**FEW ATTEND DISCUSSION:**

## New Residents Want 2 Parkway Schools Next

HICKSVILLE — New residents from the southwest corner of the school district present at the discussion meeting, Monday night, were more interested in how soon they will get a new school in their locality than in the details of the proposed Lee Ave. building. Less than 100 persons attended the session called by the Board of Education.

A highlight of the evening was the presentation by Frederick B. Tilney of the Governmental Statistical Corp. who has been engaged by the Board as a financial consultant.

Tilney's report appeared to be based largely upon the study and statistics compiled last spring by Teachers College, Columbia University. It was offered on a broad scale with giant-sized charts and graphs. He said there are today 7,500 homes in the community with a potential saturation of 12,000. There are 3012 students enrolled today.

### Tax Story Invalidated

Discussing assessments and tax rates, the story became rather involved and confusing with Tilney expounding a theory that the school budget must be divided into "operating" and "capital" budgets. After some lengthy report by Tilney on a 70 cent debt service

# Open Campaign to Get 6 Crossings Eliminated

HICKSVILLE—Convinced that the economic life of the community is being "strangled" by continuous daily blockades of automobile traffic by Long Island Rail Road crossings here, at grade, the Civic and Community Assoc., Inc., today prepared to launch an all-out campaign to get local crossings eliminated. The campaign will be set into gear tomorrow (Thursday) night when the Assoc. meets in the firehouse auditorium, E. Marie St., at 8:30 p. m.

Stanley Mruz, president of the Civic Association, last night disclosed the appointment of Vice-President James Condon as chairman of the grade crossing elimination program.

"We are convinced that nothing will be done toward the elimination of RR grade crossings here unless the community makes known its demands to the county and state authorities," Mruz asserted. Condon said that it is planned to circulate petitions locally and to get all interested to write to State Senate and State Assembly as well as County and Township leaders in an effort to get state funds appropriated for crossing elimination here.

Six local crossings here have been approved by the Legislature for elimination but are not included in that section of Chapter 195, Laws of 1941, for which funds were appropriated.

Murray G. Tanner, secretary of the State Public Service Commission, has advised the Civics that the "state pays all of the cost of preparing plans and eliminating crossings" and not more than 15 per cent can be charged against the railroad for RR benefits.

## Claim Herzog Place Project Lags

HICKSVILLE—A growing demand was being voiced this week for the speedy completion of the Herzog Pl. widening project where approximately three feet are being removed from the south sidewalk. No construction work was done on the job for a full week, commencing Election Day, leaving the street in a "hazardous condition and danger to pedestrians and motorists," it is claimed. The entire sidewalk on the south side has been demolished and broken cement removed, leaving holes, projecting pipes and other hazards, residents complained to town officials. Herzog Pl. is one of the principal avenues travelled by commuters as they leave the trains at night.

Commuters were steamed up, Monday morning, when they found the public parking field opposite the firehouse posted to give notice of a three hour parking limit. The Town Board enacted the limit at a public hearing last Thursday, effective Nov. 27. The signs, which had been erected Saturday, were quietly removed before noon time, Monday.

A program of supervised activities for the teen-agers of Jericho is underway this week and a staff of officers to direct the group is scheduled to be elected tonight.



## Few Can Take Off Day for Hearings

THERE WAS A TIME, not more than a couple of years ago, when the Town of Oyster Bay had less than six or eight applications for change of zoning within the township in a period of 12 months. Today, we find as many as six or eight applications before the board in a single month and most of the applications concern property and problems in the fast growing section in and around Hicksville.

The laws of our state have been written to protect the interests of the public and for that reason, in connection with zoning change applications, provision is made that public hearings be held upon such requests. Further provision is made for the notification of the public, by legal advertisement, of scheduled hearings.

The same provisions — public hearing and legal notice — are provided in the case of enactment of special local laws and ordinances.

For as long as we have been a newspaper editor in this community — a span of over 16 years — such hearings have taken place on weekday mornings and the vast majority of them take place at the seat of town-government in the village of Oyster Bay on the north shore.

Some months ago we advocated that the Town Hall be moved to Hicksville, a point more nearly in the centre of the township. At that time we commented that the growth of the Township would soon require an enlargement of the Town Hall. Today the town-hall at Oyster Bay is being enlarged to provide space for township departments which have grown to take care of multiplying problems, most of them around Hicksville. It is safe to assume that the Town Hall is not going to be moved to Hicksville at this time.

However, it does seem appropriate that public hearings before the Town Board be held in the evenings and wherever possible in the community directly affected by the proposals under consideration.

For example, six public hearings upon changes of zones and ordinances are scheduled to take place at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, Nov. 21, at Oyster Bay Town Hall. Five of the proposals concern property in Hicksville and one is in Bethpage. Any interested property owner who wants to attend the hearings scheduled must be able to take a morning off from work and somehow manage to get over to Oyster Bay, a good 20-minute auto trip or a longer jaunt if you try to get there by public conveyance such as a train (via Mineola).

In addition, the hearing upon the proposed extension of Hicksville Garbage to the township line on the south, already twice adjourned, is scheduled for the same morning. This question is of vital interest to

than 7,000 persons who have recently become residents of this community.

The notices of proposed changes are given in legal form, but you need a background in surveying to determine just what is involved. For example, Gil Construction Corp. (no business address given) wants to have some property on the west side of Kuhl Ave., rezoned from Residential C to Residential D. There follows a long rigmarole about distance in feet (carried out to decimal points) and angles in degrees, minutes and seconds with reference to a map made Nov. 30, 1891. Of course, no well-equipped home is without its copy of an 1891 map of a particular development.

