## Penner Serves Paper Seeks Court Order To Force Town To Evict Press Wireless

HICKSVILLE — Oyster Bay Town Board has been served with papers seeking the ouster of Press Wireless, Inc., world-wide communications organization, from the 100-acre acres it occupies on both sides of Cantiague Rd. in the northwest section of this community. Isaac Penner of Cantiague Rd. served papers upon Councilman Frank Chlumsky, Saturday, as a member of the Town Board. The hearing in the matter is scheduled for Friday morning, Feb. 16, in Supreme Court at Mineola.

The legal action instituted by the Ibsen Contracting Corp. against the township is the climax of more than a year of active controversy over the Press Wireless installations here. What is being sought now is a court order to force the Town Board to order PW removal of poles, wires and buildings, alleged to be violations.

### Cite TV Interference

Residents of Cantiague Rd. have by petition urged the Town Board to oust PW as a "nuisance," citing television reception interference and have repeatedly opposed miscellaneous variances granted over the years by the Appeal Board for further installation of poles for radio transmission.

It has been claimed that the uses made of the property are "detrimental to health, safety and general welfare of the community, a direct hazard to residents in the area and anyone passing in the immediate area and is depriving the property owners of the proper use and enjoyment of their property."

Press Wireless first acquired property in the area in 1931, twenty years ago. The opponents claim the town clerk's records fail to disclose a permit ever being granted to erect a wireless station there by Press Wireless.

In handling applications, we are seeking to take care first of those places needed for actual occupancy.


Copper usage for the second quarter of the year is yet to be determined. We will, however, use our best efforts to advise applicants promptly when jobs are scheduled and to keep these dates.

## Video Views

By BILL BOHN

Educators recently before the FCC showed that during an entire week of telecasting New York TV stations presented a total of only 19 educational programs. In contrast to this it was revealed that 19 of all programs were crime, Western and thriller shows.

This and other carefully documented testimony was offered to prove that 25 per cent of the television channels should be allocated for educational use. Coming at a time when TV is struggling to get on its feet financially, such a decision should be considered carefully.

Almost 25 years ago similar discussions were taking place when radio was in its boisterous youth. It was the educators, then as now, who demanded an active role in radio's development. Fortunately, they were given their share of the task, but not by government edict. Instead, radio and education worked together gradually allowing the new medium time to get established.

Today, television's growing pains are compounded by those inherited from radio. Not only has TV monumental technical difficulties to overcome, but it must face advertisers, audiences, labor groups, and performers, who, seasoned in the ways of radio, are better equipped to make their demands heard and felt.

Thus it is surprising that there have been any cultural productions at all when the public demands frivolous entertainment. Never-the-less, television has seen fit to present fine performances of Julius Caesar, Macbeth, Barretts of Wimpole Street, Victoria Regina and many, many more. It has devoted time to round-table discussions, UN sessions, talks and lectures, plus countless documentary films.

Perhaps if educators had not failed in their own task, the level of American taste might be above the programs so lustily condemned. Who is to blame producers who follow a successful formula when the audience rating of the Johns Hopkins Science Review is pitifully low and the Milton Berle Show, which is on at the same hour, is at the top of the surveys.




