicksville," Kostynick continues, "and contacted the night dispatcher. He stated he had not received any calls. Then he called Chief Weiss and discussed the case of it. I then left."

Bethpage Fire Dept. also got a call about the fire the same evening, according to the documents, but was unable to discover who had given the notice to the nightman at the firehouse. Chief Robert Gillespie went out with a truck in search of the alarm.  
There are about 80 Levittown homes south of the Township

line, in the Bethpage Fire District near Wantagh Ave.

**Gebhardt Quoted**  
Miller and Deets were told by Gebhardt, custodian of the Hicksville Firehouse in the Anytown, that no request for aid had been received on the night of Oct. 18. Miller says in his affidavit that "during the course of the long conversation, Mr. Gebhardt by his remarks and attitude indicated a feeling of hostility towards the tendency of resident of Levittown in Hicksville Fire District to refer to their community as 'Levittown.' When it was pointed out to him that neither area has any legal status, he resorted in a loud voice and with considerable asperity that 'Hicksville Fire District is an incorporated district and its residents live in HICKSVILLE.'"

Deets reports the incident this way: "He (Gebhardt) was quite insistent in mousing statements along the lines of 'Hicksville is not a town in the Mid-Island Herald in connection with this section of Levittown houses. He displayed unmistakable hostility towards the calling of that part of his district which is occupied by Levittown homes as 'Levittown.'"

Chief Weiss and another Hicksville fireman on that evening went to the Modell home to inspect the fire damage and prepare his report shortly after the notice of the incident was made to him by Chief Platz of Wantagh Fire Dept. It was then after midnight and the Wantagh and East Meadow vamps had left the scene.

In Bethpage School there will be individual class parties held at the school on Tuesday.



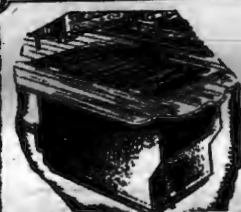

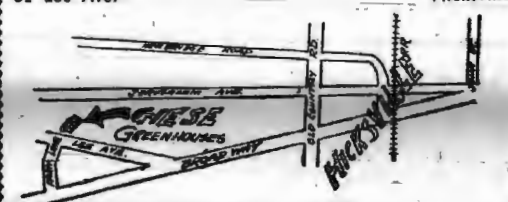

## Schedule World-Wide Reading of Bible

**HICKSVILLE**—The Rev. Ed-  
ward H. Stammel of Trinity Lu-  
theran Church, West Michael St.,  
announced at the meeting of the  
Voters, Thursday night, Oct. 19,  
that the members of the church  
will be encouraged to participate  
in the Worldwide Bible Reading  
program of the American Bible  
Society from Thanksgiving to  
Christmas.

The aim of the program is to  
encourage wider use of the Bible  
as a source of inspiration. All of  
the families of the congregation  
and all members of the congrega-  
tion in the armed forces will be  
provided with a special Bookmarks  
listing the readings for each day,  
Pastor Stammel said.

Now in its seventh year, World-  
wide Bible Reading had its begin-  
ning during the war when a lone-  
ly young Marine on Guadalcanal  
wrote his mother, asking that his

parents join with him in the daily  
reading of identical passages from  
the Bible. The mother shared the  
secret of her invisible bond of fel-  
lowship with her overseas son with  
the officers of the American Bible  
Society; and thereafter, through-  
out the war years, thousands of  
service men and their families  
shared a similar experience. As  
the movement spread, millions  
asked for and used the bookmarks  
published in connection with the  
annual Worldwide Bible Reading  
program.

Promoted by the American Bible  
Society and actively assisted by  
some 70 denominations, it is spon-  
sored by a widely representative  
national committee of laymen, of

### Shall We Incorporate?

## Youth Program

The HERALD, in cooperation with the Information Division of the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville, will publish this department regularly in an effort to bring its readers a full discussion of the question. The HERALD invites comments and questions on this subject in writing.—Editor.

**Ques.—There has been some talk about a youth program possible under incorporation. How does that work?**

The New York State Youth Commission says that State Aid is available to any municipality for the purpose of initiating or extending recreation services for youth. Hicksville is not eligible for such aid because it is not recognized by the State or Federal governments as a municipality. As an incorporated village (or city) funds would be allocated here by the state to reimburse the municipality up to 50 per cent of the maximum allocation, which is determined at 25 cents per child and...

