Increasing Monthly: School Bus Cost May Top \$54,000 For Term

HICKSVILLE—Bus transportation of smaller students, public and parochial, in this school district is today costing more than \$6,000 a month and has cost the taxpayers of the district \$24,311.80 since the start of the term last September, it was disclosed today by the Board of Education. A recent count showed that 1,644 children are now riding from their homes to classes and return each school day, which is almost half of the total enrollment.

The increase in the monthly bus bill from Benkert's in Bethpage which holds the contract reflects the gain in the number of students being transported, it was found.

Transportation of students for the kindergarten to the sixth grade started during the 1950-51 term when the sum of approximately \$30,000 was spent. At the annual meeting last May 2, by a vote of 109 to 51, an appropriation of \$45,000 for transportation was knocked out of the budget.

On June 21 by a vote of 4 to 1 with 725 ballots cast, the voters approved expenditure of \$20,000 from anticipated surplus funds for transportation of pupils. Nov. 14 by a vote of 339 yes and 58 no, an additional \$20,000 from surplus funds was voted for bus service, and on Jan. 23 of this year an extra \$5,000 for general transportation was included in the deficiency budget approved by the voters, or a total of \$45,000 has been appropriated so far this term.

With five months to go in the term at the rate of \$6,000 a month, the total cost for the service this year may exceed \$54,000 for the term since \$24,317 has been spent already.

Keep Dogs On Leash, Town Law

OYSTER BAY—All dogs in the township including Hicksville, Plainview, Bethpage and vicinity, must now be muzzled or are liable for seizure by the dog catcher. The Town Board has adopted an ordinance, the text of which appears in this issue on page 18, which makes violators liable for a fine of not over \$25.

Dogs sunning loose without a muzzle, unless "under immediate and full control of the owner or person in charge" on a leash, will be taken to the town dog pound at Locust Grove and held five days. Owners may reclaim dogs before this time expires by paying the town clerk \$2.

This week, second precinct police reported three dog bite cases in Hicksville: Little Donald Gahner, age 4, of 11 Nevada St. was bitten by a dog owned by John Jeanson of 130 No. Bway on Sunday while playing in the rear of his home. He was treated by Dr. Joseph Wycoff.

Edward Bady of 34 Acre La. was bitten on the right wrist by a German police dog while petting the animal, Friday. The owner is J. Rodeckas of 53 Acre La. and the victim was treated by Dr. M. Parlow of 170 Acre La.

Speldon Weinberg of 8 Basket La. was nipped on the calf by a German shepherd dog on Feb. 22 owned by a party by the name of Krewan of 2 East Ave. He was treated by Dr. S. Cytyn of 21 Blue Grass La., Levittown.

Brengel Breaks Soil for School

HICKSVILLE—Ground was broken Monday morning for the additions to East St. School which will increase the student capacity by 100 per cent, take at least a year to complete and cost over \$600,000. Henry C. Brengel, Board of Education president, turned the first shovel of earth.

Present for the brief ceremony were Mrs. Edna Kuhne Sutton, vice-president of the board; Dr. E. H. LeBaron, superintendent of schools; Michael Sullivan, attorney for school district; Adolph H. Knapp and Fred J. Beagan, of Knapp and Johnson, architects; D. W. Mitchell, superintendent of construction for Ryan Construction Corp. and E. B. Terrill, chief of works for school district.

The additions will add nine classrooms, two kindergartens and a cafeteria to the building.

Mothers Approve Uniform Clothing For St. Ignatius School Students

HICKSVILLE—The 900 students of St. Ignatius School will wear uniform clothing starting October 1. A discussion and vote on the question was held at a meeting of the Mother's Auxiliary, Monday night, at the school auditorium and the plan was approved with 139 yes votes and 47 no.

The uniform for girls will include a blue pleated jumper with white cotton blouse, short sleeves and peter pan collar. For the first year, girls will wear out the white

blouses they have on hand, after which the uniform blouse will be in effect.

Boys will be dressed in blue trousers, material to be either corduroy, gabardine, serge, etc.; long-sleeved white shirts and blue ties. Dark blue sweaters may be used by boys and girls if needed, it was decided.

The uniform dress will be worn from Oct. 1 to May 31. In September and June children may wear what they please, it was agreed.

RR TO Erect Fence

Local Districts Most Critical In NY

ALBANY — Four mid-Island school districts are among six in Nassau County and 50 in the en-

ire state which the State Commission on School Buildings finds may not have sufficient local re-

sources to finance their public school requirements."

The local districts listed are Hicksville, Island Trees, Jerusalem (Levittown) and Plainedge. Others in the county listed are Mepham Central High School and West Hempstead.

