## Plainview Youth Dies In Accident

ELIZABETHTOWN, N. Y. — Sanford Pilon, 16, of 3 Nassau St., Elizabethtown Park, Plainview, was found instantly here on Dec. 22 where the car in which he was a passenger skidded on Route 9 and hit a tree.

An adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Gagnon of 3 Nassau Ave., the family was traveling in two cars to Chazy, N. Y. When the driver of the lead car noticed that the second car was not following, he turned back to find the crash.

Other occupants of the car received first aid treatment at the Elizabethtown Community Hospital and then proceeded to Plattsburgh. Funeral services were held yesterday at Plattsburgh and interment was at Altoona, N. Y., yesterday (Tuesday).

Buses will stop on signal of passengers. The service was strongly recommended by the Hicksville Business Men's Association, Hicksville Civic Association and civic groups in the section west of the parkway in Westbury.

Copies of the timetable are available at the Herald office and in Hicksville stationery stores.

Service will continue as before along West John St. by Schenck buses for through passengers to Westbury, Jamaica and points west.

## Hicksville's Gift of July Becomes Levitt's Xmas Present to Levittown

HICKSVILLE — Construction of a community hall on Levittown Avenue at Beech Lane which was started last July as a potential fit to the Hicksville Park and District was back in the news this week in the shape of a Christmas present to Levittown residents from Levitt and Sons.

Last July, when Levitt and Sons sent before Oyster Bay Town Board with plans for a shopping center on Levittown Parkway (it was then the middle of the former Terlikowski farm about midway between Old Country Rd. and Hempstead Ave. or Dutch Lane) and asked for a zone change to business, the proposed community hall as a gift to Hicksville was reported.

Hicksville-Wide Tax? Councilman Frank Chlumsky

said at that time that a recreational building with a seating capacity of 1000 was scheduled and that Levitt would be willing to turn it over to the Hicksville Park and Parking District. The local park district would in turn maintain the building by local real estate tax.

Sunday's metropolitan newspaper quoted Alfred S. Levitt as saying that "The hall will serve as a meeting place for Levittown's more than 80 civic clubs, fraternal and veteran organizations and other community groups. It will also be used for theatrical performances, dances and other community activities." It would have an auditorium with a seating capacity of 800.

HICKSVILLE — Rising costs and a vastly increased student enrollment this week forced the Board of Education to go to the voters with two special propositions for supplemental appropriations. A special meeting of the district will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 23, to vote on (1) \$207,000 more for the East St. School addition, and (2) \$134,659.50 as a supplemental budget to operate the district school system.

Voters of the district on Aug. 18 approved a bond issue of \$400,000 for the two additional wings on East St. grade school. Since bids have been received and studied the School Board has found that nearly \$600,000 is today required to do the job. Other school districts throughout the Island have had the same experience.

The budget for the school year 1950-51 has been found insufficient "because the amount of such expenses could not be foreseen in view of the rapid increase in school enrollment this year." The budget for the current fiscal year (continued on page 14)

## Late Xmas Patron Attacks PO Clerk

HICKSVILLE — Temporary and permanent employees of the post office here and its Levittown branch were tired and exhausted when Christmas Day arrived. But for Postal Clerk Stanley Klevanovsky of 25 Willoughby Ave. it was a painful holiday.

Klevanovsky was kicked in the face and head, according to police, by a local resident who tried to mail a parcel after closing time, Saturday night. He was attacked by Stephen F. Musnicki, 28, of 14 Cable Lane, who is being held on second degree assault charges.

Musnicki appeared at the rear door of the post office on North Bway Saturday night after the office had closed and attempted to mail a parcel. Klevanovsky is home in bed today with several loose teeth, a possible broken nose and other facial injuries.

The post office moved and delayed all parcel post material in Hicksville and Levittown up to Sunday but Christmas Day and Tuesday brought new tons by train from out of town. The office averaged more than 100,000 mail cancellations a day for the last couple of weeks before Christmas.

## LEGION TIDE OF TOYS: Post Collecting Gifts

HICKSVILLE — Charles Wagner, Post 421, America Legion, is taking part in the second annual "Tide of Toys." In this program, toys are sent from persons in the United States to children in Europe, Philippines and Puerto Rico. In the 1949 drive, 3,000,000 toys were sent overseas. The goal for 1950 is 10,000,000 toys.

