HICKSVILLE—Two dentists of this community, both World War II veterans, are leaving for active duty with the Army this week. They are Dr. Gilbert Gilinsky, 81 Jerusalem Ave. who leaves for Fort Hood, Texas, on Friday, and Dr. Vito M. Cappelletti of 71 No. Broadway, who is going to Fort Dix, N. J., next Monday.

Both are members of the Hicksville Lions Club.

Dr. Gilinsky is being recalled by the dental department of the Ar-

my. He is closing his office on Jerusalem Ave. today (Wednesday) and will leave Friday, going to Texas by auto by way of Michigan. Both Dr. Gilinsky and his wife were on the staff of the Veterans Hospital at Fort Custer before coming to this community 17 months ago.

Town Asks Safety Devices At 2 Unguarded RR Crossings

OYSTER BAY—The Town Board has requested the Public Service Commission to order the installation of "proper safeguards" at two Hicksville grade crossings which now lack bells, lights or gates. The crossings are at Charlotte Ave. and New South Road and upon the town's request the PSC is expected to schedule public hearings shortly.

The North West Civic Association of Hicksville, which together with the Hicksville Civic and Community Association Inc. has been campaigning for more adequate protection at Charlotte Ave., this week disclosed that the LIRR does not believe traffic there is "heavy enough" to warrant installation of more protection.

Frank H. Simon, LIRR general manager, has informed NW Civics that a traffic check on four consecutive days revealed auto and pedestrian traffic "was extremely light." Further a study of accidents there between 1936 and 1950 shows "a total of five accidents on Charlotte Ave. crossing, in only one of which there was anyone seriously injured."

Both Civic groups believe that saving a single life would more than justify the expense of adequate safeguards at the crossing. Many local motorists make 2-mile trips around to avoid using either the Charlotte Ave. or New South Rd crossings, it is stated.

Vamps Get 2 Alarms In Freezing Cold

HICKSVILLE—Volunteer firemen were crushed with ice, Wednesday night, when they battled a fire well below ground level in the midst of a raging snow storm. A building in the bottom of the Preferred Sand and Gravel Co. pit at Duffy Ave. called out the vamps during supper time. An overheated stove was believed to be the cause of the blaze.

The vamps also had the freezing cold to combat on Thursday afternoon when a car owned by Mrs. A. Nygren of 35 Harding Ave. caught fire and was destroyed while on the oil pit at Madden Auto Works, Park Ave and Woodward Rd.

Under the present setup a veteran must be enrolled in any school which is recognized by the Veterans Administration before July 24, 1951; in order to secure the benefits he is entitled to under this law. If you have not applied as yet and are interested in some particular course of study—make it your business to "follow-up" as soon as possible. Courses are available at the Long Island University, Hicksville Branch, right here at the High School.

PEOPLE YOU SHOULD KNOW: Concludes 25 Years As Fire Commissioner

HICKSVILLE—William Braun, of 83 Halsey Ave., recently completed a quarter century of service to the community as a commissioner of the Hicksville Fire District. He was first elected to the board in 1925 and was re-elected for successive five-year terms until he declined to run again last fall. There is no financial compensation for the job. John Leckie was elected his successor and took office on the first day of this year.

During his tenure, Bill Braun saw the population of the district grow from about 6,000 persons to more than 17,000. The same period saw changes in fire fighting practices and the acquisition of new, modern equipment for the local volunteers.

A situation unique in firemanic circles in the state developed during his last term when his son, Vincent W. Braun of Third Street, was also elected to the Board of Commissioners.

Vincent, an ex-chief of the fire department, as was his father before him, has been on the board four years. At one point he was chairman of the board while his father served as a member.

William Braun was a volunteer in the department for 26 years as a member of Co. No. 3 and later Co. No. 4. Two of his sons, Vincent and Fred, are active firemen. Two brothers, Edward A. Braun and Clarence Braun, are also on the active list of the department.

The entire fire department became motorized in 1925, the year Bill Braun first took office. In that year three new White trucks were bought, two pumpers and one chemical for companies 2, 3 and 4. Previously in 1921 the first motorized equipment was purchased, two model-T Fords.
