

QUESTION: I am a salesman and I use my car in business. How do I obtain insurance which would enable me to pay or renting another car if mine was stolen? I'm referring to the period from loss of the car till it was either recovered or the company settled for the loss.
ANSWER: The standard auto theft policy provides for reimbursement not to exceed five dollars per day for rental of a substitute car. Total payment for this purpose not to exceed one hundred fifty dollars or the cash value of the stolen car.

Huettner Closes Doors, Ends Business



33 YEARS after coming to Hicksville, H. F. Huettner was ready to open this modern structure at the corner of Marie St. and Broadway on May 26, 1923.

(Continued from page 1) from progressing. The men even work under huge canvass protection, brick laying is being done with snow trying to get to the bricklayers."

Praiseworthy Monument
Just before the completed structure was opened on May 26, 1923, H. F. Huettner told a reporter that his first store had 1500

square feet of floor space, compared with 25,000 in the new store. The Long Islander reported: "The Huettner building will be a more enduring and praiseworthy monument to the memory of the Huettner name than any expensive shaft of granite that might be raised in Plainlawn Cemetery. This wonderful structure stands like a lighthouse to people coming into Hicksville." When it was opening, the building was declared "the largest, handsomest and most substantial general store building east of Brooklyn."

Mrs. Henry F. Huettner, who passed away a year ago in her late eighties, was long active in the life of the store. She was in the store daily and after the death of her husband, she supervised his operation with her sons, Arthur and Harry. Her late home at Jerusalem Ave. and W. Marie St. was recently sold to a local realtor.

While negotiations have been taking place for the use of the Huettner store by some other concern, arrangements have not reached the point where a definite announcement can be made of the "future" occupant. There have been numerous rumors, none of which have been confirmed.

The Home HANDYMAN'S CORNER

By **TOM CASHEL**
SO—YOU WANT BUILD A TERRACE . . . OK
The floors of the terrace can be made of any one of a number of materials. The most common is a plain or colored sand and cement mixture, or irregular shaped pieces of slate. Brick also may be used effectively. Any one of these materials will fit in with the architectural design and outside finish of your house.
Don't make the thing too small — so many folks say how they wish they had made their terrace larger. After all, three or four chairs and a table on a small patio and you're crowded. Mark the outline of the terrace on the ground, then start digging (all you need is a strong back for this) and get all the top soil and loam out before laying concrete. Regardless of the size of the terrace, make an allowance for drainage. It will trickle up like an accordion. We have hand books to guide you on the quantities needed as well as advice on preparing the area you have selected. Slope the terrace away from the house a little. Then should you want a roof over it—a very inexpensive — yet serviceable material to shed the rain and sun is: corrugated aluminum sheets (only \$2.84 each) braced with a few 2x4's and two 4x4's for upstitch complete the idea. These new ideas and materials are easy on the pocketbook, it's good to consider them in your plans. Even an UNHANDY MAN can do it. We'll help you dope it out.
