## Bank Purchases Bethpage Site

**BETHPAGE** — The Bank of Hempstead has taken title to property on Broadway, here, for a branch bank. It was disclosed yesterday (Tuesday) at the Kiwanis club meeting by Robert Glaser. He also reported that the Town Board has started condemnation of part of the baseball field, tract next to the Legion Hall on Washington Street for public parking.

The branch bank site is the former St. Martin of Tours rectory building on Broadway, just below the Broadway garage. Kiwanians present gave Past President Mel Sturtevant a rising vote of thanks for his efforts to bring a bank to the community.

The proposed parking field consists of 26 lots set back 100 feet, west of Broadway and 100 feet east of Stewart Avenue. It was one of several sites proposed to Councilman Chlumsky by the parking committee.

Fred J. Noeth, Herald publisher, was guest speaker at the meeting. He recalled the events surrounding the change of community name from Central Park to Bethpage 15 years ago.

# Handful Gets Facts: Gross School Budget Tops Million Dollars

**HICKSVILLE** — The gross budget of the school district for 1951-52 will be \$1,122,798, an all-time peak, it was disclosed at the discussion of the preliminary budget, Monday night. The total gross budget for the current year is \$802,774. The tax rate this year is \$2.13 per \$100 of assessed valuation. An unofficial estimate indicates the rate may rise to \$2.62 next year. The budget will be submitted for adoption on May 1.

The anticipated rate is based upon a total district valuation of \$31 million compared with the present valuation of \$20 million. The official valuation which fixes the rate is not announced by the County Assessment Department until August.

### Few At Hearing

About 50 people appeared for the preliminary discussion, Monday night. Henry C. Brengel, president of the board, conducted the session. Among the items of interest was bus transportation in the district for children up to the sixth grade. The estimate is \$60,000 for next year compared with \$53,000 allowed this year. There are 1,750 children now being carried on seven fulltime and 10 parttime buses on private contract.

## Black Windows Brings Firemen

**HICKSVILLE** — The town fire marshal's office was investigating this week a fire which damaged the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Barnes at the corner of Cottage Blvd. and Fairview Ct. sometime early Sunday. The homeowners were visiting in Philadelphia at the time.

Vamps led by Chief Stanford Weis were called shortly before 10 o'clock Sunday morning when a neighbor, Mrs. Lambert of Fairview Court, noticed that the windows of the house were smoke-streaked. Gaining entrance thru an unlocked bathroom window, the vamps found there had been a fire in the cellar which apparently had burned itself out due to lack of air in the closed house.

The telephone company reported an interruption of service on its line there at 4:15 A.M. which could have indicated the fire was at a peak at that time. When the firemen got in the house everything was covered with soot, but there was no fire or heat.

The occupants had left on a visit the previous afternoon (Saturday) and learned of the damage upon their return after a three-day call.

## 1200 Hicksville 3 Phones Get Service

**HICKSVILLE** — About 1,200 householders in the service area of Hicksville 3 telephone exchanges got telephone service over the weekend as pre-installed equipment was connected with the central office on W. Nicholai St.

Most of the new phones, some of which have been installed in houses for almost a month are south of Old Country Rd. and in the section built up by Levitt and Sons west of Newbridge Rd. Some Halstane and Speigel homes also were connected.

A spokesman for the telephone Co. told the Herald yesterday that there are now 6,000 instruments in the Hicksville 3 exchanges which includes Bethpage, Jones and Plainview also, and almost 11,000 phones in Hicksville 3 with central office on Hempstead Tpk. which includes Levittown, Millshire Park, Island Trees, East Meadow and parts of Hicksville.

The cable installation work has not been completed for the Hicksville 3 central office but is expected to be finished in a few weeks, giving still more local residents service.

## Little Bug Bans Site for Circus

**MANHASSET** — The Ringling Bros. • Barnum and Bailey Circus is still coming to Nassau County, June 7, 8 and 9, but it will not locate on the site chosen last week along Jerusalem Ave. at 10th St., Hicksville. Kenneth Molloy of the Manhasett Legion Memorial Fund Inc. told the HERALD Friday that the 55-acre tract was ideal but strict State Dept. of Agriculture quarantine restrictions on the golden nematauke of potato make it impossible to use the former farm. The regulations prohibit the movement of vehicles, humans and animals across soil listed as quarantined unless treated with live steam before moving out of the county. The steam treatment would, of course, be impractical.

