Plan to Change 9 Bethpage St. Names; Fire Board Ready to Finish Sign Project

BETHPAGE—Changes in names of nine local streets will be considered at a public meeting called by the Board of Fire Commissioners for next Wednesday night, Nov. 15, at the firehouse at 8 p. m. The changes are proposed to eliminate some confusing duplications and in some cases to rename streets which continue as established streets.

Purpose of the meeting, accord-

ing to Secretary Henry Strauber, is to give all interested an opportunity to be heard before formal changes are made with the cooperation of the town board.

The streets involved are listed in a legal advertisement in this issue (see page 15). Sherman Pl., Hemlock St. and Spruce St. are at present duplicated. Hicksville Ave., Mineola Ave., and Short St. are continuations of existing streets.

The fire board is anxious to clear up the changes before orders are placed for permanent street signs. About 240 new cast aluminum signs already have been erected, and about 240 more are to be installed throughout the fire district.

Scheduled to get the attractive signs, also, are the Miller Homes section in the district, Cedar Drive section off Hempstead Tpke., and Millpage. Developers have been encouraged by the fire commissioners to install the same type of sign in new areas they establish.

Discuss Bus Money, School; 2,000 Able To Vote Tuesday

HICKSVILLE—There are exactly 2,000 voters registered and qualified to vote at Hicksville High School next Tuesday, Nov. 14, between 3 and 10 p. m. upon two propositions offered by the Board of Education. One proposal calls for a bond issue of \$865,000 to construct a new elementary school (picture above) and the other proposal is to spend up to \$20,000 from surplus funds of the district to pay for pupil transportation within the district.

An additional 153 persons registered Saturday for the voting to make the total 2,000. Most of the newest voters were from the Spiegel development in the northwest section and from the southwest section where Levitt and Sons have built many new homes.

Urgently Recommended

Construction of the 20-room school is urgently recommended in the Columbia Report on building requirements of the district. "It is clear," the report states, "that Hicksville must take immediate steps to construct additional school building facilities at the earliest date possible to care for the im-

Mid-Island Votes GOP By Almost 3 to 1 Margin

BULLETIN—Mid-Island Election Districts gave the Republican ticket a plurality of more than two and a half to one yesterday, on the basis of incomplete returns available at the time the Herald went to press last night.

All eight Hicksville districts voted heavily and went along with Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for another term, including the big new home sections of the 19th and 39th districts, south of Old Country Rd.

Congressman W. Kingsland Macy in the final tally was expected to carry the election districts of the First Congressional district in Oyster Bay Township by a narrow margin of 500 votes or less.

His score in Suffolk told the story.

In Nassau County, Dewey on the basis of incomplete returns was expected to receive a 100,000 plurality with an all-time record vote.

The City of Glen Cove, which had been in the Democratic columns since the last local election, joined the Dewey parade and gave the Governor a majority of 1,100.

In Levittown the Dewey majority was about 60 per cent.

Voting was heavy throughout the day with lines steady in Hicksville's big registration districts.

High Temperatures Falls Elderly Man



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Expect New Parking Lot To Ease Local Problem

HICKSVILLE—With the opening of a second municipal parking field here, Saturday, Councilman Frank Chlumsky saw hopes for an early and speedy solution of the community's shopper and commuter parking problems. Chlumsky presided at a brief ribbon cutting ceremony and apologized for the inability of Supervisor Harry Tappen to attend the event.

2 Hearings Tomorrow On Parking Limits

OYSTER BAY—Two public hearings on proposed Hicksville Parking ordinance changes will be held tomorrow (Thursday) morning at the District Courtroom, Town Hall, here, starting at 10 o'clock.

One hearing will be on the following rules for the Hicksville Parking Fields: a three-hour limit between 8 a. m. and 6 p. m., no trucks of more than one-half ton permitted in the fields and cars to be parked within the painted boundaries only.

A second hearing will be on a proposed amendment restricting parking on Jackson Pl. off Duffy Ave. to two hours between 8 a. m. and 6 p. m.

The Town of Oyster Bay has provided one half of the funds for the new field, which will be known as "F. N. Taliaferro Field" and "the town stands ready to provide one-half of the cost of any more fields which may be constructed," Chlumsky said. The first, "Robert Williams Field," on Marie St., opposite the firehouse, was opened about a year ago. It has a capacity of about 100 cars and the Taliaferro field can accommodate about 50 autos.

Plan 3-Hour Limit

The town plans to impose three-hour parking limits on both fields to make them fully available for shoppers.

A field for commuters is now under construction off Newbridge Rd. and Duffy Ave., which will hold 450 cars. Privately owned, a nominal fee will be charged for its use, Chlumsky said. He also hopes to get the use of a field next to the new post office on North Broadway to "help during the Christmas rush."

Chlumsky expressed his thanks to Michael J. Sullivan, attorney for the town in property negotiations; H. G. Holzmacher, engineer on the project; and Mrs. Johanna Taliaferro, who sold the property to the township. Her granddaughter, Lynn Taliaferro, cut the ribbon to open the field.