Thus the youth of Hicksville are being deprived of the benefits of this state assistance for local recreation as long as the community is unincorporated.

**Ques.—What have the sponsors of this movement got against the Town Board? Are they Democrats or something?**

The incorporation movement is strictly non-political and non-partisan. The sponsors find no fault with the present officials who are doing the best they can under an antiquated form of government now being applied to a community which has long outgrown the limitations of town government. Incorporation would be a change in the form of government to keep pace with the growth of the community. Town government is designed largely for sparsely settled, rural areas. More populated sections require a form of government designed to meet the increased problems of such areas.

# A Plot to Discredit Hicksville?

THE HOMEOWNERS' COMMITTEE which claims a membership of over 260 adults among the 1200 or more new families residing in houses in Hicksville built and sold by Levitt & Sons has released copies of assorted sworn statements and affidavits connected with the fire on Oct. 16 at 2 Fork Lane. The report will probably be given in full detail at the meeting of this committee this Friday night at the high school.

Obviously, a lot of running around took place during the past week to get these statements, to interview people in East Meadow, Bethpage, Wantagh and Hicksville. We have noted before the fact there are among the residents of this section some folks who are prepared to put a lot of time and effort into civic projects.

But for all the detail of the statements prepared by Roy L. Deets, secretary of the committee, and Charles C. Miller, public utilities chairman, we find some glaring deficiencies which—for us, at least—cast a shadow upon the true value and purpose of their efforts. For example, there is no statement included as an official report or comment from the New York Telephone Co.,

#### Miller Demands Apologies

Sir—I hope it was only an outburst of your community pride, unfortunately manifested in hasty words, which led you to distort so drastically the story of the fire which occurred at 2 Fork Lane, Levittown, on the night of October 16.

The story on pages 1 and 17 of your Oct. 18 issue is correct insofar as it goes, but does not tell all the facts. Its headline in particular is incorrect.

Your editorial in the same issue contains at least one complete untruth and one morally reprehensible insinuation, plus several implications which are unworthy of an honorable journalist. Your statement to the effect that a Levittowner who refuses to admit to residence in your hamlet can have his roof burned over his head—even though his taxes support the Fire Dept. headquarters in that unfriendly community—reflects the sort of technique which should only be resorted to by a frantic, circulation-mad publisher.

(At this point Mr. Miller lists seven points based upon investigation by himself and the Homeowners' Committee, the bulk of which is covered in a separate news item in this issue. Lack of space prevents repetition here.—Ed.)

You owe the Fire Depts. of East Meadow, Bethpage and Wantagh an apology for your untrue statements and unjust implications, respectively; and I demand that you editorially apologize to the people of North Levittown for your frantic outburst, assuring them that they must and will receive proper fire protection when they summon aid from the proper department. It is NOT necessary to state that one lives in Hicksville to summon the Hicksville Fire Dept.; it is necessary and sufficient that one live within the boundaries of the Hicksville Fire District, which includes North Levittown.

I also insist that you cease and desist from the practice of writing these inflammatory antagonistic articles whose chief function, one suspects, is the attempt to alienate the people of North Levittown from their good friends and neighbors in the rest of Levittown and to win them to the cause of the incorporation of that unfriendly hamlet to the north of us. In the name of God, let us have no more of this animosity! He created Long Island big enough for us to live peacefully together and to follow our own sentiments in banding together in congenial groups!

which it must be admitted, was a major participant in the events on the evening of Oct. 16.

We found it relatively simple to get a statement based upon an investigation made by the Telephone Co. The phone company insists that there was no emergency call to Hicksville Fire Dept. made that evening.

Further, there is no statement of the facts included from Chief Stanford Wells of Hicksville Fire Department or any other person in authority in this fire district (Commissioners, Assistant Chiefs, Captains, etc.), whereas there are statements and interviews with the Chiefs of Wantagh, East Meadow and Bethpage Fire Depts. The committee had a conversation with Henry Gebhardt, day-time custodian at the firehouse, but did not interview William Lyons, the night man who was on duty at the time the event took place.