In its second report covering the State outside of New York City, the Commission proposed that the Legislature appropriate \$300,000 to continue for another year a program of emergency assistance to these school districts which will be financially hard-pressed in paying debt service on school building bonds.

The Commission said the localities generally are alert to the problems they will face in school construction beginning in Sept. 1952 when the impact of the large postwar birth rate increase will begin to be felt.

"School building problems can be solved without an undue financial hardship upon either local school districts or the State, if materials and labor are available," the Commission declared.

The situation in Nassau is regarded by the Commission as the most critical in the entire state.

Mrs. McIntosh Disputes Francke

To the Editor:
As a resident of Hicksville who has been interested and worked for the community welfare for the past 30 years, I do not like Mr. Francke's statement: "The haste and anxiety to rush the question of incorporation in themselves, no one likes to be pushed and stampeded into an important decision. It is my sincere hope that none of our people will be stampeded into signing petitions and giving their support to the incorporation move until they have individually become thoroughly convinced that incorporation is for the benefit of Hicksville. To act in this matter without such conviction is an extremely serious matter for any citizen."

First I would like to "correct the statement to be "pushed and stampeded." As chairman of the Spinners Division of the Committee for Incorporation of Hicksville, we filed 20 speaking invitations from our most active church, veterans, civic and fraternal, also P-TA organizations. The great interest shown during our five month's speaking engagement bears any "pushing or stampeding" for our Research Committee has provided us with accurate facts and figures from all the incorporated villages in Nassau County. The question and answer periods gave our citizens ample opportunity to acquaint themselves with both the advantages and disadvantages, if any.

I surely was not stampeded into joining the Committee for Incorporation. I was delighted to find that at long last there are a great number of people in Hicksville sharing my opinion, who devote their time and energy for the improvement of our community and to be of assistance to our neighbors. When people tell me that we should have incorporated 20 years ago, I would at this point like to remind Mr. Francke of the many times in years gone by when I mentioned incorporation to him, he would always give me the same answer: "The time is not ready. Wait until we have better roads" and many similar excuses. No, Mr. Francke, we are not being stampeded. We took your excuses 20 years too long. Maybe we would have a nice new government Post Office and more and cheaper parking fields, good sidewalks and better side streets. Also more industries to help pay for our schools. Our veteran organizations could commemorate Memorial Day without worrying how to raise the money to pay proper respect to the boys who paid the supreme sacrifice.

And maybe the Public Service Commission and the LIFT would become conscious, through our efforts, that our lives and businesses are in danger by the crossing delays. And we would be benefited by receiving about \$51,000 a

year from the State to help us run a good local government, plus all the mortgage taxes and building permits which we lost so far. And how about a youth program? The boy scouts and girl scouts as well as the police boys clubs? How about them? Do they have a place to meet? If we were incorporated funds would be allocated here by the state to reimburse us up to 50 per cent of the maximum allocation which is determined at 25 cents per child under 21. See what we are losing now with all the children to care for?

In answering Mr. Francke's worry about the cost of setting up a Department of Public Works, I would like to remind him that we are very fortunate in Hicksville as W. John St., Woodbury Rd., Jericho Rd., Old Country Rd., Bway, Jerusalem Ave., and Newbridge Rd. — all our major streets — are either county or state highways and therefore not a local maintenance problem. It does not take a lot of arithmetic to figure the maintenance of side streets.

The town has not seen fit to go anything about sidewalk construction and as a result people from the Gables, Hicksville Park and other sections have to walk in the road.

A further quote: "The Town of Oyster Bay has been able to spare its residents the payment of any tax at all for the expenses of the administration of the town. Can the sponsors of incorporation assure us that the same will be true of a village government?" Mr. Francke is aware that the Town of Oyster Bay receives revenue from our town beaches which we helped to finance, also a million and a half dollar windfall from Grumman's and what assurance can he give that with our town government expansion we will not have our taxes increased?

By law the salaries of Village Mayor cannot exceed \$1200, three trustees \$500 each, judge \$1200, clerk according to the duties required, superintendent of public works and quarters and equipment will be economically handled by really civic-minded people for the honor of a well regulated community. I am happy to tell Mr. Francke that, as a Village Captain, it is a great pleasure to meet my neighbors, both old and new, who received me very kindly.

There are eager for incorporation and willingly offer their services. There is no pushing or stampeding anyone. I am sorry that we cannot wait until he is able to personally discuss everybody with his own eyes. We have no team captain in Hicksville. I would like to see the Levittown homes section and a girl scout leader from that area assure me that the people like our schools, our churches, our people

and our community. Thank you all, we like you too and hope that you will incorporate our Hicksville School District 17.
Mr. Francke's views are obsolete because they lack vision and ignore progress.