It was indicated this week that two other Hicksville sites are being considered.

BETHPAGE — A gross budget of \$554,583.75 for the 1951-52 year will be voted upon Tuesday night, May 1, in the school here at 8 p. m. The proposed budget is \$60,645.50 higher than last year.

However, with \$36,000 surplus on hand and an estimated \$53,615 state aid coming, the net budget is \$265,770.75 to be raised by taxation. (Detailed budget on Page 13.)

The main increases in the proposed budget are \$14,630 more for teachers' salaries than last year's budget provided. Voters will also vote on a \$5,000 Public Library budget and elect a 5-year trustee to fill the expired term of Jacob Schaaf on Tuesday night.

An election of two trustees to the School Board will be held Wednesday, May 2, between 4 and 9 p. m., at the school. Thomas Rozzi and Peter Curcio, incumbents, members, will seek re-election, it is reported.

## Make Public Telephone Number to End Conflict

**HICKSVILLE** — Weather permitting, members of Hicksville Fire Department will start the distribution of 10,000 stickers to new and old householders in the fire district, Sunday, advising them to call a special number in case of fire.

The number is Hicksville 3-0026.

The red on white sticker measures 3 inches by 5 inches and is glued for pasting to a phone book or near the household phone.

The listing of a number to call in case of fire, according to the local Fire Commissioners, is expected to eliminate much confusion and delay in the routing of alarms to the Hicksville Dept. For more than a decade, the phone number has been "unlisted" and was only connected in event of an emergency.

A recent series of incidents wherein householders in the Hicksville 3 exchange have found it difficult to get through to the Hicksville Fire Dept. has prompted the new policy. It was learned listing of a public number for fire calls only was also recommended recently at a conference of Fire Chiefs of six departments at East Meadow concerned with the dispatching of equipment and the receipt of outside calls by Levittown PD.

### Massapequa Tops March Building

**OYSTER BAY**—Massapequa led the Township of Oyster Bay with 93 new homes built during the month of March and Hicksville was second with 87 new homes, according to the Town Building Department here.

Bethpage had 82 new home permits and Plainview one. There was a total of 312 new homes for the Township.

William DeFaria, chairman of the board referred the following statement of explanation to the voters of the District or behalf of the fire commissioners:

"At the Annual Budget Hearing last September, the voters of the Bethpage Fire District approved the purchase of a new fire truck at an estimated cost of \$15,000, and further approved the purchase of street signs to be erected within the District, at an estimated cost of an additional \$1,000. The Fire District budget was thereafter increased and submitted to the Town Board for the sum of \$15,000 for inspection and certification to the County Board of Supervisors.

In approving the budget submitted by the Board of Fire Commissioners, the Town Board voted to include the appropriations voted by the people for the purchase of the new fire truck and for the purchase of street signs. As a result, these items were not included in the tax rolls and no tax has been levied by the Town to pay for these two items.

The Board of Fire Commissioners did not learn of this fact until about two months ago, after the first truck and the street signs had been ordered. Several meetings have been had with the Town Board and with representatives of the Board in an effort to borrow the necessary money, which money had been appropriated by the voters last September. However, it has been determined that the reason of the fact that these items were not included in the budget adopted by the Town

Board and by the County Board of Supervisors, it is now necessary to submit the proposition to the voters of the District for their approval a second time.

"Originally it was planned to pay for the entire cost of the purchase of the new fire truck and the street signs out of this year's taxes. However, by reason of the fact that taxes were not levied, the Board now contemplates the collection of the funds for these two items over the next several years and the issuance of several bonds immediately. The original amount of \$15,000 voted by the people in September has been increased to \$16,350, to take care of the costs of holding a special election, advertising, printing, appraising, opinion of bonding counsel, payment for inspectors of election and legal services.

"It is expected that the truck will be delivered early in May, and it is hoped that the people of the District will vote favorably upon both of these propositions."

## Annual School Meeting Important

ABOUT 50 PERSONS (there were various assorted estimates of the number) turned out Monday night for the discussion of the preliminary budget of Hicksville School District. In view of the fact that the budget is at an all-time peak over one million dollars to be spent during the year starting July 1 for local education, we find it no less than shocking that so few bothered to come out and go over the budget.

