Calling All Radio Men: Civil Defense Gets Radio Transmitter Equipment for Disaster Control Center

HICKSVILLE—With the purchase of radio transmitting and receiving equipment for the Hicksville-Plainview Civil Defense control center this week, an appeal was issued today for all radio amateurs and others experienced in radio work to enroll without delay in the CD forces. The CD Council voted to purchase the equipment at a meeting held Wednesday night. Proceeds of paper salvage drives are being used to buy the equipment, which includes a portable unit.

Dan Sutter, chief of the communications division, wants all men and women experienced in radio operation to contact him at home, Hicksville 3-108-J, or enroll this Friday night at Nicholai St. School or at the Herald office daily.

The final registration session of the current series for CD registration and fingerprinting will take place this Friday at Nicholai St. School between 7:30 and 9:30. A photographer will be present and fingerprints for identification will be taken. All CD personnel must carry official identification, Director Frank Sutter warned today. There are about 500 men and women now registered, about half of the number required, he said.

To Instruct Homeowners: Fire Chiefs Want Direct Calls For Levitt-Built Area Alarms

EAST MEADOW—The studied attempt to sell the belief that "where Levitt builds, is Levittown" is preventing efficient fire fighting service in six fire districts to the detriment of the public, it was shown this week. Chiefs of fire departments bordering and surrounding Levittown are planning continuous homeowner educational programs to emphasize which fire-fighting organization should be called in time of emergency, the Herald learned today. Telephone Co. authorities will be asked to speed calls to the fire department requested, particularly those from phones in the Hicksville 5 exchange.

Chiefs and representatives of East Meadow, Hicksville, Wantagh, Bethpage, North Bellmore and Levittown Fire Depts. met here Monday night, at the invitation of County Fire Marshal George W. Clough to discuss mutual problems.

With many Levitt-built homes now standing in surrounding districts and another 2,000 planned for construction to the south this year, the volunteer firemen are finding it difficult to provide the assistance they want and can render, because many homeowners think they live in Levittown, it was brought out.

Dispatching Unsatisfactory

An attempt to relay calls for the fire department from Hicksville 5 telephones, via the Levittown Fire dispatcher's office, has not proven a complete success. Cited at the conference were instances where people asked for a particular fire dept. (i.e. East Meadow or Hicksville) but were connected to Levittown vamps anyway. Further, the Levittown dispatcher has found it difficult at times to get a call through to the correct neighboring department.

A continuous program of homeowner education is favored by the surrounding communities, it was learned. Cards are being or will be distributed in adjacent districts to advise residents which department should be called in time of emergency. Such a card distribution by volunteer firemen, door to door, will probably have to be repeated every three or four months to serve as a reminder and to cover homes where there are changes of occupant.

Hicksville 5 Praised

Chief Stanford Weis of Hicksville and Robert Gilleas of Bethpage pointed out that since the Hicksville 5 exchange has handled fire calls for Hicksville, Bethpage, Jericho and Plainview with few, if any, instances where the call for help went to the wrong department.

Others present pointed out that "Invariably" fire calls in Hicksville 5 exchange all go to Levittown department, even when the person in need of assistance states the name of the correct department.

MORE GRASS FIRES AND Flames Damage Dwyer Barn, John St. House

HICKSVILLE — Members of the Hicksville Fire Dept. had two serious fires this week in addition to a series of seasonal grass fires which are plaguing volunteers throughout the Island. Property damage as the result of local fires totalled almost \$25,000.

The home of John Kelsey and Fred Adams of 142 W. John St., owned by Mrs. Margaret Lyon, was damaged by flames and smoke last Thursday morning. Kelsey, who is 71, was injured while filling a kerosene stove in his home when the stove exploded.

Flames gutted the first floor rear of the house but vamps under Asst. Chief Edward Schluter quickly brought the fire under control. Damage was estimated at almost \$5000. Kelsey was taken to Meadowbrook Hospital.

The Dwyer's new potato storage barn on Newbridge Rd. at the corner of the West Village Green was the scene of a disastrous blaze, Good Friday afternoon shortly before 3 o'clock. Asst. Chief Schluter was in charge of about 30 men at the scene who fought the flames from all sides for almost 2 hours. An electrical connection was believed to be the cause of the fire.

A company of Levittown firemen under Chief John Cashman were also present and gave assistance with the approval of Asst. Chief Schluter. A large stock of potatoes stored in the structure was damaged by fire and water. Damage was estimated at almost \$20,000 to the structure and contents.

There was a grass fire Wednesday morning at Newbridge Rd. and Old Country Rd. Another brush fire called out the firemen Easter Sunday at noon.

erected soon on streets where their district boundaries end. Bethpage District recently announced that an order has been placed for similar signs to show their boundaries.

There are approximately 9,000 phones in the Hicksville 5 exchange which is located on Hempstead Tpke. Phones in Levittown and other homes in Hicksville, north of the township line and east of Newbridge Rd., are in that exchange. Phones west of Newbridge Rd. will be in Hicksville 3, it is understood.

One official at the meeting pointed out: "Part of our difficulty results from the fact that people who have bought houses built by Levitt and Sons think they live in Levittown. If that were so, then Levitt would include Carle Place, Strathmore in Manhasset, Rockville Centre, which of course would be ridiculous."



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
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
