SUBJECT OF STUDY:

PO Officials Not Ready To Change Boundaries

WASHINGTON—The boundary between Hicksville and the proposed Levittown Postal District is today the subject of study by postal authorities. No decision has been reached as yet, contrary to published reports, and none is expected before July, the *Herald* learned authoritatively yesterday.

Joseph J. Lawler, assistant postmaster general, has written the Hicksville Civic and Community Association, that "the facts on hand in the Dept. indicate that the territory involved has outgrown the facilities of the Levittown Branch, and consideration would have to be given to the establishment of an independent post office for this area."

"An investigation is currently underway to determine what the boundary lines of the contemplated new post office should be."

Oppose Move North

The Hicksville Civics have been corresponding with Lawler and Congressman Ernest Greenwood since January. They have taken the position that they are not opposed in any way to the establishment of a Levittown Post Office in place of the present branch of Hicksville office. However, they strongly oppose a move by certain individuals to have the new office embrace in its postal district the Levitt-built houses in Hicksville.

From a source close to the Post Office Dept. here, it was learned that the matter is in the hands of postal inspectors.

May Hit Million: Set Preliminary School Budget Hearing Apr 16

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education will hold a preliminary discussion upon the tentative school district budget for 1951-52 at the high school auditorium on Monday night, Apr. 16, it was announced today. It is expected to be a record budget, approaching one million dollars. The vote upon the budget takes place on Tuesday night, May 1, with election of two trustees for 3-year terms scheduled for Wednesday, May 2.

No figures for the proposed, tentative budget are expected to be available until the night of the preliminary meeting on Apr. 16.

Altering a practice of many years standing of publishing the proposed budget as a legal advertisement for four consecutive weeks prior to the voting, the Board of Education this year will print the budget as a legal advertisement the week prior to the final vote. Copies of the budget will be available, prior to the vote, at the school office.

Must Register Again.

All persons who plan to vote on the budget and for school trustees were warned today by District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer they must register, in person, on either Apr. 14 or 21 at Nicholai St. School bldg. All previous registrations during the year since last May expire with the coming annual meeting. Voters may register on Apr. 14 from 11 a. m. to 3 p. m. or on Apr. 21 from 3 to 8 p. m. Heberer said.

The terms of office of Henry C. Brengel and Edna Kubie Sutton expire this year. No candidates for election on May 2 have filed designating petitions as yet, according to Heberer.

Brengel and Mrs. Sutton were elected three years ago in a four-way contest which included Lewis Homire and William J. Borto.

25 MILES FROM KOREAN FRONTLINES: Battle Odds 50 to 1, Koziuk Writes

Pfc. John W. Koziuk, son of Mrs. Jennie Koziuk of 19 East Carl St., Hicksville, has been in Korea since August serving with the U. S. Marines. (He is pictured in the accompanying photo on the left side with an unidentified friend in Korea.)

He writes to his mother: ". . . Well, Mom, I was one of the platoon that was ambushed on the 5th of this month and my luck is still holding, as we lost five dead and five wounded on train guard and today I'm going on another one and am praying my luck still holds. I lost the pictures you and Sis sent me and hope the Gook—that has them stops a sing and that they will be found and returned to me. . . .

". . . This war might be over pretty soon, as we are pushing the N. K. further back all the time. I would be over now except that Russia keeps sending equipment to them. . . . Give Tanya a hug and kiss for me and tell her I think of her too, and tell her that her brother Johnnie is going to try and come home. Well, Mom, if she asks you why we fight over here, tell her that we fight here so that the folks at home don't have to worry about the enemy coming over there. . . .

". . . The guys were looking for wood and must have lifted something which was attached to a booby trap. Do you remember how I used to hate to go to a funeral or to see someone who was dead? Well, I've seen so much of it over here it just doesn't seem to bother me at all anymore. I guess I am pretty sure about not being home for the holidays and maybe for quite a while, as the way our forces are being pushed since the Chinese Reds have come in, it looks not so good. They have sent 200,000 troops already and we expect quite a few more.

"It's hard for the mail to keep up with my outfit as it is always on the move from one place to another. And we will probably move again pretty soon, as the Chinese just sent another 200,000 into Korea and that makes a total of about 500,000 Korean and Chinese Communists we've got to fight. The way the Army keeps running away from the N. K. and C. G., it leaves all the mean and bitter fighting to the Marines and the Gooks outnumber us about 50 to 1. They are about



25 mi. from us right now, as my outfit is carrying supplies up to the front line with bulldozers with trailers hooked behind them.