Rev. Howard Rogers, chairman of the Citizens Advisory Parking Committee; Patrick J. Buffalo, president of the BMA; Fred J. Noth, secretary of the parking committee; District Court Judge Joseph P. Lebkuecher and Town Clerk Leslie C. Disbrow also were present for the ceremony.

Widening of Herzog Pl., which is now underway, is also expected to relieve local traffic congestion, Chlumsky said.

New Resident, Retired City Fireman, Enters Race for Fire Commissioner

HICKSVILLE — Edward C. Quimby, retired New York City fireman, this week announced candidacy for election as a commissioner of the Hicksville Fire District on Dec. 5. Previously announced candidates for the vacancy for a five-year term are Daniel Munch and John Leckie, ex-chiefs of the local fire department. William Braun, whose term expires, is not a candidate for re-election after serving the district for a quarter of a century.

Quimby, a resident of 168 Cottage Blvd., served the New York City fire department for 11 years until he was retired in 1948 due to a physical disability sustained during the last war. He was a first grade fireman with Hook and Ladder 26 before the war and with Hook and Ladder 43 after the war. Both units serve the East Harlem section.

Other Candidates

Munch and Leckie have long been active in the local volunteer fire department. Munch is the immediate past chief, retiring last April. Leckie is a former chief and held a position on the fire commission by appointment to fill out an unexpired term a couple of years ago.

Fred Schaeffer, secretary of the fire district, said Saturday that Leckie has filed his nominating petition with the Board. The election will be held in the fire-

house on E. Marie St. on Tuesday, Dec. 5, between 7 and 10 p. m. with all legal resident voters of Hicksville Fire District qualified. There is no advance voter registration requirement in this election.

Quimby served with the Marine Corps in the Pacific area for two and a half years during the last war. He was wounded at Saipan and again on an aircraft carrier off Leyte. He received the Bronze Star in the latter battle for manning his anti-aircraft battle station while wounded until the situation was secured from Kamakazec attacks.

A former top flight racing skater, Quimby and his family moved to Hicksville about 1 1/2 years ago from Astoria.

Homeowners Claim Membership Gains

HICKSVILLE — The NL Home Owners Committee now has a membership of 310, an increase of 50 during the past week, it was reported yesterday by Roy L. Deets, secretary of the temporary group.

Plans to adopt the constitution of the organization as soon as possible and arrangements to elect permanent officers are well underway, Deets said. The committee is organized among the residents of Levitt-built homes in Hicksville.

THE NEED FOR APPROVAL on the bond issue question, next Tuesday, for a new elementary school on Lee Ave., Hicksville, is so urgent that hardly seems necessary to make special mention of it.

The parent of every child of elementary school age in our school district knows that the need for additional facilities is desperate. It is going to get much worse before an improvement can be detected because there are many pre-school age children who will be reporting next year and the year after, faster than any school can be built.

The approval of the Lee Ave. School will go a long way toward helping ease the situation although it will take almost two years before these facilities will be available — providing the war situation does not hamper supplies

East Meadow Fireman Comment

Dear Sir: Referring to the article entitled "Accuracy in Address is Important" in the Oct. 18 issue of your paper, I am directed by Chief Joseph Kosbanisky to call certain inaccuracies in the article to your attention. In discussing the recent fire at Fork Lane and Lantern Road in Levittown, you stated: "East Meadow refused to have anything to do with the fire because they were certain that it was not within their jurisdiction." The same general statement insofar as it affects our Department also appears in an article on the front page. But in a preceding paragraph of your article on "Accuracy," you stated that the East Meadow and Wantagh Fire Departments responded to the call.

Our Department took an active part in extinguishing the blaze and, as is customary, remained for approximately two hours on the premises in case of a flare-up.

While every fire call is important, the importance of this particular call was magnified by the fact that the owner of the house where the fire occurred is confined to a wheelchair and was unable to aid his children, who were in the upstairs bedroom where the blaze started. The owner advised the writer that he had asked the telephone company to call the Hicksville Fire Department.

Our Fire District maintains not alone a well-equipped but also a most efficient fire department and responded to the call as it responds to all calls, because it feels that it is more essential to get there and perhaps save a life than to waste valuable time quibbling as to which department has jurisdiction. From the above you will gather that, contrary to what you stated, we did have something to do with this fire.

Inasmuch as your article has been the subject of much discussion, we think it only fair that you publish this letter in its entirety.

of crucial materials.

The proposed building is well located to serve the fastest growing section of our district and may well be expected to ease off some of the burden of the multiplying cost of school buses.

This new building will have a capacity of 600 or more students and is intended as a permanent structure. It may eventually be considered the building to replace Nikolai St. School which was built in 1868 and enlarged in 1897 and again in 1909. In normal times, it would be appropriate to plan for the day when Nikolai St. School could be closed and replaced by a modern structure. But these are difficult times for educators everywhere and the need for this ancient structure will be with us for ten years or more into the future.

The proposed Lee Ave. building has been designed with an absence of frills. The board has calculated the cost as best it was able based upon the most reliable estimates of costs.