We can't help but detect an effort here to tarnish the reputation of the Hicksville Fire Dept., just as there have already been false and misleading stories circulated by unnamed individuals about the business and professional men of Hicksville. Nobody is perfect, but at least we're trying. No community can be expected to glide right thru a jolt of homes and population doubling within months, as is the case of Hicksville today. There are bound to be shortcomings and hardships. We'll come out of it all, less scarred and battered if we can learn to work together. Most certainly there are big enough problems confronting us without trying to manufacture extra ones.

The address for the fire was given as "2 Fork Lane, Levittown," and Hicksville Fire Dept. did not get the alarm. Those are the simple facts. Anything beyond that, in our book, is a deliberate attempt to confuse the issue and hold our community and its institutions up for scorn and ridicule.

### We Need a Bus Terminal

TRAFFIC CONDITIONS in Hicksville are getting helplessly involved and there appears to be little hope of any solution unless strong measures are taken by someone.

This week the Public Service Commission heard an application from the Schenck Transportation Co. for permission to operate a line from Westbury to Hicksville via Old Country Rd. A couple of weeks ago the PSC heard a plea from Hempstead Bus Co. for permission to operate into Hicksville from Carmen Ave. in East Meadow area, via Dutch Lane and Newbridge Rd.

When these requests are granted—since there hardly seems to be cause for their disapproval—Hicksville will have six bus lines entering and leaving. Besides the two new applications, we have the Purinton Bus coming in from Bethpage, the Hempstead Bus Co. coming in from Hempstead, the Levittown Bus and the Schenck Bus Co. coming in from Westbury, Mineola and points east via John St.

Of these six lines, five will be traveling along Broadway, three on Herzog Pl., three on Newbridge Rd., and all converging from one direction or another upon the Hicksville RR station.

We welcome these facilities which bring people to our community. But we fear the streets of Hicksville, already choked and congested, will become even more so with the additional routes. The long delays at the RR grade crossings due to the ancient system of lowering gates, contributes more than a fair share toward snarled traffic already.

In addition to the six bus lines, we have about five taxi operators now converging upon the RR station as well.

There is a need for strong measures as we have said—the only practical solution would be the creation of a bus and taxi terminal right at the Hicksville station. Since we see no hope of our local government, as represented by the Oyster Bay Town Board, doing anything towards this end, it remains therefore for private enterprise to do the job. A farsighted individual or combine is our only hope at this point.

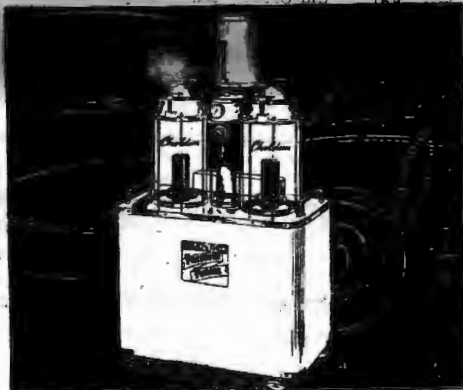

(b) The Company reserves the right to refuse to install non-standard equipment of unusually high investment, operating or maintenance expense, or whose operating characteristics are unsatisfactory to it, except under special arrangements as may be acceptable to the Company.

(c) Upon the written request of the governmental agency, the Company will change the location of installed fixtures, conductors and conduit provided the governmental agency pay to the Company the actual costs incurred by the Company in making such changes.

(d) Street Lighting service will be provided every night and all night, during the hours between 30 minutes after sunset and 30 minutes before sunrise, aggregating approximately 4,000 hours per year, unless prevented by strikes, accidents or other causes beyond the control of the Company.

(e) In the event any lamps shall become extinguished or out of service because of operating conditions of the Company and are not renewed or repaired within twenty-four (24) hours after due notice from the governmental agency has been received by the Company, a credit of 1/365th of the annual rate per lamp will be allowed for each night out of service.

(f) The second light in a twin underground street light fixture will be billed at one-half (1/2) the rates quoted above for underground lights.

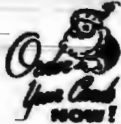

All in all, it was a marvelous evening and if our Entertainment Chairman reads this, maybe he can copy some of their ideas.

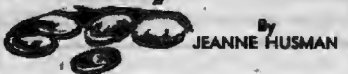

QUESTION: We plan to leave on a long vacation motor trip within the next couple of weeks and a friend suggests that we take out a special theft insurance policy on our luggage, jewelry and other valuables which we take with us. Can you tell me whether we can get a short term policy of this kind and whether its cost is low enough so it would pay us to buy it?