"". . . The way the Chinese Communists are sending help and equipment to the North Koreans, the U. S. or rather U.N., better send more troops or there will probably be a massacre over here as you can't fight without men and equipment. War sure can age and change a man.

"". . . I received all the packages sent me and sure did appreciate them. Mom, tell Tanya and the other kids I always think of them and pray for all the folks and I hope we can whip the hell out of those damn Communists and maybe get home for a while. Mom, explain to the folks that I'm sorry I don't write them all, but with the way things are over here I can't seem to get enough time so when I write one I'll try very hard to write to every one over there.

"". . . It'll probably be awhile for the next letter as I can't seem to get much stationery as it's hard to find. . . . May God bless you and may He watch over you all."

Born in Hicksville, he attended East Street School. The family had resided on Kramer St. before moving to New Jersey when Sandy was of high school age. He attended Sunday School at the Hicksville First Reformed Church. Before entering service, he was studying for a teaching career.

He served in World War II at Guadalcanal and Iwo Jima. He was a sophomore at State Teachers College, Mount Clair, N. J. when he was recalled to active duty in September. He was 24 years of age.

BOND RESOLUTION OF UNION FREE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 17 OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, N. Y., ADOPTED MARCH 28, 1951, AUTHORIZING THE CONSTRUCTION OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BUILDING WITHIN THE DISTRICT AND THE ISSUANCE OF \$855,000 SEMI-ANNUAL NOTES OF NO. 17, IN ANTICIPATION OF A TAX TO BE COLLECTED IN INSTALLMENTS.

Recital 1. That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 17 of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, New York, is hereby authorized to commence an elementary school building on the school site presently owned by the District or the Astoria School District, to erade and improve the school building, to purchase the necessary original furnishings, fixtures, equipment or apparatus required for the purpose for which such school building is to be used, and to expand for said object or purpose, including preliminary work and related incidental thereto, a sum

recital of this resolution, and in accordance with plans and specifications approved or to be approved by the Commissioner of Education, at a total cost not to exceed \$865,000.

Section 2. Pursuant to the provision referred to in Section 1 hereof, voted to levy and collect in annual installments, serial bonds of the District are hereby authorized to be issued in accordance with the provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 34-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York, amended, for the specific object or purpose described in Section 1 hereof.

The estimate of the maximum cost of said object or purpose is \$865,000, and the amount of the tax to be levied and collected of general taxes for payment of the serial bonds hereby authorized.

Section 3. The amount of the principal and interest on said bonds is hereby determined and declared.

The object of this resolution is the construction of an elementary school building which will be of "Class A" or previous construction as defined by Section 110-a of the Local Finance Law, and the uses of the specific object or purpose described in Section 1 hereof.

The estimate of the maximum cost of said object or purpose is \$865,000, and the amount of the tax to be levied and collected of general taxes for payment of the serial bonds is hereby determined and declared.

Section 4. The current bonds are not required to be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds authorized by this resolution.

Section 5. It is hereby stated that each of the bonds authorized by this resolution shall contain the recital of the date of issue, serial number and said bonds and any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds shall be general obligations of the School District.

Section 6. It is further stated that the serial bonds authorized by this resolution, and of any notes issued in anticipation of said bonds, may be converted only if:

Recital 1. That the obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the School District is not authorized to levy and collect in annual installments, and is suing the bonds and anticipations, and is hereby declared to be

Section 7. The provisions of law which should be complied with as the date of the publication of such resolution, and not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such object or purpose for which the School District is not authorized to levy and collect in annual installments, after the date of such publication, or

for such obligations as authorized in anticipation of the provisions of the constitution.

Section 8. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

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

In as much as so many people have requested the quantities needed to install a cement slab or patio, we devote this column for your future use.

Concrete is a simple mixture of Portland cement, water and various grades of sand, gravel, stone or cinders, all of which are called "curing agents." Water and cement interact chemically when mixed and harden around the aggregate to form concrete.

Other agents are added to the concrete at the time of mixing to make it waterproof or colorful. The strength and durability of concrete varies with the kinds of cement and aggregates used, and amount of water added. A knowledge of the component parts is necessary to achieve the proper job. The following table of contents is needed for a patio or slab per 100 square feet as proven a good mixture.


