

Costs Rise, Pupils Increase:

School Board Needs More Money For East St and Operating Budget

HICKSVILLE—Rising costs and a vastly increased student enrollment this week forced the Board of Education to go to the voters with two special propositions for supplemental appropriations. A special meeting of the district will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 23, to vote on (1) \$207,000 more for the East St. School addition, and (2) \$134,659.50 as a supplemental budget to operate the district school system.

Voters of the district on Aug. 15 approved a bond issue of \$400,000 for the two additional wings on East St. grade school. Since bids have been received and studied the School Board has found that nearly \$600,000 is today required to do the job. Other school districts throughout the island have had the same experience.

The budget for the school year 1950-51 has been found insufficient "because the amount of such expenses could not be forecasted in view of the rapid increase in school enrollment this year." The budget for the current fiscal year was

Old Country Rd. Bus To Start on Tuesday

FLORAL PARK — Commuter bus service along Old Country Road from Hicksville to Westbury will start on Tuesday morning, Jan. 2, it was announced last night by the Schenck Transportation Co. Service will start at six o'clock in the morning and will be timed to meet trains in and out of both depots.

For the present the service will meet trains from 6 a. m. to 9:30 in the morning and then from 3:15 in the afternoon until 8:15 in the evening. Fare will be 10 cents one way with the State Parkway the breaking point on Old Country Road.

Residents east of the parkway will pay 10 cents to Hicksville and those west of the parkway will pay the same fare into Westbury. At the Hicksville end, the route will travel Newbridge Rd. to the station.

Buses will stop on signal of passengers. The service was strongly recommended by the Hicksville Business Men's Association, Hicksville Civic Association and civic groups in the section west of the parkway in Westbury.

Copies of the timetable are available at the Herald office and in Hicksville stationery stores.

Service will continue as before along West John St. by Schenck buses for through passengers to Westbury, Jamaica and points

Hicksville's Gift of July Becomes Levitt's Xmas Present to Levittown

HICKSVILLE — Construction of a community hall on Levittown parkway at Beech Lane which was announced last July as a potential gift to the Hicksville Park and Parking District was back in the news this week in the shape of a Christmas present to Levittown residents from Levitt and Sons.

Last July, when Levitt and Sons met before Oyster Bay Town Board with plans for a shopping centre on Levittown Parkway (it was then the middle of the former Terlikosky farm about midway between Old Country Rd. and Hempstead Ave. or Dattel Lane) and asked for a zone change to business, the proposed community hall as a gift to Hicksville was reported.

Hicksville-Wide Tax? Campaigner Frank Chumsky

said at that time that a recreational building with a seating capacity of 1000 was scheduled and that Levitt would be willing to turn it over to the Hicksville Park and Parking District. The local park district would in turn maintain the building by local real estate tax.

Sunday's metropolitan newspapers quoted Alfred S. Levitt as saying that "The hall will serve as a meeting place for Levittown's more than 80 civic clubs, fraternal and veteran organizations and other community groups. It will also be used for theatrical performances, dances and other community activities." It would have an auditorium with a seating capacity of 600.

The site of the building, now un-

der construction along with the shops, is well within Hicksville.

Levittown property owners received a gift of six swimming pools from Levitt and Sons a few months ago. The pools were built by Levitt and then "turned over" to a Levittown Park and Parking District which in the future must maintain, operate them, employ lifeguards, etc. Since the Levittown Park and Parking District stops at the Hempstead-Oyster Bay Township line it is suspected that the Parkway Community Hall will be given to the Hicksville District which will levy local taxes throughout Hicksville to maintain the hall just as taxes are raised to maintain other local public buildings such as the schools and firehouse.

Landia Takes Shape In Many Ways

JERICHO—Levitt and Sons began to move into high gear with plans for the construction of 1700 homes in the section of this community between Jericho Turnpike and Northern State Parkway to be known as "Landia". Maps of the section were studied by postal officials this week to eliminate possible duplication with presently named streets in the area it was learned.

Plans for the construction of a passenger railroad station, 49x20 with radiant oil heating on the Port Jefferson Branch of the LIRR between Hicksville and Syosset near the intersection with Northern State Parkway were disclosed. The plans were revealed for a station "at Hicksville, N.Y." Two weeks ago a spokesman for the LIRR said the Rail Road has no knowledge of plans for a passenger railroad station for "Landia."

Rent Potato Plant

In addition, Produce Growers, Inc., owners of the quarter-million dollar potato washing plant on Robbins Lane, Locust Grove, which is just about across the tracks from the estimated site of the passenger station, announced yesterday that North Shore Supply Corp. has leased its building for a year with options to renew.

North Shore Supply is a Levitt and Sons subsidiary and it is expected the factory-type building which has a RR siding will be used to house furnishings and materials for the "Landia" houses.

The plant was erected by a corporation of local men in an effort to produce nematode-free potatoes.

The Landia project is described to the trade this week as a two million-dollar program of 1700 residence. The houses are frame with asbestos shingle, one story, no basement, including two baths, five rooms and attached garage. A model house has been erected near the Northern State Parkway entrance on Hicksville-Jericho Rd. east side.

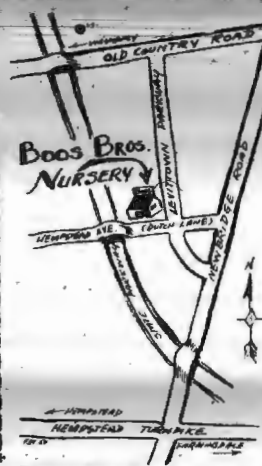
PSC to Investigate Robbins La Crossing

SAY MISTER IS YOUR SHEETROCK SHOWING?
Did Junior, while laying in your unfinished attic, put his foot through the ceiling—Did Mom, while sweeping the floor, push the end of the broom through the wall? Did anyone of many things happen to mar your sheetrock walls or ceilings? 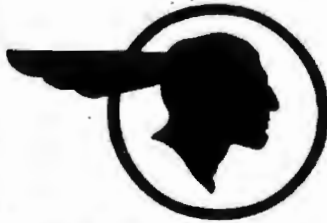

The result was thoroughly unexpected and **CHESLOCK** was brilliant as he kept the powerful bats of the losers from taking advantage of the short wall in left center field.

GUS ECONOMY and **RALEH FERRARA** did a competent job of running the Hicksville Softball League during the summer.

GEORGE BUSCHBAUM was named to coach the Hicksville Field Club.

Deviled Cheese Snacks
 1 1/2 cups shredded dried beef 1 teaspoon bottled mustard
 1 slice bread 8 slices bread
 1 tablespoon fat 16 thin strips
 4 teaspoons flour American cheese
 2 cup Pet Milk (1 1/2 x 2 1/2 in.)