In addition to the detailed surveying description of property involved it would seem more than appropriate that a small scale map of the section be published in the public notice. Many incorporated villages do this in their legal advertisements of zone changes, and since we understand the cost of publishing the notice is borne by the applicant there would be no additional cost to the taxpayers if the applicant was required to have a cut made and included with the notice.

Further, we are greatly disturbed because many notices of widespread general interest in this section are published in newspapers with little or no general circulation in this community. The seven hearings next Tuesday are, for example, advertised in a paper with less than 25 per cent of the local circulation of the Herald. Occasionally, notices of local interest have appeared in such remote areas as Oyster Bay and Seaford.

The Herald has attempted to keep track of all proposals of local interest, whether they are published in this newspaper as legal advertisements or not. But we must confess that the legal descriptions of properties, as stated from time to time, are baffling. In addition, our write-ups on such proposed hearings appear after they have been "made public" in some other periodical and as a result many people get their first notification of a proposition within a matter of hours of the hearing scheduled.

Of late the town board has found it convenient to make up extra typewritten copies of proposed hearing notices and tack them to telephone poles. However, we believe the public would rather sit back in the comfort of a living room and study a proposed notices at leisure than stand knee-deep in snow or weeds and ponder six or eight page closely typed notice fluttering from an isolated telephone pole.

The Zoning Appeals Board for many years has held its hearings on the first and third Thursday nights of each month. Why not the town board, which has before it matters of even greater weight, generally speaking? And why not hold Town Board hearings in Hicksville, which is more readily accessible to the people of other sections of the township such as Massapequa, since Hicksville is at the near-geographic centre of the township?

tax rate, Harry Ernenwein, member of the school board, interrupted to request that the speaker "clear up this 70 cent tax rate" else those present get the impression that the rate for all educational services would be only 70 cents per \$100 of assessment.

Tilney said he had projected the present total district assessment of \$20 million to \$36 million by May 1951.

He exhibited a map of the school district marked into 16 segments with school sites indicated with letters from "A" to "F." A chart showed that the district has 106 1/2 acres, now acquired, for present and future school sites.

The discussion about the next school to be offered the voters, after the Lee Ave. building, was prolonged. An unnamed gentleman from the vicinity of Levittown parkway, south of Old Country Rd. said he had gotten a letter from William Levitt that day apparently regarding the school situation but did not disclose the

substance of the letter. He asked if a petition to the Board would speed the project for his neighborhood.

Lawrence C. McCaffrey, board member, replied "I don't care if 2,000 people sign a petition. We must consider what is best for the entire district." Mrs. Edna Kuhne Sutton, another board member, stressed "as a board we have a duty to the entire district" and can't just focus attention upon one little section.

Henry C. Bengel, board president, opened the meeting. He introduced George Johnson, of the architectural firm of Knappe and Johnson, who explained in detail the features of the Lee Ave. building.

It developed during the meeting that the building will not front on Lee Ave but will be located on the far west end of the 10-acre tract with its main entrance probably from Jerusalem Ave. off Sixth St.

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

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
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

I hesitate to write what I personally think should be done with these American Communists, but I can say that the Veterans of Foreign Wars is seeking to have the Communist Party outlawed in the United States. Certainly we need to take bold, drastic action to free our country of this menacing threat.

This problem is one of deep concern to the one million two hundred thousand members of the VFW. These men were our "ambassadors" abroad in time of war. They have an important stake in our foreign policy. They prefer to be "architects" of peace—at home—rather than face another war here or on foreign battlefields.

All of us recognize Communism as the greatest menace of modern times. Its godless philosophies and despotic political theories are far more dangerous than the totalitarian forces which the free peoples of the world met and conquered during the first half of the century. The sacrifices we made in lives, money and human misery during the past fifty years will become a mere mockery unless we meet this more dreadful challenge which has been forced upon us by a small group of ruthless tyrants.

The members of the VFW cannot believe that our government has adopted—as our official foreign policy the impractical, hopeful theory recently expressed by Secretary of State Dean Acheson regarding the future of China under Communist domination. The Secretary said in effect: "United States hopes that Mao Tse-tung (Mow O-Say-Tung), Commissar in China, will prove to be another Tito who will act independently of the Kremlin in Moscow. In the event he proves to be a puppet of the Kremlin, then the United States will adopt a policy of hoping the Chinese people will eventually overthrow this foreign-controlled leader and his Comminist forces."

This policy of wishful thinking is completely inconsistent with the clearly defined relations program expressed by the Marshall Plan and the North Atlantic Pact. In fact, such an unfeasible, visionary approach to a very real problem has the effect of nullifying the unselfish sacrifices which our citizens have made in sustaining our anti-Communist policies in Europe.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars recognizes the fact that our foreign policy is formulated by the President and administered by the Department of State. The members of the VFW are determined that the sacrifices of hundreds of thousands of their comrades in World War II shall not be voided by our failure to resist the godless tyranny of Communism. Above all, we are resolved to bequeath to our children the blessed heritage of freedom and opportunity which we have enjoyed because of the unselfish sacrifices of every generation of Americans.

We know that "God grants liberty only to those who love it, and we are always ready to guard and defend it." We pray that with His help in the history of the United States as the greatest democracy the world has ever known, which began with the American Revolution of 1776, will not end with the Communist revolution of the Twentieth Century.
