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### Cite Longer Delays

Members of the Civic Association heard the report at the meeting Thursday night. The Civic group since last July has been attempting to have the depot moved to the west to permit trains to stop for passengers and mail without tying up traffic on Jerusalem Ave. Local residents claim delays there running as high as 15 and 20 minutes, particularly during commuter hours in the morning and evening.

The chief operating officer of the LIRR has reported to the Public Service Commission, according to the letter read at the Civic meeting, as follows:

"We have made a 48-hour check of the crossings in question and find that the physical blocking of the crossings by a train standing at Hicksville Station is restricted to Jerusalem Ave. During the 48-hour period of our test there were a total of 60 trains which blocked this crossing, a total of 2 hours and 27 minutes. The average blockade per train amounted to approximately 2½ minutes or the total daily average blocking of this crossing is 1 hour 13¾ min. Our test further showed that this crossing was blocked during the actual passage of trains over the crossing for a daily average of 3 hours and 10 minutes. This latter figure, of course, would not be affected by any relocation or rearrangement of station facilities at Hicksville."

James J. Condon, chairman of the Civic Association Rail Road Relation Committee, points out that the average may be correct but the report does not reveal the fact that some trains stop for longer intervals. Further, that 3 hours a day blockading by passing trains is bad enough without adding another two or more hours for standing trains for a total of 4 to 5 hours daily, most of this time during periods of heaviest major traffic.

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Regarding moving the station, the LIRR report paints a picture of an elaborate job. The report states: "We have further investigated the feasibility of moving our station facilities to the westward. (continued on page 8)

The test "Red" signal was received here at 12:05 p. m. and the alarm, 20, was sounded immediately, four times. The "white," or all clear came into local headquarters at 12:23 p. m. and the three long blasts were sounded.

as suggested in your letter of July 26, 1950. This would involve relocation of the passenger station, extension of the platform, elimination of express facilities necessitating handling mail, express and baggage by hand truck, track and signal layout changes and relocation of water facilities.

The proposed rearrangement would also necessarily entail certain undesirable operating features. We estimate that the cost of the changes would be in excess of \$39,000.

"In view of the undesirable features and excessive cost of the rearrangement and further, in view of the relatively minor benefits to highway traffic which would be derived from these changes, we are not in accord with the proposal and must decline to take the action outlined in your letter," the LIRR told the PSC.

### Can Be Simplified

"We did not contemplate an expensive project such as the LIRR pictures," Civic President Stanley Mruz commented. "Few trains now stop here for water on the city-bound track since we have many diesels. All we ask is that the express and baggage platform be extended a short distance to the west so that the baggage and mail cars can be loaded. This will take the last car off the crossing at Jerusalem Ave. as soon as the train stops and allow auto traffic to move."

"We are also asking the PSC to have locomotives of east bound trains stop just west and off Jerusalem Ave. so that the gates can rise when the train halts to unload mail and passengers."

Antagonisms And Rumors  
Open letter to the parents of Island Trees School District 26:

It would seem that in a world so full of tension, bigotry and dissension, that the people of our school district should be united in common effort to give our children such an education that, when they are graduated, they will be able to contribute to world peace and the four freedoms. Unfortunately, however, this does not appear to be present in the coming school election. Sectional antagonisms are cropping up, and rumors are that certain residents are urging their neighbors to vote only for candidates in their immediate vicinity.

In all sincerity I would like the voters to consider the following essential points:

(1) We should be interested in developing the best school system at the lowest possible cost—therefore, vote for economy-minded but prudent men.

(2) Vote for the man, not his address. Just because one lives in a Miller home does not make him more or less qualified than one living in a Levitt home.

(Continued from page 5) originating from the Hicksville made. The daily volume of calls subscribers five years ago was about 9,500, which volume has now increased to 61,700 from Hicksville 3 and Hicksville 5 customers.

Under the plan, without paying toll charges, all Hicksville flat rate customers now can, call 72,000 telephones compared to 18,000 in the former toll-free calling area for most of them. ## Video Views

By BILL ROHN

It is becoming increasingly apparent that television is giving radio viewers complete news coverage. A glance at program schedules of both television and radio will show that TV devotees far less often daily operations to news than does radio.

The best television newscasts suffer when compared with even routine radiocasts. Today, when every headline carries terrific significance, the importance of good reporting is immeasurable.

To be fair, the TV newsmen faces mechanical obstacles not confronting radio editors. Good video coverage is represented by on-the-spot film "clips." Obviously, the mechanics of field photography, processing, cutting, editing and delivery are far more exacting and time consuming than setting up eye-witness account broadcasts or culling wire-service tickertapes. This causes out of necessity a lack of adequate film material sufficient to do justice to the many twists in the path of a complete news story.

Little fault can be found with the Camel News Caravan on NBC-TV. The rapidity with which most headline happenings are telecast on this show is credit to a young industry whose technicians are largely inexperienced. A nod of approval might also go to Our mobile's Newsast on CBS.

However, the average television station seems content to allow a carefully groomed announcer to read from news tickers illustrating his remarks with occasional "stills." WPIX seems particularly aloof to the gravity of the world situation it covers. After only a brief look at the lead story on Korea or the U. N., the PIXIES are apt to give a full-blown account of the crowning of Miss Grapefruit of 1951.

Granting that the television medium has grown remarkably in the last two years, it still might be well for this budding industry to remember that its general license is granted for service to the community through the communication of news and public information. Let it follow the good example of radio and develop its own Ned Chalmers, Eric Severeide, Martin Gabelsky and Ed Murrow. There are very few television owners who have thrown away their old radios.