Incorporation Facts

To Whom It May Concern:
Here are some notes of interest about the proposed incorporation of Hicksville as a village. The area involved is the entire school district no. 17. The steps are: presentation of a petition to the Town Board signed by property owners representing one-third of the total valuation, a public hearing by the Town Board and then a referendum vote of the resident property owners. A majority approval is required.

When we incorporate, Hicksville people are bound to know more about its problems and how to solve them than the "absentee" group in Oyster Bay. Under incorporation, all public meetings and hearings concerning local matters would be held in Hicksville in the evening when almost all could attend.

By definition, incorporation means simply "United in a body or community by legal action. Think it over carefully from all angles. Talk about it with your neighbors and attend meetings and discussions on the question. Hicksville needs incorporation."

APPLICATIONS for lifeguards for Levittown swimming pools are now being taken which indicates that summer can't be far away. However, notice in the Levittown Tribune of where applications for such work are being received is certainly an eye-

brow raiser: "Levittowners who desire to serve as life guards," says the Tribune. "were advised to submit applications to Nassau County Republican Headquarters in Mineola."

Need Convenient Office

SELECTIVE SERVICE headquarters for Local Board No. 3, which serves the Mid-Island area as well as most of the Town of Oyster Bay, Town of North Hempstead and City of Glen Cove, is not centrally located. It is established in the Kensington Village Hall at Great Neck and the parent of any youth who has been told to report will tell you that the office is not the most accessible place available.

During World War II headquarters for Selective Service was logically located in the population centre for this end of the county — at Hicksville. With the prospect of even more men being called in the immediate future, the need for a convenient office in this area is urgent. We would also like to call attention to the fact that no member of the Draft Board is a resident of our community—even though it is one of the largest in the area served.

Six pools in Levittown, all south of the Township line in the Town of Hempstead, this year are under the supervision of the Park District of Hempstead Township. A tag system will be used this year with use of the pools restricted to "residents of Levittown Park District and their guests."

Two pools will probably be ready for use this summer (season from May 30 to Labor Day), both built by Levitt and Sons and both north of the Township line. One is at the West Village Green on Newbridge Rd. and the other at the as yet unnamed Village Green on Levittown Parkway, next to the Christmas-gift Community Hall which is almost finished. It has been suggested that these two pools might be turned over in Oyster Bay Township to the Hicksville Park and Parking District. The boundary of the Park District for Hicksville is all of School District No. 17.

There probably will be a lot more said about this before you get ready to stick your big toe in the water.

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

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
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Hicksville Park and Duffy Park: Can't Hear Air Raid Alarm Sirens

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

understand and use the present government they have we would be doing a better service than wasting time on incorporation," he said.

Francke said that there is a rumor that the mayor and council of the proposed incorporated village of Hicksville would work without pay. "If they do, that is just the kind of service we will get, the kind you get for nothing."

"There has been a lot of fighting about the name of Hicksville," he said. "It doesn't matter to me. I like the name but I am not going to try to jam the name down your throats."

"A village government is the cause of splitting a community," he explained in citing the case of the Glen Cove Incorporated city meetings which have become a "show" of squabbling to be enjoyed by the spectators.

Cheaper Than Nothing?
"We have not had a Town tax for the past 12 years," said Francke who is chairman of the

Hicksville Republican Committee, "and you can't have a government any cheaper than for nothing."

"We want a friendly, thriving community which is more important than unity in government," he continued. "I want to assure you that many old residents want you here. You may have heard about trying to stop building permits for big developments. This feeling of not being wanted is due to the Incorporation Committee and the publicity given to it. That slogan of 'Hold That Line' like an iron curtain, was one of the silliest things I ever heard."

"There is nothing to gain but more taxes. The Town now gets \$6 per head in State aid and incorporated villages get \$3 a head in State Aid."

He urged the 52 present for the meeting not to sign any petition unless completely convinced. "If no petitions are signed it will die before coming to a vote. Don't sign a blank check" he said.

Francke concluded his talk by stating that incorporation is an "antiquated form of government in a congested area."

Boost Garbage Rates
During the NLIHOA meeting it was brought out that garbage removal service for the Levitt homes in the Township of Oyster Bay, now conducted by a private contractor, will be increased from \$3 to \$3.75 for a 3-month period unless the contractor is given permission by the Town Board to pick up and use the incinerator at night.

A motion was approved to write to the Town Board requesting eight garbage collections in order to keep the \$3.00 rate. A committee will study the situation and make recommendations as to obtaining another contractor, forming own garbage district or going in with the Hicksville Garbage District.