This proposed school project is among the fundamental recommendations of the Columbia Survey. It will serve largely the section of the district, south of Old Country Rd. we imagine. It has access from Broadway on one side and from Jerusalem Ave. on the other.

But if you agree with us that this proposition deserves approval, please support your views with a vote on Tuesday, Nov. 14. A new arrangement by the School Board will permit you to go to the High School at any time between 3 and 10 p. m. and vote on that date. There have been equally important issues lost here and elsewhere because voters failed to support their beliefs with their ballots.

Come to the high school next Monday night if you want to discuss this project, asking questions, hear more about it and then be sure you vote on Tuesday.

Parents Are Delinquent

J. HENRY RUTER, chairman of the Boy Scout Committee and a member of the Island Trees P-TA and Island Trees Civic Association, in an open letter to the parents of Levittown-Island Trees area puts his finger on a point that can't be ignored.

He asks a question that deserves an answer: "What are you going to do about it?" The answer should take the form of action—get in touch with him or the local Cub, Girl or Boy Scout leader and offer to help out. Be alert to local youth programs and be on hand to assist.

Youth group leaders can repeat Mr. Ruter's bitter story in almost every local community. Parents are falling down on their job.

The new building will consist of 18 classrooms, two kindergartens, combination gym and auditorium and other accessory rooms.

PO Expects New Interior Fixtures

HICKSVILLE—The new post office building on North Broadway near James St. will have new fixtures and improved stamp and parcel window service facilities, but not until after the first of the year, it was disclosed yesterday by Postmaster William G. Mollitor. Delivery of \$6,000 worth of new interior fixtures for the office is expected later this month or early in December but the Christmas rush will be underway and installation will have to be delayed until after the holidays, he said.

Postmaster Mollitor told the Herald that the new fixtures will include two large parcel post windows at the south side of the building and two stamp windows at the north side. When the office moved from Herzog Pl. the old fixtures were taken along for temporary use.

Mollitor said that under the curtailed Post Office Department budget there is no possibility of keeping the windows open after six in the evening. Donaldson at Washington that many commuters now find it impossible to get to the office before the present 6 o'clock window service closing.

The Post Office will be open as usual until 12 noon this Saturday, Armistice Day.

Mollitor also issued an urgent appeal for early mailing of Christmas parcels and letters, particularly of the state. Nov. 15 is the deadline for mailing of material intended for Christmas delivery overseas.

Postmaster General Donaldson will present a series of dramatizations on a national network on alternating Sunday afternoons from 2:45 to 3 p. m., entitled "Washington Report." The theme on Nov. 19 will be "American Rail Roads Carry the Mail," Dec. 3 "US Airlines Carry the Mails" and Dec. 17 "Uncle Sam Delivers the Mail."

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

ANSWER: Under terms of a public liability policy, the insurance company assumes full responsibility for defending any suits brought against the insured as well as for payment within the limits of the policy of any damages awarded against the insured person. Also within the policy limits, the company will pay any other costs legally assessed against the insured as a result of the suit.


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

In the hearts of those he knew.

No, death to him was not defeat.
But victory sublime,
The grave prompted him to be
A hero for all time.

As we assemble ourselves together on Armistice Day, November 11, 1950, let us never forget the men and women of our town who sacrificed all pleasures and even life itself, in order that they might do their share to help keep the Red, White and Blue flying as the symbol of freedom for all mankind.

To those who served and came back without harm or injury—your family, friends and country are mighty proud of you. To those who served but returned wounded or disabled—your family, friends and country are even more proud of you, and organizations like the Veterans of Foreign Wars are doing all in their power to aid you and your family in any or all problems that might arise because of your affliction or handicap. To those who served but never came back—the nation pays its highest tribute always, but especially on Armistice Day.

To the families that sent men into battle and even death, this day really and truly means something, because all of them know what the word means. You well appreciated the fact that the liberties so cherished by all Americans were in danger and like your forefathers, arose to meet the challenge successfully.

However, there are today some single, non-veteran fellows between 19 and 25, the present draft age requirements, and perfect specimens of health, who immediately upon receipt of their physical notice, run to their supervisors or foremen in business and cry, "Oh, I can't go into the service, I'm essential." "I just bought a new car." "I'm getting married soon" and so on. Days elapse, and lo and behold, they get their deferments. To these, men I address the question, "What does Armistice Day mean to you?"

We can thank God that your group is in the minority, because our country wouldn't be able to defend itself against an attack of the seven-year itch if we had to rely upon your courage, faith and trust in the United States of America.

How can you fellows read about the horrible atrocities being committed to our boys, your buddies, over in Korea; read about the ruthless spread of Communism throughout the world; how can you say the Allegiance to the Flag of our Country; sing the Star Spangled Banner, and then when the call comes to you to help defend our dear land and all its right, you turn your back and cry, "I'm essential."

All of you want to be called Americans and enjoy the blessings in our country, but want no part in defending her or making sacrifices so that her cherished rights might be preserved. Is that true Americanism?

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
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
