Circus, the biggest in the world, is coming to Hicksville on June 7, 8 and 9, it was disclosed last night by Robert Beard, Commander of Charles Wagner Legion Post of Hicksville. It will present performances in cooperation with Nassau and Suffolk Legion Posts on a 55-acre tract of land along Jerusalem Ave. at Tenth St., entirely under canvas. The Big Show is expected to draw tens of thousands from all parts of the

island. Tickets will be sold locally at the Legion Hall.

Legion officials credited Town Councilman Frank Chlumsky and Lewis Waters with assisting in the arrangements to obtain local site. The area lies between Tenth Street and Walnut Lane on the east side of Jerusalem Ave., entirely in Hicksville. Last year it located on Old Country Road just over the Parkway bridge in Westbury.

## First School Voter Registration Saturday; Hearing Monday

HICKSVILLE—With two trustees of the School District to be elected for three-year terms on May 2, and no designating petitions filed as yet, there was much speculation and rumor this week concerning candidates. At least one and maybe two candidates were expected to appear from the south section of the district. The deadline for filing of petitions with District Clerk Andrew B. Heberer is Sunday, Apr. 15, to obtain a position on the ballot.

### Mrs. Sutton Petition Out

The terms of Henry C. Brengel and Mrs. Edna Kuhnle Sutton expire this year. Brengel, who is president of the Board said a woman member, has not stated whether he will run again, although friends are urging him to do so. Mrs. Sutton, completing her first three-year term, is the only woman on the 5-member Board. Her friends have a petition in circulation, it was verified last night, and she is expected to be a candidate.

Robert Baird of Summer Lane, who was an organizer of the North Levittown Home Owners Committee and recently resigned as its president, was prominently mentioned this week as a candidate. He admitted yesterday that he had been advised that a petition in his behalf is being circulated and said he would run if the people wanted him.

A group of residents in the Levitt home area not officially connected with the NHOA is planning to enter one or even two candidates for election, asserting that "we feel we should have representation on the school board." An incorrect report got around yesterday that last night was the petition deadline and for several hours there was a flurry of activity in the neighborhood. The committee is expected to select candidates before Saturday.