Robert Baird, president, announced that an ordinance has been passed by the Oyster Bay Town Board that dogs must be leashed when off the owners' property.

Baird read a letter from the LI Lighting Co. confirming the announcement made at a previous meeting that no new street lights can be installed due to the copper shortage except for hospitals, etc. The order for street lights has been placed with the Lighting Co. by the Oyster Bay Town Board and as soon as materials are available the lights will be installed.

School Question
A resident from the Levitt homes in the Hicksville School District asked why the School Board chose to build a wing on East Street School rather than building a school in the Levitt home section of the school district where there are no schools.

Jack Durtzman, chairman of the education committee, said that according to a survey made by Columbia University of the education

problem in Hicksville, the first step suggested was to build a wing on East Street School and did not recommend a temporary school in the district.

He said that the Lee Ave. School might be finished about the same time as the East Street School wing because the Lee Ave. School "although not a temporary school is not the permanent type of building and so construction will be faster."

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Steel Arriving For Giant Tank

HICKSVILLE—Erection of a new steel water tank, the third for the community, is scheduled to start shortly on Newbridge Rd., near Dutch Lane, at the site of new well no. 8. It was learned this week. Steel for the new tank which will hold a half-million gallons of water and almost double the present storage capacity of the district has arrived on the scene.

The community has a 350,000 gallon tank on Newbridge Rd., further south, and a 150,000 gallon tank on Bethpage Rd.

F. R. Davidson, superintendent of the district, told the Herald this week that the Board of Commissioners has let a contract to H and A Engineering for the installation of diesel auxiliary pumping engine for well no. 4, off Bethpage Rd. the equipment was ordered to insure the community water supply in times of electric power failure such as was experienced several months ago.

Well no. 6 at the site of the new tank is also an electric well with diesel auxiliary equipment. All new wells and the additional tank storage are expected to be in full service this summer at the time of peak demand in the community for water supply, Davidson said.

Library Growth

In Sept.

Except for this past year when moving operations and lack of space prohibited the holding of outside activities, all nine years of Mrs. Cecil's administration were marked by a series of programs of lectures and book discussion groups for adults and extensive summer programs of reading clubs and arts and crafts classes for children, with field trips to New York as the culminating feature of the program each fall.





NOTICE OF ENACTMENT OF ORDINANCE

TAKE NOTICE that by resolution of the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, N. Y., duly adopted by said Board and entered in full upon its minutes on the 20th day of February 1951, following a public hearing duly held thereon after advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

AN ORDINANCE regulating the seizure of unmuzzled dogs in the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, pursuant to Article IX Section 130 of the Town Law of the State of New York.

Section 1. It shall be and hereby is declared unlawful for any person, owning, possessing or harboring any dog to allow same to run loose or be at large upon any public highway, street, sidewalk, or other public place in the Town of Oyster Bay without being securely muzzled, unless such dog is under the immediate and full control of the owner or person in charge thereof and such dog is on leash.

Section 2. Any person or persons violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be liable for a forfeit and pay a penalty of not more than twenty-five (\$25) Dollars for each offense. Any violation of this Ordinance or any part thereof shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person so violating any of the provisions thereof shall be and is hereby declared a disorderly person.

Section 3. The dog warden of the Town of Oyster Bay is authorized and directed to seize and confine at the Town Dog Pound for a period not exceeding five days, all dogs found at large unmuzzled or not under the immediate possession and control of the owner or person in charge thereof. Any dog so seized may be redeemed by the owner upon the payment to the Town Clerk of a fee in the amount of Two (\$2) Dollars. All dogs not redeemed within such period of five days shall be destroyed by the dog warden who shall be entitled to the fees as provided in Section 123 of the Agriculture and Market Law of the State of New York.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Macaroni Leaf with Creamed Tuna

Broadcast: March 5, 1951

- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 2 cups hot milk
- 4 tablespoons water
- 4 tablespoons ground macaroni
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 1/2 cups cooked macaroni
- 4 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 7-oz. can tuna

Grease well, then dip with flour a roasting pan or leaf pan. Mix egg, milk, water, onion, salt, pepper, macaroni and macaroni. Put into mold or pan. Set in pan holding 1/2 in. hot water. Bake in moderately slow oven (325) 45 min., or until firm. Remove from oven; loosen sides of leaf with knife. Let stand 5 min. Mix and heat until steaming hot mushroom soup and baked tuna. Turn out leaf. Serve with creamed tuna in ring or around leaf. Make 4 servings.

Note: If creamed tuna is too thick, add 2 tablesp. water.