ANSWER: Ordinarily, if you already have a Residence Theft policy on your valuables, the simplest and most economical thing for you to do would be to have the "theft away from the premises" clause added to it and to pay the small additional premium. This coverage is usually a good deal broader than that given by a "personal effects" floater policy which you would buy for the duration of your trip. If you don't have a Residence Theft policy, you should consult your insurance agent about it before buying any other form of insurance.

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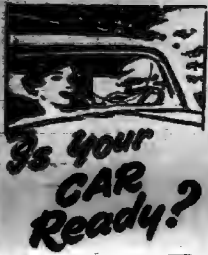

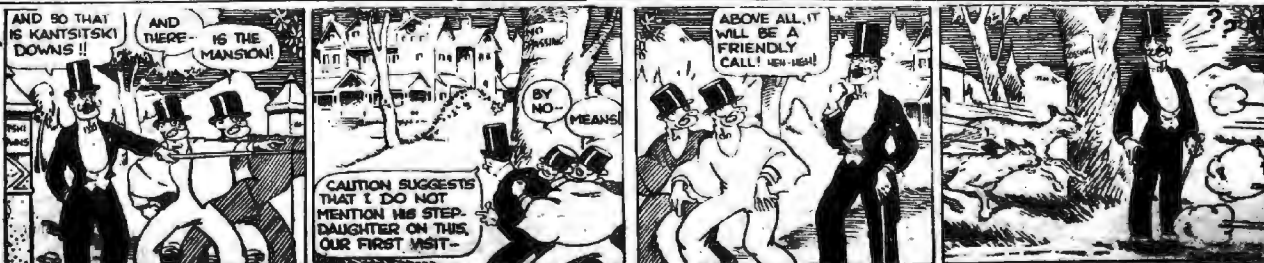

 each of the reports requested that the above requirements of the Law must be fulfilled. Your Board of Commissioners granted Mr. Steinman of the above-mentioned department who made the examination the latter part of August of this year for the years 1948 and 1949 that such a contract would

It makes no difference whether it would be levied as a water tax or as a fire tax or any other tax. This matter was thoroughly discussed and considered at meetings between the Board of Directors of the Plainview Fire Co. and the Board of Commissioners of the Plainview Water District and members of the Town Board and the Hon. Harry Tespen, supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay. They went over records for over 3 1/2 hours on this matter. The Town Board acts as the Board of Commissioners in a Fire Protection District such as is the case here in Plainview. Therefore, this matter does not concern the fire company at all.

Others Charge More  
 "Now Mr. Sattig quotes the rate of \$25 per hydrant as being extravagant and he makes mention of a

rate. The rates but why don't he quote some of the districts which are paying double and three times that amount? Mr. Sattig should learn more about the whole matter before he starts bawling out and with his remarks tries to mislead a lot of the good people of the District. Anyone that knows anything about water and fire protection requirements knows that in most all districts or private water companies the exorbitant cost of the water district or water department is due to the fact that over 50 per cent of the cost of water lines is caused by the requirements of the fire fighting part of the district. Any water district could lay water lines to supply water for domestic and all other but for fire purposes pursuant to the Suburban Division, New York Fire Insurance Co-acting Organization for less than half the cost of what the cost of the requirement of the above rating organization are. Therefore the New York State Audit and Control Department says put each charge where it justly belongs and don't change the water district for the fire fighting requirements. After all the whole thing only amounts to between \$2 and \$3 per year for the average home owner. "We all know that we need both the water and the fire protection. You couldn't charge school taxes against a water district or highway taxes against a school district. Why doesn't Mr. Sattig go to some of our adjacent districts and learn for himself what large compressive lines must be laid and what improvements must be made in some of our neighboring water districts. Only because the volume and pressure requirements of the Suburban Division must be fulfilled. Your Board of Water Commissioners is operating pursuant to law and you have at the present time a very cooperative progressive board of commissioners which is a value to any community. To build up a community and the value of it you need law abiding, peaceful living, cooperative, progressive thinking people and not the antagonistic, provoking, disagreeable type of Mr. Sattig."