Anyone desiring to contribute to this campaign should contact any of the local committee, comprising Fred L. Brengel, Ernst Gundlach, Walter Schlichting, or call Legion Hall at Hicksville 3-0421 to arrange for the collection. It is of utmost importance that electrical toys should not be given, say, say. Toys denoting militiamen such as tanks, guns and soldiers should not be given.

The toys do not necessarily have to be new, but should not be broken. The donor should securely attach a note or an address, so that the child receiving the toy may write to the donor. This is very important because unless this is done, the purpose of the program is meaningless, officials state.

It should be remembered that the chief purpose of the "Tide of Toys" is to let the children of foreign lands . . . the generation of the future . . . know that they have real friends in America. Such letters already have started a chain of letter writing that promises to build friendship for years to come, reports Post Commander Robert Beard.

# Landia Takes Shape In Many Ways

JERICHO—Levitt and Sons began to move into high gear with plans for the construction of 1700 homes in the section of this community between Jericho Turnpike and Northern State Parkway to be known as "Landia". Maps of the section were studied by postal officials this week to eliminate possible duplication with presently named streets in the area it was learned.

Plans for the construction of a passenger railroad station, 49x20 with radiant oil heating on the Port Jefferson Branch of the LIRR between Hicksville and Syosset near the intersection with Northern State Parkway were disclosed. The plans were revealed for a station "at Hicksville, N.Y." Two weeks ago a spokesman for the LIRR said the Rail Road has no knowledge of plans for a passenger railroad station for "Landia."

## Rent Potato Plant

In addition, Produce Growers, Inc., owners of the quarter-million dollar potato washing plant on Robbins Lane, Locust Grove, which is just about across the tracks from the estimated site of the passenger station, announced yesterday that North Shore Supply Corp. has leased its building for a year with options to renew.

North Shore Supply is a Levitt and Sons subsidiary and it is expected the factory-type building which has a RR siding will be used to house furnishings and materials for the "Landia" houses.

The plant was erected by a corporation of local men in an effort to produce nematode-free potatoes.

The Landia project is described to the trade this week as a two million-dollar program of 1700 residences. The houses are frame with asbestos shingle, one story, no basement, including two baths, five rooms and attached garage. A model house has been erected near the Northern State Parkway entrance on Hicksville-Jericho Rd. east side.

This article was prepared by the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville—Editor.

An effort to incorporate Hicksville as a village is now well underway. The issue will soon be put to the people of Hicksville, first for consideration and discussion; second to petition for it, and finally to vote upon it.

Incorporation, if successful, might well be the most important step forward the community of Hicksville has ever taken.

The need for incorporation is

great and has been for some time. Right now the time is ripe for all the peoples of Hicksville to unite and pull together for one common cause—a better com-

munity.

No politics are involved. There are no national, state or county issues—purely local ones.

Any bona fide resident of Hicksville can become and is welcome to be a member of the Committee and help in whichever way he or she can.

Get this straight! We seek no enemies—we criticize no one—we are, however, strongly opposed to continuing a system of local government designed primarily to govern undeveloped rural areas. Hicksville is now too big, has too many more problems of its own to continue under such an obsolete system.

Hicksville's many problems are not being solved, at least not the way the people of Hicksville would solve them. Traffic, parks,

parking, public transportation, taxis, etc., etc.—these problems need the attention of the persons concerned.

No one is to blame for this—we cannot criticize the Town Board of Oyster Bay for not meeting problems that don't directly concern them. They are just not close enough to properly take care of a Hicksville that has growing pains.

The answer is incorporation—an orderly and natural procedure. The future of our community will then be in our own hands where it belongs.

prepared last February and March and voted upon in May.

During the current year the district has doubled its student enrollment and as a result has found it necessary to hire almost twice as many teachers. Additional supplies for education have been necessary and costs of materials have increased, a spokesman for "the board" said today.

There are more than 2,000 voters registered and qualified to vote upon the two questions on Jan. 23, including those who have registered for the annual meeting last May and all subsequent special meetings and propositions.

Persons who are not yet registered will be given an opportunity to do so, according to Andrew B. Heberer, District Clerk, at Nichols St. School on Saturday, Jan. 13, between 4 and 8 p.m.

The text of the legal advertisement of the special meeting appears on page 4 in this issue of the Herald. The School Board is preparing a special statement of facts about the two questions which will be distributed to residents, school children, prior to the Jan. 23 meeting, it was learned.