It could be that the public is so well-satisfied with the Board of Education and its management of the taxpayers' money that they stayed away.

It could be that the public was just too darn lazy to stir from the television set for a few hours. (The meeting was ended in less than an hour).

It could be anyone or a million other reasons—most of them poor excuses.

Self-government is expensive in the sense that it demands the contributions of time and interest from the public. You can't "let George do it" and retain your rights and privileges.

On Tuesday night, May 1st, the budget will be submitted for final adoption. What is decided on that evening will be extracted from you legally.

Last Saturday was registration day for voters of the school district. Next Saturday, May 21, is the final registration day. Unless you register, you can't vote upon the school budget or the library budget. You can't vote for school board members or a library trustee.

No matter how many times you have registered before, the state law requires that you register at this time if you wish to vote—and your duty as a citizen requires that you DO vote.

Only 112 persons registered last Saturday. The guess is that the total registration will be under 1,000. There are probably 4,000 or 4,000 persons in Hicksville District eligible and otherwise qualified to vote.

The budget for next year represents hours of thought and also in its preparation. The school board has a tremendous job in planning for the education of ALL CHILDREN in ALL PARTS OF THE DISTRICT. It was said Monday night that by June 30 of next year there will be about 4,000 students attending Hicksville Public Schools—around 800 more than the present enrollment.

There was good news for taxpayers told Monday night. For months the Board of Education has

been attempting to get emergency state financial assistance to help carry the tremendous burden due to our great increase in enrollment and population. The announcement was made at the hearing that \$150,000 is coming to Hicksville from the State of New York as emergency aid. This is in addition to and besides the regular educational state aid funds. Trips to Albany and efforts by the Board have paid off.

You owe it to your children and yourself to be interested in the affairs of the school district. Register this Saturday and vote on May 1 and 2.

Bethpage, Jericho, Plainview, Old Bethpage and other nearby districts do not require advance registration. However, May 1st is the annual school meeting and budget vote in each district.

## OPS Gobbledeegook

HICKSVILLE MERCHANTS, as well as those from other neighboring communities who went to the meeting at Amityville Monday night to hear authorities of the Office of Price Stabilization explain the program came home with a feeling of disappointment.

They were dazed with the cross references to sections of the law, categories, appendix, filing dates, freeze dates, markups, fair trade prices, etc.

The speakers prefaced their remarks by explaining they were presenting their own personal versions of the cumbersome law, although they were expected to speak with authority.

The theory of OPS may be wonderful but the execution of its regulations for the local retailer is a back-breaker.

The term of Mrs. Joseph J. Ulmer, president of the board, expires. She is the only candidate.

The new proposed budget is an increase of \$6,220 over last year. It includes two new items, \$875 for grounds and improvements and \$312 for grass and snow, necessitated since the Library moved to a separate building on Jerusalem Ave. last September.

Other increases in the budget include \$12,200 for salaries against last year's appropriation of \$9,250.





## HERALD GARDENING DEPT.: Selection Of Garden Site Is Important

"If in vain you toil, blame the culture, not the soil."

Home gardeners who have been dissatisfied with their garden production in the past ten years may well consider that bit of philosophy. It is very easy to blame the soil or the seed for almost any crop that doesn't produce well. Actually, lack of a few hours of sunlight directly on the vegetables, small fruits, or flowers during the middle of the day; poor drainage, tree roots, inadequate spacing, and poor fertility may cause the trouble.

Shade from buildings or trees prevents food growth and production, particularly of crops that develop seeds such as the vine crops, tomatoes, beans, and corn.

Trees frequently rob the shallow-rooted vegetables and flowers of plant nutrients and moisture. Walnut trees are toxic to some garden crops, especially tomatoes.

### Poor Drainage Woes

Poor drainage leads to difficulty on the heavy soils. Tile or under-drains are the answer for the long pulls. A couple ditches, at least a foot deep, will help temporarily. Annual applications of coal ashes also loosen up the compact clay soils.

Attempts to grow several plants in the space needed by one often prove disappointing. Each crop has a minimum space requirement and failure to provide it is sure to result in poor production or complete failure.

The natural soil reaction, acidity

or alkalinity of garden soils changes more than the soils in open fields. There may be a difference between the end of the garden nearest the house and that farther way because of burning papers or other waste materials.

The only practical laboratory or chemical test for garden soils is the one for the degree of acidity.


